Few people realize the degree

that many are governed or controlled or exploited or dominated over by being scared. People are scared in various

ways. In the thirties the government scared people into believing they would starve if the government did not care for them. They did this while the government was the cause of them being out of jobs.

The bureaucrats are not the only ones who have used this scare method of exploiting people. For ages many heads of organized religion have scared people into submission. They had people scared into believing that if they did not support their organized religious leaders and believe as they said, those who disobeyed would be burned in eternal fire. Millio ; of people have gone through life afraid to think for things that could not be repeated. The result is that people have contributed and supinely submitted to most irrational leadership. Of course, this method of scaring is relatively safe because no one can prove a negative. No one has ever known anything about any other world than this one. So if people can be scared into believing terrible things, those who do the scaring can get most anything

they want from the scared. But this is not the only kind of scaring. Labor unions have been scaring the workers into believing that if they didn't belong to labor unions their wages would never go up and that they would be exploited and would be slaves. They have even scared many employers into believing that if they didn't submit to the labor unions' demands they would be financially liquidated. The labor bosses have been reaping a fat. harvest by scaring a great many of the workers and the employers into paying tribute to them.

The medical profession has scared people into believing that they must only have a doctor that the medical profession, by way of the state, sanctions. Their closed shop undoubtedly retards development in the medical profession much more than it saves lives by their monopoly. They get their laws by scaring people into believing that the doctors alone should have the exclusive right to

practice medicine. Most newspapers have been scared into believing that if they explained moral principles and exposed all special privileges granted by the government, and stood for a single standard, that they would lose subscribers and would not have the support of the public. A large part of our confusion is due to scared newspaper publishers who are afraid themselves to run editorials or columnists who fearlessly expose special privileges secured by scaring people.

The government has been scaring voters into submission for years. Way back in 1865 the government scared people into believing that if they did not permit the government to have a monopoly on issuing money and credit that they would not have sound money or currency. People were so badly legislators to make it a crime to own sound money or to permit honest dependable people to issue currency and mediums of exchange. The result is we have no sound money because the politicians years and years ago scared the people into believing that they and they alone should have the exclusive right to issue currency

and control credit. Another great scare is that people would not be educated if everybody was not forced to support a state monopoly in "education". One hears it repeatedly that people would not be educated if they didn't have tax supported

"education". The fact of the matter is that tax supported "education" is the greatest possible handicap to a real education. If that were not true, I would not have any difficulty in finding a tax supported "educator" who would for \$100



That is just one sample. I can present dozens of such utterances to anyone who requests them. I haven't the space here. Anyway, I thank Mr. Green for setting me right on wolves. How could I have ever confused such noble animals with sheep-killing dogs?



It was fine if you were the player who had control of the discard pile. It was ghastly if your opponent got there first.

The problem was solved by John R. Crawford, my favorite Canasta partner. He suggested that at each turn you draw two cards instead of one. Everything else was the same. You discard one card at each turn, as usual; you need two canastas to go out and so on.

The effect of drawing two cards and discarding only one is to get one extra card into your hand at each turn. You begin with 15 cards, have 16 cards at our first play, 17 cards at second play, and so on. As a result, you never get

strangled. Even if you don't get the discard pile, you still accu-mulate enough cards to complete at least two canastas. There is still a struggle for the discard pile, but the game is not quite so exasperating for the loser.




