

I have a book, "Religion and Crime," by Frank Swancara, LL. B. published by the Kansas atheist, E. Halderman - Julius, which pretends to show by facts. figures and logic that not only religion in general, but 'Christianity in particular produces crime, has anti - social re-

Of course I'm not an LL.B and some readers of this column would likely give me a D.D.T. degree (or what was it Truman called Drew Pearson?) but J. Edgar Hoover of the F.B.I. is an LL.B. It happens that I've been reading some of Hoover's magazine articles calling on American parents to please instruct their children in Christianity and send them to Sunday Schools and keep them off the streets and away from bad associates as the surest way to combat juvenile delinquency and crime. That raises the question in my mind of just who is the best authority on crimea professor who sometimes writes about it, obviously from a prejudiced viewpoint, and published by an atheist publisher, or a man who has devoted his entire life to the specialized study of crime and its causes and who at present heads the largest, most efficient crime detection and investigation organization in the world, the Federal Bureau of Investigation. I stand ready to prove by many Scriptures that Jesus and His Apostles taught morality and the exact opposite of the things Swancara and others lay at their door by saying

In pointing to all the cranks, head-feelers, and murderers who said some "voice" prompted them, etc. Swancara and his ilk never have and never will be able to build up a case against Christ and the teachings of Christ, Christianity. A patch test for allergy is made merely by applying a patch made of a sort of fabric soaked with a particular protein substance and placing it on the normal skin. No skin is re-moved. If the normal skin shows slight irritation, then the test is called positive for that particular substance. Patch tests, therefore are not painful.

Q-My son has been bothere with hives after each meal. Is that something to worry about? A. L. T.

A.—This sounds suspiciously like an allergy to some food which the youngster eats at each meal. What this food might be, can only be discovered by making allergy tests.




