# Pampan sets world record

Sundays are usually quiet for ordinary people. but yesterday was anything but peaceful for Pampa plumber Ronnie Farmer

Farmer, 29, set a new Guinness world record for-eating jalapeno peppers by downing 100 of the fiery peppers in 14 minutes and 19 seconds — to the cheers of around 75 spectators at the Black Golf Restaurant

The previous world record, held by a Minnesota man, was 94 eaten in one hour and 51

Curious spectators gathered at the restaurant several hours before the event was scheduled to bets — some as high as \$150. Others came e why a seemingly normal man would attempt such a painful feat.

Finally, at 4:51 p.m., the crowd hushed. Farmer sat down with a pepper in each hand and strains of his theme song. "I Don't Want to Cry This Early This Morning." boomed from the jukebox.

Country music blaring in the background. Farmer began his rhythmic assault on the peppers — chewing, swallowing and reaching for another. Beads of sweat formed on his forehead. his face turned red and his eyes closed as he solemnly pursued the world record.

Less than 15 minutes later, the crowd began a countdown when he had ten peppers left. Shouts of encouragement kept Farmer going - he occasionally flashed a "thumbs up" sign.

At 5:05.19 p.m., his plate was empty. The crowd stood up, cheering and clapping. Farmer wiped his brow, shook a few hands ... and headed for the back door. The new world record was his.

Outside, a jubilant Farmer admitted he wasn't showing his emotions as much as he would later. "I thought one time there it was coming up," he said "But the cheers helped me."

Even with 100 jalapenos burning in his stomach. Farmer, who's had ulcer problems since he was young, couldn't vomit after it was over. All he could say was "it's hurting, but I think I'll make it." He tried drinking dishwater. but that didn't help

'My whole body is quivering — I've got the shakes." Farmer said. "I'm burning up and it feels like a small campfire in my belly. He reassured the crowd he was going to be

"Tomorrow is going to be the best day of my life." Farmer said. "But right now, I'm having to

laugh to keep from crying. The plumber made an unsuccessful try for the record last March in Midland when he ate 64, but the pain forced him to stop. Since then, he has eaten 79 in an unofficial attempt.

Several years ago. Farmer had a bet with some friends in Midland who said he couldn't win a similar contest. He ate 37 in seven minutes the first time he'd ever tried. Not only did he shock his friends by winning, but Farmer also received a tackle box and other fishing equipment as his prize.

The tall, burly man said he'd eat the peppers again if someone breaks his new record. something he'll do - if necessary - until he gets too old to do it." When asked why he did it. Farmer shrugged his shoulders, saying he can't

explain it himself. Part of it is my dad said I couldn't do it, but that's just psychological." Farmer said. "I just want to break the record.

# Iranians free three hostages

Three American hostages freed from the U.S. Embassy in Tehran arrived in Western Europe today and Iranian militants appeared about to release 10 more for expulsion from the country.

A White House statement said if Iran attempts to put any of the remaining 49 U.S. hostages on trial for espionage, as Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini has threatened, it would be a "further flagrant violation" of international law.

Looking fit and well, a young woman secretary and two black Marine sergeants arrived in Copenhagen on a Scandinavian airliner and were immediately transferred to a U.S. military plane. They were flown to Frankfurt. West Germany, for a medical checkup at a military hospital.

A military source told The Associated Press the three were to be taken to the U.S. Army's 97th General Hospital in Frankfurt. The source, who asked not to be identified, did not rule out the possibility they might be transferred later to a larger hospital operated by the Air Force in nearby Wiesbaden.

State Department officials in Frankfurt refused to say how long the three would remain there, but in Washington officials said they were expected to stay at least two or three days for debriefings and tests.

Their release was the first break in the embassy siege that began Nov. 4 A report by Radio that four more women and six

more blacks had been freed and would leave Tehran later today was apparently premature. ABC News said one of its correspondents in Tehran reported the official radio was anticipating the release, and the 10 hostages had not actually been turned over to the Iranian Foreign Ministry yet for expulsion.

Reports from Tehran indicated the 10 may be paraded before microphones and cameras at a press conference tonight before release. Their names were

The first hostages freed were Katherine Gross, 22, of Cambridge Springs. Pa., a secretary in the economics section of the embassy, and Sgts. William E. Quarles of Washington, D.C., and Ladell Maples, 23, of Earle,

The State Department said U.S. authorities in Germany would question them about the condition of the rest of the hostages. An official said those freed would be given "decompression time" to themselves during which reporters would be kept away from them.

The trio waved cheerfully to a crowd of reporters and photographers waiting at the Copenhagen airport, but U.S. Ambassador Warren D. Manshel rushed them into his limousine and drove them to the waiting U.S. Air Force DC-9. After boarding the military plane, they came back to the door to wave again to the reporters and photographers. But they shook their heads at questions shouted up to them.

The Air Force plane took off less than 20 minutes after the hostages arrived

# Carter left with delicate policy problem

WASHINGTON (AP) - However the bizarre drama in Iran ends, President Carter will be left with a delicate foreign policy and political problem that might be a pivotal point in his presidency

On the one hand. Carter will be pressed to retaliate against Iran, to demonstrate to American voters and the world that he is a strong leader who will not allow the United States to be flouted. Failure to do so would undoubtedly jeopardize his hopes for re-election.

But weighing against massive retaliation will be advisers telling him that whatever measures he chooses, they must not be so severe as to endanger the long-range chances of protecting Western interests in a critical part of the world

For, despite the rabid anti-Americanism of the Tehran mobs, experts in and out of government say it is still possible that Iran will remain a source of oil for the West and a barrier to the expansion of Soviet influence in the Middle East.

Once the crisis ends. Iran is likely to be in turmoil, say State Department officials who are unwilling to be quoted directly while the hostages are still being held. There are few organized and disciplined political

power centers left in the country. One is the Islamic clergy, headed by the Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini. But the clergy has yet to demonstrate that it has the political skill necessary to govern the country

Another is the Marxist left, which, although it is small, has the virtues of being armed and organized. Thus far, the Marxists have run into solid anti-communist opposition from the Islamic revolutionaries

Two other key groups are the military and the middle class. But they are in disarray, their leaders either gone or discredited, with no man or organization to rally around. The shah virtually destroyed responsible,

democratic opposition. A social democratic group emerged after the revolution, led by Prime Minister Mehdi Bazargan. But his government fell early in the current crisis.

Citing this vacuum, one State Department official said his best estimate is that Iran will be in a state of "low-level anarchy." with the clergy nominally in control but unable to bring order to the country or pacify separatists like the Kurds, who will seek to take advantage of the central government's disarray.

This official acknowledged that in such conditions, the Marxist groups may well be able to gain influence if they time their moves carefully and appear to be the only group to offer stability. justice and progress to the

How Carter balances reprisals with restraint could help determine which scenario eventually unfolds in

But in choosing among his options, Carter would have to weigh whether they might undercut the very forces which, if encouraged, might enable the United States to reestablish decent relations with Iran.

# Sadat appeals for tolerance, co-existence

WADI RAHA, Egypt (AP) -President Anwar Sadat appealed from the foot of Mount Sinai today to the peoples of the world to strive for "goodness and the avoidance of bloodshed.

violence and hatred. In a 15-minute speech marking the second anniversary of his historic trip to Jerusalem. the Egyptian president praised "my two friends." President Carter and Prime Minister Menachem Begin of Israel for making

peace between Egypt and Israel possible

Noting that Moses, regarded as a prophet by Islam. Christianity and Judaism, is said to have received the Ten Commandments on Mount Sinai Sadat said:

"In this place chosen by God Almighty, where the three faiths descended, here we have the reaffirmation of the noblest values of men: tolerance and co-existence between peoples." He avoided all criticism of

Arab opponents who have attacked him for making peace with the Jewish state and stressed reconciliation, saying he came with "a heart full of faith, brimming with love."

Sadat reaffirmed an earlier agreement with Israel which turned over this 600-square-mile portion of Sinai last Thursday and will allow Jews, Christians and Moslems to visit the

"I announce this place open as of today to all believers, to all the faithful from the three faiths, with no restrictions so that they may come and address the Lord," Sadat said.

"I hope that we can together. all the believers and the faithful, do something that would glorify this magnificent achievement on this sacred

Sadat has proposed the building of a single house of worship for all three religions in the valley where the Children of Israel waited for Moses while he

climbed to the 7,500-foot peak to receive the Commandments.

About 500 guests flew into the southern Sinai for the ceremony, including Israeli officials and a U.S. delegation.

They mixed with several hundred Bedouin tribesmen. some on camels, and prominent Egyptian officials including cabinet members, members of parliament and the religious leaders of Egypt's Moslem. Christian and Jewish

Clements said the situation in Iran already "is directly impacting our oil supplies in the United States, although our country has been receiving only four percent of its full supplies from Iran. See page 3 of today's News for more details

# Marching orders from D.C.

With each day the drumbeat grows louder, the energy fascists in the nation's capital achieving some new victory in a war for control and eventual evisceration of an industry so vital that its alteration will affect us for the rest of our lives.

Daily we read reports on the congressional progress of Jimmy Carter's \$300 billion (at least) program to put government firmly in control of our sources and supplies of fuel. With each vote, it seems, we descend further into an abyss that will feature a changed and lowered standard of living and a system in which production and consumption of energy will be decided not by individual choice and voluntary exchange but by political pull and the amount of time one is willing to

A key decision should evolve from Senate debate this week on two proposals for creating synthetic fuel — oil from shale or coal instead of from crude in the ground. Unfortunately neither choice is a good one. One is the president's version, containing an Energy Security Corporation (as in Social "Security," and at a cost of \$88 billion, at least). It would decide where and when and how synfuel production will be attempted. If past government attempts at managerial skill, particularly those of the Energy Department, are any indication, it would be one of the worst boundoggles ever to occur in the United

In order to avert such catastrophe, the Senate Banking Committee, led by Wisconsin's William Proxmire, has come up with an alternative synfuel plan that would let private industry make the production decisions. The government would guarantee the massive loans needed to build synfuel plants, and would promise to buy the energy produced at a fixed price. As it's described to us, this would involve a federal promise to buy the oil at, say \$50 a barrel (the current world price for crude is \$20). If, at the time the synfuel is produced, the market clearing price for oil is only \$30 a barrel, the government would in effect sell off its \$50 purchase at a \$20 loss, to a private concern that would refine, distribute and retail it.

The Proxmire people, who portray their proposal as the market-oriented solution, say these sorts of subsidies to the energy industry are necessary because the private capital market - those trillions of dollars floating around the world looking for a good investment — wouldn't be willing to risk a billion dollars for a synfuel plant because the technology is still so chancy and nobody knows what the going price for oil will be by the time production is started. Great uncertainty — sounds like the prospect faced in the marketplace all the time. The risk is bigger than most, and so is the return. Proxmire wants to transfer that risk from private concerns, who avoid white elephants because they don't want to lose their own shirts, to political bodies, who play with other people's money and don't have to be as

Little is heard in Washington of the notion that if synfuel isn't a good enough prospect for people to risk their own money on, possibly it shouldn't be developed. The choice instead is between government botching it up, or industry getting a subsidy to produce it.

Meanwhile, to pay for this and other huge expenses of Carter's Energyless Inc., the House has passed and the Senate is working on the "windfall profits" tax. Carter wants to soak domestic oil producers (remember them, the ones we need to free us from OPEC?) for almost \$300 billion of the money they may gain from deregulation. The House approved almost that much. The Senate Finance Committee okayed less than half that amount after it finished exempting all sorts of political favorites from the tax. The potentate from Plains responded with a threat to take "quite punitive" measures against the oil industry unless he got the tax he wants, a bit of bluster that would be laughable if the hatred for energy producers that Jimmy's helped whip up weren't

so potent a political force. We saw how potent when the House committed harikari on behalf of the nation two weeks ago by reimposing the gasoline price and allocation controls that will keep us all in lines at the pump.

Elsewhere in Washington, congressional conferees are working on one of the scariest of the Carter proposals, the Energy Mobilization Board, vested with vast powers to run roughshod over every level of government in the land to beat a path for the federal fuel production schemes. It's rare that this newspaper finds itself in agreement with self-styled environmentalists, but the EMB is enough to so terrify us. The worst thing is that it's not going to be removing restrictions from something private industry is trying to do, but will be overriding any local veto of Energyless Inc.'s crazy projects in towns across this

Of course, there's more going on atop Capitol Hill: billions for a solar bank, more billions in heating oil credits to everybody who's clever enough to look halfway poor to the feds, some more subsidies if you alter your building the way the government wants you to, and a rationing plan that lets Jimmy Carter tell you how much gasoline you

money each year trying to influence the way people think than it spends altogether for disaster relief, foreign military assistance, energy conservation and cancer research.

That is the conclusion of a study conducted by U.S. News and World Report Magazine.

In an administration that professes a clean image, it's disheartening to know that "public-affairs and information efforts of the bureaucracy cost taxpayers at least \$2.5 billion annually." The report, written by the associate editor, John S. Lang, chronicles wasted funds for movies that are lost, huge salaries for workers whose jobs are supposedly illegal and vast sums of money spent on film making and printing costs.

Some examples that appeared in the article are: An agency spent \$125,000 on a motion picture and then lost the film: Because a 1913 law forbids using

"The federal government spends more appropriated funds for paying "public experts," government workers in this area are titled "information officers," "public affairs officers." "comunications officers" and "press secretaries" - and many of these publicity experts earn more than \$40,000 a year. Agencies spend as much as \$600 million annually making movies and other audio-visual programs. Last year the Government Printing Office billed its federal customers \$500 million, and the Office of Management and Budget found that additional U.S. printing cost another

The saddest part of the report, however, is the sheer waste of these efforts. According to the article, "It was found that in many cases films were produced and equipment was purchased by agencies merely to avoid returning money left in

budgets at year's end. In the print area, the author says, "most government press releases wind up in the

# Let us keep freedom to fail

The owners of every business want to be iree to succeed. Without such freedom there would be little motive to become

Along with the freedom to succeed goes the freedom to fail. It is the other side of the same coin. A characteristic of every private enterprise, the freedom to fail is taken for granted. Failure being an unpleasant thought, this freedom is seldom mentioned

An enterprise is not free to fail if the government stands back of it with potential money aid, either as a loan or as a gift. This amounts to a guarantee against bankruptcy

When the managers of an enterprise have such a guarantee, they know that whatever they do their company will not go down the drain. What motive have such managers to manage well, to weigh their risks, to burn the midnight oil? Why strive for success when your success is already

These thoughts come to mind as one learns of Chrysler seeking and, it seems at this writing, about to get \$1 billion or so aid from the government.

What goes on here? Is this private enterprise? Or is it today's socialist-infected capitalism coming to a head? When society, through its government, supports private firms, defraying their losses, paying for their mistakes and misfortunes, they are no longer private. They are about as public as

If the government bails out Chrysler, what shall Washington say when the next failing firm begs it for help? Is it the taxpayers' duty to take on all the bankrupts? If so, there will be à lot of them. Even now, some 15,000 businesses fail

It is of the essence of a private enterprise to run risk. When a firm is launched, it incurs expenses which cannot be avoided: interest on its initial capital investment, for example. This is sure outgo. It has to be

To meet this certain outgo, the firm has no certain income. It has merely the hope and expectation that people will buy its goods and-or services, whatever they are, and that the income received will total enough to cover those contractual expenses such as interest, rent, raw materials, labor. At the outset, that hope is merely a

Every newly organized firm is a highly uncertain venture, a sure cost balanced against a very unsure income. It is, and has to be, something of a gamble.

That entreprenuers willingly take this gamble is a tribute to human courage. It is the amazing feature of capitalism. A system that takes this kind of courage and is as successful as capitalism is has a lot to

Americans now appear to be turning against that system. One wonders what we will adopt in its place. How will we check people from launching projects that

On the other hand, if we tax heavily enough to subsidize all the weak corporate sisters, how shall we induce people to launch new projects, knowing the possible income therefrom will be taxed away from

Those who tamper with the freedom to fail will find themselves groping in some pretty dark alleys.

Innovation - the launching of new products and adoption of new methods - is highly important. Joseph Schumpeter. Harvard's great economic theorist of a generation ago, held that one bold entrepreneur encourages another, an hence that innovations come in clusters.

But there must be the chance of making and keeping profits or nobody will innovate. Recently the oil companies have been pilloried in the press for making egregious profits. But the world of consumers sorely needs more sources of energy. To discover or invent such sources, entrepreneurs must be offered a chance to make large rewards. Obviously innovation is drasticaly needed in the field of energy production. There must be the freedom to succeed in a big way. It follows that there must be the freedom to fail. Many, undoubtedly, will exercise that freedom.

It will be the innovating, not the subsidized, corporations that will supply

A score of international agencies are concerting efforts in an air-sea lift of emergency food. Fifty-one of the United Nations have

pledged more than \$200 million for relief supplies. The American deputy president -Rosalynn Carter - is personally on the

Even the previously implacable regime in Phnom Penh has yielded to the extent of opening the port of Kompong Som and the Mekong River to relief shipments.

This burst of activity is not only welcome, it may well be essential if Cambodians are not for all practical effect to be extinguished as a people. The magnitude of the disaster that has overtaken them is matched in recent history only by the Jewish Holocaust. By some estimates, up to half of Cambodia's pre-conflict population may already have perished and many or most of the survivors may already be beyond saving.

Who is to blame for this tragedy? Most immediately Cambodians themselves the two regimes, both pledged to the Marxist cause, savaging each other for control of a country that could well end up without people

Beyond these, the Vietnamese who are now the real power in Cambodia, gradually extending their own imperium over all that had once been a choice portion of the French Empire.

The Soviets, for supporting and encouraging the Vietnamese, less for what is to be gained in the Cambodian conflict

itself than to strike at the Chinese. And the Chinese, supporters of the losing Cambodian side, for similar reasons of maneuver against the Soviets. Also, for that matter, the French and the

Americans. The former for their vain post-World War II effort to re-establish themselves in Indochina and, as a consequence, launching the entire region on a 30-year war. The latter, inheritors of the losing French cause, for having drawn Cambodia into full-scale warfare in the last spasms of the effort to hold on in South

The real villain, however, is politics, the politics of power that have motivated and manipulated all the parties to this disaster. And although relief is on the way although it may yet prove both too little and to little - we are not done with them.

The United States and Soviet Union together might mount an effective relief operation that would assist both Cambodian camps, but are unable to coordinate efforts because of continuing divergent interests

The quickest and most effective means of moving relief supplies in large volume into Cambodia would be by truck across the Thai border, but Phnom Penh will not agree to this because of the likely greater benefits to its opponents whose stronghold the border region is.

The United States is reluctant to channel all aid through channels controlled by Phnom Penh because of the benefit this might represent to Vietnamese-Soviet expansionism. And so it goes.

Politics, as Cambodia is so tragically demonstrating, can be not only hazardous but potentially fatal.



# Iranian crisis overshadows domestic issues at governors meeting

AUSTIN. Texas (AP) - The crisis in Fran is overshadowing the usual domestic concerns at the Republican governors' annual meeting and promising to become a presidential campaign issue.

The economy, already an issue in the 1980 race, was on today's program however, with former President Gerald R. Ford expected to attack President Carter on

Sen. Howard H. Baker of Tennessee, former Texas Gov. John B. Connally, and Los Angeles businessman Benjamin Fernandez, all GOP presidential candidates, used the governors' forum Sunday to call for stronger action on behalf of Americans being held captive in the U.S. embassy in Tehran.

Although the candidate declined to say exactly what Carter should do about the situation in Iran, they agreed he should do more in light of new threats by Iranians to try the Americans for espionage.

"It is totally unacceptable for those Americans to stand trial in Iranian courts for espionage or anything else," Baker

said. "It is unacceptable to the American people and it should be unacceptable to the American government:

Connally also said trial of the Americans 'would be unacceptable. I don't think there's any question about that."

Baker, who is Senate minority leader, said he wanted to get his views on the record after talking with Carter and Secretary of State Cyrus Vance. But Connally complained that the other candidates were being asked to support Carter and not play politics with the situation without being briefed on it.

What actions we could or should take, what options would be available to us, I would not want to try to spell out." Connally said. "Because I wouldn't have the information on which to base an informed judgment."

Baker said he discussed a wide range of options with Carter and Vance, but would not say what his own recommendations

"It is up to the president to decide how he wishes to proceed." Baker said. "We have a wide range of options and opportunities.

And I would support him in any reasonable measure that he he cares to take, and I believe the country would.

Both Baker and Connally declined to speculate on the advisability of military action in Iran, but Baker said the situaion had become "totally unacceptable, and I think something must be done about it."

"I would not question that something more would have to be done than what we've already done." Connally agreed. Fernandez said, "The minute any American is killed in Iran, I believe the United States must move forward aggressively to show the United States will not stand for any harm to its citizens."

He said Mexico City organizers invited him to go to Iran, but said he would decline unless he had assurances that the group could talk with Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini.

Most of the country's 18 Republican governors are expected to attend the three-day meeting. Although today's programm was built around economic issues, foreign policy returns to the spotlight on Tuesday, with a speech by former secretary of State Henry Kissnger.

Sen. Larry Pressler of South Dakota, who is 37, said the party and the country "should seriously consider electing a president in the prime of his life for such a demanding job."

# Oil from burning tanker expected to hit beach

GALVESTON, Texas (AP) - Coast Guard authorities warned swimmers, surfers and other water sports enthusiasts to stay clear of stinging oil sheen expected to wash ashore on Galveston Island from a burning tanker for the next several days. The oil is leaking from the flaming and grounded

tanker Burmah Agate, whose 390,000-barrel crude oil cargo began spilling into the Gulf of Mexico Nov. 1 after the tanker collided with the freighter Mimosa. "Swimmers have been reporting eye irritation after

coming into contact with oil sheen," Coast Guard Lt. Ann Bennett said Sunday night Reports that the tanker was breaking up sent work crews to the vessel Sunday. Those crews reported some inward doubling of part of the deck, but said the ship

was "not in any immediate danger of breaking up." "Significant quantities of oil grounded in patches between East Beach and San Luis Pass Sunday, in an area one mile south of the Freeport jetties," Ms. Bennett said. "More patches are expected to come ashore during the next several days."

Analysis of wind and tidal date indicates that most of the oil due to wash ashore will do so on Galveston

"These conditions increase the probability of oil entering the (Galveston) Bay," Ms. Bennett said. "But helicopters will patrol the channel and skimmers are standing by to recover any oil that might enter the

Burning oil on the water also ignited a deflection boom and a skimming boom anchored south of the Burmah Agate, the Coast Guard said, but damage was reported minimal.

Clean-up crews have been scouring Galveston Island

scooping up oil-soaked sand, while mechanical skimming equipment continued to vaccuum the goo from the ocean's surface as it leaked from the ship, Ms. Bennett said.

The collision near the mouth of the Galveston Ship Channel killed 32 sailors. The bodies of 17 crewmen have been recovered; 15 remain missing.

Tugboats continued dousing the blazing tanker with water to keep the forward half of the Burmah Agate intact and undamaged oil-filled compartments from exploding

Officials have said as many as 18 of the 30 tanks containing oil were believed damaged either by the collision or the ensuing fire and periodic explosions.

Ms. Bennett said the Coast Guard and the ship's owners have received suggestions on ways to extinguish the inferno.

# Bid for holiday honoring King falls short

WASHINGTON (AP)- Rep. Mickey Leland, the only black member of the Texas congressional delegation. says he is confident the House eventually will approve a bill to establish the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday as a national holiday.

The bill fell short of the two-thirds majority it needed for passage Tuesday.

Leland had taken to the House floor for an empassioned speech about how he had been swayed from hating white people by King's message.

"I stand here before my colleagues today to tell them that Mickey Leland is in the United States Congress because he was inspired by Dr. Martin Luther King, one who believes that the American dream is a real dream and one that should be fulfilled," the Houston Democrat said in his speech.

Leland said later in an interview that if he had been able to speak longer he would have talked about the importance of King's teachings.

"He taught me that loving people was a much better weapon than using violent means...and too that it was a waste of time and energy, and it was wrong, to hate people." Leland said. "He taught me it was hypocritical to be a racist and at the same time fight

The congressman said he had talked to every Democratic member of the Texas delegation and believed he had helped sway some votes.

Opponents argued that the addition of a national holiday would cost too much. Leland replied that the compensation for past injustice is worth any price.

"I feel that we deserve some kind of strong commitment," he said.

Ten of the 24 Texas congressmen voted against the King holiday. They were Reps. Bill Archer, Jim Collins, E. "Kika" de la Garza, Sam Hall, Marvin Leath, Tom Loeffler, Ron Paul, Ray Roberts, Charles Stenholm and Richard White. Reps. Jim Mattox and Charles Wilson did not vote.

Jim Collins, a Republican from Dallas, had a chance last week to complain about the way television covers

He is the ranking Republican member of the House Communications Subcommittee, which held its biannual oversight hearings.

television," the congressman said.

More defense witnesses have been called to testify today in the





The three-day visit, the fourth taken by John Paul since he became pope in October 1978, will begin Nov. 28, Vatican sources

The pope said the Vatican was on the eve of "a theological dialogue with the venerable Orthodox churches to overcome together the differences still existing between them.

Patriarch Demetrius expressed 'deep joy" over the papal visit. A source in the Greek Orthodox Patriarchate in Istanbul said "the personality of the ruling pope gives new hope 'for ending the 925-year-old schism between the churches.

The Roman Catholic and Eastern Orthodox churches split in 1054 when many Christian churces in the West decided to recognize the bishop of Rome as supreme over other bishops. The decision resulted in mutual excommunication orders by Pope Leo IX and Patriarch Michael Caerularius of Constantinople, the name for Istanbul

The Roman Catholic Church now has 600 million members, while Eastern Orthodoxy has 200 million followers. Papal authority is still the chief issue in dispute between the two churches, which generally share the same beliefs but have variations in religious practices.



# Kirkland president of AFL-CIO

WASHINGTON (AP) — Lane Kirkland. organized labor's shy and scholarly administrator, won election as president of the 13.6-million-member AFL-CIO today. ending a quarter-century of leadership under George Meany

Kirkland, 57, the ailing Meany's second in command and hand-picked successor. was elected without opposition by 1,000 delegates attending the labor organization's 13th convention

It was the first change of leadership since Meany, 85, was installed as president after the birth 24 years ago of the merged American Federation of Labor and Congress of Industrial Organizations.

Kirkland, a South Carolinian who worked his way up the AFL-CIO staff during a 30-year career with the labor federation. emerges now not only as chief spokesman for unionized workers but also as a potent force in the nation's political, social and economic affairs.

Kirkland is a protege and close friend of Meany, who is retiring after 12 two-year terms as AFL-CIO president because of poor health, and his eventual election to the top post had been anticipated for years.

Thomas R. Donahue, 51, a former Labor Department official who became Meany's executive assistant, also ran without opposition to succeed Kirkland as secretary-treasurer



# See dermatologist for hair breakage

you can help me. My hair will only grow to a certain length and then the scalp starts itching and the hair just breaks off down to the scalp. I don't have dandruff. Can you tell me what might be wrong and what I can do DEAR READER - Your

description is a bit sketchy but it sounds to me like you ought to see a dermatologist. You may have a condition that we call trichorrhexis nodosa. There are many variations of this disorder, but what that long technical term really means is that the hair breaks easily. It may tend to break very close to the scalp or at a specified distance along the hair shaft. In this condition the hair shaft itself is defective. It's sometimes seen in people who straighten their hair or it can be seen in a person who has worn a tight-fitting cap for long peri-

way, it needs to be handled very gently. No heat should be applied to the hair of any sort and you should avoid using different kinds of chemicals such as might be encountered in bleaching agents or even certain dandruff medications. Only a wide tooth comb should be used to avoid break-

With gentle treatment it may recover in two to four years. That's quite a long time. That's why I think it's worth seeing a dermatologist to see if he can determine what really is causing your problem and help you. Meanwhile, I'm sending you The Health Letter number 12-6 Hair Care. > DEAR DR. LAMB — My daughter, age 39, called last night. She found a doctor who told her why her hands are nearly always cold and red He says she has Raynaud's disease. This probably explains the infection she's had several times at the base of her fingernails. I'm frightened. The doctor told her she could lose her hand if she was caught in a snow storm in the mountains. Please tell me

what this disease is. DEAR READER Raynaud's disease is associated with severe spasm of the arteries and it commonly affects the hands and fingers, although it can affect the nose and face. The attacks are par-

ticularly apt to be caused by exposure to cold. Many doctors advise patients with this problem to hands warm at all times. If there's any reason they have to go outside and possibly touch anything that's cold they should wear warm gloves to avoid direct contact. An example here would be a cold steering wheel.

I could offer one simple home remedy. During such attacks she could whirl her arms. You swing the arms in a 360-degree circle like a softball pitcher swinging his arm for the pitch. They should be swung at approximately 80 cycles per minute, which is pretty fast. It's important to keep the elbows straight all the way through the swing and be sure that the fingers are straight and not curled. The centrifugal force causes blood to be forced into the tips of the fingers and this may abort an attack. This procedure is often used by skiers to help warm their hands.

# A few minutes, four placemats bring results

NEW YORK (NEA) — Nice job, ducky. You won't get invited there for dinner again. Bad enough you dribbled duck sauce on her blue calico place mats — did you have to show up wearing them, too?

You could have at least nosed around beforehand and found out she went in for blue calico. Then you could have made your vest out of four pink gingham quilted place mats instead. In just six minutes, says Pam Aulson, sewing and crafts consultant who knew two years ago that "the vest was going to be an important accessory. Suddenly I thought, why not make one using place mats?

Which she did. Which even the most ham - handed can, she

First you get four matching place mats which you know are washable because you wash them to make sure they don't shrink. They'll have a plain binding because says Ms. Aulson, "those are

beeter for sportswear. Place mats with ruffles make nicer bedjackets." You work with the mats "longwise", not table setting And you work up the back of the vest first, as follows: Take any two of the four place mats and line them up next to each other.

"longwise". Now, tilt the bottom of one three inches over the other so vou're looking at a "V Sew the two together just like that, from top to bottom, along the long overlapping binding, and that's the back of the vest.

To do the front, you take the third place mat and lap one of its short ends over one of the peaks of the "V". Then you do the same with the fourth mat and the other peak. Now make sure there's seven inches between the third and fourth mats for your neck, which will fit in

Stitching the peaks and the short ends together - which is what you do after lapping — is called doing the shoulder seams.

So now you've got a V - back with two place mats dangling down in front. You need armholes and side seams so the vest won't fall off when you wear it. To get them, pick up the vest by the shoulders. See how the front and the back falls together? Wrestle the vest to the table top just like that and, starting from the outside edge of the shoulder seams, walk down eight and a half inches. You're now at the bottom of the armhole. From here down, stick pins in a straight line through the front and the back of the vest, about two and a half inches in, towards the belly button (or the spine if you're pinning from the

After you do the walking and sticking and pinning on the shoulder you haven't done, try on the vest. If you can drop your arms without getting stabbed under the arm by pins or a clump of material, fine. Otherwise, adjust the pins.

Sew up the side seams. cut off the excess material except for half an inch of seam allowance, and then sew "zigzag" or "over edge" over the seams. When that's done, turn the whole thing inside out and

# Banned drugs often dumped abroad

What ever happened to the Dalkon Shield an IUD that was withdrawn from the U.S. market? What ever happened to the children's pajamas that were banned by the Consumer Product Safety Commission because the chemical that made them flame - retardant was carcinogenic? What ever happened to Panalba - a popular antibiotic which was removed from pharmacies because it presented more risk than benefit?

Most people probably never pay much attention to the fate of the dangerous products that are restricted or banned in the United States, assuming that they are either discarded or destroyed. They are wrong!

While teaching pharmacology in a foreign medical school I was often dismayed to discover that drugs which were restricted in the U.S. were being used with abandon.

A recent article in the magazine Hother Jones (November 1979) has documented in shocking detail a fact I have long suspected - American mistakes don't get buried. they get shipped abroad.

American corporations have been dumping dangerous drugs, medical devices and poisonous pesticides in other countries when they can no longer sell them in the United States.

Webster's Dictionary defines the word

'dump" as to "get rid of unceremoniously or irresponsibly." That ain't the half of it! Do you recognize the name Tis? A few years ago this chemical flame retardant captured the headlines. It had been added to hundreds of milions of children's pajamas and later was shown to be

The clothes were recalled quickly from department stores and retail outlets. So far, so good. One would have assumed that all dangerous sleepwear would have been burned or buried. But apparently million of pajamas were disposed of by selling them to unsuspecting parents in other countries.

While one could understand, though not condone. the companies' wish to salvage a product disaster, the government's complacency is far more alarming. Our well - meaning bureaucrats may have actually contributed to the controversy, especially when it comes to birth control.

Despite many reports of serious side effects associated with the Dalkon Shield, an IUD made by the A.H. Robins company. the U.S. Agency for International Development bought and distributed hundreds of thousands in over 40 countries.

It is particularly shocking that the devices were often sent abroad in unsterilized bulk packages, although in the U.S. nonsterile devices are not allowed. This may have saved money, but it greatly increased the risk of uterine infections,

already a major complication of IUDs. Another classic case of the double standard involves the antibiotic Panalba. In the late 60s it was one of the Upjohn

Company's most popular drugs. Researchers had been saying that this combination antibiotic was "without merit for any infection" as far back as 1962. And in 1969 a panel of experts for the National Academy of Sciences concluded that this combination product was hazardous. lacked benefit and should be withdrawn from the market.

Although Panalba has not been available in the U.S. since 1970, the Upjohn Company continues to market this drug (under the name Albamycin-T) in over 30 countries.

The list of products and chemicals that have been dumped is long - including among other things, baby pacifiers, cancer - causing pesticides and controversial contraceptives.

In my opinion this sort of dumping must stop! I agree with Congressman Henry Waxman. Chairman of the House Subcommittee on Health and Environment, when he said. "I think we have a clear moral obligation not to allow exporting of hazardous substances which we know are going to harm the health of people around the world ... There is no human right to make a profit at the expense of children who may get cancer.

# Skins tighten NFC East with win over Cowboys

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Washington Redskins have made the National Football Conference East as tight as it can be, but a last-second field goal against Dallas may come back to haunt them.

"The Redskins have no class," said Dallas defensive end Harvey Martin after Washington won 34-20 Sunday. "When they get us down they want to rub it in our face. That's great. Maybe that's what it's gonna take to wake up this ball club.

"It was totally an insult." he said. "It got me in a frame of mind just to hate the Redskins.

With 14 seconds remaining in the game. and Washington ahead 31-20, the Redskins took possession of the ball and immediately called a time out to bring on the field goal kicking team.

Mark Moseley then boosted his second field goal of the day, a 45-yarder that came with only nine seconds left

Coach Jack Pardee and Redskins players justified the field goal because of the closeness of the NFC East, with Dallas, Washington and Philadelphia all tied for first with records of 8-4 with four games to

"The way this division is going the point differential could be involved," said Pardee. "Taking a field goal that is nearly a gimme is not running it up.

Asked about the possibility of stirring up bad blood between the two teams, Pardee replied. "There's not too much good blood to begin with

"Look at what they did to us a year ago," he declared. "Using play-action bombs (late in the Cowboys 37-10 Thanksgiving Day victory) is running it up.

Quarterback Joe Theismann threw three touchdown passes- a 4-yarder to John McDaniel, a 10-yarder to Clarence Harmon and an 11-yarder to Ricky Thompson to spark the Redskins offense as the defense blitzed the Cowboys, picking up

six sacks, three interceptions and two fumble recoveries.

"This was one of the best football games we played, offensively, defensively and special teams," said Theismann, "It was a classic."

Dallas Coach Tom Landry, who agreed with Pardee on the field goal and the closeness of the NFC East race, said, "We're in a lot of trouble. We haven't played very good football for some time.

We have been beaten three times in the last four games and haven played with much emotion. Maybe we're at hungry."

Quarterback Roger Staubach said, "We had some good plays, some good chances and we didn't take advantage of them.

They beat us with the blitz." Redskins defensive end Cor Bacon, who had two sacks, said. There is no doubt in my mind that if we keep playing like this.

we'll get in the playoffs?


Defensive tackle Diron Talbert, a long-time Dallas-baiter said, "It's always fun to play the Cowboys and to beat them."

# Rams need win to Olympic team to deadlock NFC West train overseas

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The 1979 National Football League season has not been a banner year for either the Los Angeles Rams or Atlanta Falcons, but both teams are fortunate in one regard they're in pro football's weakest division.

Going into tonight's nationally televised contest, both the 5-6 Rams and 4-7 Falcons are still well in the thick of the NFC West race. Los Angeles, in fact, can move into a tie for the division lead with a victory over the Falcons, since New Orleans fell to 6-6 via a 38-24 loss

to Seattle on Sunday. And in a division where .500 is tops, the Falcons can move within a game of first with a triumph over the Rams, who are favored by a touchdown in this meeting. As an example of what kind of year it's been for the Rams, they're hoping against hope that their No.2 quarterback, Vince Ferragamo,

can start against the Falcons. Injury-riddled Los Angeles, NFC West champions the past six years, has lost starter Pat Haden for the season with a broken finger, and backup Ferragamo - who has never started an NFL game has been sidelined since Oct. 14 with a broken bone in his throwing

Bob Lee, the 11-year NFL veteran who formerly played for Atlanta and Minnesota, has been with the Rams for less than two weeks, and he and rookie Jeff Rutledge are the other Los Angeles quarterbacks. The Falcons, too, may have a reserve at the controls. June Jones III will start at quarterback if Steve Bartkowski is unable to play. He

was listed as doubtful because of a hip injury suffered in last

Sunday's 24-3 loss to the New York Giants. Jones, who has completed nine of 17 passes for 159 yards this season, came off the bench last year to lead the Falcons to a 15-7 Monday night victory over the Rams in Atlanta. Ferragamo is seven of 17 for 89 yards for the Rams this year.

The opposing coaches, Atlanta's Leeman Bennett and Los Angeles' Ray Malavasi, agree that neither team can afford many more losses. We still have something to play for, since we still have four games against Western Division opponents," said Bennett, a former Rams'

"It is not too late to make something happen, but we have got to do it right now. The Rams are in the same position, and it should be a good game.



DALLAS (AP) - The U.S. Olympic Committee has adopted a plan for the 1980 U.S. Olympic team to conduct its final training in West Berlin beginning July 1.

Spokesman Bob Paul said it will mark the first time for the American team to be processed and finish its training overseas. In other action taken during a weekend meeting of the committee's executive board, Larry Brown, baskeball coach at

UCLA and a 1964 Olympian, was named assistant basketball coach for the American team. David Gavitt of Providence College is the main coach.

The executive board also adopted a strong resolution requesting that the AAU wrestling division and the rival US Wrestling Federation agree within seven days to meet and to seek a resolution of their differences over who will be the national governing body of amateur wrestling.

By a court decision earlier this year, the AAU Wrestling Division was cited to retain the governing body status until after the Olympic Games in Moscow nest summer.

At the same time, the U.S. Wresting Federation was given the title governing body-designate.

"By action of the executive board, it is hoped that the two groups will be able to resolve their differences and bring to an end the dispute which has been carried on for four years," Paul said.







# Government predicts higher food prices in '80

The government has predicted that food prices could go up by as much as 11 percent in 1980, but you don't have to pay the higher prices if you shop carefully

Economists at Citibank, the country's second-biggest commercial bank. recently priced a random marketbasket of 36 food and non-food items at a New York City supermarket.

They found that a careful shopper rang up a bill-of \$51.08. A careless shopper, who picked haphazardly, without paying much attention to price, paid \$83.39 for the same products. The careful shopper saved 39 percent — more than three times as much as the maximum price boost predicted for next year.

Shopping to save takes time and effort. But the trouble may be worth it. Suppose you spend \$60 a week on food. Assume you can save just 15 percent by spending an extra hour on shopping - clipping coupons, comparing prices, planning menus around specials. That comes out to \$9 a week. That's more than \$450 a year. How many hours would you have to work to earn enough to save \$450?

Some of the savings reported by the Citibank shoppers were dramatic. One brand of vinegar, for example, cost more than twice as much as another — 34 cents a quart versus 79 cents. Three pounds of onions, purchased loose, cost 69 cents. The same amount, packaged in a bag, carried a price tag of \$1.77.

Here are some of the things you can do to save money: -Check newspaper ads before you shop. Circle specials and buy those products at the store that offers the best deal.

-Compare prices on non-sale goods. A 10-cent saving on an advertised special is no bargain if a store's regular prices are higher

-Try to plan your spending and shop less often. Each time you enter the supermarket, you're vulnerable to impulse buying; fewer trips mean fewer potential temptations. -Look for unit prices so you can compare different sizes. The

larger size is usually — but not always — cheaper. -Inspect store displays carefully. A special display doesn't always

mean a special price. -Suit quality to use No-frills brands in plain packages often offer equal nutrition at much lower prices.

-Learn to compare true cost as well as price. Spare ribs may seem to be cheaper than hamburger, but you get fewer servings per

-Be aware of marketing techniques. The potato chips and snack foods didn't wind up next to the soda by accident.

-Use coupons and take advantage of refund offers displayed on shelves. If the store is out of an advertised item, demand a raincheck.

-Weigh the cost of convenience. The Citibank shoppers, for example, found that a 10-ounce box of frozen peas with butter sauce cost 89 cents. A 10-ounce bag of plain, frozen peas cost 29 cents. Adding the butter yourself is cheaper and takes very little effort.
