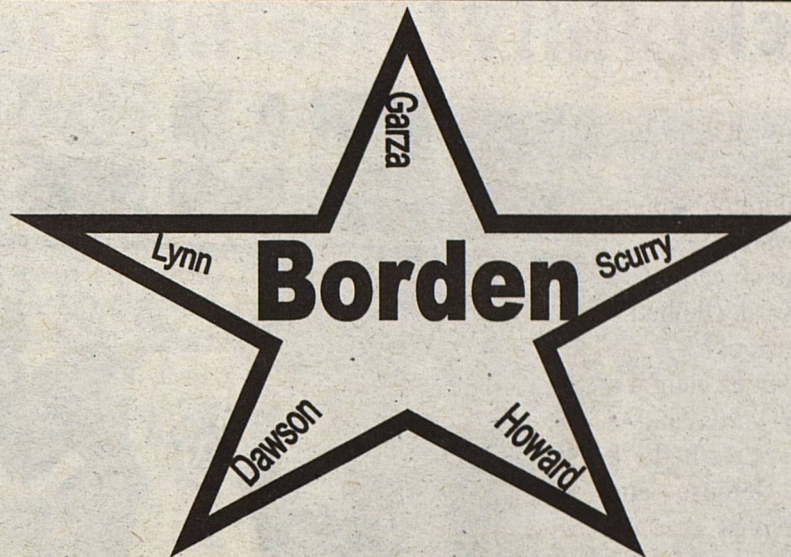

## '89 BHS Graduate to walk 60 miles during in Dallas Breast Cancer 3-Day

D'Lyn (Lloyd) Biggs of Plano, Texas will join thousands of other dedicated women and men at the Dallas/Fort Worth Breast Cancer 3-Day benefiting the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation and the National Philanthropic Trust. The participants will walk 60 miles during three days to raise breast cancer awareness and to raise money for critical research and community outreach programs.

Breast cancer hit "home" for Biggs in January 2004 when her mother, Sue Stephens, was diagnosed.

"I decided to participate in the Breast Cancer 3-Day after I watched my mother and far too many of our friends face the very real threat of breast cancer," Biggs says. "We all need to join together to do something bold to help fight this disease. For me, that's

walking 60 miles in three days. Yes, this is a challenge, but it's nothing compared to going through chemo."

"When I look at my beautiful daughters, Abbie and Kaitlyn, I'm more determined than ever to help find a cure for breast cancer. We need to find a cure before they're old enough to know what a mammogram is."

Biggs is walking in honor of her mother, former teachers Carol Lewis and Dorothy Gray, and Ann Everett. She is walking in honor of her friends Wendy White, Sonia McHugh, and Kelene Curry. And she's walking in memory of Pat Stephens and Linda Boaz.

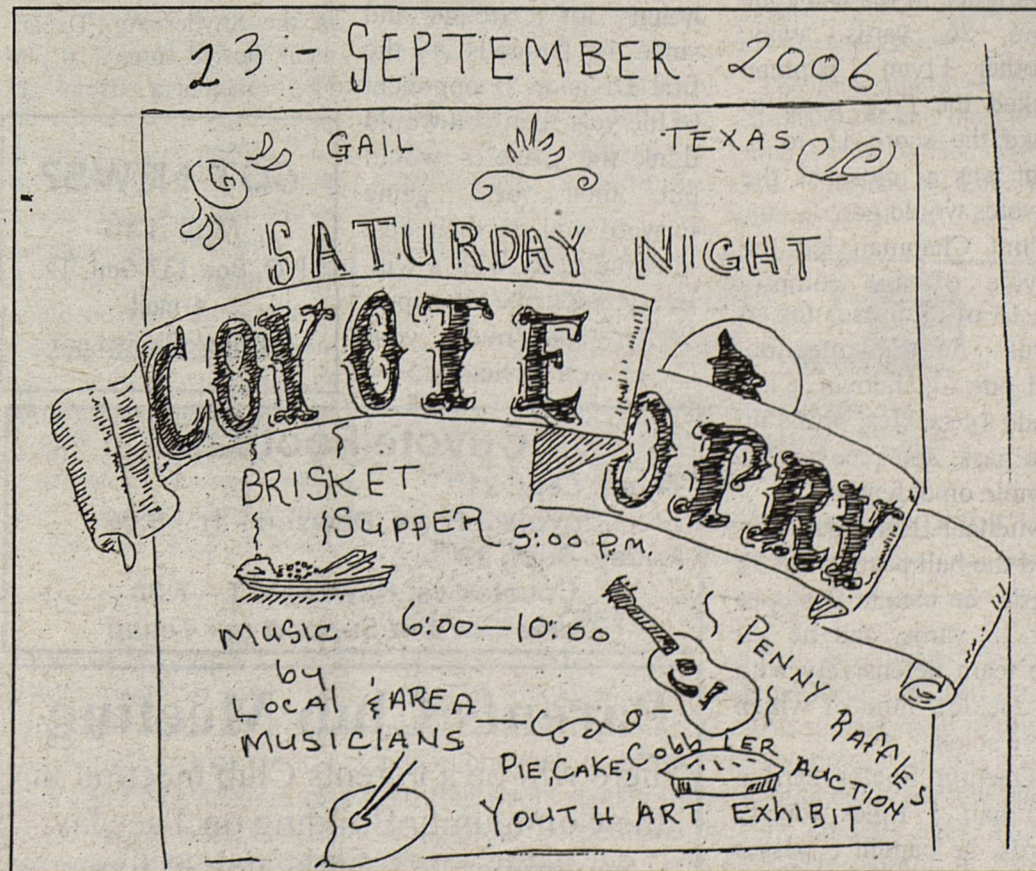
Every three minutes a man or woman is diagnosed with breast cancer. Breast Cancer 3-Day participants have an opportunity to celebrate breast cancer survivorship, honor those who lost their

lives to the disease, and collectively, have an enormous impact on funding

for breast cancer programs. "Knowing that the Komen Foundation and the National Philanthropic Trust are involved in the Breast Cancer 3-Day assures me that the events will be well-managed and that the millions of dollars we raise will support the fight against breast cancer," said Biggs. In fact, many of those dollars

will be distributed at the event - resulting in an immediate impact in Texas. The Breast Cancer 3-Day in Dallas/Fort Worth will start on Friday morning, October 27 and end with Closing Ceremonies on Sunday afternoon, October 29. Thousands of walkers will cover about 20 miles a

# Wildcat Attack

The Borden Coyote football team lost their third game this season to the Wellman-Union Wildcats with a score of 29 to 8. It was a hard fought battle all night in a low scoring affair, the score at the half was 15 to 8. Wellman scored twice in the second half to take a comfortable lead when they took the ball to begin the fourth period and took seven minutes off the clock to score again. This was the only time in the game that the Wildcats had a comfortable lead with only three minutes left it was not likely that the Coyotes would stage a comeback now that we were down 3 scores.

The only td for the Coyotes came from the arm of Clint Chapman finding fellow senior Dore Rodriguez in the end zone from 26 yards away. Brother Flynn Chapman kicked the PAT good to make the score 15 to 8. That was as close as the Coyotes would get.

Clint Chapman led the Coyote offense completing 13 of 23 passes for 86 yards, one interception, and one touchdown. Clint made 14 tackles, broke up one pass, and recovered a fumble on defense.

Michael Bullinger carried the ball 8 times for 38 yards, he caught 2 passes for 15 yards, and he led the team defensively with 18 tackles, nine of which were solos.

Quentin Shafer carried the ball 5 times for 49 yards, he caught 5 passes for 20 yards, and he had 9

tackles, and broke up two passes on defense.

Miller Valentine caught a pass for 8 yards.

Jake Cooley caught a pass for 11 yards, he had 6 tackles defensively.

Dore Rodriguez caught a pass for 26 yards and a touchdown; he had 8 tackles on defense and broke up one pass.

Flynn Chapman caught 4 passes for 7 yards; he had 9 tackles and caused one fumble on defense.

Asa Rutherford had a tackle.

Logan Howard had 4 tackles, one hurry, and recovered a fumble.

Symeron Rinehart had 5 tackles and caused 2 fumbles.

The Coyotes will go to Dawson this Friday for their fourth game of the season. The winless Coyotes should really be hungry for a victory and since the Dragons are the first Division II opponent of the year then you would think the Coyotes would put their best game forward and do their best to come away with a win. Every one make the trip to Welch and route your Coyotes on to victory.

With 2:02 left in the first quarter the Kittens passed the ball into the end zone from the 5 yard line to tie the score 6-6 as their PAT failed.

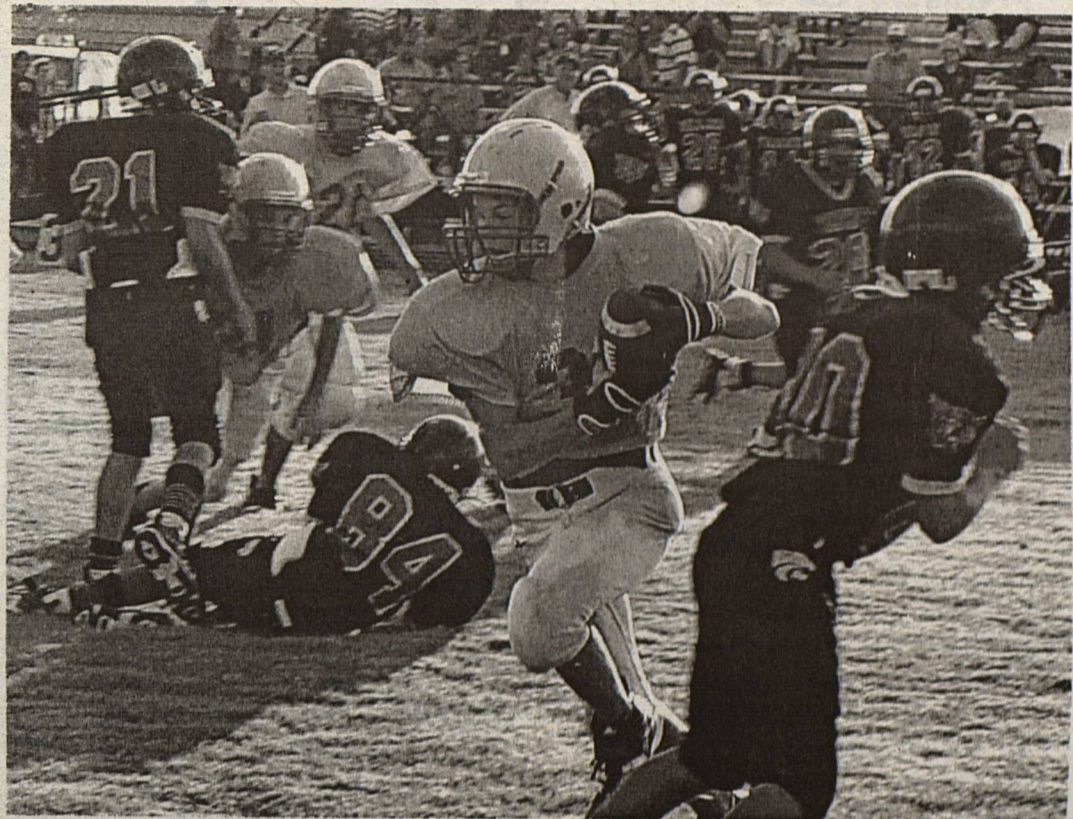

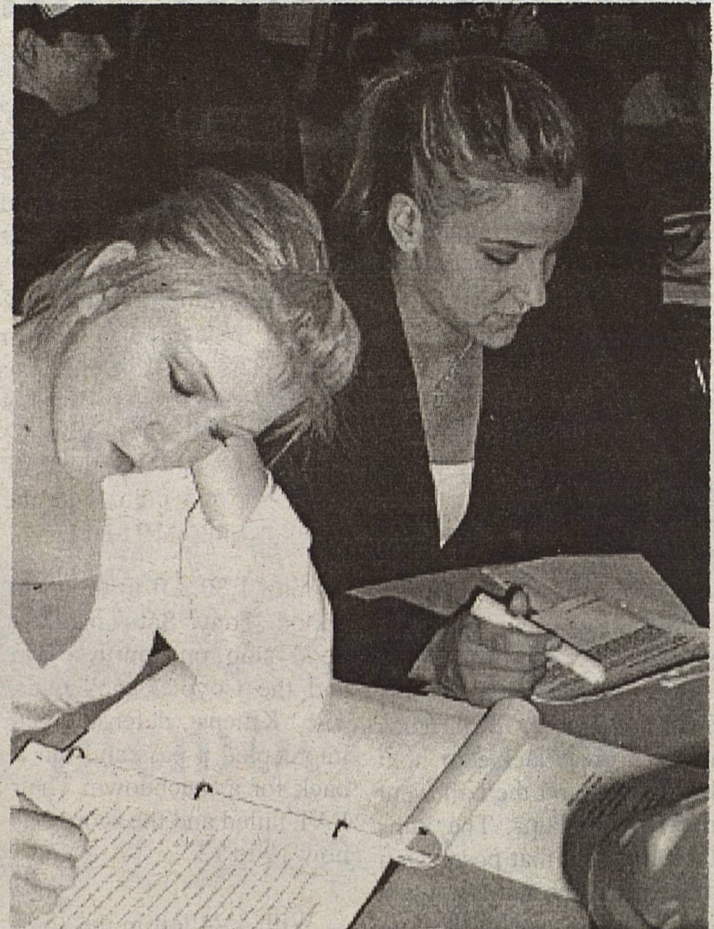

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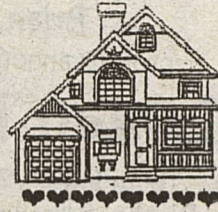

## Building an Emergency Kit

We generally do not think about preparing an in-home emergency kit or disaster supply kit. However, it is very important to keep a basic collection of items that members of your household would probably need in the event of a disaster. It is important to keep these items in a portable container that is near, or as close as possible, to an exit door. Every household should keep an emergency kit and keep it up to date. The number of people in a household and their ages and abilities will determine how many containers will be required to carry the kit items.

The emergency supply kit should be accessible to you whether at home or should you need to evacuate. Make sure that it can be accessed quickly and easily. Store the kit items in a sturdy, clearly labeled, easy-to-carry container(s). Duffle bags, backpacks, storage totes and covered trash receptacles make good containers. Your supply kit should hold items that can accommodate each family member for three days. In case of prolonged power outages and major disasters, you should plan to have enough food and water supplies for 2 weeks.

To properly supply your emergency kit, assemble the following items for use at home or in case you must evacuate. Remember to pack them in easy-to-carry

containers and label the containers clearly.

\* Portable, battery-powered radio or television and extra, fresh batteries.

\* Flashlight and extra, fresh batteries.

\* First Aid Kit.

\* Cash and coins.

\* Copies of personal identification, such as driver's licenses, passports and work identification badges and copies of medical prescriptions and credit cards.

\* An extra set of car keys and house keys.

\* Matches in a waterproof container.

\* Map of area marked with places you could go and their telephone numbers.

\* Items for infants, such as formula, diapers, bottles, pacifiers, powdered milk and medications not requiring refrigeration.

\* Special items, such as denture needs, contact lenses and supplies, extra eyeglasses, and hearing aid batteries.

\* Food - a three day supply in the kit and at least an additional four-day supply readily accessible for use if you are confined to home. You may want to consider stocking a two week supply of food and water in your home.

\* Medications - Prescription and non-prescription that are regularly used.

Check with you physician or pharmacist on storage requirements.

\* Water - three gallons per person in the kit and an additional four gallons per person readily accessible for use if you are confined to home.

\* Kitchen accessories: manual can opener, mess kits or disposable cups, plates and utensils, utility knife, sugar and salt, aluminum foil and plastic wrap, resealable plastic bags.

\* Household liquid bleach.

\* For each person, one complete change of clothing and footwear (including sturdy work shoes or boots, raingear, and other items adjusted for the season, such as hat and gloves, thermal underwear, sunglasses, dust mask).

\* Blankets or sleeping bag for each person.

\* Small tent, compass and small shovel.

\* Paper, pencil, needles, thread, small A-B-C types fire extinguisher, medicine dropper, whistle and emergency preparedness manual.

\* Sanitation and hygiene items (toilet paper, towels, soap, hand sanitizer, liquid detergent, feminine supplies, shampoo, deodorant, toothpaste, toothbrushes, comb and brush, lip balm, sunscreen, plastic garbage bags (heavy duty) and ties (for personal sanitation uses), medium plastic bucket with tight lid and disinfectant.

\* Entertainments such as games and books. Favorite comfort dolls and stuffed animals for small children.

\* Roll of duct tape and scissors.

\* Plastic sheeting pre-cut to fit shelter-in-place room openings.

\* Supplies for pets if sheltering in place.

Remember, it never hurts to be prepared! Go ahead and make an emergency supply kit. Some of these

day, traveling at their own pace. The walkers will be supported by hundreds of volunteer crew members who will provide meals, water and snack stops, gear transport, hot showers, portable restrooms, safety on the streets and comprehensive medical services.

In order to participate, each walker must train for the event and must commit to raising a minimum of \$2,200 (many walkers will raise more than the minimum). To help prepare for the Breast Cancer 3-Day, each walker is supported by coaches who assist in all aspects of training and fundraising, while clinics, meetings, training sessions and mailings provide ongoing support. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation and the National Philanthropic Trust (NPT) collaborated to initiate the Breast Cancer 3-Day, a series of three-day walks that will raise millions of dollars for the fight against breast cancer. Twelve Breast Cancer 3-Day events are scheduled in 2006: Boston (August 4-6), Michigan (August 1-13), Twin Cities (August 18-29), Seattle (August 25-27), Chicago (September 8-10), Kansas City (September 15-17), Philadelphia (October 6-8), Tampa Bay (October 13-15), Atlanta (October 20-22), Dallas/Ft. Worth (October

27-19), Arizona (November 3-5) and San Diego (November 10-12).

As the primary beneficiary of the Breast cancer 3-Day Series, the Komen Foundation will receive 85 percent of the net proceeds to support breast cancer research, education, screening and treatment programs. An independent non-profit organization, National Philanthropic Trust is the event manager and will direct up to 15 percent of the net proceeds to the NPT Breast Cancer Fund, a special field of interest fund for breast cancer initiatives.

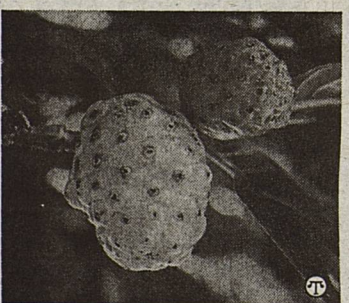

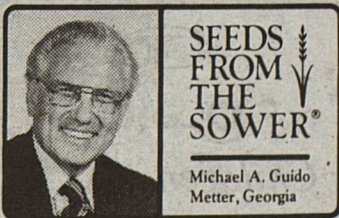

## Shooting Pheasants in Hungary

Bob Jamison of Dayton is an outdoorsman deluxe. He shot his first squirrel when he was seven years old and has been a huge fan of hunting and fishing since then. He has his own wildlife preserve with a swamp where alligators live. Tall trees attract big birds.

When he was working as a volunteer with Ducks Unlimited, he had a chance to do some pheasant hunting in Hungary.

"At the time, it was behind the iron curtain," says Bob. "A friend and I did all the necessary paper work for each of us to get two shotguns into the country. You need two because when you shoot driven pheasants, you have a loader at your side and you shoot two times as the birds come over. Then you hand your empty gun back and the loader pops the other gun in your hand and you shoot two more times and never take your eyes off the birds. You might have as many as 300 birds come over you just in a stream. They are flushed by beaters who come through the forest."

Bob says it's their way to harvest a product.

"The pheasants are wild-trapped and the hens are put in a fox-proof pen about two acres big. They start feeding the pheasants just prior to their nesting season. The roosters fly in and out all the time and mate with the hens. Then they collect the eggs

and raise the birds until they get feathers. When that happens, they quit feeding them because they can fly and get feed in the forest. They're wild birds for the rest of the year. They're in excellent shape, fly real fast and it's quite a sport."

Bob says there is a kind of commissary where the birds are taken to be cleaned.

"We furnished the community with 1,700 pheasant in just four days. Citizens can buy them real cheap."

The beaters come from all levels of society.

"There might be 75 to 100 of these people who walk

through the woods beating on pans or whatever. When the birds leave the protection of the forest, they fly. I was asking one of these beaters who spoke perfect English what he did for a living. He told me he was a university professor and translated English literature into Hungarian. I asked him what in the world he was doing out here beating bushes. He told me it was the only way he can earn the right to hunt. "If we don't contribute part of our time to conservation, we don't deserve the right to hunt nor can we get a permit. If we don't own a gun, we can check one out, but we buy our shells. That's our only expense."


"So that's a lesson I learned a long time ago. If you take something out of what nature gives us, you should put something back."
