

natural law, the her moral law, Natural law is simple. It consists of one precept-self-survival. The natural cave man wasn't concerned with moral law. He was only concerned with existing. What was necessary for his existence he took. If he was hungry and his neighbor had just killed a dinsosaur, he took the dinosaur if he were able to. He wasn't concerned with moral laws on stealing. If his neighbor tried to interfere he had no compunctions about bopping him over the head. Murder was another moral law he didn't even know existed. His only law was the natural one of self-survival. When he wanted woman he didn't even think about any moral law on coveting

He took her and if the male who had a prior interest in her got in

his way, he bashed his skull in.

The Bible speaks of the difference between the natural man and the spiritual or moral man, comparing the former to brute beasts made to be taken. I've noticed that natural animals usually have little or no respect for moral law They take what they want or what is necessary for their survival. A horde of ants will invade your house if you have some food they want. No questions asked about theft or covetuousness. A lion will take meat away from another lion if he has the force to do it. A stallion will kill another stallion without any conscientuous misgivings if a filly he needs is the prize, He is concerned with self-survivat in perpetuating himsel through a colt the filly will bear The brute beast or brute man, under the prime natural law of selfpreservation only, will break every one of the Ten Commandments and the Golden Rule without any scruples whatsoever or even real izing that such a thing as moral or spiritual law exists.

Moral law, on the contrary, has to be supernatural, something above nature, as indeed it must be if its Inspirer is supernatural. A supernatural God could be expected to provide a system ethics higher than the mere natural precept of tooth and claw.
