Cabarrus County, N.C., commissioners have unanimously adopted a proclamation at a meeting that called on residents to fast and pray to God for rain to end the drought that has plagued the county for nearly three years.

Residents should pray that the county's lakes and rivers be filled again and that the county experience aboveaverage rainfall for the remainder of the year to replenish its water supply, according to the proclamation. Apparently, it worked.

The wet stuff fell two days after the proclamation passed. County officials now plan to send a copy of the proclamation to every city and town in the county and ask their help.

Girls still lead district golf race by one stroke

With two district golf tournaments behind them, the Lady Mules are leading the pack by only one stroke in the district title race.

Littlefield was able to cut Muleshoe's 10-stroke advantage down to just one swing Thursday. The Lady Mules' team score was 415, while the Lady Wildcats carded a 406 to cut deep into Muleshoe's first-round lead.

Trailing Muleshoe (843 overall) and Littlefield (844) are Lubbock Cooper (985) and Shallowater (1,066). Dimmitt and Lubbock Roosevelt have individuals competing in the medalist division but do not field complete

teams.

Muleshoe and Littlefield players occupy nine of the top 10 individual spots after two tournaments. Tasha Whitehead of Littlefield holds first place with a 186, followed by Lady Mules Rendi Hodge (201), Candace Hutto and Kristen Magby (each at 211) and Amanda Bell (222).

Hodge led the Lady Mules on

Thursday with a 93, including four pars, followed by Hutto's 99, Magby's 103, Nikki Bonds' 120 and Bell's 122. Gaining competitive experience playing for the Lady Mules are Angela Allen and Tisha Lovelady.

IRS offers tips to use when tax day turns into 'pay' day

WASHINGTON, D.C. — For taxpayers who find that the income-tax filing deadline will be a "pay" day for them, the Internal Revenue Service offers several options to help meet the obligation.

The agency also has an installment program for those who cannot pay the full amount now.

If a check or money order is being sent, make it payable to "United States Treasury" and include the payer's Social Security number, a daytime telephone number, the tax year and type of form filed — for example "2000 Form 1040."

The Form 1040-V payment voucher should be used if available, and not stapled to the tax return. Any 2001 estimated tax payment should

When e-filing a return by computer or telephone, the taxpayer may authorize the Treasury to automatically withdraw the tax due from a checking or savings account on a specified date.

This is similar to the electonic funds transfer arrangements many people have for their mortgage, auto, utility or insurance payments, except that the withdrawal for income-tax payment is a one-time payment. There is no extra charge; more than 100,000 e-filers have authorized automatic withdrawals this year.

Automatic withdrawal payments also can be

Toscano smashed a hot ground ball to the shortstop and reached base on an error by the first baseman. Nichols and Cox scored on the error.

Ramírez drew a walk and Jerrell Otwell hit behind the runners with a single to right field, scoring Toscano. The Mules had cut the Cooper lead to 6-4 at the end of three innings.

The Mules could not mount another rally, however, and Cooper scored another five runs before the game ended. The Pirates scored 11 runs on 13 hits while committing three errors the Mules scored four runs on five hits with five errors.





Understanding folk remedies helps doctors

HOUSTON - An understanding of folk remedies and their cultural basis could help physicians provide better overall patient care.

To identify common folk practices, Dr. Armando G. Correa, an assistant professor of pediatrics at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, in conjunction with Texas Tech University, designed a 24-question survey and distributed it to 250 Hispanic families in west and southwest Texas.

In the survey, Correa found that more than half of Hispanic families use folk medicine in addition to conventional medical care, regardless of educational level and employment status.

Place brisket in a large roasting pan.


