

Mules fall prey to barrage of mistakes

Portales ruins Muleshoe '95 season opener, 42-6

Feasting on Muleshoe mistakes, the Portales Rams ruined the Mules' season opener, 42-6 here Friday at Benny Douglas Stadium.

The Rams stunned the Mules by scoring 21 points in a 3:45 span in the second period and took a 29-0 halftime lead. The barrage took what had been a hard-fought battle in the first period and in a heartbeat turned it into a runaway.

The Mules have an open week (their next game is Sept. 15 at Denver City) to look back and see what might have been. Five turnovers, dropped passes, 100 yards in penalties and blown coverages melted the Mules' chances.

But it didn't start out that way. The Mules held the Rams on downs at the MHS 14 in the first period, then drove deep into Portales territory. But Jake Adair's fumble at the PHS 27 gave the Rams new life.

Portales went back the other way, the big play coming on a 22-yard bootleg pass from Raul Anaya to Ryan Hightower. Wide open deep, Hightower

might have scored had he not fallen down making the catch.

Four plays later, Jimmy Bargas went in from nine yards out to give Portales the lead. Anaya added the two-point run to make it 8-0 with 9:48 left in the half.

The Mules were poised to get right back in it, after a nice kickoff return and a Ram penalty put them at the PHS 40. Two plays later, the Mules were at the Portales 20. But after a beautiful move to get open inside the five, Daniel Garbarino dropped an Alfredo Gonzales pass that appeared to have touchdown written all over it. Gonzales fumbled the snap on the next play and the Rams took over.

Garbarino got the ball back when he picked off Anaya at the PHS 49 a few plays later. Gonzales went right back to his All-South Plains wide receiver on the first play. Again, Garbarino made a great move to get rid of a Portales defender, but dropped the pass.

A foiled fake punt by the Mules gave the Rams the ball

back at their own 49. Two plays later, Anaya hit a wide open Kris Summers with a 24-yard bootleg pass to the MHS 10. Bargas scored two plays later to make it 14-0.

Things continued to go bad for the Mules. Gonzales was stripped of the ball on the ensuing kickoff and the Rams took over. An MHS personal foul on the play moved the

Rams to the Mule 23.

Anaya kept on the option on the first play, cut back and sprinted through the Mule defense for the score. He passed to Bryan Aguilar for the two-pointer, putting the Rams up 22-0 with 4:02 left in the half.

A fumbled punt snap on the Mules' next possession gave the Rams the ball at the MHS 35. Eight plays later, the Rams

were in the endzone again, as Anaya hit Aguilar from eight yards out. Charlie Sotelo's kick made it 29-0 with 31 seconds left before the half.

The Mules' hopes glimmered following halftime, as the defense forced a quick Portales punt. Gonzales hit Garbarino with a short pass on

Matua gets good reviews in the area

LOWRY CITY, MO — Cattlemen and dairy producers throughout the plains states who have been using Matua brome grass in their operations are coming in with some very promising results.

"The interest is high according to Bob McBride, Oklahoma NRCS fieldman, of Boise City OK: "Our recent field day on Matua was attended by fifty-four people from four states. They like what they see, but they do have a lot of questions."

Matua grazed near Boise City last year provided 270 days of grazing (March-November) and 1,400 pounds of gain per acre during one of the most severe summers on record.

This year began for most procedures with a mild winter that allowed them to graze even newly established stands of Matua straight through the winter.

Some near Muleshoe have carefully monitored over 30,000 "head-days" on a 120 acre circle from mid-November to May 31st.

"We haven't found the 'catch' yet," says Boyd Magby, a Parmer County cattleman. "It does seem too good. We've

Deadline draws near for bidding on state land

AUSTIN — A catalogue listing 239 tracts of forfeited state land reserved exclusively for bids from Texas veterans is now available from the Texas Veterans Land Board (VLB).

Bids will be opened on Oct. 24, 1995 at 1 p.m.

The catalogue, which contains bidding instructions and a detailed description of each tract, can be ordered by calling (800) 252-VETS.

Located in 96 counties, the tracts range in size from five to 82 acres. The tracts, known as Type I tracts, can be purchased with no down payment. Bids are restricted to eligible Texas veterans.

The VLB will finance the entire loan amount of all winning bids. There is no limit on the amount loaned or on the number of tracts that an individual can bid on. However,

The win evened the Rams record at 1-1. PHS had opened last week in a 43-0 loss to Clovis.

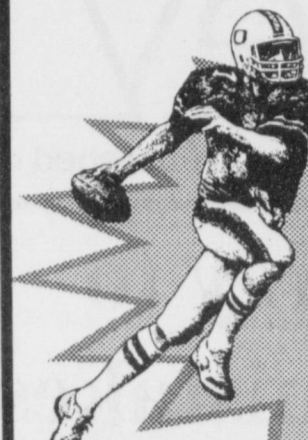

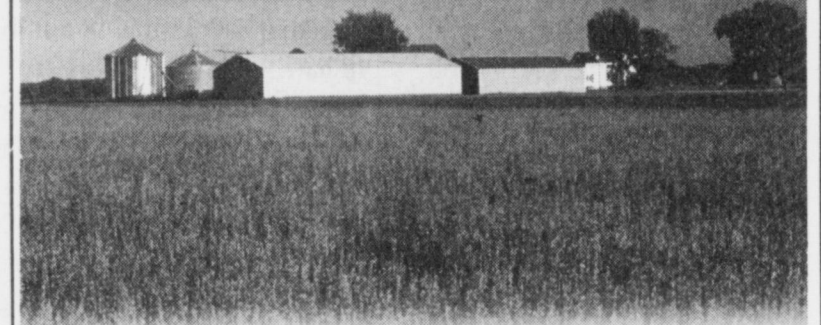

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

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Muleshoe School Board notes

The Board of Trustees began their meeting Monday night with a public hearing on the 1995-1996 school budget.

During the hearing portion of the meeting, they discussed various aspects of the proposed budget.

Following the hearing, the trustees voted unanimously to adopt the 1995-1996 school budget at the function level. The total budget amount for the year will be \$8,896,562.

After the budget was adopted, the trustees turned their attention to the 1995-1996 tax rate. The tax rate adopted for the coming year was \$1.2704 per hundred dollars valuation. This is an increase of about one and one-third cents over last year.

Next, the board heard a report from Steve McBride concerning the group self-funded insurance plan. McBride is a representative of First Health, the administrative company for the group.

According to McBride and the local insurance committee, the group is financially sound. Following McBride's report, the trustees voted unanimously to renew the self-funded plan.

The final business item considered by the trustees concerned capital improvement projects for the 1995-1996 school year.

Bill Adling of Adling & Associates was on hand to discuss the upcoming projects along with time lines for completion.

Projects to be done within the next three years include the construction of a free-standing metal building which will be used as a weight room, the addition of two tennis courts, and roofing on all four campuses.

The trustees ended their meeting with reports from the administrative staff concerning the day-to-day operations of the district.

It was noted that enrollment district-wide is up from the past year. Total enrollment for the district as of Aug. 28 was 1,594.

The meeting adjourned at 8:51 p.m. The next meeting of the trustees will be held Sept. 11, 1995.

tried to find the flaw in it. We can't find it." Boyd and his son, Skip Magby, have already produced and sold 1,150 lbs. of beef per acre off of their Matua from October to April and moved a second set of cattle (400-455 lb. calves) in May.

"Even with that stocking rate (over 1,500 lbs per acre), we needed to hay half of it to catch up this spring," says Skip. "I have no doubt that we're looking at more than a ton of gain per acre in 12 months." The Magbys plan to add another 600 acres of Matua this fall.

Because Matua continues to grow through the summer months, these producers are expecting 365 grazing days with Matua this season, but only because of the exceptionally mild winter. During most years Matua will need to be

rested during January and February in these areas.

While producers throughout the region are intrigued about the "upper limits" production potential of Matua, there are others, faced with ever increasing machinery costs and soil erosion concerns, who see it as an opportunity to get away from planting wheat year after year.

"We can 'graze out' wheat each year and then replant, or graze 'right on through' with Matua," says Skip Magby. "It's really not much of a choice. We're running three times as many pounds per acre as we can on wheat and doing it nearly three times as long."

In every region of the country, cattlemen are finding that the cattle show a real preference for the Matua, and cattle are performing well on it. Dairy heifers consistently gain

two pounds per day on the grass and beef steers two and half or more.

Producers are also finding out another important point—Matua responds to management. Adequate fertility affects not only yield, but also energy, protein content, and stand life.

This cool season grass can extend the season best in a system where it is almost abused for short periods and then receives time to recover or rest each rotation. Matua persists best under a rotational grazing system in which it can receive a 25-30 day rest each rotation or in a monthly harvesting hay system.

Allowing a fifty-day rest period will be sufficient for Matua to drop mature seed that can thicken the stand vigor and disease resistance due to head smut infection.

Any type of seed that appears or is for certified should be avoided. Planting a seed with a clearly visible fungicide treatment (i.e. Easy-Drill) will help prevent the initial introduction of head smut into the stand, and practices that might spread smut spores throughout the field should be avoided.

On the Shelton Ranch near Dalhart, Beryl Miller manages over 600 acres of Matua that was drilled into existing bluestem last fall.

"I've never seen anything like it," he says. "We're running 1,300-1,400 lbs. per acre, and the grass is way ahead of us."

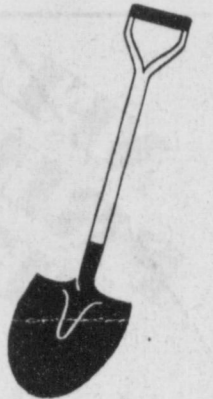

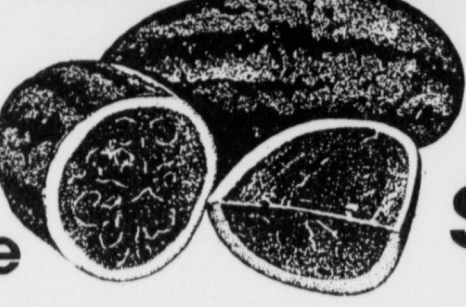

Did they lose a generation to the genuine love of Christ as they wasted time trying to answer questions about old issues that nobody in their right mind is now asking?

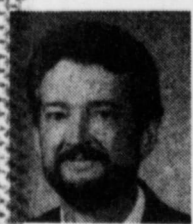
Does that old building bear witness to a "faith of our fathers" that somehow never got passed on to the children in any meaningful way?

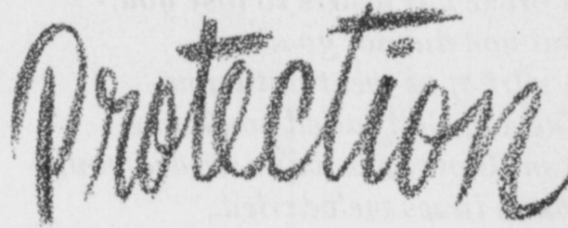

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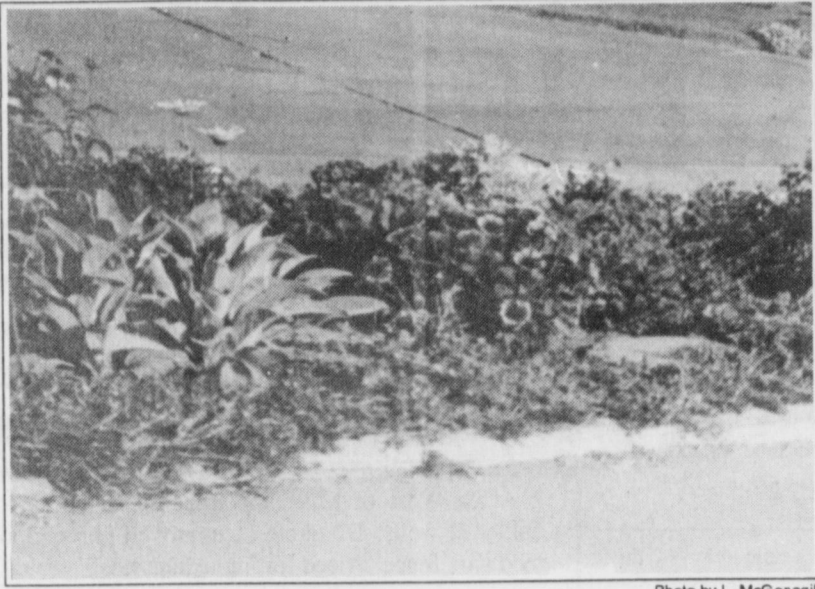
