Heavily-Armed Reds Push South

HST Charges Rail Strike Order Unfair

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman declared today the nationwide railroad strike was called within an hour after assurances to him that there would be no strike. He made it plain to a news conference that he felt he had not been dealt with fairly. As to what he intends to do, he said he would have a statement later. He refused to indicate whether he plans seizure. The unions have been urging this step for weeks. Mr. Truman said the strike was sudden and unexpected. He said assurance came to him from both the unions and the management that there would be no walkout. These assurances, he said, were given within an hour before the strike was called by the trainmen and conductors. They set the walkout for 6 a. m. (local standard time) next Monday. A reporter asked Mr. Truman who gave him the assurance there would be no strike. The railroad unions and the railroad managers both, the president said emphatically. He said they had given him that assurance frequently within the last two or three days, and within an hour before the strike was called. A reporter asked if he considered the tactic a "double cross." Mr. Truman told the reporter not to put words in his mouth. A union spokesman had this comment on President Truman's news conference remarks: "We would ask that it be noted the strike had been set far enough in advance to provide opportunity to clear this thing up, if the president cares to call in the presidents of these roads in place of the management committee, which has been stalling all these months. 'Secondly, if the president decides he will seize the railroads, the two presidents of the unions are remaining in Washington to cooperate in any way possible. Two big rail unions, the Brotherhood of Railroad Trainmen and the International Brotherhood of Railway Employees, are remaining in Washington to cooperate in any way possible. Candidates Go Into High Gear Funds Are Okayed For Widening of 70

(By The Associated Press) Candidates for Saturday's runoff election were busy today plugging and hammering out statements and speeches to climax their campaigns. Pierce Brooks of Dallas, candidate for lieutenant governor, plans radio broadcasts tonight and tomorrow night. Meade F. Griffin, candidate for court of criminal appeals, plans a broadcast tonight. John C. White, candidate for commissioner of agriculture, plans to visit the Galveston-Duckinson area and tomorrow go to Conroe, Huntsville, Buffalo, Fairfield and Corsicana. Ben Ramsey of San Augustine, Brooks' opponent, made his only radio speech last night and emphasized his legislative and governmental experience. He said that Brooks has "not told the people of one single qualification that makes him a suitable candidate for lieutenant governor." Brooks, in his radio talk last night, repeated the charge that state money was spent by legislators supporting his opponent. Earlier, four state senators denied Brooks' charge. Senators O. L. Lock of Lufkin and Jimmy Phillips of Angleton issued state spots in Austin. Sen. Crawford Martin at Hillsboro said letters he mailed urging Ramsey's candidacy "were prepared for mailing at my expense; lettershead were printed at my expense, and postage paid by me." Sen. Rogers of Edinburg issued in the denial, saying it was "utterly ridiculous and typical of Brooks' tactics." Brooks called the letter case "just another example of waste and extravagance that the people of this state are entitled to know about." (See CANDIDATES, Page 2)

The State Highway Commission Wednesday allocated an additional \$50,000 for widening proposed paving along State Highway 70 from Alcock to 21st streets in Pampa. Original plans called for a 22-foot paved strip through the city, but the municipal government several months ago applied to the Highway Commission for a full 60-foot street. The stretch, one and one-half miles long, was originally set up at an estimated cost of \$108,000. The additional appropriation yesterday brought the overall total to \$158,000 for the project. No bids have been let by the commission, and won't be until all of the right-of-way easements are cleared up. Recently the city okayed plans for the stretch as drawn by Resident Engineer G. K. Reading and this week signed a maintenance contract with the State Highway Department for maintenance of the stretch through the city limits when the job is completed.

Three Republicans, Two Dems Named As U. N. Delegates WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman today announced the United Nations delegation made up of three Republicans and two Democrats. The lineup: Republicans—Former Senator Warren Austin, Senator Lodge (Mass.) and John Foster Dulles, GOP foreign policy statesman. Democrats—Senator Sparkman (Ala.) and Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt. The delegation will serve at the general assembly session this fall. Mr. Truman made his announcement at a news conference. He said the two senators were picked after a consultation with the Senate foreign relations committee. Secretary of State Acheson probably will lead the delegation for the opening of the assembly session, with one of the committee's members serving as an alternate. Other alternate members are expected to include John Hays, aide to Austin; John Sherman Cooper, Republican aide to Acheson; Benjamin O. Davis, now on the delegation; and Mrs. Edith Sampson, Chicago Negro leader. There have been some reports that Senator Graham (D-N.C.) would be in the recent North Carolina primary, might also be chosen as an alternate. The president's anticipated move to give the Republican members roles at the next U. N. session was regarded as some indication of an administration answer to recent criticism that the GOP has not been consulted fully on foreign policy. Lodge was a signer of a recent statement by GOP members of the foreign relations committee which accused the administration of virtually inviting the Communist attack on Korea. His choice as a delegate, however, appeared to be based on a new plan to put two members of Congress from opposing parties on the U. N. delegation each year with the House and Senate alternating. Candidates for Tuesday's runoff election passed over Senator H. Alexander Smith (R-N.D.) first was offered the post on a seniority basis, but begged off. Senators Wiley (R-Miss.) and Holloman (D-Iowa) both have refused similar offers and aren't eligible. Senator Vandenberg (R-Mich.) is also ineligible.

Action on Tidelands In 1951 Expected

WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Gossett (D-Tex.), a House leader in the fight for state ownership of the lands beneath the coastal seas, said today he will press for legislative action on the matter early next year. There obviously is little or no chance now that anything will be done this year, he told a reporter. "Therefore, soon after the new session starts next year, I will urge immediate consideration of a state ownership bill in the House. I think we can pass it given a presidential veto, if necessary." Gossett is a member of the House judiciary committee. This group several months ago approved a bill to give the state control over the so-called tidelands. He said this legislation should be given prompt approval by the committee again early next year without holding a hearing. If it comes from a hardware store, we have it, Lewis Hdw.

Division Moves Toward U.S. Positions on South Coast

TOKYO, Friday (AP)—A heavily armed Red Korean division rolled eastward Thursday night toward American positions on the Korean south coast. In three columns of men and machines the division moved up a new threat to the all-important Allied southeastern port of Pusan some 50 miles away.

Military Fund Bill to House

WASHINGTON (AP)—A \$16,771,084.479 bill providing cash for 5,333 new war planes and other equipment for America's growing military machine was approved today by the House Appropriations Committee. An emergency measure growing out of the war in Korea, it not only finances expansion of United States armed might but also carries \$1,000,000,000 to help arm friendly nations. In sending the bill to the House floor, the committee wrote this sharp criticism of the defense program: "Events of recent weeks have made it crystal clear that the military planning and thinking in key positions is not as clear and as realistic as could be desired, but it is not the purpose of the committee at this time to criticize past errors of judgment."

Drill Pierces Child's Body

DANBURY, Conn. (AP)—The life of little Joey Korczynski, whose father yesterday admitted boring two holes in his chest with a drill press, hung in the balance today at Danbury Hospital. Surgeons said the 3-16th-inch hole-and-a-half year old boy's heart, and his condition was listed as "extremely critical."

Boy Loses Leg In Gun Accident

Lloyd Cook, 15, of Skellytown, is in Worley Hospital following a shooting accident, which resulted in the amputation of his leg just above the knee. Lloyd Cook reported that the shotgun was leaning against the inside of the car door and when he opened the door the gun fell out and discharged. The charge shattered the bone in such a way that amputation was necessary. It was reported that the shotgun was in good condition and is doing very well. The accident happened late Tuesday.

Two City Blocks Okayed for Mail

Two additional city blocks have been approved for mail delivery, according to W. B. Weathered, postmaster. The 100 block on S. Nelson and 1100 block on N. Somerville have been approved for daily delivery by government carriers. Weathered said residents of those two blocks should see to it that they have house numbers and approved mail boxes installed immediately. The approved boxes may be bought at any hardware store in Pampa. Blocks are approved for city delivery only after at least 50 percent of the block is improved.

U. S. Commissioner Named for Austria

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman today named Walter J. Donnelly as minister and high commissioner for Austria. Donnelly is now ambassador to Venezuela. Mr. Truman's announcement of Donnelly's new assignment was made at a news conference attended by a group of Austrian newspapermen, whom the president welcomed to Washington.

Estimates of New Tax Bill 'Take' Lower

WASHINGTON (AP)—Estimated collections under the new tax bill were revised downward today as the measure was called up for Senate debate. The finance committee told the Senate the measure would yield about \$1,508,000,000 annually instead of \$3,900,000,000. The committee listed revenue increases under the bill as follows: From individuals \$2,745,000,000, From corporations \$1,500,000,000. From charitable trusts, family foundations, educational institutions, etc. \$60,000,000. From closing of "loopholes" in present tax laws, \$88,000,000. From life insurance companies, \$50,000,000. From new excises on television sets and deep freezers and an increase in the excise on slot machines, \$35,000,000. The big question in the Senate was whether a corporation excise profit tax should be added to the bill. Chairman George (D-Ga.) of the finance committee was battling against that. He declared the bill will pass without an excess profits levy "for there will be no bill at all."

Acheson, Johnson Ouster Demanded By Walter Rogers

Secretary of State Dean Acheson and Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson "should voluntarily resign immediately for the good of the country or be relieved of their posts," a congressional candidate Walter Rogers told a radio audience at 10:15 p. m. Wednesday. In the same address he also called, again, for the expulsion of Russia from the United Nations, declaring her unfit to "sit among nations attempting to establish world peace." Turning his sights on the two cabinet members, Acheson and Johnson, Rogers charged them with "grievous errors in judgment," and pointed to the breakdown of the East policies fostered by Acheson and Johnson's "scuttling" of the nation's largest aircraft carrier under construction. He said, too, if "these men are not big enough to resign, they are not big enough to hold their present jobs, and should be relieved of their duties." In his blast at communism in the United States, Rogers called for the breaking up of every Communist front organization and expulsion from the country of its members. Earlier, Lewis Foxhall, H. I. County veteran and farmer, won on an Amarrillo radio station, a his own expense, and declared the federal job held by Mrs. Allavene Clark is "an example of how to ruin a job." He declared her job as executive officer of the House agriculture committee, was "one of the best examples of useless federal jobs I can think of." "She has been away from her job for about six months and I find that no one has taken her place. This \$10,000 a year job has been vacant since she left," he added. He said further, "during her absence Congress has been in continuous session, with the committee meeting and conducting business without her help and apparently without missing her." Fabulous Oil Empire Only Part of Phillips' Wide Interests; Founder Started as Barber

BARTLESVILLE, Okla. — (AP) — Frank Phillips' career was as fabulous as the industry in which he attained prominence and great wealth.

He was successful in two other businesses before he was 30 years old and then founded the oil company that was to become one of the industry's largest independents.

First as a barber, then as a Lord salesman, he demonstrated a business ability which made him well-to-do before he ever came to oil-rich Oklahoma.

Phillips, son of Louis and Lucinda Phillips, was the first white child born in Greeley County, Nebraska. His birthplace on Nov. 28, 1873, was a log cabin on the sparsely settled frontier.

A grasshopper scourge in 1873 drove his family to Iowa, where they settled on a farm near Creston, Phillips, at the age of 10, earned his first money digging potatoes for a neighbor. After finishing country school at 14 he launched his business career.

Phillips often told how his admiration for the town barber's stepped-up success attracted him to the trade. He apprenticed himself, became a journeyman barber and wandered all over the west. He returned to Creston and bought a shop.

"I was the best damned barber in Iowa," was his frequent boast in later years.

Before he was 21 he owned all the barber shops in Creston.

"I became a monopolist," was his way of telling it.

His barbering enterprise attracted the attention of the town's leading lawyer, who had become his father-in-law and needed a bond salesman.

Phillips had another boast: "I was a damned good salesman, too!"

Seemingly it was justified, for in his next seven years he acquired enough capital to finance his first Bartlesville venture in banking and oil when he arrived in the boom year of 1904.

With his younger brother, L. E. Phillips, he organized a bank and drilled his first well, a feather. Their banking and oil activities flourished and a third brother, Waite, joined the combination.

In 1915, however, the brothers disposed of most of their oil holdings and turned strictly to banking. Waite Phillips went into business for himself.

Then came the United States' entry into World War I and mechanized war equipment sent the price of oil soaring.

Frank and L. E. Phillips found the expanding oil business becoming more and more a part of their banking, and on July 1, 1917, they organized the Phillips Petroleum Co.

In the years that followed the company grew from 27 employees and assets of \$3,000,000 into a \$225,000,000 concern with more than 12,000 persons on its payroll.

For the first 21 years Frank Phillips was the company's president. After he was succeeded in 1938 by K. S. Adams, he served as chairman of the board. He retired in 1949 with the title of honorary chairman of the board.

But before he relinquished his management, he was the force behind his company's growth from one which produced only crude oil into an organization that deals in every phase of the petroleum business.

Phillips was the eldest of five brothers, three of whom became oil millionaires.

He never realized the size of his personal fortune, simply say-and it's not exceedingly large," and it's not exceedingly large."

Newspaper estimates a few years ago, however, placed it at around \$40,000,000.

Phillips made his personal interest those of his company. In 1927 he was the financial backer of Col. Arthur C. Goebel, who made the first non-stop airplane flight from California to Hawaii.

He also sponsored the late Wiley Post in the latter's pioneering test flights into the stratosphere. Both ventures paid him handsomely in the development and marketing of his widely-advertised "Phillips 66" motor fuel.

His 66th birthday on Nov. 28, 1939, was the occasion of a gigantic Bartlesville celebration in which company employees, townspeople, the oil industry and the

state of Oklahoma paid tribute to the man they knew affectionately as "Uncle Frank."

Beside the oil that made him rich and affluent, Phillips had two other interests into which he put millions of dollars.

He preached that America's youth was a sound investment, and he gave heavily to the Boy Scouts of America, the Girl Scouts and other youth organizations.

"Money's no good unless you have character and stability with it," he once remarked. "An idle boy is a sad thing. It might lead to bad association. The Boy Scouts give fine leadership to boys when they need it."

Much of Phillips' philanthropy was funneled through the Frank Phillips Foundation, Inc.

He also gave generously to churches of all denominations. A few years ago he quietly called in several Bartlesville pastors, asked them the amounts of their church debts and wrote out a check for full payment.

His other pride was "Woolaroc," a lodge set among thousands of acres in the Osage Hills outside Bartlesville and which he converted into a modern museum housing Indian and

early-day cattle country relics of the Southwest. It contains one of the nation's largest collections of animals from all parts of the world.

Phillips' industrial connections, his honorary appointments and memberships and degrees fill three legal-size typewritten sheets of paper.

Among them were membership in Oklahoma's Hall of Fame, the French government's decoration of Chevalier of the Legion of Honor and many tributes from the Boy Scouts.

He was the only white man ever made a chief of the Osage Indians, on whose lands he drilled many oil wells and to whom the company paid more than \$112,000,000 in rentals, lease bonuses and royalties.

They gave him the name "Wah - Shah - She - Hluah-Ki-He-Kah" or "Eagle Chief."

Phillips was married Feb. 18, 1897, to Jane Gibson, daughter of an Iowa banker. She died in 1948.

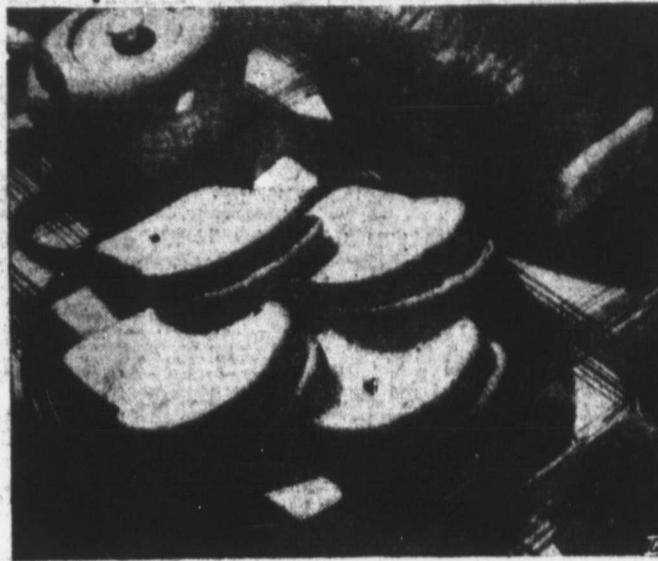

Delight to all who enjoy good food is the appearance of freshly baked homemade bread, with butter or margarine and preserves to spread on it.

Though busy homemakers like to depend on the baker for their daily supply of enriched bread, there is nothing quite like the wonderful aroma of homemade bread baking in the kitchen and family enjoyment of this special treat.

Thick slices of fresh home baked bread may be cut for snacks, to be spread with butter or margarine and topped with a bit of brown sugar or jelly; thinner slices for sandwiches to go into the lunchbox, others to be dipped in egg-and-milk and fried a golden brown for breakfast French toast.

However you like it, enriched bread from home kitchen or bakery fits well into any normal diet and provides excellent nourishment. In the well-planned reduced diet, too, enriched bread is included at each meal for its food energy, proteins, and B-vitamins.

If you like a deep-browed loaf of bread, brush melted butter or margarine over the top of the loaf after it has been shaped and placed in bread pan to rise. Bake in moderately hot oven for lightness and even grain.

ENRICHED BREAD

1 package yeast, compressed or dry
1 1/2 cups lukewarm water
2 cups milk
2 tablespoons sugar
2 teaspoons salt
1 tablespoon shortening
6 cups sifted enriched flour (about 12)

Soften yeast in lukewarm water. Scald milk. Add sugar, salt and shortening. Cool to lukewarm, (80 to 85° F.) When cooled, add 2 cups flour, stirring well. Add softened yeast. Add enough more flour to make a moderately stiff dough. Turn out on lightly floured board and knead until smooth and satiny (5 to 8 minutes). Shape into ball and place in lightly greased bowl. Grease surface of dough lightly. Cover and let rise in warm place (80 to 85° F.) until doubled (about 1 1/2 hours). Punch down. Let rise again until doubled (about 45 minutes). If preferred, shape dough into loaves after first rising. Divide dough into 2 equal portions. Shape each portion into smooth ball. Let rest 10 minutes. Shape into loaves. Place in greased bread pans. Let rise until doubled (about 1 hour). Bake in moderately hot oven (400° F.) 50 minutes. Makes two 1-pound loaves.

Scurry County Sheriff Also Serves as Janitor for Jail

Scurry County Sheriff Lloyd Merritt is also janitor at the county jail in Snyder.

He sweeps the steps and corridors of the three-floor structure, since no official funds are provided for janitor work. Prisoners are expected to clean their own quarters.

But the sheriff's wife has a bigger job than her husband. She cooks for the prisoners, and takes care of her four children besides keeping everything spic and span in the family's apartment on the first floor of the building.

The old jail was built in 1913 to accommodate 20 prisoners but as many as 80 have been confined at one time. A feature of the jail is equipment for hangings, including a trap door. The Snyder Daily News said it found no proof that the lethal equipment was ever used.

Sheriff Merritt, a tall fellow, 47 years old, is serving his third term. Before he was elected in 1948, he had been a farmer, truck driver, miner and railroad worker. He was born in a log cabin at Mansfield, Tarrant County, but has called Snyder County home for 44 years.

He seldom carries a gun. "I treat all prisoners humanely but with a stern hand and very seldom do I have any trouble," he said.

"During my terms as sheriff, there have been several escapes but all except one of the es-

caped prisoners have been recaptured.

"About midnight a few months ago, I heard a knock on the county jail door and went to investigate. There at the door, pleading to get in, was a man who had escaped and wanted to surrender and finish his sentence.

"Since I have been in office, I have had no gun battles, no serious trouble and have never been shot at."

New Lamp Detects Poor Dishwashing

PASADENA, Calif. — (AP) — Greasy spoon restaurants and hen-pecked husbands may soon be at the mercy of a new type lamp.

The lamp is using "black light" mercury — can detect sloppily dishwashing.

GI's Seek to Capture Hill On 'Hellish Day for War'

KOREA — The sun shone with blazing heat that scorched up the earth and parched the months of rain, rolled slowly up a hillside with gurgles and moans.

It was a hellish day for war. The physical effort of digging guns and ammunition up steep hills was enough, but there was a heavy mortar fire and bursting mortars and that molten sun hanging above. Sweat dripped from the brows of men on arms and soaked into fatigue garb. The heat was a living thing that embraced with another fierceness. It drove men from falling in a daze and pushed forward God only knows as much the enemy as the Communists in the battle of another ridge top.

Some managed to hobble down alone, but most of them were being helped down with their torn legs and twisted arms and blood stained faces.

The medics did what they could in the aid station. They bandaged wounds, eased the suffering with drugs and poured plasma into the veins of those whose own blood had gushed onto the battlefield.

And then the wounded were carried back down the dusty road they had walked over a few hours before.

That night I sat in a darkened hospital train which would take them to a bigger and better hospital in another part of this tortured land.

The passenger seats had been ripped out of the little coaches and racks had been built to hold the stretchers. The ambulances rolled up alongside the train and the wounded were lifted out and carried gently into the cars.

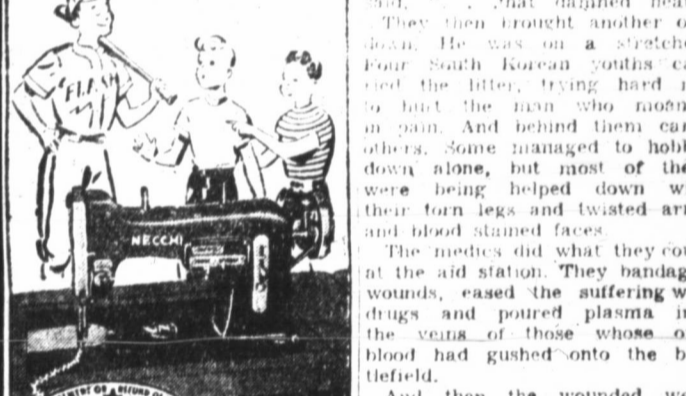

They wince the walking wounded with bandaged heads and arms and legs. There were no more stretchers so they filed into a bare railroad car and eased themselves onto the hard floor. "I'm sorry," the soldier said, "we're out of blankets. I'm sorry."

The wounded man said, "That's all right, Mac. Don't worry about me."

10,000 U.S., British Troops In Trieste Await Red Move

By JAMES M. LONG
TRIESTE — Ten thousand British and American troops are ready here if communism's next armed blow falls on neighboring Yugoslavia.

Guarding this allied guarded free territory on the Yugoslav-Hungarian border, they are "combat ready" in training and equipment. But they sit on a spot too tight to hold — backed by nations probably still too weak to help.

Their chief bulwark is the opinion — held by American military observers here and in Rome — that the Yugoslav army would be a tough nut for other Communist states to crack.

Probably no one outside the Kremlin knows of such an invasion blow is scheduled for Yugoslavia. It is the base from which that help would have to come.

Stalin Communist state. But if such a Red move should come, most observers think the Anglo-American forces here would be reinforced quickly and ordered into the fight. U. S. action in Korea is an example.

Well-qualified opinion here holds that Tito's troops are equal to or better than anything that any one of two of the surrounding Soviet satellite powers could muster for an attack.

But hit by them all — Hungary, Romania, Bulgaria, Albania — and by strong Soviet support, Yugoslavia would need help.

This thin strip of Allied-guarded free territory is five miles deep and 20 miles long, centered on the port and naval basin of Trieste.

The British-American zones are stretched along the coastal flatland, virtually untenable against attack from the 1,000-foot-high inland plain which looks down from within close artillery range.

The American force is limited by the peace treaty to 5,000 men and thus cannot now be reinforced. The British element of the Trieste force is also 5,000 strong and limited to that figure.

The U. S. troops are members of the 351st Infantry Regiment with supporting auxiliary units. Their officers say 30 percent of the men are combat veterans.

Their commander is Maj. Gen. William M. Hoge, Gen. George Patton's old Fourth Armored Division commander, who led his troops in the Battle of the Bulge, across the Rhine and finally into Czechoslovakia.

Attempt to Revive Fish by Artificial Respiration Fails

PHILADELPHIA — (AP) — Most of us have heard fish stories, figments of the imagination of our friends, but young Bob Volk is telling the granddaddy of them all today — and it's true.

The 24-year-old Volk fought for three hours yesterday to save the life of a giant sun fish. He put on swimming trunks, climbed into a five-foot deep tank and applied artificial respiration in a vain effort to save the fish.

Volk, who works at the Publicker Alcohol Co., is a nature lover and a constant visitor to the Philadelphia aquarium where he picks up information on raising fish.

Off duty yesterday he joined some commercial fishermen at Seaside Park, N. J., 67 miles from Philadelphia, and helped them haul in the 600-pound, five-foot sun fish in their nets.

Volk immediately volunteered to drive the fish to the Philadelphia Aquarium to give him to his friend, Harry R. Lindaman, the aquarium superintendent.

He placed the fish in a tank-trailer attached to his car and hurried to Philadelphia. The fish displaced so much water in the tank that from time to time Volk stopped to add more water to the tank.

On his arrival, the giant fish looked none too healthy. Lindaman had him placed in an empty tank, nine by eighteen feet, and the fish quickly sank to the bottom.

At Lindaman's suggestion, Volk jumped into the tank to "walk" the fish. To walk a fish, one places it straight and gently moves it back and forth.

That didn't help much, so Lindaman suggested artificial respiration. Volk had never heard of applying it to fish, but he was game and went to work.

With Lindaman giving instructions, Volk applied pressure behind the fish's gills, which, like humans, enables a fish to breathe. For two hours and 20 minutes Volk worked patiently. The six foot one inch Volk stood in water up to his shoulders, pushing his hands forward and backward.

Some 600 persons gathered to watch the rescue effort.

At last, Lindaman said it appeared the fish would not revive. So Volk climbed out.

But he wasn't finished yet. Volk told Lindaman he wanted to try some more. He climbed back in the tank and applied artificial respiration for 20 minutes more.

Then, exhausted and disheartened, Volk climbed out of the tank. The fish was dead.

Lindaman said the fish apparently had not been injured but had suffered from lack of deep sea water on his trip here.

"He was an aquatic animal, and he was out of his element," Lindaman said. He explained that the fish, known as a sea cow hereabouts, normally makes his home on the ocean floor and probably was swept toward shore by the recent Atlantic hurricane.

Association Assails Chicago Film Ban

CHICAGO — (AP) — The police ban on the showing of a movie, "No Way Out," in Chicago has been protested by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and six other organizations.

The ban against showing the Twentieth Century-Fox film here was recommended by Capt. Harry Fulmer, in charge of the police censor division.

Fulmer said he told Police Commissioner John Frendergast the film was "something that might cause more racial unrest than we have now." He said his office "held up the permit" on the film, which portrays alleged prejudices met by a Negro doctor in practicing his profession.

"We already have a (racial) without adding to it," Fulmer said.

Texas' death toll from traffic accidents rose to 1,257 for the first seven months of the year. There were 1,024 deaths in that period last year.

No Enlisting After Notice for Physical Armed Forces Rules

AUSTIN — 24 — If you have any idea of enlisting in the regular armed forces, better not do until you're notified by mail of a draft physical examination.

State selectees in military headquarters said it will be too late then.

Director Brig. Gen. Paul I. Wakefield reported that a physical examination would not interfere with a conscription notice or registration card issued by the National Guard if they are accurate.

"But he cannot enlist for a four or five day period in the Air Force or other branches of the military until he has received a notice to report for physical examination," Wakefield said.

Earlier this week the state adjutant general advised and conscription notices not to permit the National Guard to become an "escape hatch" for conscription. Conscription notices were sent into a guard appointment area status before admitting him to make sure he was the top person the guard wanted.

U. S. Troops to Eat Mexican Meat, Gravy

WASHINGTON — 24 — American troops in Korea soon will be eating Mexican ground beef and gravy, the Army has announced.

No Production Cut At Present In Nylon Hose

By SAM DAWSON
NEW YORK (AP) — Nylon stockings continue to pour out in a steady stream from the mills. They report no production cut-back in sight, although a sudden pick-up in military demand can change that.

And panic buying at the stores appears ended. It was sparked by women who regarded the nylon shortage in the last war as the symbol of civilian deprivation. Mere men remember when "a pair of nylons" was the gift supreme in almost any part of the world.

Mills expect to get as much nylon yarn in September as they got in August, which is around 10 percent less than in July. Du Pont held back that amount to fill government orders — mostly for parachutes, and therefore mostly in the 70-denier size used in nylon apparel fabrics but no in stockings.

But some hosiery mills report their stocks of yarn are low. And others fear that by October the government might require more nylon or ask Du Pont to start stockpiling it for future needs.

Meanwhile, Du Pont, the nylon producer, announces the eighth major expansion of its nylon facilities since the last war. Its plant at Martinsville, Va., will be expanded by more than 100,000 square feet of floor space, bringing it to almost 500,000 square feet.

In spite of expansion at this and other Du Pont plants, the demand for more and more products made of nylon has continued to outstrip production facilities.

Gallantry in Action Wins Silver Star For 6 U.S. Heroes

WITH U.S. FORCES IN KOREA — Five Silver Stars and an oak leaf cluster to a Silver Star have been awarded to American soldiers for gallantry in action, division headquarters announced.

A seventh man has been recommended for an oak leaf cluster to a Silver Star awarded him earlier in the Korean fighting.

The Silver Star award to Capt. Charles V. H. Harvey of the first cavalry division was made posthumously. His citation said that he led a reconnaissance mission through Chirya, throwing grenades as he moved through town. He put a mortar in position and directed its fire on the enemy's position until struck.

His widow, Eleanor, lives at Texarkana, Texas.

PFC Marvin Koppelman of Brooklyn has been recommended by Lt. Col. Charles Stratton of Lawton, Okla., for his second decoration of the war — an oak leaf cluster to a Silver Star.

His latest bravery under fire occurred on August 6 when his battery was overrun by Communists. He took a 3.5 rocket launcher and held off the enemy until the rest of the unit could pull out. Knocked down by mortar concussion, Koppelman recovered, disected surrounded men to an ambulance and then drove them safely through machinegun fire.

Koppelman was first decorated for knocking out two enemy road blocks which permitted his unit to withdraw from Taejon.

Some Candidates Lagging In Filing Expense Reports

AUSTIN — (AP) — Some candidates are lagging in reporting primary campaign expenses, Secretary of State John Ben Shepherd says.

As of this week, five expense accounts are due from the 30 candidates in Saturday's run-off primary. Only half have fully complied, the secretary of state's report showed.

Under the law, candidates in each of the races at issue in the run-off are limited to a total expenditure of \$2,500 in both the first and second primaries. The reports received to date cover both campaigns.

J. E. McDonald, candidate for re-election as commissioner of agriculture who has said he is too busy in his office to campaign, has submitted no expense account, the secretary of state reported.

McDonald's opponent, John C. White, has made five reports accounting for a total of \$1,452.59.

These are the secretary of state's figures on the other candidates:

Lieutenant governor — Pierce Brooks (three reports) \$1,600; Ben Ramsey (five reports) \$2,160.07.

Train Engine Blast Kills 2

BATAVIA, Ohio — (AP) — Two men died, windows in nearby homes were shattered and railroad tracks were ripped up by the explosion of a Norfolk and Western Railroad freight locomotive near here last night.

The blast occurred about a mile east of Williamsburg in the eastern part of Clermont County.

Dead are Carl D. Clark of Portsmouth, O., the engineer of the train, and R. D. Aldred, also of Portsmouth, the fireman. Their mangled bodies were blown several hundred feet.

It took approximately an hour for rescuers to find the bodies.

Paul Keyes of South Shore, Ky., the brakeman, was blown from a cupola atop the coal tender but escaped with only a sprained ankle. He said the cupola door suddenly flew open and that "Boy, it got hot in there."

Three cars of the train were derailed. They were loaded with hogs. Several of the hogs were killed.

The explosion occurred as the freight train was heading into a siding to allow a passenger train to pass. Traffic on the line was blocked as the blast ripped up rails and dug a huge hole in the ground.

Dispute Cites 'Wheat Loans' Maturity Date

WAS-INGTON — (AP) — The Agriculture Department disagreed yesterday with Rep. Hope (R-Kan.) that farmers would benefit if the April 30 maturity date for wheat loans were advanced or if different dates were set for different areas to ease the harvest-time boxcar shortage.

Hope told a reporter he felt the question of advancing the loan maturity date would be "a good subject for consideration by the National Association of Wheat Growers."

He recently wrote Commodity Credit Corporation officials that Kansas and other states suffer from box car shortages and lack of sufficient storage space at harvest time.

The difficulty is caused in part by the April 30 maturity date which he said does not enable the CCC to move its wheat from farms and local storage in time to make transportation room for the new crop.

The Kansan said he did not see how a box-car shortage could be avoided unless CCC-owned wheat is moved before the new crop starts moving.

Frank Woolley, deputy CCC administrator, replied that in view of diminishing exports and crowded warehouses, an earlier maturity date would have been of little benefit this year.

An earlier date would be of advantage in administration, he said, but it would lessen the benefits of the loan program to growers.

During the last several years there has been a general rise in wheat prices during the month of April, he said. To eliminate that month from the support period, he wrote, would materially weaken the program.

Under the program, wheat growers may redeem their wheat from the government if they think it will draw a better price on the open market than the loan price.

Suggestions for staggered maturity dates have come from railroads and the grain trade, Woolley said.

"Economic recovery there was far better than our wildest dreams," the ECA chief reported yesterday. "Politically great strides were being made along democratic lines. Familiar Communist tactics, such as false propaganda, failed completely.

This, in my opinion, is why North Korea moved across the 38th parallel."

Hoffman, completely recovered from an operation, leaves for Washington tomorrow.

Troops Sent Over; Navy Given Away

This country needs government controls, all right, but it's controls OVER government not BY government. What they're doing to us in Washington may not be a smidgen in comparison to what they will be doing before this rattle-brained Washington bunch gets thru, but even what they're doing now is ruinous.

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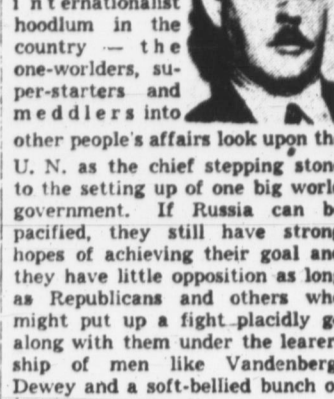

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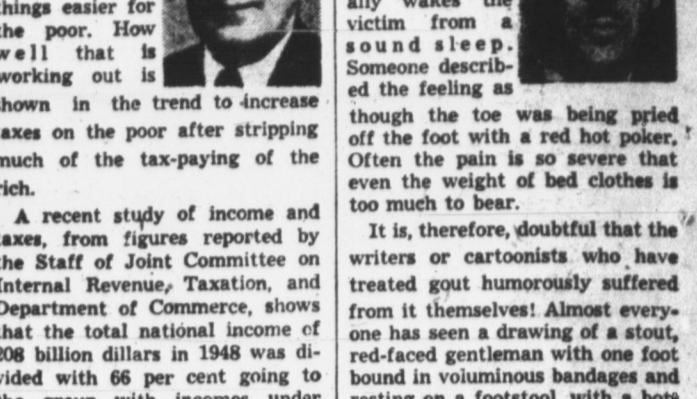

our own boys. This is what long range planes mean. On the evidence from Korea, Mr. Cannon could not have been wider of the mark. No atomic bombs have been dropped. The long range planes haven't stopped the enemy from continuing a sustained offensive. Soldiers from other nations aren't doing the fighting. This job has been reserved strictly for American troops, some of whom had to be rushed clear across the Pacific from the United States.

Yet it would be dangerous to think that the Korean experience dictates a complete re-casting of all theories of mechanized, modern, robot, Buck Rogers type war in favor of a return to the concepts of World War II. ... war II, drive men mad before killing them.

All of these, and perhaps other methods of warfare still more terrible, are available. The fact that they are not employed in Korea does not signify that they do not exist or that they won't work. The Korean terrain, the conditions of that conflict, the haste with which our troops were committed to action, the utter lack of planning for any Korean campaign, and the feeling that Korea, after all, was only a sideshow not calling for an uninhibited use of force—all of these factors probably precluded the use of our mass killing instruments.

The campaign in Korea is hard, dirty, discouraging work. Yet, as once used to be said of the Civil war, Korea may go down in the history books as the last of the "romantic" wars. When and if the main event materializes, no holds will be barred and nothing will be kept under wraps. If there are any glimmerings of sense left in humanity, including Russian humanity, that slaughter will be averted.

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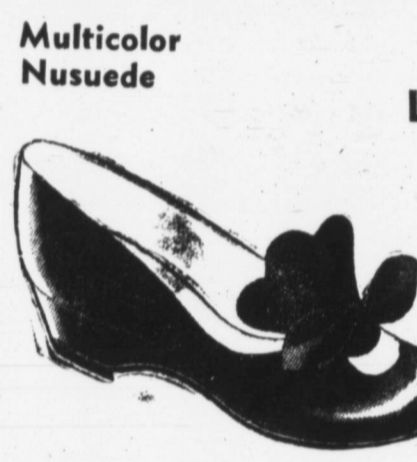
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
