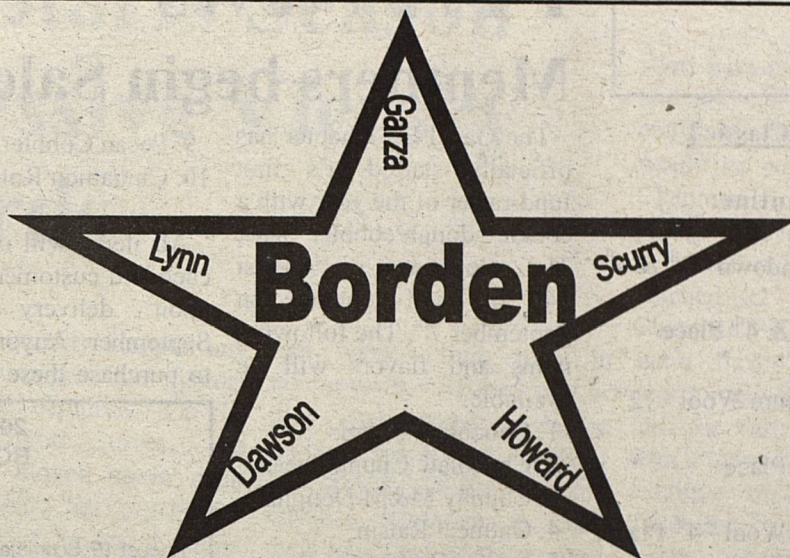

Coyotes Drops Season Opener to Leopards

The Borden County varsity football team lost the first game of the season last Friday night, August 1st to the New Home Leopards by a score of 42 to 34. The Coyotes struggled all night against the Leopards trailing most of the game. The Coyotes fell behind in the third period 34 to 20, but managed to score two times to tie the game at 34 with 9:15 left in the fourth period. With 1:05 left in the game the Leopards scored and kicked the PAT good to go up by 8 points, 42 to 34. On the Coyotes last possession a first down was made and then the wheels fell off the Coyotes offense and time ran out.

The Coyotes did not muster much offense in the second half statistically especially after center Zane Williamson left the game with a groin injury. The Coyotes had 176 total yards

to the Leopards 375 total yards of offense. The Coyote defense intercepted the ball 4 times and forced 2 fumbles for turnovers. The Coyotes lost two possessions to interceptions and lost two fumbles.

Senior, quarter back and defensive corner Clint Chapman was an iron man all night. Chapman completed 10 of 24 passes for 86 yards 2 interceptions and one touch-down. Defensively Chapman had 18 tackles, broke up 4 passes and had a quarterback sack.

Junior, Michael Bullinger carried the ball 15 times for 27 yards and 3 touchdowns. Bullinger had 84 yards rushing by the half time but big sacks in the back field cost him a lot of yardage in the second half. Bullinger caught 3 passes for 42 yards and completed 3 of 4 passes for 23 yards. He had 13 tackles in the game.

Junior, Quentin Shafer carried the ball 5 times for 36 yards, and he caught 5 passes for 33 yards. Shafer had 9 tackles, broke up 2 Leopard passes and had two interceptions.

Senior center, and defensive end Zane Williamson had a short night due to an injury but caught 2 passes for 14 yards, had 4 tackles, two hurries and an interception that he returned 40 yards for a touchdown before he left the game.

Senior end, Symeron Rinehart caught a 9 yard touchdown pass from Chapman. Rinehart had 6 tackles on the defensive side of the ball.

Senior safety, Asa

Rutherford caught a 14 yard pass and had 5 tackles, 1 quarterback hurry, broke up one pass and had an interception.

Senior lineman, Dore Rodriguez caught a pass and

Coyote JV Starts Season With Impressive Victory over Leopards

The 2006 Borden County football season got under way in Gail last Thursday night as the Borden Coyote JV played host to the visiting Leopards from New Home. The Coyotes started this contest on defense, and wasted little time in grabbing the momentum in this contest as good pressure by the Cory Teel and Karl Lamming forced an off target pass that Michael Cooley caught for an opening drive turnover with his first of what hopes to be many interceptions. The Coyotes began on a march, but after collecting a couple of first downs, a gamble did not pay off as the Leopards stiffened and forced a fumble from quarterback Brendan Tarleton when he was blind sided by a Leopard defender. But, behind the orchestration of Defensive coordinator Coach Benavidez, the Coyote

defense quickly stopped any momentum that the visitors may have captured. On the next Coyote drive, the Coyotes moved again deep into Leopard territory before a couple of mistakes stalled another drive. This time, the visitors put together a solid drive that was capped on a 4th down pass for a touchdown with 22 seconds left in the first half. The visitors kicked the PAT to take an 8 to 0 lead. This lead did not last long and Michael Cooley took the ensuing kick-off and weaved his way thru traffic picking up a key block by Flynn Chapman and Cory Teel on his way to a 68 yard kick-off return with only 11 seconds remaining in the half. This made the halftime score 8 to 6 in favor of the visitors from New Home.

The Coyotes started the second half with the football

and wasted little time in taking control of the game as they used some powering running behind the blocking of Teel, Chapman and Pasqual Espinoza to take their first lead of the contest on a 23 yard run by Cooley. Chapman kicked the extra point thru to give the Coyotes a lead that they would not relinquish at 14 to 8. The defense then took their turn and forced a quick 3 and out to give the offense another opportunity to pad the lead. Again, using a power brand of football, mixing a few powers with a dive and a Power pass the Coyotes methodically marched down the field. The Coyotes did have one scary moment as they faced a 4th and short situation, but quarterback Tarleton showed some great play action ability and then calmly hit Chapman on a

short pass for the conversion and allowed the Coyotes to continue their drive that would be culminated with a Chapman 5 yard 4th and 1 plunge to give the home team a comfortable lead that reached 22 to 8 after the Chapman PAT. The defense again flexed their muscles and forced the Leopards to turn the ball over on downs which allowed the offense to continue building on their momentum. The Coyotes wasted little time as they ran the reverse that was so key in the early stages of the game, and then followed that with the fake reverse, pass in which Tarleton calmly stood in the pocket and hit Flynn Chapman on a short connection that turned into a 21 yard touchdown pass and

a 28 to 8 score. That proved to be too much for the visitors to overcome and the defense of Teel, Chapman, Espinoza, Lamming, Tarleton and Cooley closed the game with yet another impressive display of dominance on that side of the ball. This same six along with receiver Skylar Dear scored 28 points in a 14 minute stretch to take complete control of this contest and give the Coyotes a victory to start the 2006 football season.

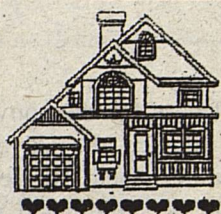

Prepare Now to Keep Your Family Safe in a Disaster

Note: Included in this article is the latest information from the Texas Extension Disaster Education Network (EDEN).

Although disasters kill hundreds and injure thousands of people each year in the United States, local residents can help keep themselves and their families safe in emergencies by taking a few steps to become prepared now. September is National Preparedness Month, which is part of an annual effort to help communities in every state become better prepared for disasters. To help citizens become disaster-ready, Texas Cooperative Extension, the Texas Department of State Health Services, the U.S. Department of Homeland Security and the American Red Cross are offering information on the steps each person should take before a disaster occurs.

Being disaster-prepared is more than just knowing what to do in case of a tornado or a fire. It also involves:

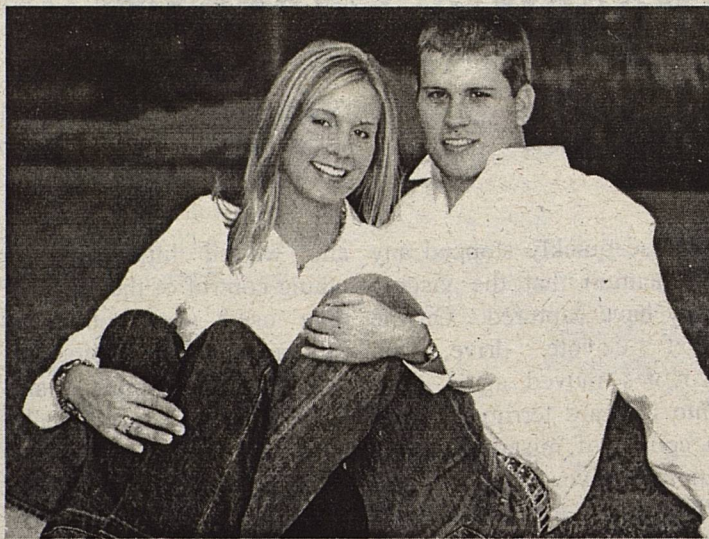
- Developing and practicing an emergency plan for your family

- Preparing 72-hour disaster supplies kits for your home, office and car
- Understanding your community's warning systems and evacuation routes
- Knowing whom to contact in your community for more information
- Getting involved in local preparedness efforts

Disasters most often are unpredictable, and they can be devastating. But the more you prepare, the better you will know exactly what to do and where to go and the more likely that you and your family will be safe.

Part 10: "Day Off"

June 15

Today was our "day off." We get to be tourists for a little bit, basically. Of course we still need to be doing God's work, but in the meantime we can be tourists as well.

Okay, Japan has this amazing drink called Calpis, and an even more amazing Calpis called Peach Calpis. I had had a sip of my friend's a few days ago and thought it was the best thing ever, but I hadn't been able to find anymore until today, when I found a bottle in a machine in some little alley of Harajuku. Silly me though, I forgot to save the bottle.

Anyway, today we went shopping in Harajuku most of the day. It's one of the trendiest, most artsy sections of Tokyo with all these neat little shops. The "Harajuku girls" are really famous for their crazy hair, clothes, and makeup. You hear them mentioned in Gwen Stefani's song, "If I Were a Rich Girl." And it's funny, because that song title totally embodies the spirit of Harajuku. I could feel the darkness so much. I could feel these people squeezing God out and opening the doors wide for everything materialistic.

Walking down the street,

Amy and I saw this little staircase lined with voodoo things. When we went upstairs, we found an Indian/Oriental shop. Darkness was just all around. This was such a crazy little place. It was a closet of a store that was just crammed with all sorts of colorful novelties and an overpowering smell of incense. If you've ever read the Harry Potter books and pictured Professor Trelawney's classroom...that's what it smelled like. Except that instead of classroom materials, it had marijuana products, Hindu, Satanic, and voodoo symbols everywhere...and they were right next to crosses.

When I told the lady who worked there that there were many religious things in the store, she smiled and nodded. However, when I said, "Do you believe in any of these things, or are you just selling them?" she didn't understand. I gave her a tract in Japanese though... this was one of those times when I really wish I knew her language, so I could talk to her.

I was really sad this morning because I wanted to go to a rollercoaster park right near Mt. Fuji, and hardly anyone else did. But it's a good thing we didn't because it rained all day today!

I'm at a baseball game right now - the Tokyo Giants vs. Buffaloes. Our "seats" are not seats at all...when we got the cheapest spots, we didn't know that they would be spots on the floor up on the

top row! There's a line marking where we have to sit and where people can walk by. We have two choices: either stand up against the back seats to watch, or sit down next to the wall and talk with friends. It's so much fun to hear everyone yell in Japanese and bang their little plastic noisemakers! They're so spirited! We've all been joining in with them. We're on the Buffaloes side of the stadium, and they're getting stomped 15-4, but they're yelling as loud as if it were a really close game! Their language is so cute. It makes me smile.

Again, tonight I rediscovered that God does not stop working once we enter the hostel. A girl from Belgium came up to me while I was sorting my souvenirs that I got for friends and family in Harajuku. I could feel that

feeling of relativism, the same thing I felt in Germany last year. I could tell she's not sure what's true and

what's false. We got to have a really long conversation. Maybe I will get to see her again...

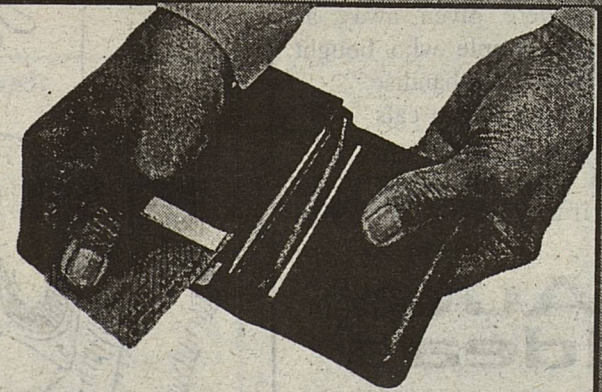

Water Summit

A secure supply of water is vital to the health of West Texas communities. As this on going drought indicates, our region cannot rely on consistent rainfall each year. To counteract this insufficient rainfall, it is imperative that local communities put together water plans that ensure a future water supply. It is for this reason that I worked with the West Central Texas Municipal Water District to organize a summit in Albany this past week. This summit served as a great opportunity for everyone on the local, state and federal levels to enhance our cooperation on water security and plan for the future.

Experience tells us that we are better off when we combine our efforts, rather than work individually. I want to commend the local communities for coming together with the goal of ensuring our region's future water supply. Meeting this goal requires that the cities and counties, state and local governments, and the federal government work together on finding solutions.

As the federal representative from this area, I commit to continuing to help facilitate cooperation and communication across the region and with state officials and to ensuring that our region gets a fair return on the federal tax dollars we contribute.

Addressing the Drought

As the House of Representatives wrapped up its legislative business at the end of July, I had the opportunity to meet with

several of my colleagues who represent agricultural districts. The topic of our discussion was the drought that has been plaguing our districts this year. In the weeks since that discussion, I have traveled extensively throughout the 19th District, seen the effects of the drought first-hand, and listened to the concerns of farmers who are working hard to salvage a crop.

As many of you may have already learned, on August 29, the U.S. Department of Agriculture announced the details of its plan to help areas affected by the drought. This plan refocuses money from existing programs to help drought-stricken farmers. Of particular interest to West Texas producers, money will be available for some cattle producers, and counter-cyclical payments will be accelerated. While this plan will help some folks hit hard by the drought, the plan falls short of what is required to meet the needs of farmers in Texas.

Because there is only so much USDA can do without congressional action, it is clear that a drought assistance package will have to be approved by Congress if farmers are to get the relief they need. So as Congress gets back into action this month, I will immediately begin working with my colleagues to focus on putting together a package that gets much-needed assistance to our farmers and ranchers.
