I want to continue to quote from the book "The Way to Security" by Dr. Henry C. Link, and published by Doubleday & Co., Inc. Dr. Link is a student of moral principles and how government should

be limited, Under the chapter "Security through Education and Personality" Dr. Link observes:
"Why should our extensive sys-

tem of public education fail to develop the personality as well as the mind? This problem is of utmost importance to every student and parent, because an effective personality is basic to sound mental health and security...

"If they wish to develop ma-ture characters they must rely on their families and the church. Inadequate though these may be, they are still far superior forces of public education. Indeed, since the training of character must be largely based on religious principles, the public schools can-not do this training properly even if they would. Religious education is, for certain reasons, no longer compatible with secular educa-

Then Dr. Link relates that:
"The net result of our modern system of secondary education was revealed by a study of secondary schools in New York State. This study was made over a period of three years by a large body of the nation's leading educators, under a grant of a half million dollars from the Rockefeller Foundation The director of the survey, Luther Gulick, summed up its findings as

"The Inquiry found, in spite of the fact that New York's schools are as good as those in other states, that we are turning out of school a vast number of boys and girls each year who are not at all ready for adult life. They have no idea what work means, what sorts of opportunities there are, how to for work, or how to work when they get a job. They are not prepared to be useful citizens, or to enter community or home They do not know how to take care of their own bodies or minds. Few have implanted in them any seeds of individual inner life and growth, any skill in working with others, or any protections against mob hysteria, propaganda, shallow

prejudice, or economic gold bricks.
"We of the Inquiry suspect that
America cannot be governed satisfactority or administered industrially in the days that lie ahead on the basis of the kind of schooling this 80 per cent of boys and

girls now receive." "The school products described in this summary are perfect prospects for those who preach the doctrines of Communism and class hatred. They are the gullible dupes of the politicians who promise them a security which they have not earned. They are the easy vicms of those labor leaders who ite them to hold by force jobs

they cannot keep by their own nerits." Under the chapter "The Mature Character" Dr. Link writes:
"Much has been said in recent years about the mature mind, emoonal maturity, and the mature personality. Less and less has been said about the mature character. The concept of character and character development was once the focal point of education. Today this concept has all but disappear-

ed from our thinking approach the subject of security, we find character as its basic ingredient. Security is no more poswithout character than life is without air or a building without a foundation. Character is the foundation of security in the individual, in the family, in the community, the nation, and in the world of nations.

"The man of mature character s a man who can be relied upon. No matter what the circumstances, he can be depended on to act in a definite way. He is not just a good man or a man of good will but a man whose qualities of goodness are predictable. That is, he can be depended on to act according to certain spiritual standards of right and wrong, and not according to expediency or his own selfish interests....
"The man of mature character

is one who has learned to subordinate his passions and his im pluses to certain spiritual standards. Such a man has sometimes been described as a 'man of principle'. There has been a tendency in recent years to disparage the man of principle as being rigid, dull, and even stuffy.' But now We are beginning to see, once more, that the man of principle is the safe man. He is a good security risk for himself, his family, and his neighbors. He can be relied on not to steal another's wife another's money, automobile, or other possessions. He can be relied on not to covet his neighbor's good fortune or higher position or greater wealth. Being mature in character he will not waste his eneror his thoughts on how to pull down his neighbor: he will concentrate instead on how to lift up himself. He can be relied on to lie about others, or to utter damaging half-truths. He will not violence or murder. He will not, knowingly, vote for any form of government that advocates stealing or violence.

"Life in these United States has been relatively secure just cause we have had so many citizens of good character. But, several philosophers have now stated, we are living on the moral momentum of our past. Our present security is still the result of the character training of earlier years, Now, the decline of character training is becoming manifest in our rapidly growing rate of crime Murder, sex crimes, robbery, and assault have increased rapidly in recent years. By far the largest increase has been among the young, those under twenty-five. only natural since young people would be the first to reflect decline in character training. The increase in crime means a de-


