

## **London Believes** Sevastopol Taken

an overwhelming vote of confidence from the house of commons today after he had gravely assessed the Allied position in the Mediterranean and Middle East war zones as a near-disaster with a hope of victory pinned on "very considerable" reinforcements now in progress.

The parliamentary victory came at the end of a speech one hour and 28 minutes long in which Churchill staunchly defended his direction of the war as the best

Churchill sketched a dark picture of the battle of Egypt. He said it had developed "a recession of our hopes and prospects in the Middle East and Mediterranean unequalled since the fall of France."

The 475 to 25 vote left 115 of the house's 615 mempers unaccounted for.

## **Huge Pool Of** Wheat Ready For Hungry

By WADE WERNER WASHINGTON, July 2. (AP)-Millions of hungry people in Axis-occupied countries today had another reason to hope for a United Nations victory.

It was the decision of the United States and four other countries to set aside an immense pool of wheat for the relief of war-stricken countries, to be rushed to them "so soon as the international situation permits."

That means so soon as available shipping no longer is monopolized for the transport of the tools of war, and ships can carry breadstuffs instead of bombs, wheat instead of weapons, across the seas. Establishment of a relief pool of not less than 100,000,000 bushels is only one of the features of the wheat agreement made public yesterday with the United States, Great Britain, Canada, Australia and Argentina as signatories. Other provisions relate to the control of wheat production, stocks and exports and the cooperation of all five countries in the stabilization of

What urgently matters to hungry millions, however, is the picture of plenty disclosed in the paragraphs of the pact and in the facts of the situation it is designed to meet.

The combined wheat surplus of the four exporting countries involved now aggregates nearly 1,500,-000,000 bushels. Defeat of the Axis commerce and put that wheat into circulation. The ultimate aim is restoration of the international wheat trade on a sound basis; but to make sure the hungry millions will get bread without delay as soon as the war is won the 100,000,000bushel relief pool is created.

tons, and they will be in operation in less than a year. Other oil companies are pursuing similar programs. On top of that, great progress is being made in the development of other kinds of synthetic rubbers, such as those which are produced from coal and coke.

American industry regards the rubber problem as a challenge. It is determined to produce a rubber substitute which, in time, will be as good and perhaps better than the natural product. It is determined to produce such a substitute in sufficient quantity to meet essential civilian no less than military needs. It is likely that some day we may regard the cause of it. equitable levels as a bar against inflation. It is a very different thing to establish arbitrary price standards which cut deeply into the modest earnings of basic industries.

Gasoline is an example of that. Due to the loss and transfer of tankers, it is necessary to ship gas overland at a far higher transportation cost. But the government has not permitted the oil companies to raise their retail gasoline prices to compensate for this. As a result, one major oil company reports that in April alone the additional expense totaled \$2,-300,000. All oil companies are in much the same position

Many similar examples can be found in the field of retail merchandising. Because the general pricefreezing order made no allowance for the wide "lag" that has existed between wholesale and retail prices, stores are legally bound to sell many items at little cause millions of dollars of productive labor to or no profit whatsoever-and to sell some items at a be lost by strikes. loss. ## **Woods Denies** Figures On **Illiteracy**

AUSTIN, July 2-Figures on illiteracy in Texas recently released by the Department of Commerce were branded by the head of the state's educational system today as "exaggerated and inaccurate."

Dr. L. A. Woods, state superintendent of public instruction, in an interview, asserted that statistics listing 18.8 per cent of Texans under the age of 25 with less than four years of schooling and 179,426 Texans in the same age bracket with no schooling at all "do not reflect the true condition of literacy of this state's population."

Pointing out that in the last 10 years the rating of Texas' education system changed from 37th to 15th in the nation, Woods declared that Texas stands ahead of any other state with the dual school sys-

Texas, he asserted, "has the best

The median school year completed gives a good indication of the standing of Texas' educational system, the state superintendent ex-

(The median year of school completed is that year which divides the population into two equal groupsone-half having had more formal education, the other half having

had less, than the median.) "Figures on median school years completed among persons 25 years old and over reveal Texas to be above the average for the nation as a whole, surpassing any other state in the South and equaling the average in the North." Woods stated.

"The figure for Texas is 8.5 years, New York 8.4. Pennsylvania 8.2, Wissin 8.3, Missouri 8.3, Delaware 8.5. Virginia 7.7."

The superintendent listed two difficulties in extending educational opportunities in Texas to individuals now classed in census reports as illiterate.

"We don't have enough money," he said, "to take care of Latin-Americans and negroes as well as we do Anglo-Americans. And in Texas there are vast distances of wild. open country where we don't have

Pointing to 1940 census reports of 328,000 persons in Texas of foreign parentage, and 683,000 Latin-Americans, Woods said that the "average of illiteracy shoots up in regions with Latin-Americans and negroes.'

Census reports do not correctly reflect the literacy level of foreign Woods maintained, explaining that Latin-Americans especially hesitate to give information to census officials.

"This probably explains the high illiteracy rate accorded to Texas and the recently published census reports," he said, "but I would emphasize that though Latin-American schooling in Texas is low, it is rapidly improving."

A plea for a safe and sane Fourth of July was issued jointly today by Police Chief Ray Dudley and Fire Chief Ben White who declared, "We should not forget that the glorious Fourth is the anniversary of American freedom-a freedom which is now in jeopardy.'

"This nation needs every man, woman and child at maximum physical strength. Unnecessary loss of life or time off work from careless accidents is a form of sabotage against our total war effort," they declared.

Use of firecrackers is prohibited. The two chiefs stressed the fact that hundreds of accidents occur each year among Fourth of July celebrants, including drownings, traffic casualties and fireworks. "Using caution in water sports and
