Ex-Queen Alexandra Listed 'Very Serious'

VENICE, Italy (UPI) — Ex-Queen Alexandra of Yugoslavia, whose royal marriage has been a stormy one, was in a coma yesterday, the result of an apparent suicide attempt with an overdose of barbiturates.

Doctors at a Venice hospital described her condition as "very serious." The dark-haired 42-year-old former queen was rushed to the hospital Sunday night after her son Alexander, 18, found her unconscious in her bedroom at the home of her mother, Princess Aspasia of Greece.

Officials said she took 16 non-barbiturate sleeping pills. It appeared to be her second suicide attempt in 10 years.

A Greek Orthodox priest was hastily summoned to the hospital early today.

"There was a slight improvement this morning but it was followed by a further worsening," a hospital spokesman said. "Doctors are very worried and reserve a prognosis on her recovery."

Four letters written in English were found scattered on the bed beside her Sunday night. It was not immediately known to whom they were addressed.

Ex-King Peter, 39, was reported en route to Venice from New York to be at his wife's side. Peter and Alexandra, who now is known officially as Princess Alexandra of Greece, have had a turbulent life since their marriage in the Yugoslav Embassy in London in 1944. King George VI and Queen Elizabeth of England were present for the wedding.

The marriage has been marred by the wanderings and poverty of life in exile. Peter had been ousted from Yugoslavia in 1941 when German troops conquered the country.

After World War II, Yugoslav Communist leader Josip Broz Tito barred Peter's return, cut off his funds and branded him an "enemy of the people." At one time they lived in the United States as "Mr. and Mrs. Boudin."

IMPORTANCE UNCERTAIN—WASHINGTON (UPI)—Rocket scientist Werner Von Braun says it is "a little premature" to attach special military importance to landing a man on the moon.

"It would be something like saying the South Pole or Antarctica has great military importance," Von Braun said Sunday. "It undoubtedly has, but we don't feel it very strongly yet."

RETURNS WALKING—WATERLOO, N.Y. (UPI)—An 8-year-old girl who lost both legs in a school bus accident near here last February will be walking again when she returns to school next week.

"She walks beautifully," said the doctor of little Debby Maruccilli, who was fitted with artificial legs and taught to use them at the orthopedic clinic of Rochester's Strong Memorial Hospital.

Debby, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Orazio Maruccilli, will enter the third grade.

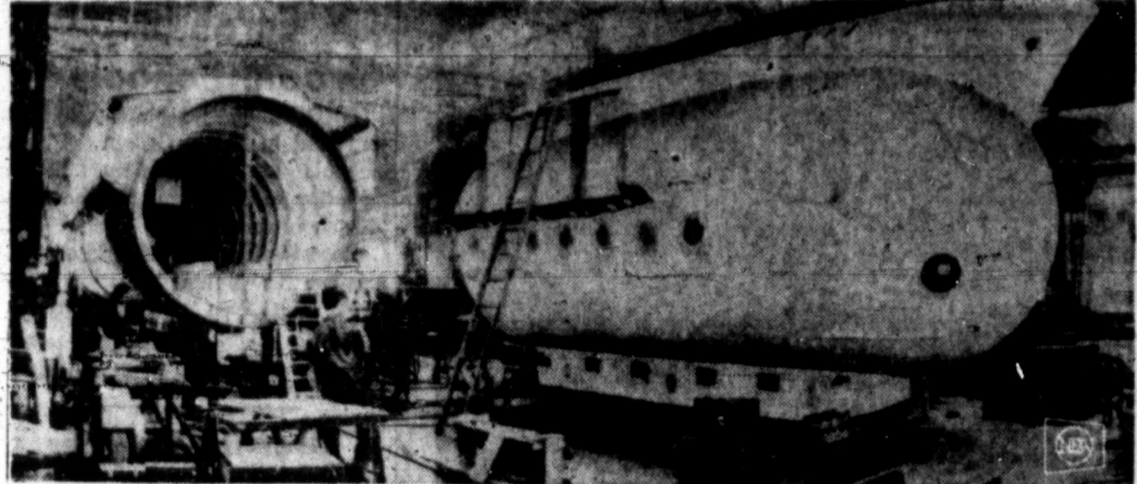

WOULD BAR MARTELLI

Martelli was working on secret research at a British atomic station on loan from EURATOM when arrested and tried as a potential spy. He has been suspended since his arrest in April.

Television In Review

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — NBC-TV Monday night canceled its entire prime-time schedule — the Monday night movie, the Art Linkletter show and "David Brinkley's Journal" — in order to present a three-hour study of the desegregation crisis.

Among other things, the special broadcast succeeded in petrifying sponsors, who stayed away in great numbers, thereby undoubtedly costing NBC a pretty penny. On the other hand, the program also succeeded in taking away the play — in reviews such as this one — from the expansion of Walter Cronkite's CBS-TV evening news report from 15 to 30 minutes, so maybe NBC didn't come up so short-changed after all.

In the past, NBC, along with CBS and other communications media, has been accused by some quarters of slanting news coverage in favor of the Negro position. Monday night's program, which NBC said was not intended to show favoritism, was however, one of these difficult undertakings in which it was virtually impossible to get everyone to agree on anything, let alone present it.

The program, entitled "The American Revolution of '63," made this abundantly clear itself when it aired a statement by Gov. Ross Barnett of Mississippi criticizing such shows as this one and decrying what he called "over-emphasis" of the subject. The ideological aspects of merely scheduling a three-hour telecast on the desegregation issue are obvious, and need no rehashing here. Those who feel pro action on the matter are not likely to change their views as a result of the program. But anyone on any side who knows anything about putting together a television show is probably still somewhat astounded today at the audacity of attempting such a massive task.

PHOTOGRAPHS DEBRIS

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Navy said Monday the deep-diving bathyscaph Trieste last week photographed debris that may have come from the sunken nuclear submarine Thresher.

The pictures were taken on the bottom of the Atlantic about 220 miles off the New England coast where Thresher sank April 10 with 139 men aboard.

To achieve a definitive study of the crisis, and thus to answer the question "Why did it happen in 1963?" The word definitive has, as one of its definitions in the dictionary, the word "conclusive." But Monday night's effort was far more in the nature of an attempt to be comprehensive than definitive, since it amounted primarily to a recapitulation of well-worn stories and historical notes. To have been truly definitive most probably would have put the network out on a real limb, since it almost demands conclusions of an editorial type.

In like manner, the answer to the question "Why did it happen in 1963?" went begging for new interpretations that might alter the ones that we know to be obvious. It is probably, however, that even those persons with extremely different opinions about the crisis were able to add to their knowledge by reading carefully between the lines of the comprehensive portions of the telecast.

Once again, strictly as a viewer, I found it almost impossible to stay sharply attuned to a video program — especially one composed of so much that I had seen before — for three hours. After a while you get that glazed look, which is equally unfair to the creators. It has been said that the story couldn't be told in less than three hours. For that matter, it couldn't be told in only three either.

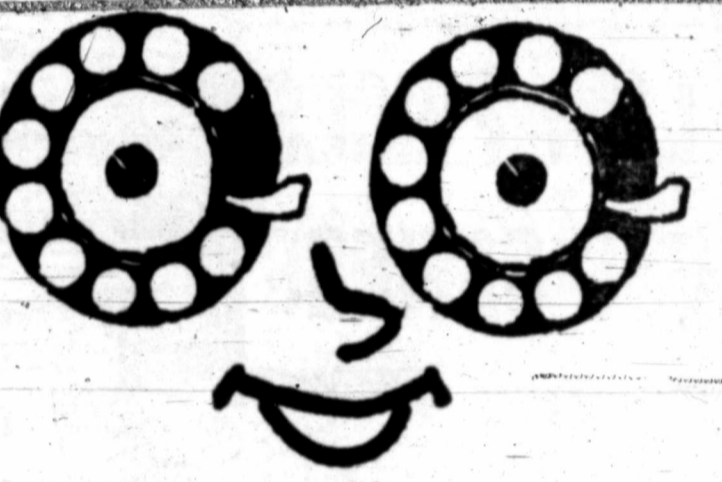

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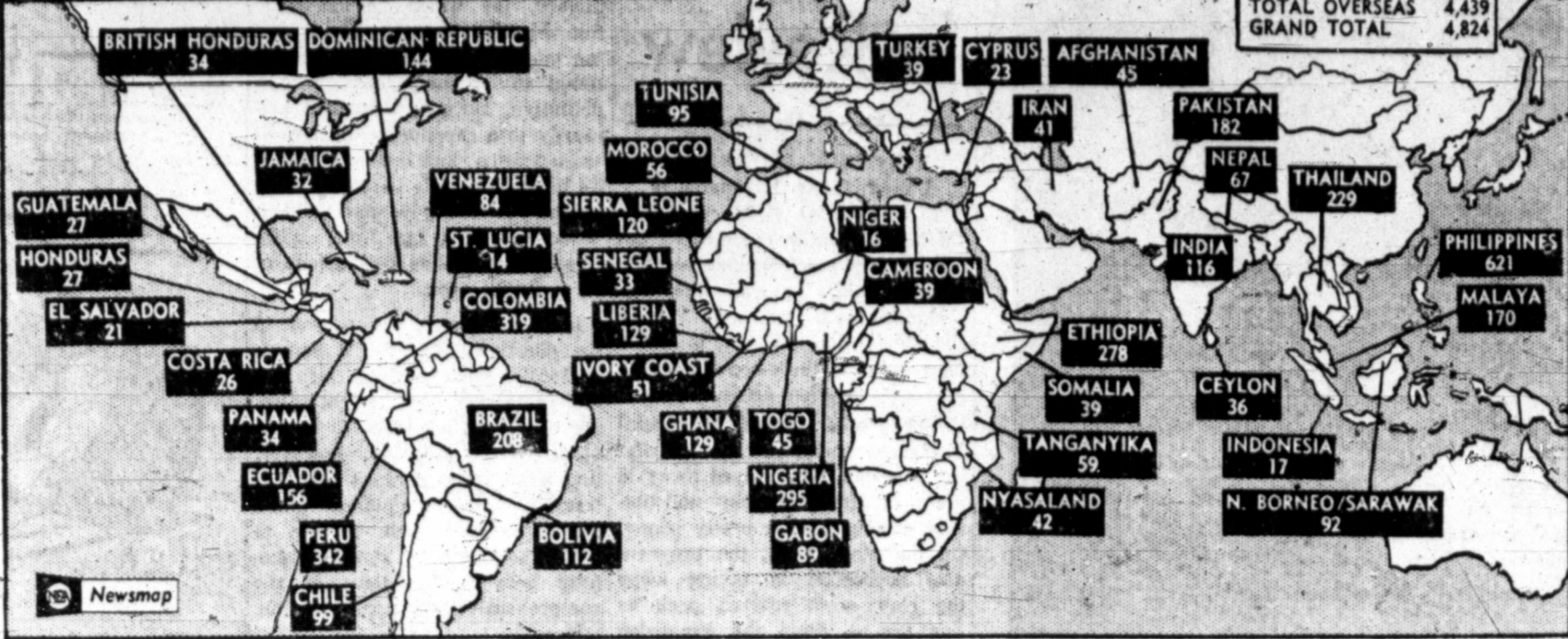

Possibility of March Crisis in Rail Dispute

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The possibility of another crisis in the railroad dispute next March, generating new threats of a nationwide strike has not been ruled out by administration officials. Publicly, government peace-makers express confidence the unprecedented arbitration law passed by Congress will settle the four-year-old controversy. Privately, they acknowledge that a deadlock could develop over so-called secondary issues in the dispute over job-reducing work-rule changes demanded by the railroads. Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz said Sunday he believed the secondary issues could be settled without a new strike threat. He made the statement on a television program (Issues and Answers—ABC). Wirtz blamed Charles Luna, president of the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen, and two other unions representing conductors and switchmen for the breakdown of a voluntary arbitration agreement. Claim Many Conditions He said these unions attached too many conditions to the arbitration plan for the railroads to accept although the firemen's and engineer's union "lived up completely to the commitment which they made." Two key issues—the need for firemen on diesel locomotives in freight or yard service and the makeup of train crews—are to be arbitrated within 90 days by a seven-man board under the new law.

Unsettled disputes over revision of the basic pay system, length of crew runs, road and yard crew jurisdiction, fringe benefits and manning of self-propelled equipment are scheduled for negotiation in the following 90 days. The law provides no way to prevent a shutdown of the rail network if there is no agreement by the end of that 90-day period. This is regarded as a weakness in the law by some informed observers. The lengthy government efforts to settle the dispute without legislation. Here is their reasoning: —Arbitration of the two main issues is almost sure to be regarded by one side as a victory and by the other side as a defeat. —Whoever "loses" in this sense will be eager to compensate by seeking greater concessions in the bargaining on the subordinate issues.

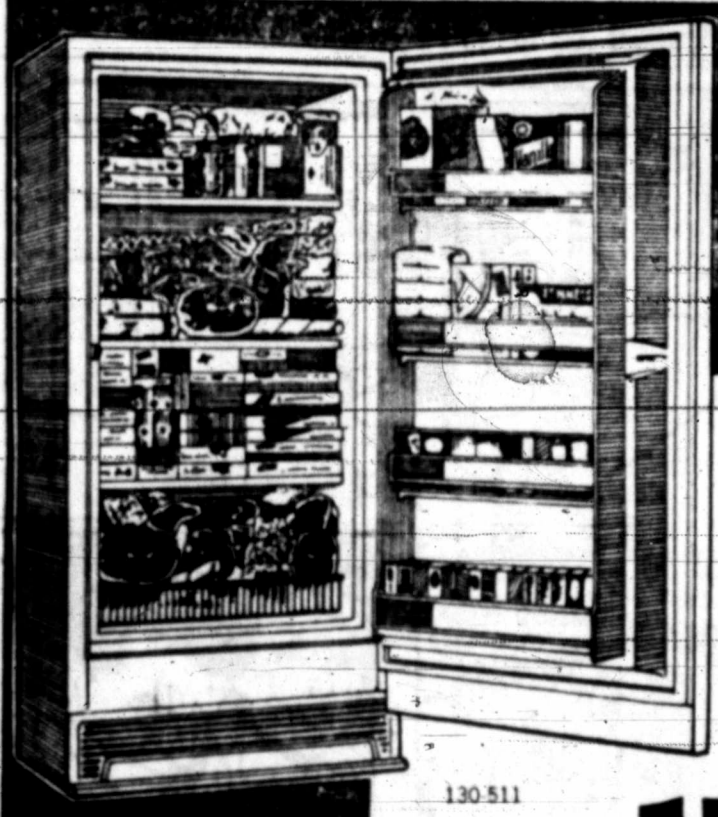

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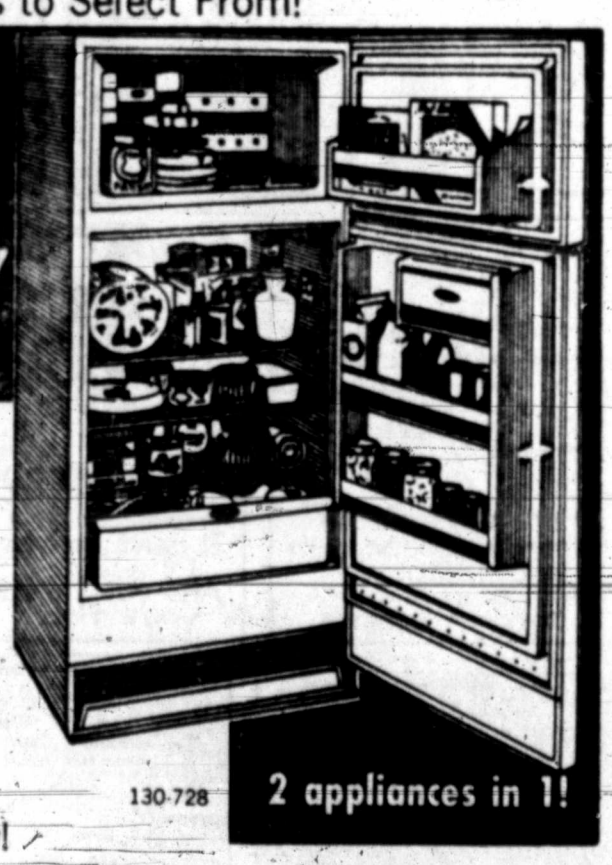

Foreign News Commentary

Back in 1952 when Bolivian President Victor Paz Estenssoro took office the first time it was with the support of Bolivia's turbulent tin miners whose Trotskyite leadership had aligned itself with Paz's national revolutionary movement.

A first step of the Paz government was to nationalize the country's tin mines, upon which most of its wealth depended, and give the miners unprecedented veto powers over the mine management.

Back of this was the burly figure of a man named JUAN Lechin, son of an Arab father and a Bolivian mother, said to have first been hired by the Patino mining interests for his ability as a football player.

With this as a start, Lechin had advanced swiftly from executive secretary of the mine union in 1943, to senator in 1947 and to successful revolutionary leader in 1952. His was a powerful voice in calling Paz Estenssoro from Argentine exile to assume the presidency.

In Bolivia's present crisis, Paz and Lechin once more are central figures.

Paz is serving his second term as president and Lechin has risen to vice president, but the two are in bitter conflict and the outcome could determine whether the moderate left-of-center government of Paz is to continue or whether Bolivia is to become the first Communist-controlled nation in the South American continent. Paz, long since disenchanted with his former Communist supporters, now relies upon the Bolivian peasants who have benefited from his land reform program.

For Paz, as for Hernan Siles Zuazo, the in-between presidential office holder, the job has been to stabilize the Bolivian economy and by development of its other rich mineral and agricultural resources to rescue it from its one-sided reliance upon tin. It has been uphill going.
