## Panhandle Days results in unification of areas


#### Abstract

By DAVID BOWSER Staff Writer Pampa Police Chief Trevlyn Pitner reported that South Plains and Panhandle representatives play Panhandle representatives played well together in Austin this week as well together in Austin this week as local civic officials and businessmen gathered at the State Capitol to meet with their legislators. "Panhandle Days were held in conjunction with the South Plains this year," Pitner said of the biennial event. "It was an opportunity for cities to let Austin know we're here." He said that while the cities and towns across the Texas Panhandle and South Plains often compete for grant funding, they work together for the region the region. Pitner s Pitner said six people from the commerce and economic development corporation represented Pampa. The big issue that was discussed, Pitner said, was wind energy. State Rep. David Swinford, R- Dumas, has worked Dumas, has worked on developing a grid that could be used to sell electricity generated by windmills to other states. Pithey're ready to start building," Pitner said. Much of the money for the projec is coming from investors in Dallas is coming from investors in Dalla and Houston, including the Hun family. Pitner Commission during their meeting Wednesday. According to Pitner, Swinford claimed there claimed there would be some 10,000 new jobs in the area during the construction phase and 3,000 to 5,000 new jobs to maintain the system once it has been built. "These are high tech jobs," Pitner said. "It's really a neat deal." Pitner said transportation issues, particularly the Port to Plains initiative, were discussed with area legislators. ## Early DST could foil computer calenders

with all meeting invitees " with all meeting invitees. something treacherous afoot? Actually, it's a potential problem in any software that was programmed before a 2005 law decreed that daylight-saving time would start three weeks earlier
and end one week later, beginning and end one week later, beginning
this year. Congress decided that tis year. Congress decided that
more early evening daylight more early evening daylight
would translate into energy savings.
Softw
Software created earlier is set to automatically advance its time-
keeping by one hour on the first keeping by one hour on the first
Sunday in April, not the second Sunday in March (that's March 11 this year).
The result is a glitch reminiscent of the Y 2 K bug, when cataclysmic crashes were feared if computers interpreted the year 2000 as 1900 and couldn't recon-
cile time appearing to move backward. This bug is much less ward. This bug is much less
threatening, but it could cause head-scratching episodes when

 only in computers, of course. It will affect plenty of non-netand automatically adjust for daylight saving, like some digital watches and clocks. But in those instances the result will be a nui-sance (adjust the time manually or sance (adjust the time manually or

for time of day. In many, changing the rules around daylight saving is a snap, but in others, it may be more complex.
"There's no rule that says you
have to represent time in a cert have to represent time in a certain Thewlis said. "How complicated it is to implement the change has to do with the original design, where code is located."
Further confounding matters, here are lots of old computer pro-
grams whose original vendors don't support them anymore meaning there's no repair available. Some gadgets, such as VCR clocks, may not have any mech
nism to update their software. nism to update their software. Also, the change originated in
the United States and is being fol the United States and is being fol-
lowed in Canada, but not most other nations. That could befuddle conferencing systems and other applications that run in multiple
countries at once. countries at once.
In our hyper-networked age
with data synchronizing on the fly with data synchronizing on the fly fewer clocks that we have to manually change for daylight-saving time - it might be hard to imag-
ine that computers' time could fall seamlessly keep their clocks in with "time servers" run by the government and other parties. But what those time servers provide is "Universal Time" or Greenwich Mean Time. You tell your computer where in the world adjustment to Universal Time. A common fix is a "patch" that reprograms systems with the updated start and end dates for daylight-saving time. Some of these updates are targeted at specific systems, while others have wider implications - such as one
from Sun Microsystems Inc. for older versions of the Java older versions of the Java
Runtime Environment, which often fuels applications on computers and Web pages.
Microsoft planned to send its
daylight-saving patch to Windows daylight-saving patch to Windows
PCs with the "automatic update" PCs with the "automatic update"
feature Tuesday. Users with automatic updates turned off should matic upatates turned off should
download the patch from

Microsoft. (New machines run ning Windows Vista are immune,
since Vista was finalized after the 2005 law passed.)
However, computers running anything older than the most recent version of Windows XP known as Service Pack 2, no longer get this level of tech sup-
port. Owners of those PCs should go into the control panel and unclick the setting that tells the machine to automatically change the clock for daylight-saving time. They have to make the change themselves when the moment
arrives. (This is a sizable populaarrives. (This is a sizable popula-
tion; according to Gartner Windows. 2000 alone was still running 14 percent of PCs worldwide last year.) For people who store their appointments in Microsof
Outlook or other desktop-based Outlook or other desktop-based
calendar programs - rather than dynamic, Web-based programs such as Google Calendar - the situation gets trickier. Patches fo
calendar calendar programs are available, but appointments entered before a patch was applied might still be
registered in standard time rather than daylight time - off by an than.

Ranchers try to preserve purity of Texas longhorns

horns they raise to be, well, horns the Her passion, though, lies with preserving the pure
longhorn breed that roamed Texas and other parts of the West during the mid-1800s. "A true Texas longhorn is endangered right now," said Davis, president of the
Cattlemen's. Texas Longhorm Registry, which is striving to keep the bloodline of the longhorn as pure as possible. The longhorn isn't on any endangered lists, but the crossbred longhorns competing in livestock show
have far more heft and girth than the rangy, gaunt animal of the Wild West.
Davis and other ranchers believe crossbreeding with other cattle species is diminishing the
numbers.

Government settles on design for new nuclear warhead

Associated Press Writer WASHINGTON (AP) Bush administration selected a design Friday for a new generation of atomic warheads, taking a major step toward building the first new nuclear weapon since the end of the
Cold War nearly two decades ago. The military and the Energy Department selected a design developed by the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory in California over a competing design
National Laboratory in New Mexico.
The decision to move ahead with the warhead, which eventually would replace the existing arsenal of weapons, has been criticized as sending the wrong signal to the
