WASHINGTON, Dec. 11. (AP)-The United States is studying broadening of selective service to register and classify all the ablebodied men and women in the nation for military and civilian defense, Brig. Gen. Louis B. Hershey said today.

Challenge Hurled By II Duce, Hitler Accepted

WASHINGTON, Dec. 11. (AP)--Congress voted war against Nazi Germany and Italy today in a swift response to President Roosevelt's appeal for a "rapid and united effort" for the cause of victory "over the forces of savagery and of barbarism."

As fast as roll calls could be tallied, the senate unanimously, and the house without a single "no" vote, accepted the challenge of Adolf Hitler and Benito Mussolini, Axis partners of Japan with whom the nation went to war Monday.

The senate vote for war against Germany was 88 to 0. Before the tally on Italy was recorded, Senators Andrews (D-A.) and Smathers (D.-N. J.) reached the chamber to make the vote against Italy stand at 90 to 0.

The house vote was 393, with one member recorded |

The senators lined up unanimously again—90 to 0 for war against Mussolini's government. Simultaneously the house voted war against Germany and proceeded to Vittorio Emanuele had declared take similar action against Italy.

U. S. Navy Needs Radio Technicians

An urgent call for radio technicians, repairmen and maintenance men was issued today by the United States Navy, with the announcement that qualified candidates may be enlisted as radiomen second class in the Naval Reserve.

Texas and the Eighth Naval district has been assigned a quota of 250 men for this branch of the service, out of a nationwide total of 1,-000 men within the next 60 days. Candidates for ratings must be high school graduates and must hold

or have held a Class A or B license. However, in the absence of these

qualifications, a man must be actively engaged in technical radio work. Accepted candidates will be sent o a naval training school at Los Angeles and may be, by the officerin-charge of the school, recommended for ratings up to and including chief radioman. Texas Aggies Tender Services To Nation cial To The NEWS

COLLEGE STATION, Dec. 11—(A&MC)—Like April 6. 1917, the date of Dec. 8, 1941 again found the stu-dents at Texas A&M College ready and willing to do their part for their country and they were backed by the academic council of the school in again tendering to the federal government all of the research, exension and instructional facilities of the college in whatever use they will be of the most service to the nation.

While President Franklin D. Roos-evelt was addressing a joint session of congress, the executive committee of the college sat in the office of Dr. T. O. Walton, college president, discussing recommended action to be taken by the faculty as soon as congress acted upon the resolution which was placed before them following the President's address. At a subsequent meeting of the academic council, those recommendations were unanimously approved and the offer wired to the Chief Executive at the White House. In World War I a total of 2,200 Texas A&M College alumni and students answered their country's call and 56 of them gave their lives in the performance of their duty. Since 1918, and the formation of the Reserve Officers Training corps (R.O.T.C.) training, more than 5,100 A&M students have received reserve commissions upon graduation and latest estimates place over 3,000 of these ex-Aggies on active duty.

Checkup Monday showed that 4,-842 of the enrollment of 6,341 in school on Dec. 8 are taking courses in military science and tactics which will prepare them to become commissioned officers in the organized reserve. Of those, 549 are seniors holding contracts with the war department calling for them to complete the two-year advance course while another 514 such contracts are held by juniors. 

Tobey asserted that the fleet's listening devices "weren't working" that the ships "lay at anchor and were sunk than had been disclosed

by the president.

He demanded that there be placed at the head of the navy a "responsible" man who believes in "efficiency" rather than public utterances.

Senator Lucas (D.-Ill.) asked Tobey where he got the information that the fleet had no steam up at the time of the attack. had told him.

Lucas told him that he had taken the word of members who declined to tell the senate where they got their information and had yet made no effort to check with the navy to see whether the facts were true.

Tobey replied that he had demanded an investigation of the facts

available. "I wouldn't want to tell all I've heard on the floor of the senate about the debacle at Pearl Harbor,"

but so far they had not been made

Tobey said. Earlier, senators of both major parties had said there should be a sweeping inveseigation of the circumstances which permitted the Japs to surprise the navy.

to invade the island. At sea, U. S. army headquarters at Manila said an American bomber had smashed at a 29,000-ton Japanese battleship, scoring repeated hits, and left it "burning furi-





Wide World War Analyst The declaration of war against the United States by Germany and Italy, in alliance with Japan, was fully expected and doesn't alter the position materially.

Herr Hitler, as overlord of the Axis, undoubtedly hopes that the moral effect of this declaration, delivered at a moment of great triumph because of Japanese succeswill benefit his cause. However, it is likely that the effet has been largely discounted in advance.

True, this may presage more direct action against the United States. Indeed one would expect this to be so. But that action would have come in any event, for the normal Axis strategy is to strike without warning. It happens to suit Hitler's purpose now to make a show of the formality.

As for the Japanese end of our now all-inclusive war, the long lane is showing some slight curves even though no turning has developed.

We have some good news to go with the bad. Foremost is the announcement by an American Army spokesman in Manila that "the situation is completely in hand" in connection with the Japanese landings on the Island of Luzon, of which Manila is the capital. With this is recorded the fine success of our bombers in three direct hits on a Jap battleship off Luzon and leaving it a blazing mass.

The battle of the Pacific at this moment pivots on the Japanese assaults against the two great allied -our own Philippines and Britain's Singapore.

Possession of these two powerful bases is essential to control of the

While the word from Manila is cheering, we shouldn't jump to con-clusions. The Japanese attack is continuing, with fighting forces ashore at various points, and a further landing of parachute troops at an airport near Illanga was reported this morning. We have to sail through a lot of dirty weather

The sensational success of the Japanese in the first round of this fresh conflict very naturally has distracted attention from the European war. Had the world taken trouble to glance at this theater it would have learned that the Russians have had further successes, both in the Leningrad and the Moscow sectors, and report inflicting bloody losses on the Germans.

Simultaneously the Nazis announce with apparent complacence that their advance forces have withdrawn to winter lines along the Russian front. The military spokesman in Berlin said the German push eastward was finished until spring. That is cheerful news for the allies, for it will give the Bolshevists a chance to recuperate from the effect of their fierce struggle thus far.

London, however, isn't entirely happy over reports from Moscow, and it may seem a curious circumstance that this is due to the fact that the Bolshevists claim to have gained air superiority over the invaders. To Britain that means Hitler has withdrawn many war-planes from Russia for use elsewhere. In other words, the fuehrer scheme to employ against the al-lies.

What are we to expect? There are several possibilities. Among these, and of peculiar interest to the United States, is the possibil-ity that the Germans may be preparing to intensify their attack on Atlantic shipping and may carry their attack into American waters. There always is the possibility also that they may attempt air raids against the Atlantic coast for the psychological effect.

AP All-America Team To Be **Announced In News Friday**

NEW YORK, Dec. 11 (A)—The
17th annual AP All-America football selections, successor to the AllOklahoma Negroes Americas picked by the late Walter Camp from 1899 to 1924, will be an-Camp from 1899 to 1924, will be an income of the News next Friday In 'Illran Bowl'

Following the death of Camp whose selections has been carried on AP news wires, the first AP All-America was chosen in 1925—on the basis of country-wide expert opinion-by Alan Gould, then general sports editor and now executive assistant in charge of personnel. Gould and his assistants were the first to recognize talent in the Rocky mountain area when, in 1928, they put Dutch Clark of Colorado on the AP All-America. Clark later became one of professional football's greatest stars.

Gould continued to pick the AP All-Americas through 1937, when he was succeeded by Herb Parker, president general sports editor. The ntricate task of selecting this year's AP All-America started last October. Throughout the season, Barker received weekly game-by-game re-ports from AP football writers across the country and kept the data in a card-index file. These rewere comprehensive—caliber of the players' opposition, their versatility, skill, power, speed, durability and spirit-and they were based on the AP writers' personal observations, plus information volunteered by coaches, scouts, players and sports writers on the 1,400 AP and tied one.

The Grim Task That Has Been Given Us

The first shattering explosions of bombs in Hawaii did one good thing for the American people, even while they took terrible toll.

They woke us up. They dispelled the mist of

confusion in which we have been wandering. It wasn't even a shock when Germany and Italy

declared war on us this morning. No longer can the question "Do you think we ought to have a war?" bemuse us. We have a war,

and it is not of our own making. We have a war, forced on us, catching us unawares simply because we had not yet brought ourselves to understand the complete duplicity, the shameless double-dealing ,and the venomous deceit that lay behind all Japan's dealings. We were innocent, Like Hamlet, we could scarcely believe that one could

"smile and smile, and be a villain." Now we know. In the blood of our men, women and children, in the whirlpools above ships sunk without warning, the lesson is written:

Japan has proved itself faithless, despicable, and unworthy of civilized relationship with a civilized people. The sword Japan has forced from our reluctant scabbard must not be sheathed until the Axis nations as a power in world affairs do not exist. That does not mean a war of extermination against the people of those countries. It means the destruction of her navy and air force, together with the means of building another. To this task Japan has herself assigned us. Nothing less offers the slightest hope of peace when this war shall have been concluded.

Let us not deceive ourselves. War with the Axis will be no basket picnic. They are good fighters; they are ruthless, unscrupulous, and actuated by religious zealotry and desperation. The Japanese have all geography on their side. They are able in war.

The news from the Pacific and Atlantic will be worse before it is better. We must be prepared for bad news, for losses of ships and men. The naval disaster with which the war was launched is good proof of the fatuousness of the thoughtless chestbeating that has gone on in the highest quarters about our naval irresistibility.

We cannot fail to win in the long run, though the run may be longer than we see at this moment. Anything less than a complete, crushing and final victory over Japan, Germany and Italy means the end of the United States as a great nation. Our standing before the world, and especially our status as the principal protector of the western hemisphere, demand complete and final victory-nothing less. We are going to see this thing through to the bitter end, knowing full well that the cost will be heavy, the burden great, and the losses grievous.

With deceit, low craftiness, and contempt the Japanese have thrown the gauntlet in our faces. We pick it up; we draw the sword; we shall not sheathe it until the world power of Japan is broken, finally

CHRISTIAN INTERPRETATION OF CONTEMPORARY HISTORY

The gist of the criticism of the churches in J. Middleton Murry's book, "The Betrayal of Christ by the Churches", is that they do not lead the people by interpreting the results of certain collective actions. Mr. Murry contends that churches simply generalize against sin or wickedness, but do not point out specific instances of collective errors. I will give a few quotations from his book

"I must conclude one of two things: either that the church sees nothing untoward in the behavior of nations today, and is persuaded that the service it does its Lord is sufficient already; or that the Church does not really possess the authority it claims to possess."

"How can it possibly be that the Church lacks courage? Who else would lack courage, if he knew he possessed the titles manifold to authority which the Church claims to possess? If the very God is with me, why should I be afraid? * * *

"It is rarely, if ever at all, that I am even faintly tinged with the courage of the Christian hope. Yet the gleams of it which visit me are that by which I live. Without them my life would have been a different and a much more cowardly thing." * * *

"For any effort towards a true Christian perfection of the individual must involve an awareness of his situation in society, and his position in history." * * *

"The Christian effort to educate his countrymen into a Christian conception of their own immediate history is the highest form of patriotism." * * *

"The tragedy is that the Christian Church today pretends to believe in something in which it palpably does not believe, and lacks the courage to discover the real foundations of its belief (if such foundations there are) and to build upon these. Men cannot, and will not, trust the Christian Church." * * *

"It would be a disaster for mankind if ever there were established a new universal Christian Church of which the Head was believed to have in his keeping the keys of a Heaven and Hell in whose reality men believed. With such absolute authority no man is, or ever will be, fit to be trusted." * * *

"It follows that the power of Christ in a Christian Church is its power to suffer martyrdom, not to inflict it. Yet the power which the Christian Church has mainly prized is the power to inflict martrydom, not to suffer it." * *

"Men must love Christ freely, or they do not love Him at all. However pitiful may have been the abuse of their new freedom by mankind, however appalling its final manifestation in the brutalities of totalitarianism and the horrors of fratricidal war, still we must-if only to avoid an absolute pessimism,-believe that this monstrous aberration of emancipated man is a frenzy of madness out of which a chastened remnant will one day emerge clothed and in its right mind, with a new power of Christian love. The true Church of Christ-that is, the Church whose spiritual foundation is the crucified Christ-must always possess the power to rise from her own ashes. For her the moment of absolute defeat is the moment of absolute reb. th." * * *

East Texans Act To Guard Oil Fields

Vigilant East Texans pressed a campaign Thursday to guard their fabulously-rich oil reserves—the stuff that armies move on—as airtight Texas went on the alert. Gladewater citizens at a mass meeting Wednesday night request-ed Governor Stevenson to designate the oil belt a defense area. A company of East Texas defense guardsmen was organized and a program drafted to fight oil fires and guard vital spots in the in-

dustry's setup.

Plans went forward for a proposed blackout of the East Texas field—one of the most highly productive in the world—as a defense measure. The blackout would cover Kilgore, Gladewater, Longview, Court Upholds Texas Henderson and some 26,000 wells.

In Dallas a police guard patrolled buildings occupied by national de-fense schools after Police Chief J. M. Welch said he had received a tip that aliens planned to dynamite the buildings.

"The tip was no phony—it was the straight goods," Welch said. The Dallas city council appropriated \$5,000 for civilian defense and Mayor Woodall Rodgers said an air-raid siren would be installed in the near future atop Hotel Adolphus. Local officials estimated 3,eventually needed in the Dallas

Anti-Strike Law

Court of Criminal Appeals today
