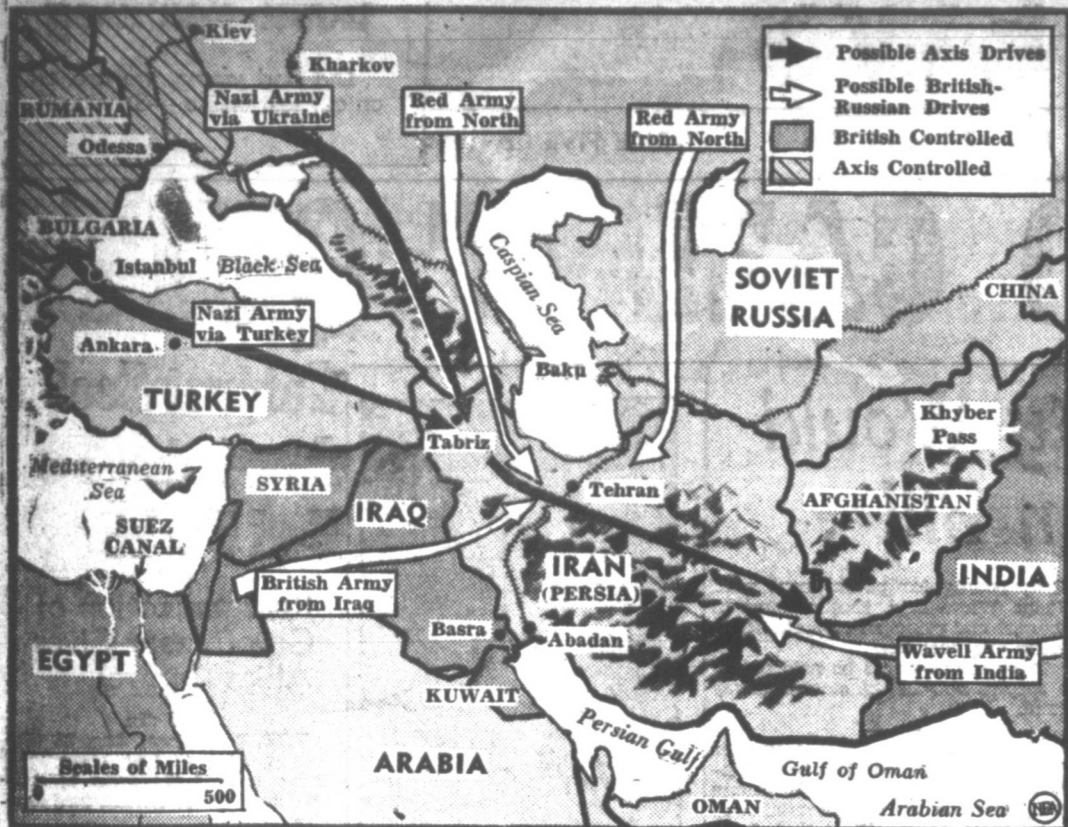


India, Like Persia, Imperiled by Nazi Menace

After a week of far-flung action, the most footsore and weary unit among the nearly 100,000 troops probably was the 2nd Battalion of the 185th Infantry, 40th Division. Cold, drenched, hungry and exhausted, they came out of the wilds of southern Pacific county yesterday after harrowing experiences that included a member of the marching detachment said, eating of wild berries and an occasional crawfish from a meandering gully stream.

At 40th division headquarters, officers available last night claimed the battalion never was lost but only "overcome" after running blind and then retracing its course to get out of the timber.

The member of the detachment who told of the grueling hike, close to 72 hours in all with food rations for only 18 hours, said the unit had been sent out on a flanking movement up the Deep river against a force of the mythical Pacific coast

leader.

It never found the enemy, and that was what some of the soldiers griped about when they got back to food and warming fires after two nights and a day in intermittent, drenching rain.

There was between 500 and 700 men in the detachment and "they made a mighty long line through the woods."

The soldier related that apparently faulty maps caused complications, while compasses were of slight value because of the rough country. The men, bearing machine guns and mortars struggled up and down slopes and across abandoned logging railroad tracks.

After sandwiches ran out, they turned to berries and anything else that seemed edible.

One man broke an arm in a fall and another suffered a less severe arm injury.

Germans Claim Gains In Gornel Fighting

(By The Associated Press)
BERLIN, Aug. 28—German forces pursuing retreating Russians east of Gornel on the central front captured 2,200 prisoners today as two mechanized divisions ploughed deeply into Red columns, DNB reported. Fifteen cannon also were taken, the agency said.

The number of prisoners taken in the region of Velikie Luki increased from 30,000 to 34,000, DNB stated, as the Germans continued mopping up operations in this sector between Smolensk and Lake Ilmen. Fall of the town itself was announced yesterday.

In addition, 452 guns have been captured or destroyed in this region where the 22nd Russian army was said to have been smashed.

Russians on the lower Dnieper river in the Ukraine tried to shell German positions on the west bank from river boats, DNB said, but were repulsed by German artillery fire.

German infantry has cut the Moscow-Leningrad railway while Finnish and German forces have virtually destroyed two Russian mechanized divisions above the Arctic Circle near the Murmansk-Leningrad line, Germans reported today.

Adolf Hitler's field headquarters reported operations "continued according to plan" on the entire Soviet front of nearly 2,000 miles, but military commentators said German, Hungarian and Rumanian troops had entered Zaporozhe, important Ukrainian rail junction east of the lower Dnieper river.

New Drunk Driving Law Ups Convictions

AUSTIN, Aug. 28 (AP)—Under a new law making the initial offense of drunk driving a misdemeanor instead of felony, conviction have increased 340 per cent, State Police Director Romer Garrison, Jr., said today.

Garrison reported 332 driver's licenses were suspended or revoked on conviction of driving intoxicated between June 19, effective date of the new statute, and Aug. 22, as compared with 50 suspensions in the same period last year.

East Gasoline Supply Reduced 15 Per Cent

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28 (AP)—Ralph E. Davies, acting petroleum coordinator, announced today that gasoline supplies for filling stations in the east would be reduced 15 per cent in September, compared with July.

Davies' testimony opened a Senate investigation of threatened oil shortages. He presented a mass of figures which he said showed that the eastern coast faced an actual shortage of both gasoline and oil for heating and industry this winter.

The east coast faced a deficit of 37,800,000 barrels of petroleum products during the last four months of this year, Davies testified. He said the reduction in gasoline supplies to filling stations would help meet this shortage.

If present methods fail to eliminate danger of shutdowns for industry and home heating plants, Davies said officials were ready to operate a rigid rationing plan. But he added they hoped to avoid such drastic action.

Davies flatly disputed rumors he said had been circulated that the shortage "is being played up to foster war psychology; that a shortage has been created artificially to assure passage of a pipeline bill" or that a shortage of gasoline "was deliberately precipitated."

The witness, who is a former vice president of the Standard Oil company of California, said the committee that unless east coast supplies were brought into balance, these conditions would result:

"1. We could have all the gasoline we want and not enough oil to heat our homes.

"2. We could heat our homes and have all the gasoline we want, but not heat our homes and gasoline for transportation.

"3. We could have ample oil for running our industries, but not heat our homes and gasoline for transportation.

Davies said that in July the navy was unable to get a single bid for 2,500,000 barrels of heavy fuel oil to be delivered on the east coast "because no company could supply the oil unless the navy would carry it in its own tankers from the Gulf ports."

Reviewing the whole problem of pipelines, and particularly the projected 1,300-mile-\$800,000,000 line from East Texas to Louisiana, to Salem, Ill., to Marcus Hook and Bayonne, N. J., Davies said:

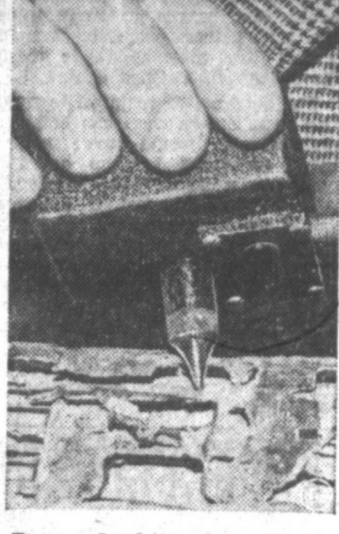
"Though the eventual relief will be substantial, it is manifest that it can have no effect on the immediate situation."

As to railway tank cars, he asserted:

"I am in no position to give assurance that the tank car capacity of the country is being utilized to capacity. I suspect that it is not, and that greater accomplishment is possible in that direction. In fact, our forecasts of stock position contemplate an improved employment of tank car facilities."

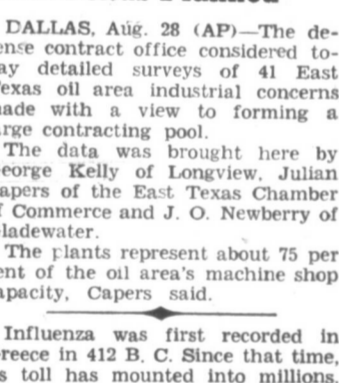

Members Of Anti-Communist Legion Rounded Up By Nazis

VERSAILLES, German-Occupied France, Aug. 28 (AP)—Police of the German-occupied zone today began a roundup of the members of the Anti-Communist legion which has been recruited for services in Russia in an effort to determine whether or not they are Communists.

The red-headed Colette, meanwhile, frankly told an investigating magistrate this morning that he was a follower of General Charles De Gaulle and that he was very glad he had hit the collaboratorist politicians.

Doctors were hopeful they would save the lives of both Laval and Deat, who were gravely wounded.

In Paris, outright opposition elements were being rounded up in what were called preventive arrests in order to keep the Versailles shootings from serving as a signal for general disorder. Yesterday, one of the new Anti-Communist courts in Paris pronounced its first three death sentences as the result of many hundreds of recent arrests.

Here in Versailles, a heavy guard was thrown about the barracks where the shootings occurred and in the early morning hours three Anti-Communist legionnaires were taken into custody.

They were carrying revolvers of the same type which Colette had stuck in his leather belt.

Still other arrests were made in Versailles—either to prevent new outbreaks or to block open fighting between collaboratorists and their enemies.

The three men condemned by the

special Paris court in secret session were ordered executed immediately. They were Andre Broches, an electrician who formerly was secretary to a Communist deputy; Emil Jean Bastard, a militant Communist and a Russian, Abraham Trzebucze, Lucien Sampaix, noted Communist journalist, and former secretary-general of the Paris Communist newspaper L'Humanite, who escaped from a concentration camp in the department of Hautes Alpes in the unoccupied zone, was sentenced to life imprisonment at hard labor.

Police officials in Versailles apparently feared that other so-called terrorists had joined the Anti-Bolshevik legion in order to have an opportunity to attack its leaders.

Admiral Bard, chief of the police forces in the Paris region, took personal charge of police measures in cooperation with Marshal Chevalier, prefect of the Seine-Et-Oise department, of which Versailles is the capital.

The two visited Laval and Deat and besides and questioned them for several minutes. Deat refused to permit longer questioning.

Deat was in considerably more danger than Laval, running a high temperature.

A bulletin issued at 1 p. m. said that both were doing well as could be expected and that hope of saving Deat had not been given up.

As for Laval, former cabinet minister Pierre Cathala said after being allowed to talk to the patient a minute:

"I found Laval in a state of health as satisfactory as possible considering his wounds. The best of hope is permissible for the future."

New Airport To Be Built At Arlington

FORT WORTH, Aug. 28 (AP)—Selection of a site for a new airport near Arlington and nearly equidistant between Fort Worth and Dallas will be made within four or five days by L. C. Elliott, regional manager of the Civil Aeronautics Administration, he said today.

Actual development of the landing area of the new field may be under way within 60 or 90 days, Elliott said. An initial allotment of \$400,000 from the CAA is available for construction of landing facilities.

Development of the airport will be pressed, Elliott said, to make it available as soon as possible for national defense purposes. He said it is likely to be used as an auxiliary field by the army to augment training facilities in this area.

Later the field may serve as a joint commercial airport between Fort Worth and Dallas.

Shooting Of Laval Heard Over Radio

VICHY, Unoccupied France, Aug. 28 (AP)—French radio listeners tuned in on the Paris radio station yesterday could hear the actual shots which felled Pierre Laval and Marcel Deat and Laval's cries "I'm hit! I'm hit!" when the assassin's bullets hit him.

The occasion was a public ceremony marking the mobilization of an anti-Bolshevik legion which is due to go to fight against Russia.

The microphone was close to the scene of the shooting and the announcer, interrupted by the sound of three shots in quick succession and then two others, was able to give an on-the-spot running account of what occurred.

Wheeling around, he excitedly described Laval several yards away with blood spots spattering over his shirt front.

American-Jap Senator in U. S.

While Washington worries about trouble with the Nipponese across the Pacific, Sanji Abe, member of the Hawaiian Senate and first American citizen of Japanese ancestry to be elected senator on U. S. territory, pays a visit to Los Angeles with his daughter Bernice. He says there has been no recruiting of American-Japanese in Hawaii for the Jap army.

VFW Asks Dismissal Of Frances Perkins

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 28 (AP)—The Veterans of Foreign Wars has come through the first flurp of its 42nd national encampment by tabling a resolution to censure "any and all organizations" attempting to undermine U. S. foreign policy.

The action followed a plea to President Roosevelt to outlaw jurisdictional strikes in defense industries as un-American and to forfeit exemption of defense employees from selective service if they strike.

The veterans also unanimously called upon the President to dispense with services of Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins because she "has demonstrated her lack of ability to handle the position she holds." They petitioned congress to declare the Communist party a non-political organization and bar it from the ballot.

U. S. To Make Tests Of Substitute Fuels

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28 (AP)—Rigorous tests of motor fuel made from farm crop surpluses and wastes will be made soon at the agriculture department's laboratory in Peoria, Ill.

Construction of a plant for production of such fuels has been practically completed, the department reported today. The plant will be capable of producing 500 gallons of motor fuel a day from corn, sweet potatoes, wheat and other carbohydrate crops.

RAF Bombers Raid Western Germany

LONDON, Aug. 28 (AP)—British bombers, flying to the attack on Germany again last night, centered a heavy assault on the industrial city of Mannheim and also blasted docks at Bologne, Ostend and Dunkerque, the air ministry announced today.

Other targets in western Germany in addition to Mannheim were subjected to lighter assaults, a communique said.

Lord Mountbatten Takes Command Of 'Illustrious'

ABOARD H. M. S. ILLUSTRIOUS, Aug. 28 (AP)—Captain Lord Louis Mountbatten, cousin of King George VI of England and one of Great Britain's most distinguished naval officers, formally took command of the repaired aircraft carrier Illustrious this morning in a colorful ceremony aboard the ship's flight deck.

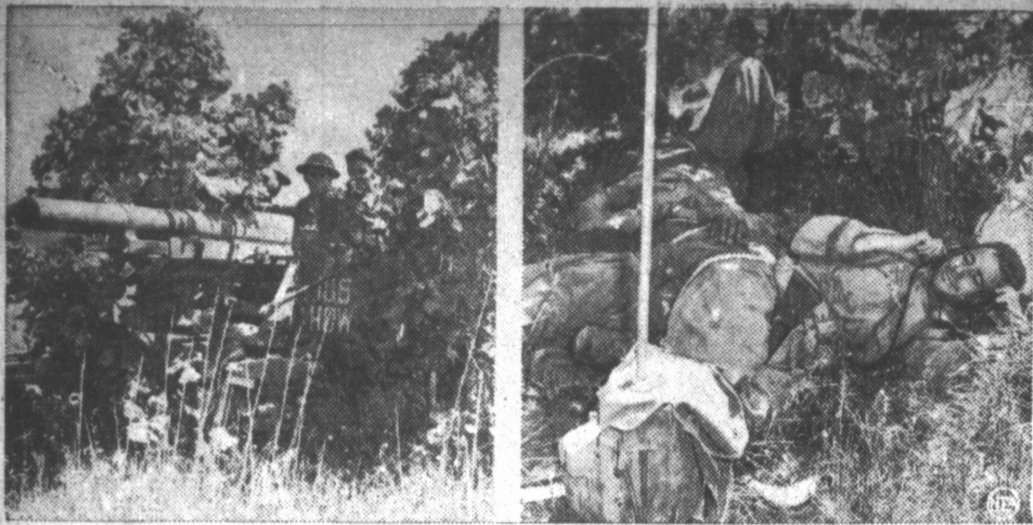

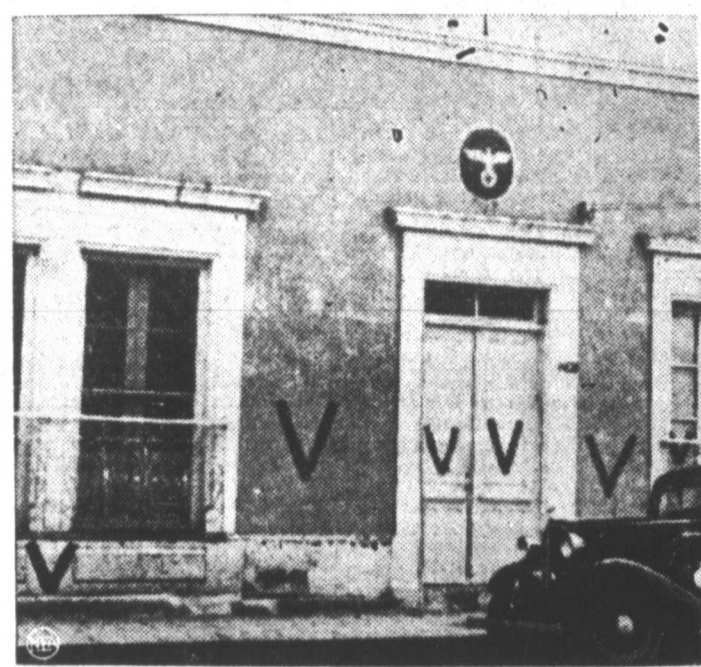

Five Men Hurt In Magnesium Factory Fire

SAN JOSE, Calif., Aug. 28 (AP)—A brief, fierce fire in the new \$12,000,000 magnesium plant at Monte Vista early today burned five men working on a new experimental process, three of them seriously. FBI agents began an immediate investigation at the plant which started producing the vital defense metal only Monday. Ralph Knight, chief engineer for the Henry J. Kaiser interests which own the plant, said a preliminary investigation did not indicate whether the fire was accidental or deliberately set. Damage to the plant, which is expected to treble America's magnesium production, was negligible. Workers said flames suddenly burst out in one corner of the plant, and were confined to an area of about 400 square feet. There was no explosion. The three men gravely burned were Eugene McGlinchey of Pleasanton, Donald Bonafide, Santa Clara, and Meyer Gallonway, San Jose. They were taken to a San Jose hospital.

Private Air Lines To Continue Using Love, Meacham Fields

DALLAS, Aug. 28 (AP)—Although they agreed yesterday to purchase the site for a midway airport which will be developed by Arlington and the federal government, American Airlines and Braniff Airways still expect to use Love field in Dallas and Meacham field in Fort Worth for many more years. T. E. Braniff, president of Braniff Airways, announced that the field

which will be located between Dallas and Fort Worth was "a protection for the future—not for immediate use." This explanation by airline officials came as city authorities and civic leaders of both Dallas and Fort Worth protested establishment of an airport which would take traffic away from Love and Meacham fields. Under plans of Arlington, the federal CAA and the airlines, the midway airport will be developed with a \$490,000 federal grant already allocated. It will be used immediately for military purposes during the national defense emergency and will

be converted into a strictly commercial field later on. The federal government will install three runways, lights, drainage and a fence. But it will not build hangars or an administration building.

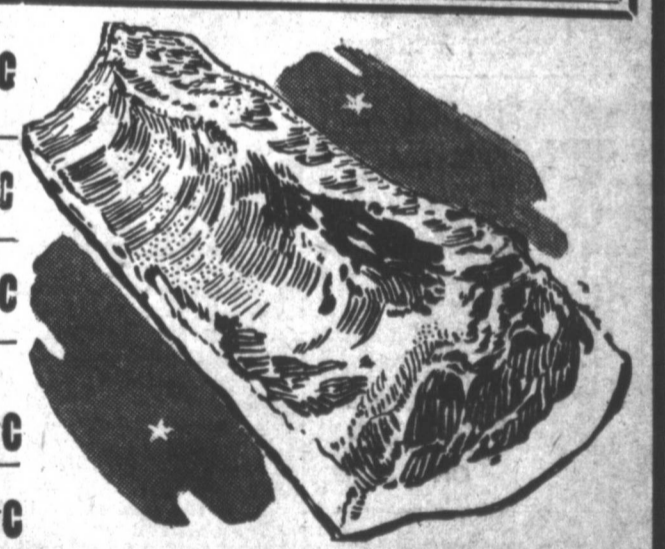

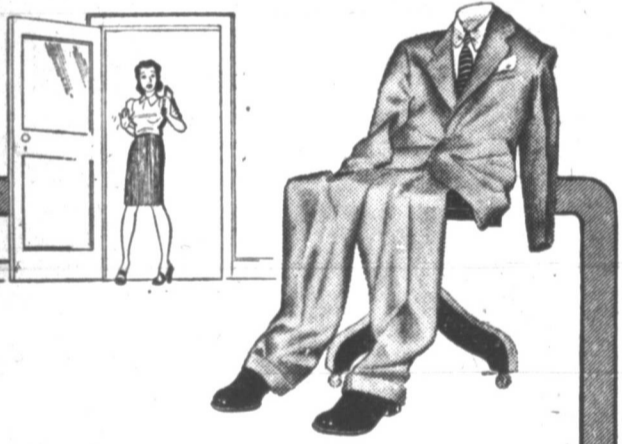

Six Killed In Air Collision

BLACKPOOL, England, Aug. 28 (AP)—An air collision of two planes over Blackpool today resulted in the death of six persons, including the crews of both planes, the hospitalization of 16 and minor injuries for scores of others.

(Presumably both the craft were British. Rammings of opposing planes, however, has come to be an accepted practice in aerial combat and it might be that one was a raiding craft.)

Thirty persons were injured by the fall of one plane on a central station (perhaps a railway depot). The other dropped upon a house.

Figures from eight Canadian points of entry show that 61,770 motor cars from the United States entered the Dominion on 60-day permits during the week ending July 5, 1941, compared with 26,535 in the corresponding week last year.

Solons Undecided On Special Session

AUSTIN, Aug. 28 (AP)—A prospective special session of the legislature on the controversial road bond issue remained indeterminate today. Senator Allan Shivers of Fort Arthur, leader of forces opposed to the plan of a group of county judges headed by Merritt Gibson of Longview, conferred with Governor Coke Stevenson yesterday but reported only that he was hopeful a compromise could be agreed upon.

Shivers said he had received many letters from county judges indicating they were not especially interested in disposal of a \$2,000,000 surplus in the state's road bond assumption fund but desired greatly to have the bonds serviced.

Gibson's group favor allotting the surplus to counties for lateral road construction while Shivers, the governor and others prefer to allocate it to the highway department. At its regular session, the legislature failed to re-enact the bond assumption act.

Soldiers Believe Tanks Overrated

WITH THE THIRD ARMY IN LOUISIANA, Aug. 28 (AP)—Declaring tank power has been overrated in this country, officers of the Third Army said American soldiers were being taught to keep up their fighting courage even while looking into the spitting guns of an enemy tank roaring across a battle field.

"For every weapon man ever invented," declared Lieut. General Walker Krueger, commander of the Third Army, "there has been adequate defense devised to cope with it."

In war time, he said, infantry units must stand steadfastly in the front line and, should tanks shove through, they must hold firm until steel-puncturing artillery fire can be rushed into place.

"When thus cut off from their food and gas supply," Krueger continued, "tanks will either have to fight their way out quickly or be destroyed by the concentrated fire of the defender."

Although other weapons performed in the initial phases of the Third Army's maneuvers just completed, every soldier had an opportunity to witness the handicaps as well as advantages of tanks.

"Facing armored forces at close range has largely reduced the popular impression that tanks defy defense," officer said.

Subways Darkened By Torrential Rain

NEW YORK, Aug. 28 (AP)—New York's subway lines returned to normal schedules today after service had been disrupted for hours last night by a torrential rainstorm that indirectly caused at least two deaths. An unidentified pencil peddler was killed by a truck as the driver's vision was obscured by the downpour. Martin Costello, 66, attempting to turn on the lights in the flooded and darkened St. Catherine's Maternity hospital, was electrocuted as he touched a fuse box while standing in water.

The 2.13-inch rainfall short-circuited power lines in the subways in various sections of the city as thousands headed for home during the suddenly darkened dinner hour.

Today's War Analysis

By DEWITT MACKENZIE

Another Anglo-Russian sensation of the near future is likely to be the creation of a joint fighting front in the Caucasus, or so it seems to me—a move which will be hastened if the Germans continue to advance eastward along the coast of the Black sea.

The Nazi threat is emphasized in the report from Berlin today that the invaders have captured the industrial railway center of Zaporozhe, east of the lower Dnieper river. The significance of this lies in the fact that Hitler's troops should have effected a crossing of this great stream in sufficient force to take a big city.

The establishment of a joint front is logical strategy in view of the Allied occupation of Iran (Persia) which gives the British an open road into Russia. That left flank of the Soviet defenses, running through the Caucasus between the Black sea and the Caspian, must be protected at all hazards. The reasons are these:

1. First off, Persia is the keystone for control of the whole Near East and Middle East. It would be a disaster for the Allies if Hitler got it.
2. The Russians must hold the ports on the east coast of the Black sea unless they are to lose control

of that vital water altogether.

3. Since the Caucasus is the gateway into Persia, and thence to the open sea, it's one of Russia's lifelines, and may become the chief route for supplies from America and other sources.

4. The Caucasus also provides a door to Turkey, and it is essential from the Allied standpoint that the Turks shouldn't come under Hitler's domination.

5. Quite apart from Persia's oil, the Caucasus has wells which would be worth more to the Nazi chief than gold or principalities at this juncture when there is danger that the wheels of the German war machine may go dry for lack of lubricants.

The sending of such an expeditionary force into the Caucasus may be the first major assistance the British will give the Reds on land. Moscow has been pressing England to create a diversion, other than the bombing of Germany to relieve the Nazi pressure on the Russian front.

Now the creation of a worthwhile diversion is easier said than done. Most military experts hold that it would be foolhardy for Britain to attempt an invasion of western Europe while the Nazis remain so strong. It would be silly to believe that the astute German high command has overlooked the possibility of such a move and left itself unprotected along the English channel.

A British attempt at a major landing might result in utter catastrophe. Raids of moderate size can be carried out, of course, and ultimately the grand invasion can and will be attempted if Hitler is sufficiently weakened to make the attempt feasible.

Here we may well note that we have a rather unusual situation in the alliance between Britain and the Reds. John Bull and the Russian Bear make strange bedfellows. It is an ironic circumstance that it was the Bolsheviks who greased the

wheels of Hitler's war chariot by signing the non-aggression pact with him. Then the Moscowites tendered the fueler both moral and material support until he turned on them.

Thus it's safe to assume that while the British naturally will do all possible to aid Russia to the mutual benefit of the alliance, neither sentimental nor political motives will enter into the transactions.

What I mean is, the British aren't likely to do for the Bolsheviks what they did for Greece when, to make good their bond, they sent a military expedition, knowing full well that it must meet defeat, barring unexpected help from Olympus.

'Gas Girls' Have Edge On Secretaries

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 28 (AP)—You working girls who've been plugging your heart out to become the boss' secretary might be overlooking something just as good in the gasoline station business.

"It's much more exciting than dictation," declares 25-year-old Dorothy Wilson, a former typist and one of seven girls being tested as station attendants.

The Sun Oil company is experimenting with the "gas girls" to see if they could replace men in event of a labor shortage due to the defense program.

And they're doing all right so far, at least considering the traffic they're detouring into a suburban station where they're performing after a week of schooling.

Chosen for ability and charm among 500 applicants, the six blondes and a brunette got their first actual test in public yesterday, servicing radiators and windshields, inflating tires, dishing out gas and oil and keeping station records—all of which is to bring them \$100 monthly.

San Antonio Packing Plants Resume Work

SAN ANTONIO, Aug. 28—Officials reported operations were three-fourths of normal yesterday at the Mission Provision company and the Roegelein Packing company, where more than 200 workers struck yesterday.

"We are back up to 75 per cent of normal operations," said William Roegelein, president of the latter firm. "Several men who failed to report to work yesterday returned to work this morning."

Union representatives denied that some of the strikers returned to work.

"We haven't heard of any of our men returning," said Frank Had-dick, international organizer for the Amalgamated Meat Cutters union (AFL).

Roegelein and President J. E. O'Neill of the Mission plant said all orders for the army and navy were being handled without delay.

Union employees of the plants stayed away from work following a break in contract negotiations.

The union sought vacations with pay, a general 17 1/2 cent hourly wage increase, a closed shop and a system whereby the companies would deduct union dues and assessments from pay checks.

Strike Hurts Mexico Telephone Service

MEXICO CITY, Aug. 28 (AP)—A high premium has been placed on the already overtaxed facilities of the Swedish-owned Ericsson Telephone company by the current strike against the United States-owned Mexicana system which has paralyzed half of Mexico's telephone service.

The Ericsson firm has been unable to meet the heavy demand for telephone installations from Mexicana subscribers whom the strike has deprived of service.

As a result Ericsson users are now advertising in the newspapers their willingness to sell their subscriptions for as much as 150 pesos, to frantic Mexicana subscribers who cannot wait for solution of the strike.

Meanwhile, the ministry of labor pressed its efforts to mediate the five-day-old conflict. The 1,800 Mexicana employees have demanded weekly wage increases totaling about 20,000 pesos.

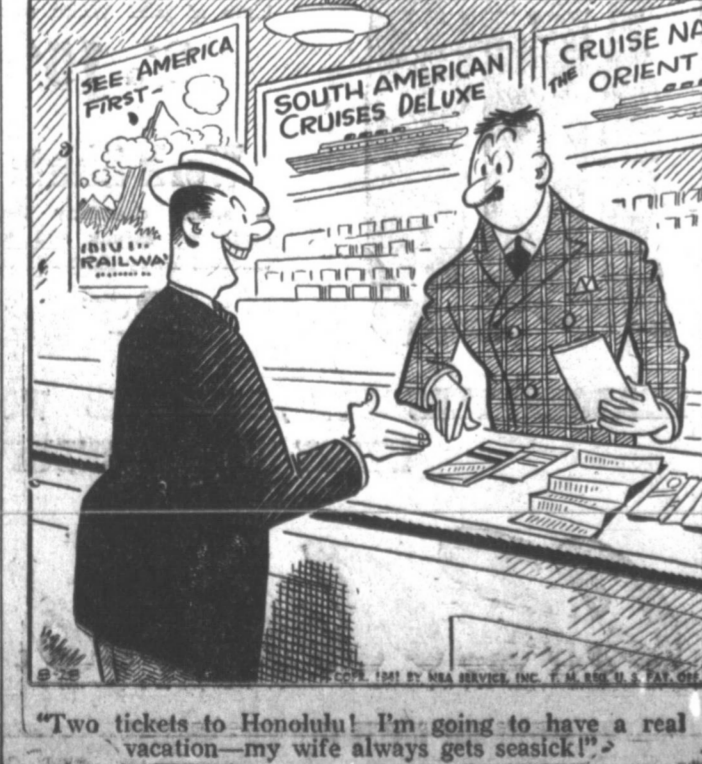

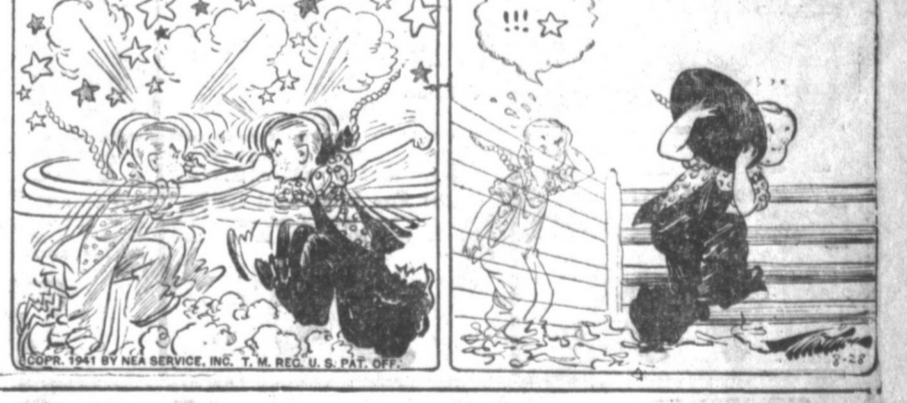

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WD Schools To Open On Monday

 WHITE DEER, Aug. 28—With most of the high school students already enrolled, the faculty virtually complete, the buildings refinished, and much new equipment added, the White Deer Independent schools will begin the fall semester, Monday, September 1.

Faculty meetings will be held Monday, beginning with a breakfast at 8 o'clock in the high school cafeteria. On Tuesday the high school students will report to classes and grade school pupils will be enrolled. High school pupils who did not enroll at the scheduled time are urged

to register Saturday or Monday afternoons.

Eleven new teachers have been employed in the system this year, three in the high school, and four in each of the grade schools, and one at Skellytown is yet to be secured.

Ronald Davis, a graduate of West Texas State college, Canyon, will teach vocational agriculture. He has been teaching at Wellington. Avery Freeman will teach science in the high school. He has a B. A. degree from Hendrix college, Conway, Ark., and an M. S. degree from Southern Methodist university, Dallas, where he was assistant in the science department. For the past three years he has been teaching in the Lancaster High school.

Charles Churchill, assistant coach, received his B. S. degree last spring from East Texas State Teachers

college, Commerce, where he was one of the outstanding members of the football team.

New teachers in the White Deer grade school are Vera Taylor, of Ballinger; Edythe Strickland, Amarillo; Ralph Griffiths, Plainview; and Mary Lee Davis, Shamrock.

Miss Taylor, a graduate of Texas Tech, with several years teaching experience, will teach the fourth grade and girls' physical education. Miss Strickland, who will teach public school music, was graduated this year from Texas State College for Women, Denton, where she appeared often in concert and radio programs. Mr. Griffiths, a West Texas State college graduate, will teach social science and shop for boys. He held a similar position last year at Priona. Miss Davis, also from West Texas State college, will teach second grade. She has had three years experience, coming here from Happy.

Maloney Asks Use Of R. R. Tank Cars

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28 (AP)—Senator Maloney (D-Conn.) proposed today that all unused railroad tank cars be set to rolling in an effort to relieve shortages of gasoline, fuel oil and other products.

"I have the feeling that we may press the new unused tank cars and other tank cars not badly needed otherwise—into immediate service," Maloney said. "I know that the cost of transportation by rail has been considerably greater than by tanker and pipe line."

To offset this added cost, the senator suggested that railroads might "move whole trains of tank cars at one time," and thus reduce costs substantially.

Maloney is chairman of a special committee appointed yesterday to begin a senate investigation of the shortages tomorrow. Meanwhile, a plan of action against gasoline profiteering was drafted in government quarters.

Texas Farmers Asked To Plant More Winter Cover Crops For Food

COLLEGE STATION, Aug. 28—Texas farmers are being urged in the name of national defense to plant more winter cover crops as a means of increasing production of needed foods for America and the embattled democracies.

Meeting in College Station on the request of Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard, the Texas USDA Defense board studied a threatened shortage of winter legume seed and recommended plantings of both winter legumes and non-leguminous cover crops.

"Protection of our soil is more important than ever during the defense emergency," B. F. Vance, chairman of the board, told board members representing all USDA agencies in the state. "Food is vital to our national defense, and increased production of the necessary foods to a great extent depends on increased productivity of the soil."

Winter cover crops, it was pointed out, prevent leaching and erosion of the soil and add to its fertility. Most widely-used legume cover crops in Texas are vetch, Austrian winterpeas, and various clovers. Non-leguminous cover crops in the state include oats, barley, rye, and sudan grass.

"Texas farmers this year ordered nearly a million pounds of winter legume seed through the AAA's conservation materials program, Vance told the board, and already have received 60 per cent of their order. A delay in shipment of the rest of the order will seriously curtail the planting of winter legumes in the state and will result in serious damage to the state's soil, he declared.

It was explained to the board that most of the vetch and Austrian winterpea seed supply was produced in the northwest, but that an anticipated bumper crop of seed had failed to materialize with the result that growers were holding the seed off the market to await better prices.

Preventive Arrests Ordered By Germans

VICHY, Unoccupied France, Aug. 28 (AP)—Advises from German-occupied Paris today police were rounding up opposition elements in preventive arrests throughout the city to keep the attempted assassination of Marshal Laval and Marcel Deat from serving as a signal for general disorder.

The new and so-called preventive arrests in Paris began early this morning after conferences between Vichy authorities and police officials.

Here, authorized sources asserted that the attack on Versailles on Laval and the others "fully justifies the measures which have been taken by Marshal Petain's government against the Communists."

Deat was reported to be in serious condition with a bullet lodged in his intestines. Hospital officials were to attempt an operation, it was said.

a bullet in Laval's arm has been extracted, but another lodged in his chest could not be removed and it was reported he would have to carry the bullet for the rest of his life. Laval's condition was said to be satisfactory.
