

There are large areas in the world such as our own Great Lakes region in which there is normally an insufficient amount of iodine in the water or food. It is for such places in particular that iodized salt has meant so much in the prevention of goiter.

Some fear has occasionally been expressed that iodized salt or even "natural" salt containing iodine might be harmful if continued over long a period. The Bible In The Public Schools

Many church-going individues calling themselves Christians and probably believing that they are, are devoting a lot of time and en-ergy intrying to get the Bible read in tax supported schools. sed Christians These self-profe don't seem to realize that tax supported schools are not based on the ethical principles set forth in the Bible. The Bible teaches the importance of the individual. It teaches that the inherent rights of each and every individual must be respected. It teaches this in the Ten Commandments and the Golden rule.

Public schools are not based on individual rights, but are based on the theory that might or the majority is the Messiah or God; they teach that the majority determines right; they teach that there are no higher laws than the will of

the majority.
It would be a mockery and delusion to have a book like the Bible that teaches practical ethical principles that will promote peace, good will and prosperity, to be read by a lot of teachers who teach so poorly that people will not voluntarily pay them for their services—to be read by teachers who believe that they have a right to join with others to send the sheriff to confiscate other people's property in order to pay their salaries.

How could teachers of this kind select the ethical concepts of the Bible that are embodied in the ethics of the Golden Rule. No public teacher can name one solitary thing that he wants to be forced to pay for, yet he is perfectly willing to join with others and force the minority to pay for his salary. Public school teachers teach by example that might makes right and that the end justifies the means.

To have the Bible read in public schools would probably do infinitely more harm than good because the pupils would get an entirely distorted idea of the moral principles presented in the Bible when it was handled and read by teachers who pay no attention to the moral principles of the Bible as far as initiating force to get their salaries is concerned.

Educator Sees Danger Of L Tax Supported Education

Dr. E. M. Sadler, president of Texas Christian University, seems to understand exactly what is taking place in the United States. In the May issue of the Christian-Evangelist, the national weekly of the Disciples of Christ, appeared and article quoting statements made by Dr. Sadler before the 64th annual convention of the Christian Churches of Texas. I quote from

"Church-related colleges and universities are threatened with extinction by external pressures upon them, declared Dr. E, M. Sadler, president of Texas Christian University in an address April 26 at the 64th annual convention of the Christian Churches of Texas in East Dallas Church, Dallas.

"He asserted that five factors are bringing serious consequences to church schools. The five factors are (1) decrease in veteran enrollment (2) decrease in the number of high school graduates, (3) operation of the selective service system, (4) existing high employment level and (5) governmental

"'For several generations in this country almost all colleges and universities were privately controlled and church-related. . . now government schools are beginning o dominate the whole field of education.' he asserted, 'During the past century we in this country have witnessed the beginning and marked the development of taxsupported schools, and the transformation of many church-related institutions into completely independent institutions.'

'The well-known Disciple leader pointed out some of the encroachments of government on education. He mentioned the 'Report of the President's Commission on Education' which recommended that enrollment in privately controlled colleges and universities should be frozen at the 1947 level of 900,000, and that tax-supported colleges and universities should be creased fourfold to a total of 3,-

700,000 by 1960. "The TCU official cited four items controlling the financial situation for privately controlled church-related colleges. Included were (1) serious reductions in income from student fees through decreased enrollment, (2) greatly increased cost of education, (3) reduced rate of income from endowment funds, and (4) limited support from church constituen-

"In concluding his address, the TCU president declared:

The surest road toward absolute dictatorship and regimentation is by way of control in education. Whoever and whatever controls education will soon control life . . . The free, democratic approach to life can live so long, and only so long, as people seek and serve God. If the fires of religion burn out, the heart of democracy will cease to beat, And make no mistake about it, the fires of religion will burn out unless we keep them alive in and through institutions of learning which have vital religion as their permeating center and not as a peripheral side-show!" "

It is because this column believes that education that is not under the control of inidividuals who attempt to practice and believe in moral principles is bound to impoverish our country and enslave us that this column has so repeatedly stressed what is bound to happen when education to happen when education is controlled by the majority.







ST. LOUIS - (A) - Dr. Arthur H. Compton, one of the scientists who helped develop the atomic bomb, says atomic strength will determine the winner of the "platina del Pinta."

"Masses of foot soldiers are rapidly becoming obsolescent for military attack.

America may be hurt in an atomic war, Dr. Compton said, 'hut we know that we are prepared to inflict much more severe damage on the enemy." He said America's preparation of tactical atomic weapons for use in the battle field is an important factor in reducing the threat of masses of foot soldiers and added:

"It is this fact that gives us confidence in case of a full offensive by the huge armies of China and Russia. The prime factor that must determine the outcome of such a war is now not millions of men but atomic strength, and in such strength we believe we can maintain pre-


