## Preparation, safety, finances crucial to disaster recovery <br> by Paul Schattenberg

Extension News Returning home and cleaning up after a disaster such as Hurricane Ike can be a difficult, time-consuming and potentially dangerous task, said Texas AgriLife Extension Service experts.
But there are ways evacuees and
others returning to can prepare for what they might encounter and get a good start on recovery.
"With Hurricane Ike, the major property damage issue is flood-
ing," said Janie Harris, AgriLife Extension housing and environmental specialist. "If a home has been flooded, pretty much everything that's gotten wet from floo waters should be considered con
taminated. People will have to sor out what can be disinfected and saved and what has to be thrown ${ }^{\text {out }}$ Harris said before evacuee return to their homes, they need to
nsure their own safety.
"The first thing people should do is listen to the authorities in the until they say it's safe to do so," she said. "It won't do any good to go home if there's dangerous debris, downed power lines or possibly e"
area."
Harris added that if people injury, there may be limited access 0 medical attention.

getting together supplies that will gelp sustain health and safety along with items for initial cleanup." In addition to sufficient In addition to sufficient food and

sanitizer, a basic tool kit, sturd closed-toe shoes, and basic personal hygiene items such as soap, bath owels, toothbrush and toothpaste

buckets, bleach, sponges, scrub buckets, bleach, sponges, scrub
brushes, dust masks, gloves and rrushes, dust masks, gloves and rash bags, she said. And they
should wear long-sleeved shirts, long pants and work gloves or latex gloves, depending on what they're doing,"

their home using tarps, plastic sheeting, plywood or other materiAgriLife Extension family eco nomics specialist. "But before they make those repairs, they need to contact their insurance company, take photos of the damage and begin an inventory of damaged personal possessions for insurance
purposes. Then they can make tempurposes. Then they can make tem-
porary repairs to prevent further damage."
Cavanagh added that people
making temporary repairs making temporary repairs should retain receipts for supplies pur-
chased as some or all of these costs usually are reimbursed by their homeowners insurance.

Dallas, turned his attention to the socalled Free State of Galveston. "Shocked, shocked ..." he employed undercover operatives to penetrate the club and later,
after someone tipped off the Balinese that the Rangers were planning a big raid, used civil injunctions to still the slots and stop the roulette wheels.
Even so, the process took longer than
most people realize most people realize. Up to the early ' 60 s , make sure the lid on Galveston gaming stayed down.
But for all practical purposes, the party - at least the illegal version - was over by the spring of 1957. The Maceos had died
a few years earlier, and the club closed. a few years earlier, and the club closed.
Variously someone would reopen the place as a shell shop or eatery, but the magic was long gone.
The old club got roughed up by Hurricane Carla in 1961 and again by
Alicia in 1983 , but the Alicia in 1983, but the structure proved as durable as a geriatric slot machine addict.
Listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1997, the Balinese Room sat empty for a time before Houston lawyer Scott Arnold took a 60 year lease on the place in 2001. He
reopened it as a live entertainment venue - sans gambling.

Whether he will rebuild the Balinese and roll the figurative dice one more time remains to be seen.

## Survey: Nearly every American kid a video gamer

CHICAGO (AP) Katherine Graden doesn' really like shoot-'em-up
video games. She prefers games on her Wii system that test her fitness and agility - the ones her guy
friends tease are her "sissy friends tease are her "sissy

school freshman from Chicago says, chuckling. It's a common scenario,
according to a new national according to a new national
survey from the Pew survey from the Pew
Internet \& American Life Project that illustrates just how ingrained games have become in youth culture. The survey found that
while young Americans while young Americans same thing, nearly all of them vigirls included play video games of one And they don't just play thirds play video games to socialize face-to-face with friends and family, while just over a quarter said they play with Internet friends. social people," says social people, says
Amanda Lenhart, a senior researcher at Pew who led the report on the survey.

The Tuesday, combined the telephone responses from a nationally representative sample of 1,102 young peo-
ple, ages 12 to 17 , and their parents. Performed from November 2007 through February of this year, and partly funded by the

- Ninety-seven percent of young respondents play
video games. That's 99 pervideo games. That s 99 per-
cent of boys and 94 percent of girls, with little difference in the percentages among various racial and ethnic groups and incomes In fact, 7 percent of those
surveyed said they didn' surveyed said they didn but did have a game console, such as Sony Corp.'s PlayStation, Microsoft Corp.'s Xbox or Nintendo
Co.'s Wii. When They play often. respondents said they had played a video game the previous day. - Their games of choice in music or TV Eighty per in music or TV. Eighty per-
cent of respondents play five or more different game genres, with racing, puz zles, sports and action the
most common most common. Favorite were "Guitar Hero," "Halo taire and "Dance Dance Revolution."
- Young people are routinely able to get their hands on games that are
rated " M " (for mature) or "AO" (adults only). Threequarters of parents who were surveyed said they "always" or "sometimes" check the ratings on their kids' games. And yet, half tioned listed a game with an " M " or " $A O$ " rating as one of their favorites, compared with 14 percent of girls. Regardless, Pew researchers said they wan
to steer clear of depicting video games as "good" or "bad," says Joseph Kahne, a study co-author and dean of the education school at Mills College in California.

He noted, for instance that even games with vio "Halo," provided "more than average opportunitie for players to help one Kahne also looked at games' effect on civic engagement, anything from political involvement to raising money for charity.
He found that those who spent the most time playing video games weren't any less likely to be involved in their communities. The survey did, however, find that those who playe
games in face-to-face social gettings were more likely to say they were committed to civic participation. gist who studies the pologist who studies the use o new media, said mor

million bushels. million bushels.
favor," said Larimore farmer Jay Nissen, president of the favor," said Larimore farmer Jay Risen, president of the
North Dakota Corn Growers Association. "I think producers are seeing the financial viability of corn versus other crops, especially young producers.
Corn production has increased tenfold in North Dakota in
the past 20 years, but no one believes the past 20 years, but no one believes corn will supplant spring wheat as North Dakota's staple crop. North Dakota
leads the nation in spring wheat production every year and leads the nation in spring wheat production every year, and
farmers plant nearly three times as many wheat acres as farmers plant nearly three times as many wheat acres as
corn.
There are other factors to consider, as well. A bushel of corn weighs about 4 pounds less than a bushel of wheat. And the value of the spring wheat crop is hundreds of millions of dollars more than that of the state 's com crop. But even wheat farmers agree that corn is becoming a
mainstay of eastern North Dakota agriculture as worldwide demand for the crop grows, pushed in part by the ethanol industry.
