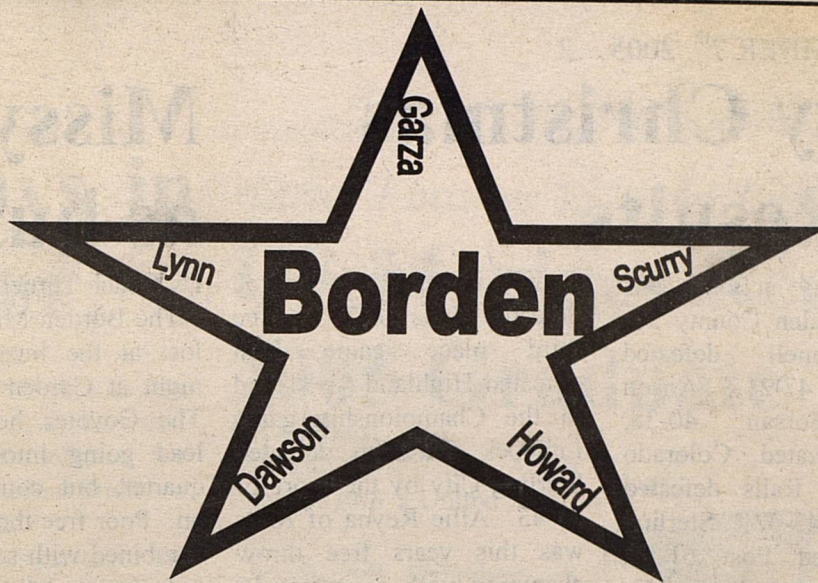

## Gail FFA Radio Broadcast Team Captures Second in State

The Gail FFA Radio Broadcasting team rounded out another successful year of competition by placing 2nd at the State LDE Contest this past weekend. On Saturday, December 3rd, team members Garrett Thomas, JRyan Gicklhorn, Kate Wallace, and sound technician Sharrelle Gass, competed at the FFA State Leadership Competition at Sam Houston State University in Huntsville, Texas.

After setting aside many hours for practice, outshining

the district competition, and securing the area crown, these three students demonstrated they have what it takes to compete with the best of the best. The contest requires the students to broadcast a prepared radio script addressing a topic affecting agriculture locally and statewide. They are judged on the quality of the broadcast as well as the timeliness of the script.

The Radio team competed with twenty other area winning teams throughout the

state. These teams were placed in 2 heats of 10 with 5 teams breaking to the finals from each heat. The Gail Radio team made the finals and had an outstanding performance with their script on "Wind Turbines" which placed them 2nd from the top 10 finalists in the state. There were 544 Radio teams in Texas this year.

# Borden County Christmas Tournament Results

The Borden Lady Coyotes hosted the annual Borden Invitational Tournament in Gail last week. The tournament tipped off at 9am Thursday with Sterling City defeating Anson 58-43 and Ralls defeating Colorado City 47-36. Other games played Thursday included Highland defeating host Borden County 53-18, Forsan defeating Crosbyton 28-24, Sterling City defeating Ralls 65-48, Lubbock Christian defeating O'Donnell 33-32, Highland defeating Forsan 45-41, and Post defeating Roscoe 44-43.

In Friday action Ralls defeated Borden County 51-24, O'Donnell defeated Crosbyton 47-21, Anson defeated Forsan 40-38, Roscoe defeated Colorado City 57-38, Ralls defeated O'Donnell 43-32, Sterling City defeated Post 61-51, Roscoe defeated Anson 43-17, and Lubbock Christian defeated Highland 38-33.

Saturday's action tipped off with Forsan defeating Borden County 51-28 and Crosbyton defeating Colorado City 35-28 in the guarantee games.

In the fifth place game O'Donnell defeated Anson 41-39, and in the Consolation

Championship game Roscoe defeated Ralls 46-36. In the third place game Post defeated Highland 41-31 and in the Championship game Lubbock Christian defeated Sterling City by the score of 55-43. Allie Reyna of Ralls was this years free throw champion with a perfect 10 of 10.

# Carter Finishes 13-Week Recruit Training in California US Marines Recognize BHS 2005 Graduate

It's official Private First Class Adam Carter is now a United States Marine.

Carter was recognized at the Marines Eagle, Globe, and Anchor Ceremony November 10 (coincidentally the Marine Corps birthday) and then graduated the following day, which just happened to be Veterans' Day.

The graduation ceremonies took place on 11-11 (Nov. 11<sup>th</sup>) at 11 o'clock - - the exact time that Armistice Day was proclaimed in 1918 recognizing the end of World War I.

Leaving Gail August 15<sup>th</sup>, Carter traveled to California for thirteen weeks of recruit training.

He earned the title of "Guide" for his platoon (1<sup>st</sup> Bravo Co.) which placed him as the go-between for the 74 other recruits and the drill instructors.

As Guide, Carter was responsible for marching with the guide on stick and platoon flag. He also had to maintain a strict and harsh attitude at times with fellow recruits, not an easy thing to do when still a recruit himself.

After a short visit in Gail highlighted by a surprise midnight gathering at Buddy and Kristen Wallace's home November 12, Carter spent



ten days visiting family and friends before returning to San Diego and Camp Pendleton.

One of the stories Carter told the 20 former classmates and neighbors who were at the Wallaces involved an ordeal called *The Crucible*.

This two-and-a-half day field operation required Carter to pass through thirty-two obstacles, sleeping outside and eating rations that included trail nut mix, crackers and jelly, and water.

The Reaper Hike is the final obstacle, a twelve-mile trek up a forty-degree slope.

When the hike is accomplished, the recruits are honored with what is called the Warriors' Breakfast, a meal comprised of steak and eggs.

Carter is currently attending a three-week School of Infantry, called the MCT

(Marine Corp Training) at Camp Pendleton.

He has plans to return home for Christmas but will depart January 2. His next assignment is to Ft. Lindonwood, Missouri where he will train for military police operations.

The MOS (Military Occupational Specialty) training is a nine-week school.

Carter will then fill out a "wish list" from places on the East Coast, West Coast, and overseas before being assigned.

No matter where he gets stationed, Carter will be one of the Few, the Proud, the Marines.

### Economy Keeps Going on Strong

The headline read "Job market gets major boost during November." The story that followed detailed how the economy created 215,000 jobs and the unemployment rate remained at the historically low number of 5.0 percent in November. This story -and others like it - appeared in newspapers across the country over the weekend. The positive numbers from last month mean the economy has now added jobs for an amazing 30 consecutive months.

This period of economic growth began more than two and a half years ago. It was in May of 2003 that Congress passed the Jobs and Growth Act which provided tax relief for millions of Americans. Since the enactment of that law, 4.5 million jobs have been created, the stock market has rebounded, record numbers of Americans have realized the dream of homeownership, and there has been constant GDP growth. There are several factors that have contributed to our healthy economy, but smart tax policies have

proven to be one of the primary drivers of this growth.

This week, important legislation will come to the House floor which will give Congress the opportunity to keep this economy moving by making sure these policies remain in place. This measure keeps taxes on individuals at current rates, retains the tax relief on capital gains and dividends, and extends sales tax deductibility provisions (which I wrote about two weeks ago in the Roundup). If Congress does not pass this bill, it will mean an automatic tax increase for millions of taxpayers. This would not only mean that, come January, the federal

government will be taking more money out of your paycheck, but it would also be bad news for the economy.

### House to Take Up Immigration Reform

The wheels are in motion to get a major immigration reform bill to the floor of the House. This legislation, in combination with a stronger commitment to enforce laws already on the books, is the remedy needed to fix an ailing immigration system. There is some talk of voting on the bill before Christmas. If we don't get to it this year, it will be one of the first pieces of legislation we focus on in the new year. As this bill makes its way through the legislative process, I will provide additional updates on this very important issue.

### Chicken Soup in a Jar

- 1 package (2.75 oz) country gravy mix, such as Pioneer Brand
- 2 tablespoons chicken bouillon granules
- 2 tablespoon dried minced onion
- 2 tablespoons dried celery flakes
- 2 teaspoons dried parsley flakes
- 2 1/2 to 3 cups uncooked wide egg noodles or other pasta

Pour gravy mix into wide-mouth quart jar. In small bowl, combine bouillon granules, onion, celery and parsley. Pour into jar to make a second layer. Add noodles. Close with lid. Attach recipe tag (below) and decorate jar as desired.

GIFT TAG: Empty contents of jar into a 4-quart saucepan or Dutch oven. Add 8 cups water; heat to boiling on high. Reduce heat to medium add 2 cups of cooked chopped chicken. Cover and simmer for 5 to 6 minutes or until noodles are tender, stirring occasionally. Makes 8 servings.

### Vegetable Beef Soup in a Jar

- 1 package (1.61 ounces) brown gravy mix, such as Pioneer Brand
- 2 tablespoon beef bouillon granules
- 1/4 cup dried minced onion
- 1/4 cup dried celery flakes
- 1 tablespoon dried parsley flakes
- 3 cups rotini pasta or other pasta shapes

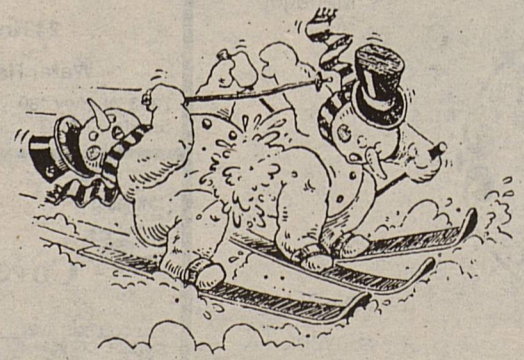

GIFT TAG: Brown 1 pound of ground beef in a 4-quart saucepan or Dutch oven. Add contents of jar, 7 cups water, 1 can (16 ounces) chopped undrained, and 1 cup frozen peas; heat to boiling on high. Reduce heat; cover and simmer 5 to 7 minutes or until pasta is tender. Stirring occasionally. Garnish with shredded Cheddar cheese. Makes 8 servings.
