## Mexico: power

killed in 1919, but the legend of Mexico's
-revolutionary hero and his battlecry-"land and -revolutionary hero and his battlecry - "land and
liberty"-are being revived today. This is the fina article of a five-part series on Mexico AP Special Correspondent ANENECULLCO. Mexico (AP) - They say in strong. that you're not a man and you have no
future without your land. And nowhere is that feeling more powerfully (elt than in this adobe village in Morelos where
the storied revolutionary hero Emiliano Zapata was born 100 years ago, and where his surviving
sons and grandchildren live his legend. It was from the canefields around Anenecuilco that Zapata, a small farmer, stable master and
village chief, recruited the first members of his village chief. recruited the first members of his
insurgent army in 1910 to join the Mexican revolution and overthrow the dictator Porfirio Nine years later. unwilling to accept the new
rulers he had helped gain power, he was killed by the army after being led into a trap. But by then, with his ammunition bandoliers a black jacket. floppy hat shading his dark face
and black moustache. and black moustache. Zapata had ridden into Unlike the numerous other revolutionary
heroes whose bronze statues anonymously grac plazas and boulevards, the "Attila of the South"

President Jose Lopez Portillo and a full retinue of cabinet ministers and state governors
crowded into the memorial built over the crumbling walls of Zapata's birthplace to pay
homage on the centenary. It was tacit recognition that Z Zapatàs.s battlecry "land and
liberty" still echoes across Mexico and is potent politics.
The revival of the Zapata legend comes at a time when millions of Mexicans are again
landless because an explosive birth rate has overcrowded their small farms. Many make
