





free speech calls for the self-control and the wisdom which will make our speech of good

temper and of helpful counsel to others, who likewise have the same freedom of speech. The

right to worship according to the dictates of our consciences summons us to train our con-

sciences so that we shall choose well, surely that we shall worship somewhere. Democracy is the most elevated of systems of economic, of civil, and of religious living, but it is also

the most difficult. For it requires so much of those who assume responsibility to govern themselves. There must be self-discipline; there must be the training of youth in disciplined living; there must be high dedication to the common good, as over against selfish behaviour.

This explains the great temptation to personify the enemy of liberty, to recast it in the form of certain persons who can be attacked by the use of force.***

"What, then is to be done? The leaders ignore the fact that they are incapable of examining even one person, and hide their incapacity behind a grandiose facade of decoys. They label entire nations or continents or races as the enemies of liberty, when, in fact, they are unable to judge even one person in this respect and do not even know the questions to be asked."

In the spring of 1865 a young minister took his seat on the pulnit of the Second Baptist Church at Rochester, N. Y. About to preach his trial sermon before a new congregation, he thumbed through a hymnal to select an impressive song. Over in the book his hand stopped. His eyes widened. Then he smiled. His wife must have played a prank on him. His thoughts went back to a night three years earlier.

It was March 26, 1862. The nation was in turmoil. The War-Between-the-States had swung into its tragic stride. Abraham Lincoln had not yet issued his Emancipation Proclamation and no-body knew what the blood shed was all about ... nor where the struggle might lead. Everywhere people were praying for Divine guidance. In Philadelphia the son of the Governor of New Hampshire made a talk before a group that had gathered at the First Baptist Church for prayer.

The speaker and his wife went home with Dea-con Thomas Watison for the hight. The deacon complimented the young speaker on his selection of a text. Retiring to his room Joseph Gilmore sat up into the wee hours writing some verse. The next morning Mrs. Gilmore was up ahead

of her husband. She took the paper with its verses but said nothing. Gilmore forgot it completely, Mrs. Gilmore sent the poem to a Baptist periodical. Composer William Bradbury read it, set it to music and published it in his hymnal, The Golden Cencer."

At Rochester when Joseph Gilmore, D.D. stopped his hand on a page in the hymnal his thoughts went back to that night in Philadelphia when he talked from the text "He Leadeth me beside the still waters." At any rate, he wanted to hear how a hymn sounded that he had written, so he asked the congregation to sing . . .

Lord, I would clasp Thy hand in mine, Nor ever murmur nor repine, Content, what-ever lot I see, Since 'tis my God that leadeth me.

And when my task on earth is done, When, by Thy grace, the victory's won, E'en death's cold wave I will not flee, Since God thro' Jordan leadeth me.




