WASHINGTON - (A) - President Truman declared today the nationwide railroad strike was called within an hour after assmances to him that there would be no strike.

He made it plain to a news conference that he felt he had not been dealt with fairly.

As to what he intends to do, he said he would have a statement later. He refused to indicate whether he plans seizure The unions have been urging this step for weeks.

Mr. Truman said the strike was sudden and unexpected. He said assurance came to him from both the unions and the management that there would be no walkout. These assurances, he said, were given within an hour before the strike was called by the trainmen and conductors. They set the walkout for 6


Though busy homemakers like to depend on the baker for their daily supply of enriched bread, there is nothing quite like the won-derful aroma of homemade bread baking in the kitchen and family enjoyment of this special treat. Thick slices of fresh home baked bread may be cut for snacks.

to be spread with butter or margarine and topped with a bit of brown sugar or jelly; thinner slices for sandwiches to go into the lunchbox, others to be dipped in egg-and-milk and fried a golden brown for breakfast French toast.

However you like it, enriched bread from home kitchen or bakery fits well into any normal diet and provides excellent nourishment. In well-planned reducing diet, too, enriched bread is included at each meal for its food energy, proteins, and B-vitamins.

If you like a deep-browned loaf of bread, brush maked butter or margarine over the top of the loaf after it has been shaped and placed in bread pan to rise. Bake in moderately hot oven for lightness and even grain.

Soften yeast in lukewarm water. doubled (about 1-2 hours). Punch Scald milk. Add sugar, salt and shortening. Cool to lukewarm, (80 down. Let rise again until doubled (about 45 minutes). If preferred, shape dough into loaves after first rising. Divide dough into 2 equal portions. Shape each portion into smooth ball. Let rest 10 minutes. Shape into loaves. Place in greased bread pans. Let rise until doubled (about 1 hour). Bake in satiny (5 to 8 minutes). Shape into ball and place in lightly moderately hot oven (400° F.) 50 greased bowl. Grease surface of dough lightly. Cover and let rise minutes. Makes two 1-pound loaves

The American Way The Dector Says

NOW LET'S SOAK THE FOOR (By Dr. Alfred P. Haske)

A few years ago political leaders in power played on the old falsehood that the poor were get-

ting poorer and rich were the getting richer. So they proceeded to soak the rich with the idea of making things easier for poor. How the well that is working out is

shown in the trend to increase taxes on the poor after stripping much of the tax-paying of the

rich. A recent study of income and taxes, from figures reported by the Staff of Joint Committee on Internal Revenue, Taxation, and Department of Commerce, shows that the total national income of 208 billion dillars in 1948 was divided with 66 per cent going to the group with incomes under \$3,000 a year; 20.2 per cent going to those whose incomes were over \$3,000 and under \$5,000 a year; 4.7 per cent to those between \$5000 and \$10,000 a year; 4.6 per cent to those between \$10,-000 and \$25,000 a year, and only

\$25,000 a year. ly. Thus: those whose incomes were under \$3000 a year received

66 percent of the total income but paid only 29.1 per cent of the total income taxes; those with incomes between \$3000 and \$5000 a year received 20.2 per cent of the total income and paid 22.2 percent. of the taxes: those with incomes between \$5000 and \$10,000 a year received 4.7 per cent of the total

income and paid 8.1 per cent of

the income taxes; the incomes between \$10,000 and \$25,000 reeived 4.6 per cent of the total income and paid 13 per cent oft he total taxes; while all the incomes over \$25,000 received 4.5 per cent of the total income and paid 27.6 per cent of the total income taxes. From these facts it appears that the one group which pays a fair share of the total taxes, according to its income, is the group that received between \$3000 and \$5,-000 a year, with an income of 20.2 per cent of the total and

22.2 per cent of the total taxes. Those whose incomes are below this group receive 66 per cent of the income and pay only 29.1 per cent of the taxes, less than their share, while those above the group, with incomes over \$500 a year pay more than their share of taxes according to their small-

er share of the income. It is significant that eighty-six dollars and twenty cents out of every hundred dollars of income goes to those whose income is less than \$5000 a year, while those with incomes over \$5000 a year receive only thirteen dollars and eighty cents out of every hundred

There are few things more pain ful than an attack of acute gout, A typical bout starts in the middle of the night with severe pain at the base of one of the big toes. This pain is so sharp that it usually wakes the victim from a sound sleep. Someone described the feeling as

though the toe was being pried off the foot with a red hot poker, Often the pain is so severe that even the weight of bed clothes is too much to bear.

It is, therefore, doubtful that the writers or cartoonists who have treated gout humorously suffered from it themselves! Almost everyone has seen a drawing of a stout, red-faced gentleman with one foot bound in voluminous bandages and resting on a footstool, with a bots tle of wine at his side. This classic picture may seem humorous to the person who does not have s . but is by no means funny to the one who does.

Gout is almost always a disease of men. Frequently there is a family tendency to the disease. It is comparatively rare before early middle age. Over-indulgence in food and drink often brings on an attack. Those who are big meat eaters and heavy drinkers of wine, are especially likely to develop this strange disease. Attacks of gout tend to occur most frequently

in the spring and fall. There is a chronic form of the disorder usually called gouty arthritis. At this stage crystal-like substances called urates made of the products of these purines are deposited in and near the joints. This stage ordinarily is not reached until there have been many acute attacks over a period of years.


RIGHT DIET HELPS

Fortunately, acute gout can be greatly improved by proper supervision and improved diet and general living conditions. It is difficult for many persons with gout to refrain from some of the foods or liquors which they crave but which are most likely to produce attacks.

The ingredients of food which appear to cause most of the trouble are called purines. Some foods contain purines in large amounts, especially sweet breads, liver, kidney, squab and calf's tongue. Others, like veal, pork, beef, sausage, gravies and several kinds of fish, also have a higher purine content than is safe for most people with this disease.



We have been told that radioactive dust can be loosed in a lethal cloud to kill people who would be outwardly unharmed and would never know what got them. The nerve gases, "Tabun" and Sarin," developed but never used during

All of these, and perhaps other methods of warfare still more terrible, are available. The fact that they are not employed in Korea does not signify that they do not exist or that they won't work. The Korean terrain, the conditions of that conflict, the haste with which our "oops were committed to action, the utter lack of planning for any Korean campaign, and the feeling that Korea, after all, was only a sideshow not calling for an uninhibited use of force-all of these factors probably precluded the use of our mass killing instruments.

The campaign in Korea is hard, dirty, discouraging work. Yet, as once used to be said of the Civil war, Korea may go down in the

history books as the last of the "romantic" wars When and If the main event materializes, no holds will be barred and nothing will be kept under wraps. If there are any glimmerings of sense left in humanity, including Russian humanity, that slaughter will be



averted.
