Coyote Howl Past the Hornet's Sting

The Borden County Coyotes howled through out the night as they dominated the number 8 team in the state last Friday night at Coyote Stadium. The Coyotes put up 56 points in a little over three quarters against a good football team, increasing it's record to 3-0. The Mighty Coyote defense only allowed 7 points on the evening. They gave up only 7 first downs and 150 total yards of offense. The Coyote offense managed to record 16 first downs and a season high 382 total yards of offense.

The Coyotes took the ball first, and on the first play of the game Colt McCook hit Colt Miller on a 60 yard pass reception that put the first points on the board for the Coyotes. Nick Flanigan kicked the PAT good, making the score 8-0.

The next two Coyote TD's were scored by Fernando Baeza with runs from 9 and 11 yards out. Flanigan kicked one of the PAT's good, and the score at the end of the first period was 22 to 0.

The Hornets scored their only TD of the evening next with a one yard plunge to end a good

drive. Their PAT was blocked by Ed Rodriguez making the score 22 to 6.

The Coyotes quickly got the ball back from Highland with good defense and on the first of the next possession, McCook out raced the Hornet defenders, breaking several tackles to reach the end zone from 47 yards out. The PAT failed tallying the score to 34 to 6.

The Coyotes then recovered their second fumble of the evening, as Baeza stripped the ball from a Hornet on the kick-off return and then fell o the ball. Kevin Pinkerton then caught a McCook pass for a first down. Baeza caught a McCook pass on the next play and went 16 yards for the touchdown. The PAT failed, and the half ended

with a score of 40 to 6.

In the third period, Ryan Grant scored first for the Coyotes by diving over the line from 4 yards out. The PAT failed, and the score was increased 46 to 6.

The next Coyotes possession was capped off by a 26 yard field goal attempt that went through the uprights with plenty of room left. Baeza caught the snap from Pinkerton, and McCook booted the oblong pigskin through the uprights with plenty of room to spare. The score put 4 points on the board to make the score 50 to 6 with just :34 seconds left in the third period.

With 7:29 left in the fourth period, Kevin Pinkerton caught a McCook pass and ran 48 yards for

Coyote JV Tie The Wildcats

The Borden County Coyotes traveled to Jayton to play the Westbrook Wildcats Thursday night. The Coyotes and the Wildcats battled to a 20-20 tie in 28 minutes of action packed football. This contest created a whole rainbow of emotion, before the final relief came as Javier Galvan deflated a last gasp effort by the Wildcats.

The Coyotes got off to a great start as QB Dale Grant, after a great play fake hit Cody Nowlain on a 65 yard touchdown pass. The extra point failed, and the Coyotes had a quick 6-0 lead. The defense then turned around and held the Wildcats to a three and out situation that gave the Coyotes their second opportunity. On this drive, the Coyotes mixed the run with the pass well before the Wildcats stopped the Coyotes inside the Wildcat 20 yard line. The Wildcats then marched 62 yards of power football to pay dirt and a -6 lead after a successful point after run.

The Coyotes took little time answering back as Philip Abalos took a Jacob Zant pitch and raced 52 yards for the Coyote TD. Again, the Coyotes were unable to convert the extra point.

The Wildcats root possession of the ball late in the 2nd quarter and marched right down the field. The Wildcats converted two critical 4th down plays and eventually completed a 16 yard touchdown pass between two Coyotes defenders with only 8 seconds remaining

in the opening half to take a 13-12 lead to the locker room. The 3rd quarter was pretty silent, before the Wildcats turned a busted play to open the fourth quarter into a 10-12 lead. The extra points was good and 8 points looked to be too much as the Coyotes had missed their last 7 extra points tries on the season.

The Coyotes took over deep in their own territory with about 4 minutes left. The Coyotes went back to good old fashioned power football as Dale Grant converted a 4th and 2 into a 38 yard touchdown to cut the lead to 20-18. Dale Grant then snapped the ball to Jacob Zant who held for Javier Galvan who booted the extra point through for a 20-20 tie with 2:20 left in the game.

The Coyote defense then continued the momentum swing as they held the Wildcats to a three and out. On the punt return, Dale Grant was about 2 inches from breaking the run. The Coyotes then had another emotional change as they threw an interception with 40 seconds left. The Coyotes showed tremendous character as they held the Wildcats out of the end zone on a play culminated by Javier and Cody defending a last gasp play in the end zone. Final score 20-20.

The Pups had to work a little harder on this drive as Nuckols carried the ball to the 10, for a 5 yard gain. Sharp then carried the ball to the 5 for 5 more yards, and on third and goal from the 5. Quarter back, Brionne Jackson faked the ball to Nuckols, and then pitched the ball to Sharp who was wide open to jog in for the score. The PAT kick was blocked and the score was now 19-0.

The Pups received the ball right back as the Stangs's offense coughed it up when Tanner Poole wrapped up the QB and forced a fumble. Talin Pepper fell on the loose ball.

On third down from 30 yards out, Sharp scampered the distance for another Pup touchdown. The PAT kick was no good, making the score 25-0.

The Stangs got on the board for the first time right before the half, and ran the point after over for one point to make the score 25 to 7.

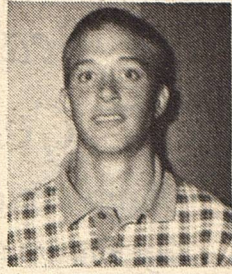
The Stangs found the end zone once more on the Pups' defense to put up 7 more points with just a few ticks of the clock left. The final score of the game was 45 to 26.

Lindsey led the girls with her fifth place finish in a time of 14:06, right ahead of Holly's sixth place finish in 14:09. Valerie Wootan barely missed a medal as she placed nineteenth with a time of 14:44. Other girls and their times are: Bekah Hensley, 15:10; Crystal Dye, 15:31; and Hailey Adcock, 15:39.

The high school

junior varsity girls were led by medalist Shaina Isaacs's fifteenth place in 16:25. Ky Merritt, Jessica Ellison, Amanda Watts, and Rebecca Garcia also ran, finishing in 17:58, 18:21, 20:15, and 20:17 respectively.

The junior high girls, who ran a two mile course, had two medalists, with Bobbi Kempf placing third with a time of 14:14, and Dalene Kempf placing fifth with a time of 14:31. Ryan Grant had 8 tackles and a fumble recovery. Kevin Pinkerton had 7 tackles, including two quarterback sacks, and an interception. Preston Sharp had 7 tackles. McCook had 6, Stamper and Justin Lawrence had 2 tackles each. Nick Flanigan had one tackle and snapped the ball on offense for the injured Ramon Griffin.

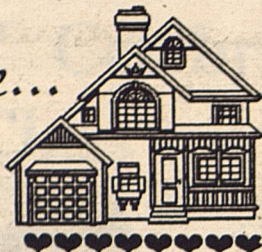

Chill: Refrigerate Promptly **FIGHT BAC!**

(Part 4 of 4)

Refrigerate foods quickly because cold temperatures keep harmful bacterial from growing and multiplying. So, set your refrigerator no higher than 40° F and the freezer unit at 0° F. Check these temperatures occasionally with an appliance thermometer. Then *Fight BAC* by following these steps.

- * Refrigerate or freeze perishables, prepared foods and leftovers within two hours or sooner.
- * Never defrost food at room temperature. Thaw food in the refrigerator, under cold running water or in the microwave. Marinate foods in the refrigerator.
- * Divide large amounts of leftovers into small, shallow containers for quick cooling in the refrigerator

* Don't pack the refrigerator. Cool air must circulate to keep food safe.

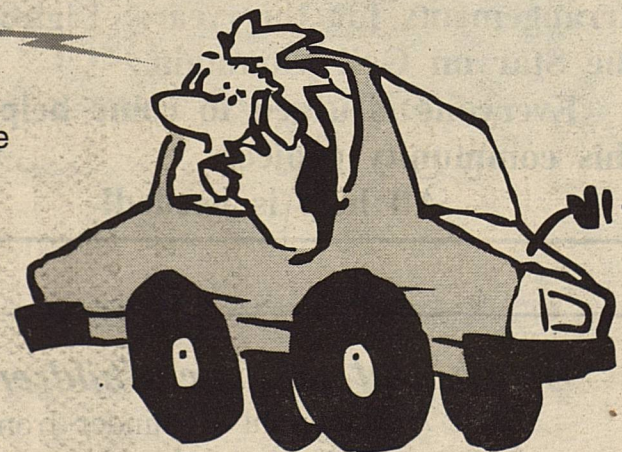

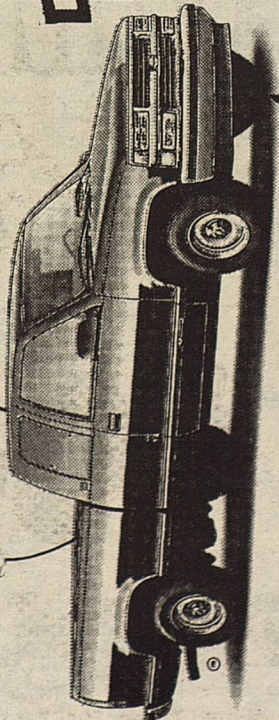

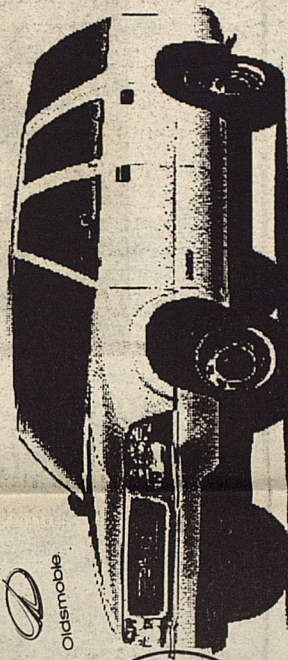

Snakes Slither Out of Drought's Grip

They strike the human emotion of fear like a match and conjure feelings of danger wherever they are seen. And some Texans may think that the drought has reduced their numbers. Think again. Texas Agricultural Extension service experts say snake populations are very resilient to drought conditions, and some snakes may actually be among the few to benefit from the hot and dry weather.

Because large snakes can survive without a meal for five to six months, hot and dry weather does not affect them as severely as other Texas wildlife. Extension herpetologist Neil Wilkins said some of the Texas snake populations may have actually grown as a result of the drought.

"Snakes are very long-lived animals, but some of the smaller species need more food more often," he said. "Because this year we had a boom in grasshopper numbers, some of the smaller snakes' populations that eat grasshoppers and other snakes boomed also. As you see an increase in one species, thought, you also see a decrease in other species. That's why it's possible to have a population increase in drought times."

Wilkins said there is no way to monitor snakes' exact numbers in a long-term scenario, but experts do know that the numbers fluctuate.

"We do know that snake populations bust and boom quite regularly," he said. "But they really are

the least affected by the drought of any other resident wildlife."

Of all Texas wildlife, the aquatic amphibians are the hardest hit. Because of water shortages and dried-up creek beds and ponds, salamander numbers have decreased dramatically. Wilkins said the water shortages also have affected water moccasins.

"Water moccasins are at the top of the food chain because nothing else eats them, and since there hasn't been much water in ponds, lakes and rivers, their populations are very concentrated," he said. "And moccasins are much more territorial than other snakes."

However, since water moccasins are among the group of larger snakes that can survive for months without a meal, their

numbers have not been severely impacted. Wilkins explained.

"When you look at the big picture, this drought didn't hit at a critical time for snakes. They are most noticeable affected during floods, and not droughts," he said. "Because the water picks them up and moves them out of their natural habitat, there are many more snake-people interactions and they become more of a nuisance."

Wilkins said snakes are still hiding during the hot daytime hours, but are emerging during the cooler nights.

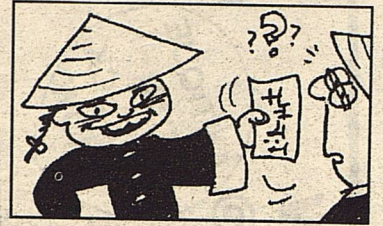
"Our poisonous snakes like the copperhead and rattler tend to stay where it is cool," he said.

Most people assume that since they have not seen large numbers of rattlesnakes, populations must be plummeting. Wilkins says those assumptions are dead wrong.

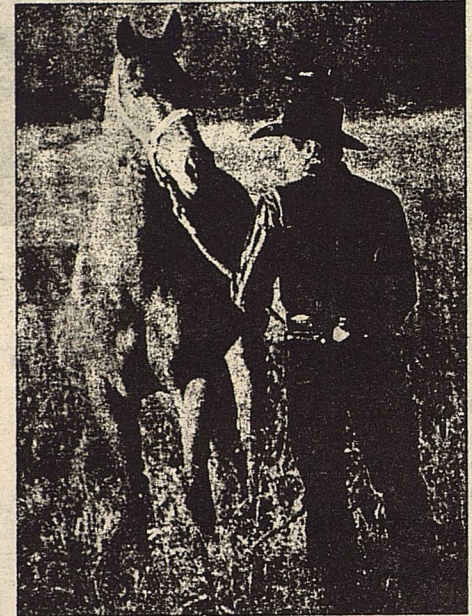
"Just because you don't see lots of rattler activity, it doesn't mean that there aren't as many as usual," he warned. "The numbers aren't reduced, but their activity rate is."

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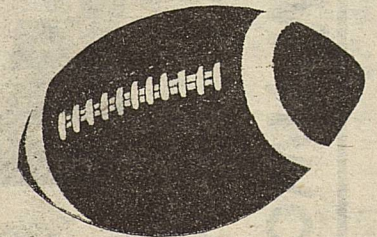
