## Government Slaps **Ban On Two Metals**

WASHINGTON —(AP)— Price Director Michael V. Di-Salle warned last night that the first meat black marketeer who is caught will be made a "national example." And DiSalle's staff prepared a new and tough meat order designed to aid enforcement of ceiling prices by tight curbs on slaughterers.

There were also these other developments on the home front:

1. The government banned the use of aluminum in more than 200 consumer items, effective April 1. The items range from storm windows to automobile hardware. Kitchen utensils are not affected, however.

2. DiSalle rolled back the price of steel scrap and iron scrap about 20 percent, wiping out a sharp January increase. A spokesman for the scrap industry welcomed the action and said neither buyers nor sellers wanted the January rise. Scrap is used in making steel, but no change is expected in the price of steel itself.

#### I He Dock. Says

Most people today are being constantly bombarded by worries and annoyances. Where will the money come

from to pay the mortgage or taxes? Will webe hit by an atomic bomb? Has a loved son or daughter gotten into bad company? There is always some-

thing keeping us stirred up. This added to the fact that more people are living longer has made high blood pressure a problem to more people than ever before, fore, But a lot of people have only a vague idea about what the blood pressure is and what keens it where it should be or maker it go up or down.

When water is run through a hose it presses on the inside of the hose. How hard it presses depends on how much water is going through it, the force of the stream at the entrance, the size of the hose, the size of the exit opening, the composition of the hose and other things.

It is much the same with the blood pressure. The neart is the pump which forces the blood into the hose or blood vessels. When the heart contracts it pumps the blood into the arteries and at this time the pressure on the walls of

the arteries goes up. When the heart relaxes for moment the pressure in the arteries drops. The high pressure point is called the systolic pressure, and the low point the diastolic. These are the two figures which the doctor takes and expresses such as 120 over 80.

But just like water running through the hose it isn't only the force with which blood enters the arteries that influences the blood pressure. If the arteries are narrawed and this can be the result of hardening from contractions caused by nervousness-the pressure will be higher than if they were nice and relaxed. NERVES RESPONSIBLE

One of the most remarkable things about the blood pressure is how it is effected by nerves. Excitement, worry, anger, and other emotions send the pressure skyrocketing.

The pressure is almost always higher the first time the doctor takes it than it is later on. Even an exciting conversation will cause the pressure to go up. Undoubtedly worrying about high blood pressure is bad and tends to keep it high.

Your first two or three discards should usually be high cards that you don't need. As you know, from ordinary Canaslow cards may be slightly safer discards than high cards. However, you should make slightly dangerous discards at the very beginning of a hand and become progressively more cautious as the pile builds up. It is no tragedy if your opponent picks up a very small discard pile; but you weep bitter tears if he picks up a very large pile. At the same time that you are making and planning your own discards, you must pay very careful attention to those of your op-ponent. Since he will usually throw cards that he cannot use, you must plan to match those discards fairly soon.


The chances are, if he discards a queen, that you can safely throw a queen one or two rounds later. He may have a pair of queens by that time, but the odds are against it. This leads to an important principle of deception. If you know that your opponent is watching your discards and will try to match them, you must occasionaly trap him into throwing something that you actually want. Thus, you throw a card that you realy want about half the time as one of your first
