Pampa will soon have its old World War II industry back in full production. This time with more modern equipment, it was learned reliably late Thursday.

A letter-order contract for rough turned, heat treated, rough bored gun tubes (gun barrels) was given the Cabot Shops by U.S. Army Ordnance Dept. out of St. Louis, Mo.

The contract also authorized Cabot Shops, through its general manager, R. A. Baker, to order the necessary equipment to swing into full production at a cost of close to \$1,500,000. The first gun barrel contract will run in excess of a million dollars, Baker revealed yesterday.

The order was received Wednesday and returned to the federal government the same day.



There are estimates showing that the hydrogen star may not be much hotter than the A-bomb fireball. There also are estimates showing that the hydrogen star certainly will not be cooler.

This star will rise rapidly, at about three miles a minute, and that is the principal reason why its perils will last only about ten seconds. While still close to earth the
