An election for a director to serve in Zone Four (4) on the Upper Colorado Soil and Water Conservation District Board is scheduled for Tuesday evening October 4, in the District Courtroom, Borden County Courthouse, Gail, Texas, announced W. State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the subdivision where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 21 years

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 21 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the

district.
Zone Four (4) of the Upper Colorado Soil and Water Conservation District includes all of Borden County north of U.S. Highway 180. Burl Belew of Fluvanna, currently represents Zone Four (4) on the Districts board and he is eligible for re-

They are wondering, too, why our governor hasn't been speaking out forcefully for a farm policy that would help our beleagured farms and ranches.
