## It's Clear (When This Is Written); But Just Look What Has Happened!

Now that Northeast Panhandlers look at clear skies almost unbelieving, it would be a dirty trick to toss around a few precipitation figures.

According to U.S. Weather Bureau records, now in the hands of Radio Station KPDN, the normal annual rainfall for Pampa and vicinity is 19.97 inches. So far in 1949, there has been a total of 14.13 inches of rain.

The normal annual rainfall from January through June is 10:62-so this year we are 3.51 inches ahead. That 14.13 inches of rain has caused a lot of trouble to farmers, especially since it was spaced in dribbles, over a period of days and days.

In January, 1948, it rained only .21 of an inch; this year in January it rained 1.54. February, 1948, 1.30; this February, only .78. March, 1948, .66; March, this year, 1.78. April, 1948, 1.81; April, 1949, 1.09. May, 1948, 1.46; this year, 6.03. Total rainfall in June, 1948, was 3.34; while up until today we have received 2.91 this month.
