Solon Offers Bonds to Pay For Overtime

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Senator Douglas (D-Ill.) suggested today that to combat inflation it might be wise to pay the nation's workers for overtime in government bonds instead of cash.

Douglas said there is no need to do that now, but that such a program probably would have "great advantages later on when the inflation pressures will be much heavier."

The Illinois senator told a reporter he has in mind the payment of overtime at the rate of time and a half in federal bonds which could not be cashed until the current emergency has passed.

"Taking that money out of circulation not only would greatly reduce the danger of inflation, but would provide workers with a comfortable financial cushion against possible unemployment after this crisis," Douglas said.

Douglas outlined his views in commenting on the stress placed upon saving by President Truman's council of economic advisers. In its report to the President over the week-end the council said:

"The central effort to increase saving (as an anti-inflation measure) will undoubtedly be through vigorous patriotic campaigns to buy government bonds. No method for increasing saving should be left unconsidered."

Douglas said his proposal is "as close to enforced saving as I care to go."

Senator Sparkman (D-Ala.) called the Douglas plan "a feasible idea" which should be studied. He suggested further that the government consider permitting interest to continue to build up on outstanding federal savings bonds after they reach their 10-year maturity.

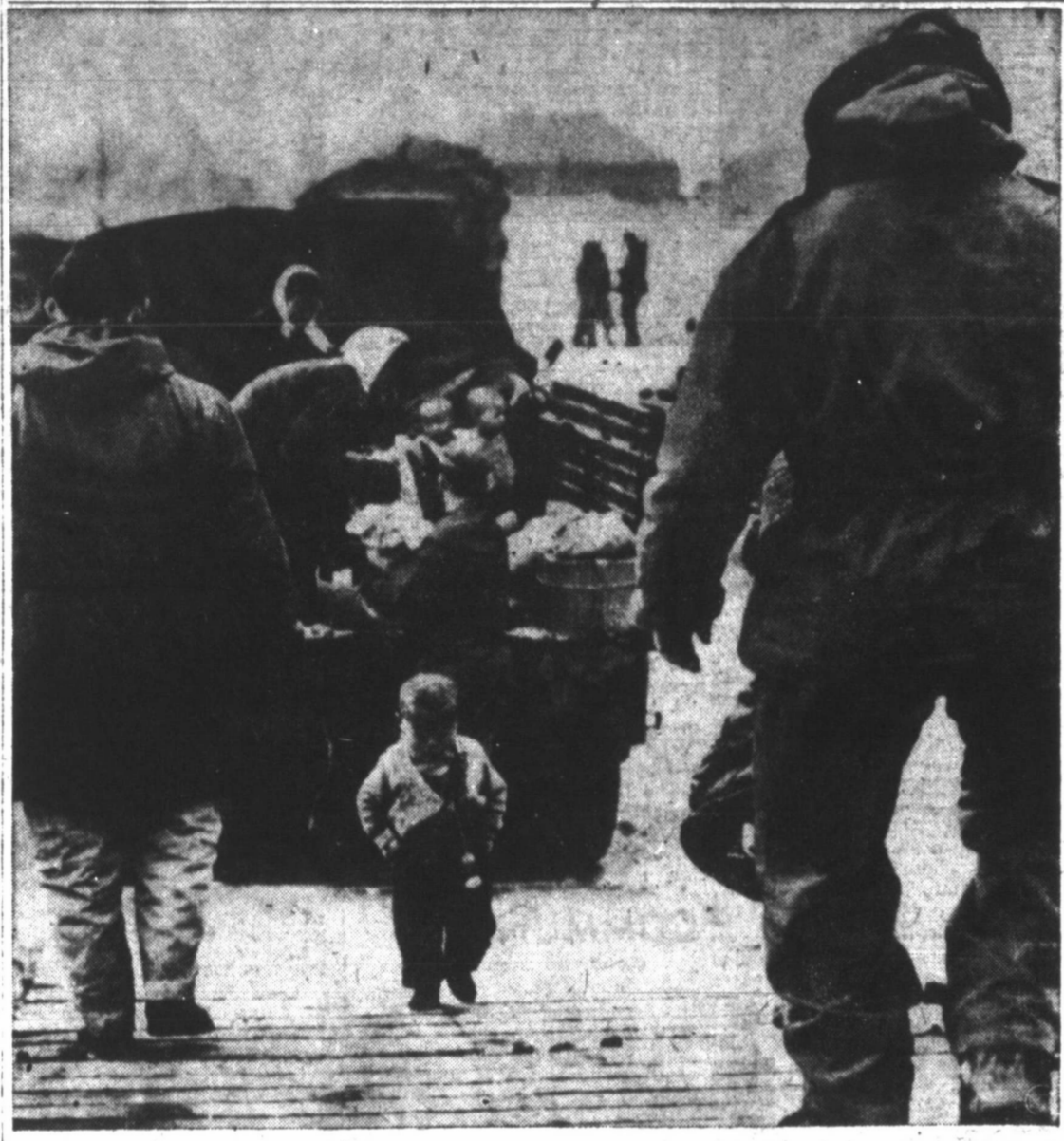
"Millions of dollars worth of those bonds are now being cashed and other millions of dollars worth will be maturing soon," Sparkman said. "If you sell them in many cases simply because they have matured and not particularly because they need the money."

"Why not keep that money out of circulation, and thereby help fight inflation by letting the interest continue to accumulate? It would be far less costly in the long run."

In the report, the economic council urged that the government give the people a definite indication of its intent to increase many years of "very high" spending for defense. It said dramatic defense goals could have a "galat" effect.

Communist Armies Carve Menacing Bulge in UN Line

Defenses Set Up For Next Assault

TOKYO — (AP) — Vanguard of six Chinese Communist armies carved out a menacing salient today in western Korea within 17 air miles of Seoul.

Outnumbered United Nations forces, after retreating up to 11 miles in zero weather, manned new defense lines and awaited the next onslaught. It was expected in a few days.

The deepest enemy penetration was pinpointed by General MacArthur's headquarters Tuesday as six miles south of Tongduchon. That forward position is 17 miles from the virtually deserted capital on a road leading north through Uijongbu.

The Reds were only five miles from Uijongbu, the key to Seoul.

MacArthur's headquarters quoted North Korea's dictator as boasting in a broadcast that his war efforts have "support and sympathy" of Red China, Russia, Hungary, Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Rumania and Poland.

MacArthur said Kim Il Sung's statement indicated clearly "the general character of this war."

The allied pullback in South Korea before at least 42 enemy divisions was so swift that contact was lost with the main Red forces. There was little ground fighting listed in field reports Tuesday.

Thousands of Communist dead littered the frozen and rugged battlefield.

MacArthur's headquarters called the New Year's assault an "about attack" "preluded by the enemy with complete disregard for his losses, which have been extremely heavy."

The first suicidal waves hurled themselves on land mines, exploding them. Then succeeding waves climbed over their bodies.

Other advances were formed human bridges over barbed wire entanglements.

Allied planes of all categories look heavy enemy toll. Ground observers estimated that 6,000 Red casualties were inflicted Monday by air action alone.

Pilots of one group of F-50 Shooting Star jets said they annihilated an entire company of Communists six miles east of Koroanpo. That is 28 miles north of Seoul.

Fliers of Navy Skyraider bombers from the U.S. Aircraft Carrier Valley Forge reported their deadly low level attacks forced Red troops to retreat from a ridge six miles south of Uijongbu. That is 50 miles north-east of Seoul.

The Communist wedge drive into the west flank was described in a field dispatch by A. P. Correspondent John Randolph as amounting to "a major pullback and a big sag in the defense line across South Korea."

MacArthur's headquarters said that, in addition to the thrust (See COMMUNIST, Page 2)

Snow Brings Hope For Break in Drouth

Ranchers and farmers watched hopefully this morning as snow began covering the entire Panhandle area.

A light rain during the night brought additional snow flurries, and hopes for suitable moisture rose 100 percent.

Reports indicated that the storm formed in the Colorado mountains, moving swiftly southward, through New Mexico and the Panhandle of Texas.

Bus drivers reported a about eight inches of snow at the northern tip of Texas.

Local precipitation exceeded .09 of an inch. A low of 28 degrees was recorded during the night in Pampa, with temperatures steadily falling. At present-time the temperature was 24 degrees.

Good highway conditions were reported however. The Texas Highway Patrol at Amarillo indicated good road conditions in all areas with the exception of Dalhart and Dumas. Officers stated snow was falling rapidly in that area, making travel somewhat hazardous.

Local officers indicated good road conditions in and around Pampa, but said increasing snow could make travel dangerous.

J. O. Dumas, assistant chief of the Pampa Police Dept., issued a note of caution, however, as snow piled up and ice formed on streets and sidewalks over town.

"This is the first appreciable moisture in the area since the first part of September, when 3.65 inches of rain was recorded in Pampa."

Transportation officials at bus and train terminals added that all schedules were being met.

County Given Tag Numbers

License tag assignments for Gray County arrived through the mails this week with notice that the plates should be delivered between Jan. 15 and Jan. 31.

Although the notice did not disclose what colors the plates would be, county tax officials estimated they would be the reverse of the current year—black numerals on a yellow field.

But Gray County moved deeper into the alphabet so far as passenger car plates are concerned. The series runs from AR 2500 to AR 9999; AS 10 to AS 2599 — a total of 10,000 plates. There will be 3,000 commercial license plates running from MC 1800 to MC 3799 and 900 farm vehicle licenses from RB 6250 to RB 7149.

The county tax office staff was still working on 1950's tax tabulations including the number of pay taxes and exemptions paid to the last day of the year. These were incomplete this morning but were expected to be ready in about two days.

New Chinese Attacks Spur U.S. Action Against Peiping

LAKE SUCCESS — (AP) — Spurred by new Chinese Communist attacks in Korea, the United States today pushed plans for United Nations action against the Red regime.

American diplomats conferred with their British and French allies, seeking to establish a joint policy. The U.S. was expected to make a minimum demand that the UN formally brand the Chinese Reds aggressors, thus opening the door for more stringent action.

U.S. Delegate Ernest A. Gross also consulted with India's Sir Benegal N. Rau and Egypt's Mahmoud Fawzi Bey over the weekend to inform them of the new U.S. view.

Rau and Fawzi Bey have been leading the Asian-Arab efforts to arrange a cease-fire either on a military basis or by tempting the Peiping Red regime with the offer of a political conference on Far Eastern problems.

An American spokesman said the U.S. did not want to appear to be closing the door on those peace feelers, but Gross had made it plain his country would go ahead with its demands for action against Peiping if the Chinese drive in Korea continues.

India has maintained that unless the Chinese troops are in full retreat across the 38th Parallel, Peiping could not legally be charged with aggression. The U.S. hopes the pressure of military events will now convince that country that UN cannot ignore the fact that the Chinese Communist troops are in full cry against the world organization's anti-aggression forces.

Labeling Peiping an aggressor would lay that overmen open to three forms of UN action. They are:

1. Diplomatic sanctions — UN members would be asked to withdraw recognition from Red China.
2. Economic sanctions — a blockade of Peiping — controlled territory.
3. Military sanctions — a UN-sponsored war against the guilty government.

A U.S. spokesman said this country has not yet decided which form of punishment to demand for Red China. Washington is anxious to sound out its allies before introducing any specific proposals.

The U.S., however, considers the matter urgent, the spokesman said, and will bring it before the next meeting of the 60-nation "political committee" unless the Red Chinese drive is halted.

The committee is scheduled to meet tomorrow or Thursday. It must first hear the report of its

cease-fire commission which was drafted by Rau, Assembly President Nasrallah-Entezam of Iran and Lester B. Pearson of Canada.

The report, still secret, is expected to tell the committee the three-man group failed in its efforts.

Further such attempts are regarded here as academic in view of the increased tempo of the Chinese military drive and the U.S.-led determination to oppose such attempts.

Except in agencies whose activities are readily adapted to machine methods, the committee said, "no one knows how many people are required to carry on particular program responsibilities."

It added that speaking unofficially "some of the key budget officers confide that they would welcome the opportunity to reduce the budget requirements within their own agencies," but instead "they are required to bolster the justification for increased appropriation requests."

"Unfortunately," it said, "this kind of frustration was observed in all of the agencies surveyed."

The committee found that with few exceptions the federal agencies are "overorganized," but noted that government officials "are becoming increasingly aware of the effects of obsolescent or faulty organization."

Solons Recommend Staffs Be Trimmed

WASHINGTON — (AP) — A congressional committee declared today that "in general, executive agencies of the government could do a better job with fewer employees."

That was one of the major findings of the House Postoffice and Civil Service Committee based on a study of federal agencies by a special subcommittee. It said also that many government officials have acknowledged that payrolls could easily be cut but that they are obliged to keep asking for large staffs.

There are not only too many federal employes, the committee said, but "the full capacity and myriad talents of the federal work force are not properly utilized." It also said "the cost consciousness which prevailed in the prewar period has not been restored."

The committee studies deal with 238,280 federal workers.

In many respects, the committee said, executive agencies have "not fully recovered from the ill effects of the World War II period," and "elaborate staff requirements still exist," with work habits being relaxed.

"Functional duties have not been altered in conformance with postwar conditions," the committee said. "Improved methods and labor saving techniques have not been placed in general practice. Reorganization to eliminate duplicate and overlapping activities has not been completed. Overhead administrative costs have increased sharply."

Bill to Prohibit 'Bandit' Shipping

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Truman today signed a bill prohibiting the shipment of slot machines and related gambling devices across state lines.

The new law, providing fines and jail terms for violations, is expected to put a severe crimp in the multi-billion dollar annual slot machine "take."

The law is an outgrowth of the attorney-general's conference on organized crime last February. Federal and local law enforcement authorities heard estimates that the slot machine racket was grossing \$2,000,000,000 a year.

UN Troops Eager to Remain as Orders Pull Them From Front

WITH UN FORCES NORTH OF SEOUL, Korea — (AP) — A young Army captain at a forward command post looked out across a frozen valley to the north and said:

"Wish we could have stayed up there. We would have killed us a lot of Chinese."

His face was dirty and unshaven. He was up most of the night as his regiment completed its pullback to a new defense position after the Red Chinese assault on the western Korean front yesterday.

"We were all set to give those Chinamen a lot of trouble if they had come our way," he said. "But we got orders to come back."

The regiment was way up front in a strategic position on the south bank of the Imjin River when the Chinese let go with their New Year's present.

"We didn't want to pull back," said the captain. "You should have heard some of our boys holler. They wanted to get at those Chinks. But it was best to pull back because if we had stayed the Chinks would have come around us and slipped behind us."

Weather Hits Mail Schedule

Airmail schedules during the day will be uncertain because of weather complications, according to W. B. Weathered, postmaster.

The postmaster indicated local airline officials were checking constantly with Amarillo as to conditions, but added that prompt service would be hard to obtain.

"If the weather doesn't let up soon, we plan on sending all airmail and air parcels to Amarillo by truck late this afternoon for transportation by major airlines," Weathered said.

Drop Is Shown For Accidents

Traffic accidents in Pampa were somewhat lower during 1950, according to John B. Wilkinson, chief of police.

Total number of reported wrecks during the calendar year, ending Dec. 31 were 248, indicating a drop of 18 wrecks under the 1949 tally, 267 wrecks.

Damage to automobiles totaled \$41,577.97, and total damages to other property amounted to \$208. The number of injured persons taken to hospitals in the city of Pampa totaled 25.

There were no traffic fatalities during the year 1950.

Rene Plevin Plans Visit to Washington

PARIS — (AP) — Parliamentary sources reported today that Premier Rene Plevin would visit Washington late this month.

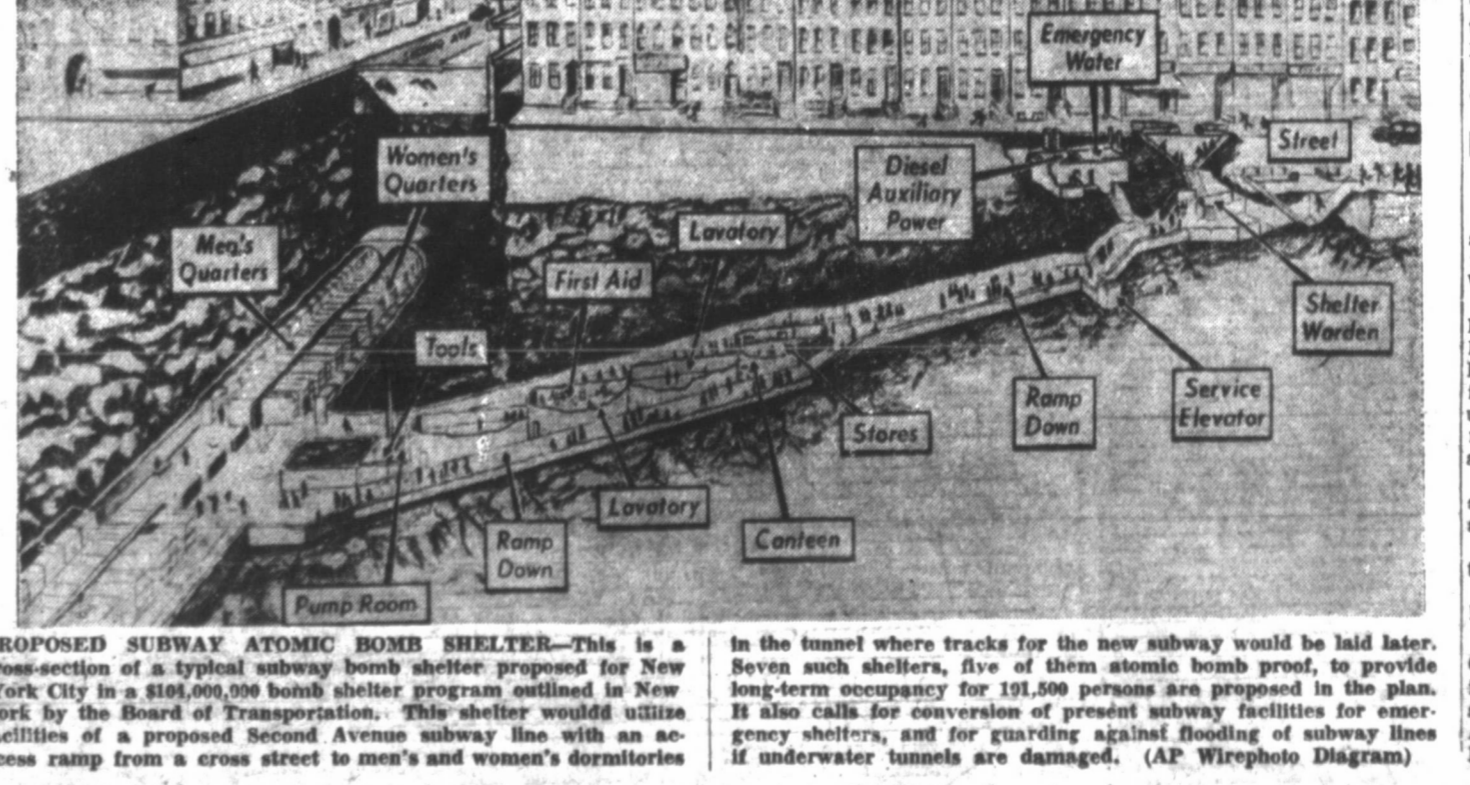
These informants said the French Premier would not leave Paris until the arrival of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, due here in the next few days to take up his post as supreme commander of the Atlantic powers' army in Europe.

Plevin's aides said two weeks ago he hoped to visit Washington after the first of the year.

There was no official comment today on his plans.

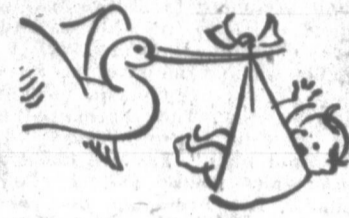

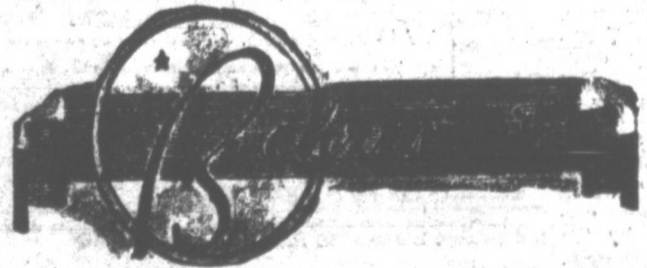

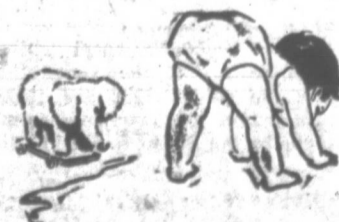

Notes During An Emergency

The New Deal's bundle of breads, schemes and bubbleheads is in the saddle at the time when the most expert and accomplished rider would have his hands full and his bottom-side bruised.

As is the custom, they're been realistic about their shortcomings and, in their boundless despair, they've turned to their erstwhile enemies to get them out of the bind.

But Verne A. Bellman, vice president of General Petroleum Corp., hasn't been taken by the expedient love - making of the administration. In an address in Pampa recently, Mr. Bellman said that oilmen are "temporary heroes" and he warned them not to forget that word "temporary."

On May 12, Mr. Bellman reminded his audience, the federal government filed anti-trust suits against seven major oil companies in the West. The suit charged them with being "monopolistic" and "conspirators" and "a lot of other anti-social things."

That's what Atty. Gen. J. Howard McGrath, an administration lackey, had to say. The assistant attorney general said that the defendants "have exercised such power to exclude substantial competition."

But, said Mr. Bellman, then came the Korean War. And guess what? Said the Secretary of the Interior Oscar Chapman:

"We have learned in gas and oil that the safest and best way to meet expanding demands is to increase supply, not ration a deficiency. This belief in the virtue of expanding production has always been a characteristic of the oil industry."

"Traditionally, oilmen fear they will not have enough. As a result, they do not hesitate to enlarge their productive capacity. The oil and gas fraternity has never been backward in its cooperation with government in developing new methods for finding additional supplies of oil and gas or devising new methods for producing additional quantities of petroleum products."

Fair Enough-Pegler

NEW YORK—Under our system of government, President Truman cannot be put out of office until the election of 1952, except by impeachment, which is neither feasible nor desirable. However, it is possible and certainly desirable that the President clear out of the government and sincerely repudiate those whose faith in him he should get rid of.

Ordinarily, it would be impudence on the part of a president to ask the Justice Department to get out. But this is not an ordinary situation. Frankfurter has been a pushful, bumptious politician. He sponsored Alger Hiss and Lee Pressman, among other study-bugs of the same type, who sat at his knee at Harvard law and may reasonably be supposed to have derived some of their ideas from his teaching.

WASHINGTON Numerous so-called "small business men's organizations" will be forced out of a shadowy field of highly profitable pickings as a result of a decision by the Tax Court of the United States that they do not perform a "scientific or educational service" or any other meritorious work at Washington.

John Q. Will Have More in '51; Uncle Sam to Take More

NEW YORK — (AP) — You should have more money to spend next year. And Uncle Sam is taking steps to see that you spend it differently than you did this year.

He plans, of course, to take more of your income in taxes, but even so the boom in defense production is expected to boost the nation's total disposable personal income — what you have left after taxes — to a new record in excess of the present all-time high annual rate of \$204.7 billion.

This year you bought houses, autos, home furnishings. You kept more money in demand deposits in the bank where you could get at it fast to buy the things you wanted. And you put less of it into time and savings deposits — according to a report by the Securities and Exchange Commission.

The SEC reports that you bought more corporate securities, but reduced your holdings of federal, state and local government securities. You'll have more money to invest next year, economists say, for two reasons: paychecks will be larger, and there will be fewer goods to spend your money on. The government is seeking to cut back the number of houses that can be built. Government controls on the use of raw materials will soon be cutting back the number of pleasure cars that can be made, and the number of household gadgets.

With more money around and fewer goods to buy, the pressure of inflation will mount fast. The government is trying to sit on the lid now by asking voluntary controls on prices and wages. By March it will probably be ready to make controls mandatory. But then inflation is likely to move over into the black market and the cost of living will go on a spree. By March, also, Congress may have raised income taxes again to siphon off part of the rising income. Industry will be working at the other half of the inflationary squeeze by building up its productive capacity. A great spurt in plant and equipment expansion is starting. While most of this is aimed at meeting the need of producing more goods for defense, some of it will increase industry's capacity to produce civilian goods. And this—along with longer hours of work—will help fight inflation by providing more goods for people to share. Even so, the government is expecting the amount of available cash in the nation's pockets to increase. The government is hoping that people will turn to building up deposits in banking and savings institutions, and other forms of saving, such as insurance. To the extent that they do, the less pressure there will be to push the cost of living higher.

Britain Has 20,000 in Korea

NEW YORK — (AP) — Britain now has 20,000 soldiers, sailors and airmen engaged in the Korean campaign in support of American troops, Sir Gladwyn Jebb, British UN delegate, said today. Jebb, speaking on Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt's radio program, added that Britain and the United States "stand or fall together, and we are therefore resolved to stand together."

DOG NOTES by PETER BOGGS

STORE PUPS GIVEN THIS PAST YEAR AS GIFTS

As I expected, the letters are beginning to pour in asking for tips on how to care for and train puppies. It happens every year at this time because of the increasing number of people who receive dogs as Christmas gifts. Evidently more pups were given as gifts this year as my mail on this subject seems much larger than in previous years. Therefore, I'll try and devote a little more space than usual these next few weeks to the care and training of puppies.

THE FIRST THING TO TEACH A PUPPY

The first thing to teach a puppy or a dog of any age is to come to you when you call him. Perhaps you have noticed a dog owner trying to get his dog to come to him when called while the dog goes blissfully on his way until he feels like returning to his master. Often I have noticed people running after a dog, and at the same calling to him to come back. Thinking it some kind of game, the animal continues on his way.

WHEN PICKING UP A PUPPY

Hundreds of times I have seen young puppies picked up by the forelegs or by only one foreleg. This is one of the most injurious handlings a pup can receive. It puts an unnatural strain on the leg or legs and, indirectly on the pup's whole body.

WHEN PICKING UP A PUPPY

Many a dog owes a permanent twisted shoulder or chronic dislocation to the fact that some lazy or ignorant person acquired the habit of picking him up by the leg. Sometimes the formation of the soft little bones has been warped. This, in addition to the pain suffered at the time it was done.

WHEN PICKING UP A PUPPY

The best way to lift a puppy from the ground is to place your cupped palm under his body between stomach and chest so that some semblance of balance is maintained and so that he will not slip from your hands as he is picked up. Thus, no special strain comes on any part of him. If he is too big or too heavy or if he wriggles too much, use the cupped palms of both hands in the same way—one on either side of his underbody. And don't get the idea that this precaution is trivial or useless. His condition in future years may depend on it.

The other day I was asked to give my opinion of a litter of pointer pups. They were only eight weeks old and bone thin. I asked their owner what he fed them and how often. The diet he described was all right in quality but I understood at once what was wrong with the dogs when he said, "I feed them twice a day. At each meal I take their food away before they can get at all swelled up from eating too much."

He was doing exactly the thing that would starve his pups or make them grow up into half-nourished runts. His procedure was most certainly incorrect if he wanted vigorous and healthy pointers. At their age these dogs should have been fed four or five times a day, at least. At every meal they should have been allowed to eat all they wanted of the right kind of foods. Of course they would have looked distended after a full meal—all young animals do. It does them no harm.

Question: Would you say there were something wrong with my dog when from time to time he eats grass? —R. L. P. Answer: Dogs eat grass instinctively. It is a conditioner for them and does them no harm. It is not unnatural for a dog to eat grass so don't worry about it.

Question: Would you say there kingeshe shed her coat so excessively? Answer: A number of things could cause this condition. Suggest you have your dog checked by a good veterinarian.

DOG MAY BE USED IN CIVILIAN DEFENSE I am sure you are aware of the vast increase in Civilian Defense preparations since President Truman's declaration of a national emergency. Few people are aware that dogs may play an important part in this country's plans for the protection of civilians after any bomb attacks. Recently I attended a meeting where the training and use of dogs were seriously discussed. This meeting was called because of the great value dogs were to people of London during the bombing raids of World War II. When Germany launched their V-1 and V-2 attacks on London a group of trained Alsatian dogs were brought to London to help locate buried casualties. It was found that dogs are so sure-footed

ed that they can walk over debris which would collapse if walked over by a man.

Here is how the final phase of the training was given at the Ministry of Aircraft Protection at Cheltenham, England, during the last war: Dogs in groups of four were sent to locate four men buried under a heap of rubble which had been covered with burning rags. The dogs were released 30 yards away from the simulated bomb damage and given the command "Find." In less than 2 minutes each dog had fought his way through the flames and found his man. Alsatians, or "police dogs" as they are commonly called, are particularly suited for this kind of work. Their hereditary police work instincts and their remarkable sense of hearing have made them the logical choice for locating buried victims. So don't be surprised if you hear that a group of dogs is being trained in your locality for such work. Serious thought is being given to such training by our Civilian Defense leaders.

(Continued from Page 6) to use the simple Form 1040A. He and his wife have filed a joint return by printing both names on the first line and by both signing at the bottom. A joint return on Form 1040A never results in more tax than if separate returns were filed because the collector figures both ways and takes the smaller amount. If both you and your wife are working, with neither one of you making more than \$5000 but with your combined income more than \$5000, you can only file separate returns on Form 1040A. In this case, your tax may be lower if you file a joint return on Form 1040 and take advantage of the "split-income" provisions. Your tax on Form 1040 will usually be the same as on Form 1040A. In some circumstances, explained above, your tax may be lower if you use Form 1040. The definitions for Form 1040A are the same as for Form 1040. You can get answers to questions that may puzzle you by referring back to earlier articles in this series.

If you have received any dividends or interest in 1950 and have a question regarding them, watch for tomorrow's article. Tax Primer Q&A Q. I have a refund due me on my 1950 tax. How can I get the quickest refund? A. By filing as soon as possible being careful not to make obvious mistakes such as forgetting to attach your Form W-2, failing to sign the return, or not supplying necessary information. Q. Do I get the benefit of any deductions if I use Form 1040A? A. You can't itemize your deductions but you automatically get a deduction of about 10 percent of your total income. You also get the benefit of \$800 for each exemption.
