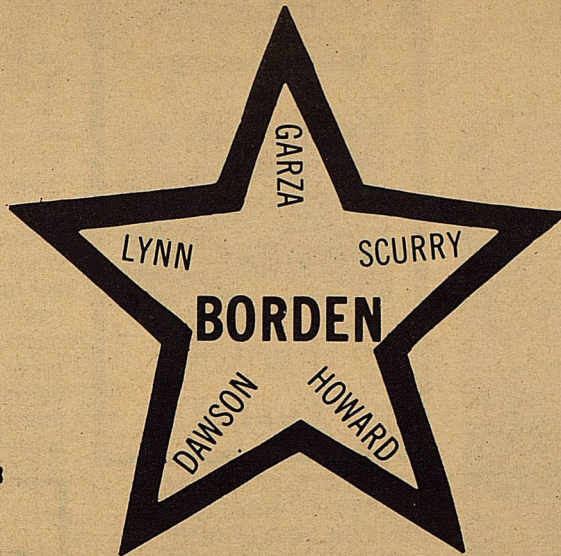

The Groom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. S.C. (Buddy) Sharp of Gail.

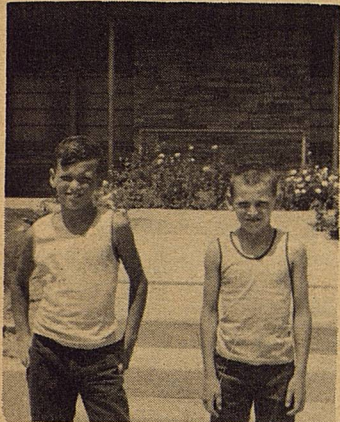

SAN ANTONIO—About 500 of the state's premier junior horsemen will be competing in the 10th annual State 4-H Horse Show July 19-22 in the Joe Freeman Coliseum in San Antonio, announce B.F. Yeates and Dr. Gary Potter, horse specialists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. The 4-H boys and girls will be representing the 13 Extension Service districts. Included will be the top 20 individuals in each district who will compete in the regular events as well as other 4-H'ers who will compete in open invitational events. To be eligible, a 4-H member must be enrolled in a horse project. There are presently about 14,000 boys and girls in Texas enrolled in the 4-H horse program.

Open events will feature cutting horse and drill team competition English competition, which includes English pleasure, working hunter, hunter hack and open jumper, and two roping events, times breakaway roping and calf roping.

Regular show events include halter classes, showmanship,

western pleasure, reining, pole bending and barrel racing according to the Texas A & M University specialists.

The state show will get underway Wednesday afternoon July 19, with preliminaries in cutting, calf roping and breakaway roping. The schedule for the following day includes the second go-round of cutting drill team competition, and preliminaries in the four English events. Finals in English competition and in calf roping, breakaway roping and cutting will be run Thursday evening.

Regular show events begin Friday morning with halter classes. Finals in the four performance classes will be run Saturday evening at 7:30. An awards program will follow.

Judges for the event will be Jack Kyle of Santa Rosa, New Mexico, Suzanne Jones of Tatum, New Mexico, and Lee Elbel of New Braunfels.

A special feature of the show will be a barbecue and awards program Friday evening at 5:30, note Yeates and Potter.

Sponsors of this year's state show in addition to the Extension Service, include the Farm and Ranch Committee of the San Antonio Chamber of Commerce the San Antonio Livestock Show, and the Freeman Livestock Foundation.

COLLEGE STATION— Hot, dry summer weather can be a big pain in the face for cattle. The reason is "pinkeye." "Pinkeye is an infectious eye

disease of cattle of all ages and breeds," says Dr. James Armstrong, veterinarian with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "However, younger animals under two years of age appear to be more susceptible than older ones."

The eye inflammation occurs most often in summer and fall and is generally more prevalent in white-faced animals. Dry, dusty conditions, bright sunlight, feeding in tall grass and the presence of flies all tend to aggravate the condition.

"The disease is caused primarily by a bacteria," according to the Texas A&M University specialist. "The eyelids swell and a watery discharge increases and thickens. The white of the eye becomes inflamed and a white or gray spot appears near the center of the eye. This spot swells and later opens to form an ulcer."

According to Armstrong, affected animals are sensitive to light and generally stand in shade. They lose weight quickly suffer production decreases and

may injure themselves because of temporary blindness.

Although the disease generally runs its course in two to four weeks without much damage, secondary bacteria often invades and can cause permanent blindness. Therefore treatment is important as soon as a case of pinkeye is suspected.

"Isolate the affected animals as soon as possible and protect them from wind, dust and sunlight," advises the veterinarian. Bathe the eye with a lukewarm mild borax solution and dust with an antibiotic powder at least twice a day. This prevents a secondary infection and allows the eye to recover without complications. Although no specific drug is available to treat pinkeye, injections of Vitamin A and a cortisone product have helped in some cases."

Armstrong advises cattlemen to isolate for at least 60 days all new animals brought into the herd. Cattle that have recovered from the disease may still be capable of spreading it for some months.

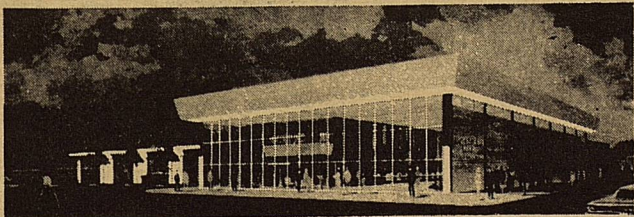
