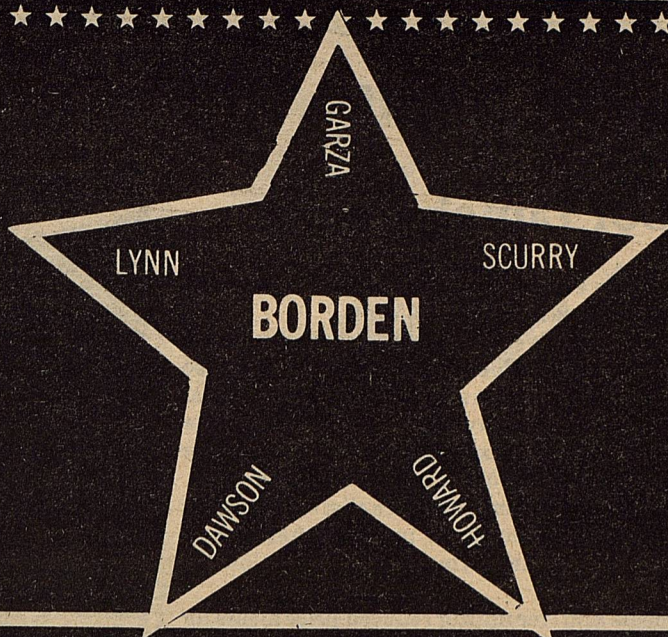

Borden County 4-H Horseshow

The 4-H County Horse Show got off to a slow start, but this didn't discourage any of the 28 contestants.

Ceremonies were kicked off, about 8:00 o'clock with Michael Murphy leading the pledge of allegiance and 4-H motto, the 4-H pledge was lead by Kristi Stone & Julie Ridenour. Gerry Smith then presented the 4-H prayer.

The show started with mares & geldings at halter. This year they were divided into 4 classes. Pee Wee Mares, Mares, Pee Wee Geldings & Geldings. The Pee Wee stands for the age of the child not the size of the horse. This was followed by Showmanship,

Western Pleasure, Reining, Barrels, Poles, Flags & four ropings.

Pee Wee Western Pleasure was something to see. It's amazing how 8 small children can get in one bunch in such a large arena.

But once they got things going their way they never slowed down. These eight plus 2 more made up the pee wee class for the night. Amyotropic lateral sclerosis (ALS), commonly known as "Lou Gehrig's Disease" is a progressive paralytic disease in which the motor nerve cells of the nervous system cease functioning and sometimes die, so that the muscles supplied by such nerve cells go out of control and become paralyzed. This is a very rare disease with the odds of contracting it being 440,000 to one, yet in our County, there are three families effected by this disease, the families of O. D. Jackson, Glenn Toombs and Roger Williams. These families whose loves ones, Jessie B.

Jackson, Glenn Toombs and Calvin Allen, brother of Comelle Williams, have contracted ALS, invite you to a benefit to raise money for ALSSOA (Amyotropic Lateral Sclerosis Society of America).

Back to School Safety

Why is there a need for Back To School Safety?

Every year the opening of school brings about a tragic rise in the number of accidents involving children. Studies indicate that traffic accidents are the leading cause of death in children under the age of fourteen years, with two out of three victims being boys.

Statistics on school related traffic accidents show that the greatest number occur 45 minutes before and within two hours after school closes for the day. School age children tend to be in traffic accidents on a week day, in an area without traffic controls, often in midblock (not at an intersection or a crosswalk) where a pedestrian was running or crossing from behind a parked car.

Darting out between cars causes a greater number of accidents in children under

the age of nine. Yet, older children often take more chances at signal lights and when driving bicycles. Older children also tend to take the shortest route to school rather than the safest route.

In short, children have difficulty discriminating the direction of sound or cannot always size up a traffic situation.

What can be done for Back To School Safety?

Parents must accept the responsibility of knowing and teaching proper safety behavior. Schools and media can provide tips to help parents help their children and to reinforce what children are taught.

Tips for Safe School Bus Riding

1. Leave home early enough to arrive at your bus stop on time.
2. Walk to your school bus stop by the safest route.

Borden County School News

Borden County School Lunch Policy

The Borden County School serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for 30 and 35 cents, breakfast for 25 cents, and extra milk for 5 cents.

Children from families whose income is at or below levels shown on the attached scale are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. If the children are eligible for free meals, they are also eligible for free extra milk. The reduced price for lunch is 10 cents and for breakfast 10 cents. If your income is greater than those shown, but you have unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of your income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses, your children may still be eligible.

The school children of parents or guardians who become unemployed are eligible for free or reduced-price meals and free milk during the period of unemployment, provided that the loss of income causes the family income during the period of unemployment to be at or below the levels shown on the scale.

To apply at any time during the year for free meals and free milk or reduced-price meals for your children, an application may be obtained at the school office. The information given on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility for free meals and milk or reduced-price meals. Within ten days of receiving your application, the school will let you know whether or not your children are eligible. If you do not agree with the school's decision you have a right to a fair hearing. This can be done by writing Mr. James McLeroy, Box 95, Gail, Texas 79738, or calling (915) 856-4262.

In certain cases, foster children are eligible for these benefits. If you have foster children living with you and wish to apply for such meals and milk for them, please notify us or indicate it on the application.

All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operating of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin.

If assistance is needed or your family size or income changes during the year, please contact the superintendent's office.



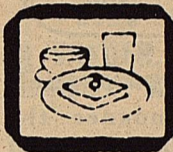

Student Registration



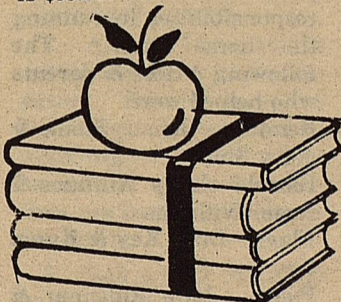
Students who will be attending Borden High School during the 1979-1980 school year will be registering August 31. The registration schedule is as follows:

to helping ALS patients better cope with the disease. ALSSOA is only about four years old, and is not a long established organization such as the Cancer Society or the Muscular Dystrophy Association or Multiple Sclerosis Society. ALSSOA funding has been coming exclusively from ALS patient family efforts.

New research grants totaling \$150,000 are to be considered on September 21 and the ALS Society needs to raise \$250,000 by September 15th from renewal donations from old members and form new members who want to be a part of this research effort.

In a little over 3 years, ALSSOA has spent or committed over \$1,200,000 for research. In addition, due to ALSSOA's stimulation, other organizations, including the federal government, have increased their thrust to over \$6,000,000 on ALS research.

ALSSOA funded research is ongoing at many University Medical Centers, Chicago; Hadasseh in Isreal; Northeastern Ohio;

Wisconsin; Wakayama, Japan; University of Southern California; Columbia; Pennsylvania; Conneticut; Baylor; John Hopkins; National Hospital, London, England

Ever growing number of great Medical scientists are becoming interested in ALS. New research opportunities are opening that should be funded.

Progress is being made. More is being learned about the basics of ALS. There are some clues that are being aggressively followed as to the cause.

The (ALSSOA leadership serves full-time, without compensation. ALSSOA's fund raising & administrative costs are among the lowest for any national, voluntary agency.

Leave Pressure Out of Sports

Too much pressure in sports can turn a child off-with both the sport and with his parents, says a family life education specialist.

Athletic events can play an important role in an adolescent's development and health, but parents should know both the positive and negative aspects of competitive sports, says Dorothy Taylor.

Miss Taylor is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A & M University System.

TAKE PRESSURE OFF

Since competition puts pressure on children, parents can help relieve it by making "fun" the primary goal in sporting events.

Parents also can "play up" other benefits - in addition to the glory of winning.

Other benefits include learning the rules and tools of the "game of life" - agility, skill development, cooperation, discipline and fair play.

Give these benefits plenty of attention, the specialist advises.

Also, consider different kinds of sports with your child - together you may discover some new ones that don't carry high pressures.

Instead of considering only competitive sports such as football, basketball and baseball, look into some non-competitive, less-pressured sports.

Non-competitive sports include jogging, swimming, cycling or hiking-all of which let children develop

their bodies, enjoy themselves and keep a sense of self-worth.

These may be especially attractive to children who aren't ready for-or interested in-organized sports.

In addition, resist the natural desire to live through your children, especially on the athletic field.

Remember that adults usually are the ones that give winning too much importance.

Highly organized leagues for young children are most often planned with adult seriousness, and they tend to take the fun and play out of the activity.

PARENTS' INTEREST-A KEY IN SPORTS

Parents' interest in their children's sports is vital - as it is in all aspects of child development, says a family life education specialist.

Interest means responding to your child's feelings - and sharing his wins and losses, explains Dorothy Taylor.

Miss Taylor is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A & M University System.

Interest also means being honest, and it means always avoiding "put downs."

Finally, interest means knowing six key facts about sports:

- (1) Know that pre-adolescents and immature boys and girls having growing bones cannot take hard blows, so injuries can occur frequently in contact sports.
- (2) Know that all

competitive sports pose threats of major injuries. To help cut down that threat, be sure all events are properly monitored, and make sure each child has protective equipment.

(3) Know that competitive spirit is very much a part of our national fabric - and in appropriate amounts, it promotes healthy growth and achievement.

(4) Know that losers realize quickly they have little support. Sympathize with the pain felt in defeat, and admit that winning would have been more fun. However, do not promote the "win-above-all" feeling - that only makes the pain of losing more severe.

(5) Know that children link performance with self-esteem, even when winning or losing has equal importance with other aspects of the game.

Because of that, don't laugh off poor performance when you child feels bad about it.

Let him talk about why the event and his part in it were so important.

Above all, don't put him down about his performance - you are attacking his self-esteem.

(6) Know that sports can contribute to the social, emotional and physical development of your child at a vulnerable period of his life - especially with your interest.

3. Enter the bus from a safe place - off of the roadway if possible.

4. Always listen to the school bus driver or the bus patrol. They do have the right to give instructions to passengers and if a passenger doesn't obey, they can be refused rides in the future.

5. Stay seated when the bus is in motion.

6. Enter the bus in single file; do not push or shove other passengers. Then, take a seat.

7. Keep your hands, arms, head, books, etc. inside the bus at all times.

8. Do not stand in the aisle or put books in the aisle without the bus driver's permission.

9. Remain quiet and courteous - it makes a nicer ride.

10. After leaving the bus, be very careful when crossing the street. May be your bus driver can tell you when it is clear to cross.

11. Walk home from the bus stop by the safest route.

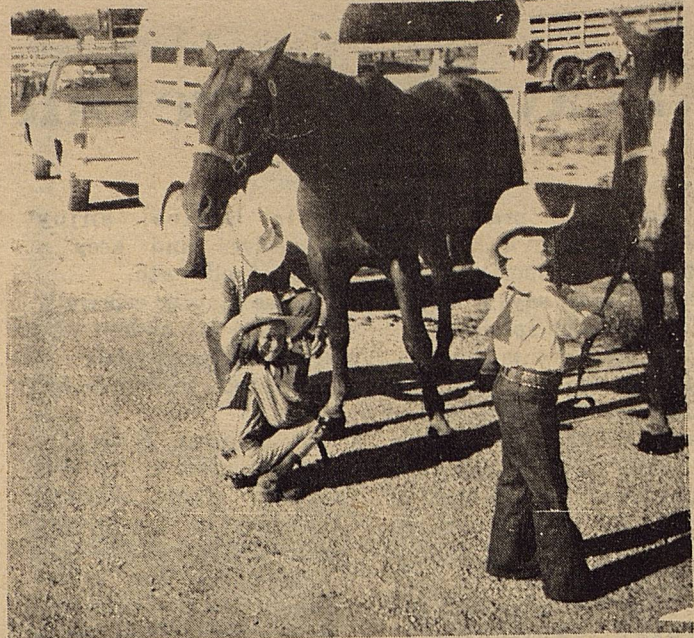

Your County Agent Says By Sam Field

Just because range forage has increased substantially due to spring and summer rains doesn't mean you can automatically adjust stocking rates upward.

Keeping stocking rates low now will pay off later. "This will allow range conditions to improve since animals repeatedly graze plants needing to improve in vigor and ground cover after drouths. Also, improved range conditions will provide partial insurance against the next drouth."

Late summer and fall is a good time to shape up herds and flocks due to the continued good livestock, wool and mohair prices. Additionally, with good management, more pounds of product can be marketed from fewer animals.

Consider deferred rotation grazing to insure continued range condition improvement and future increased livestock production. As range condition improves, desirable forage plants return through natural succession.

With this system, emphasized the agent, only one pasture of the 2, 3 or 4 in the system is deferred from grazing but the deferment

period is scheduled so a pasture is vacant at a different season each time it is deferred.

In addition to improved forage, livestock numbers increase, wildlife habitat improves, soil erosion decreases and rainfall use is more efficient.

Another approach is the on herd-multiple pasture system. Graze a pasture intensively for 7-14 days, then defer it for a long period depending on the number of pastures and length of grazing period.

More rapid range improvement is made and grazing animal numbers can be increased over the 2, 3 or 4 pasture deferred-rotation grazing.

For any system to work, balance the proper kinds of animals and their numbers with forage production, the agent advises. Also graze pastures at the proper season.

The system must be tailored to the individual ranch and fitted to the goals of the rancher.

Many ranchers have some type of grazing system but don't realize it. The system doesn't have to be formal or elaborate. The main point is that pastures have a resting period.

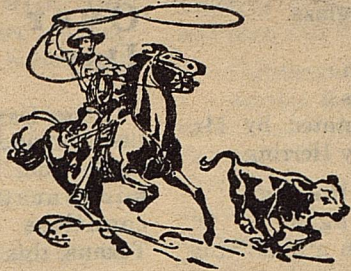

Cotton or grain sorghum destroyed by heavy rains, hail, grasshoppers, etc., need to be reported before *destroying the crop residue* and putting the acreage to another use. Measure the acreage and come by the office and file an ASCS-574, Request for Disaster Credit.

For disaster affected acreage carried on to harvest, the request for disaster credit must be filed within 15 days from the date harvest is complete.

SET-ASIDE ACRES

for producers participating in the 1979 Wheat and Grain Sorghum Programs, effective September 1, 1979, these acreages will be released. Please remember the acreage cannot be harvested by any means other than by grazing, after the September 1, deadline.

Conservation measures and control of weeds are still required on these acres.

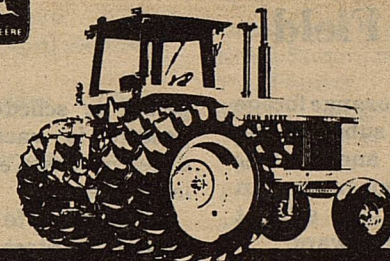
