### Wichita Falls Big State Choice

DALLAS — (AP) — Wichita predicts club owners in the Big State League, will lead the race this season. The moguls, meeting yesterday to complete the 1951 schedule, selected the Spudders for the No. 1 spot. They also figured Longview, a newcomer to the circuit, replacing Gainesville, would wind up second, Tyler third and Texarkana fourth. Longview is being operated by Dick Burnett, owner of the Dallas club in the Texas League. In the second division the city placed Austin fifth, Waco sixth, Greenville seventh and Temple eighth. Four of the eight club owners picked Wichita Falls to finish first. The club owners also were quite optimistic over what the season has in store in attendance. They forecast 1,115,000, which would be far the greatest outpouring of fans in the six years of the league. Austin and Longview predicted 200,000, Wichita Falls and Texarkana 180,000, Temple 125,000, Greenville and Tyler 100,000 and Waco 90,000. The six clubs in the league last year drew 496,000. Greenville and Longview were out of baseball last season. The league race opens April 15 and closes Sept. 30. The circuit has 147 games. W. B. Ruggles, baseball statistician who furnishes the circuit's schedule, said he would work out the 1952 chart and have it ready by Friday. The schedule has had to be revised twice because of changes in the league make-up. NEW YORK (AP) The New York Yankees today announced receipt of the signed contracts of three pitchers — two of them rookies who won 31 games between them at Beaumont in the Texas League. The yearlings — righthanded Harry Schaeffer and Tom Gorman — have been requested to report to the Yankees instruction school in Lake Wales, Fla., for a week's pre-training period starting Feb. 15. Bob Hogue, a reliever who joined the Yanks on Aug. 23 last year, also is in the fold. He formerly was with Dallas. Schaeffer won 19 games and lost nine for the Exporters and had an earned run average of 2.38 in 261 innings. Gorman, used mostly in relief, had a 12-8 record. During one stretch, the Valley Stream, N. Y. hurler, tossed 42 consecutive scoreless innings to set a Texas League record. He topped the circuit with a 1.94 earned-run mark.

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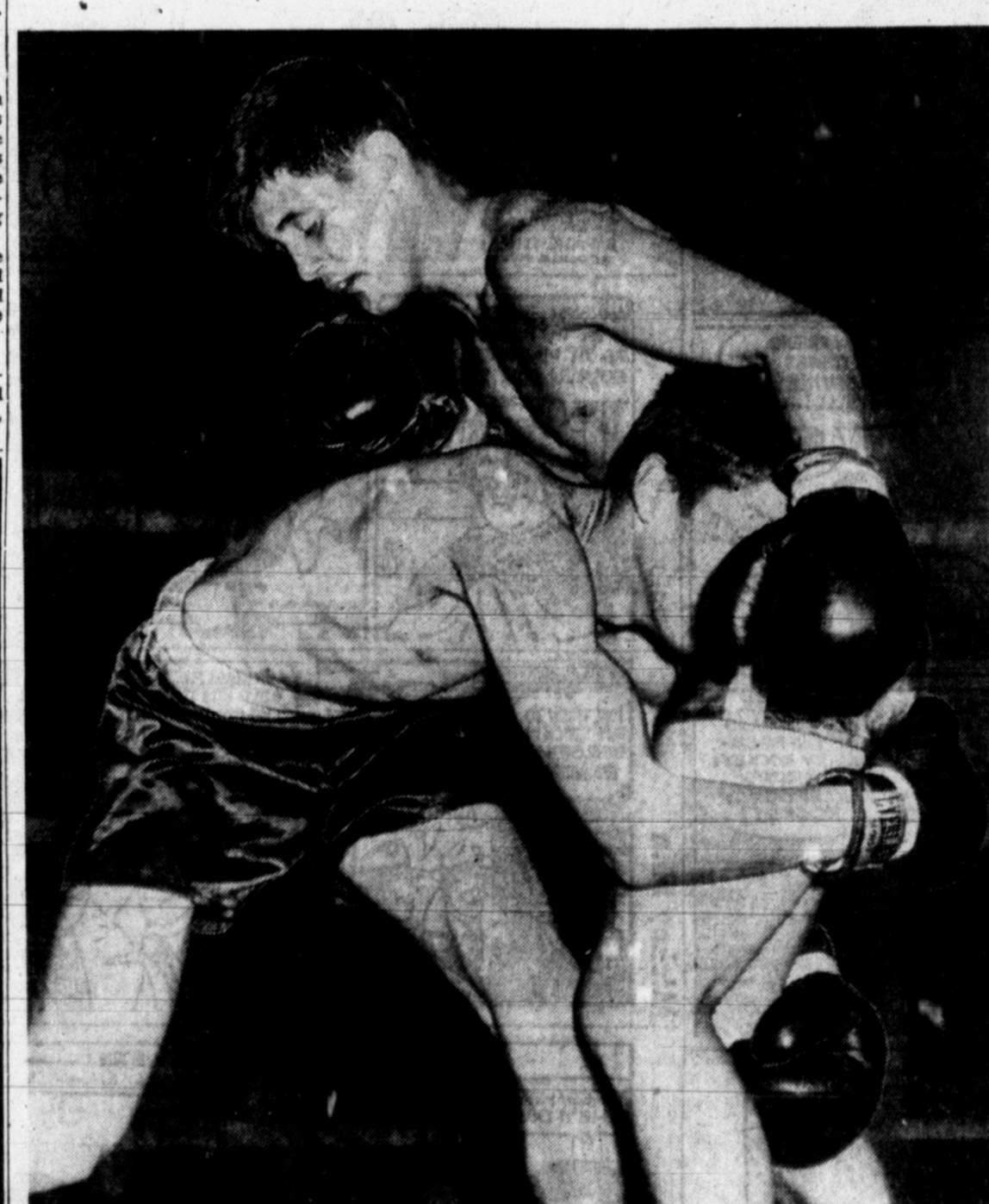

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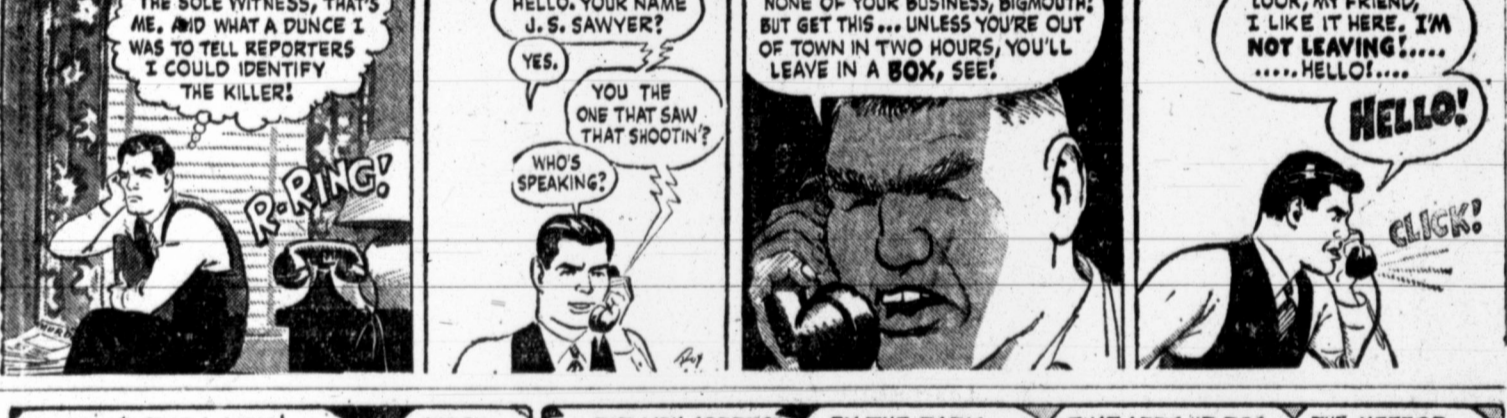
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Korea's Families Of Carried-Off Persons

The dinner party was almost all women — members of the Nap-Chi Society. In Korea, that means the Association of the Families-of-the-Carried-Off-Persons.

It was an experience I won't soon forget. Most of those present were Koreans whose husbands were kidnapped by the Communists in Seoul. The missing (there are 88,000 in all, by actual record) include government leaders, educators, newspapermen, bankers, artists, policemen and doctors.

Their families are now greatly worried because they fear no provisions will be made in the current truce talks for returning them from the enemy.

"Unless a strong demand is made for the return of the carried-off civilians," one woman told me, "they will certainly perish behind the iron curtain."

S. T. Hong, told me almost lea-

fully of the efforts he had made to locate a sister, the Mother Superior of a convent in Pyeng-Yang, who along with her 22 Korean nuns was taken off to the Communists. "So far we can find out nothing," Hong said.

It is generally believed that some of those kidnapped have already died in Communist hands. These include Dr. Kimm Kiu-Sic, former head of the Korean Legislature. And there is little hope that the Gantdi of Korea, Cho Man-Sik, is still alive.

At least one of the Carried-Off Persons has returned after escaping by some clever footwork from imprisonment in Pyeng-Yang.

She is Mrs. Shin-Duk Whang, and seated on flat square cushions on the floor of a room lighted only by oil lamps, she told of her harrowing experience.

Sometimes there was laughter as she talked. More often tears.

Mrs. Whang, principal of a girls' school in Seoul, was ordered by the Communists one day to get into a crowded truck.

Also in the truck were such people as Kim Dong-Won, vice chairman of the National Assembly; Lee Chung-Ho, president of the Seoul YMCA; and several professors from Seoul University.

"When the truck got to Pyeng-Yang I was first put into a prison cell with several other women and later transferred to a school."

"Trials were held in the schoolhouse. Some were sentenced to 10 years in prison. Some were given lesser sentences. My case was undecided."

"The weather was turning colder and I had on only summer clothes. We women would stand huddled together for warmth."

"Three or four times a day UN planes flew over Pyeng-Yang, dropping bombs. The guards always ordered us to fall flat in our cells during a bombing, but we would lift our eyes to the small window to count the planes."

"One day some other women and I were undergoing an inspection in the courtyard when UN planes came over. The guards ordered us into nearby bomb shelters outside the enclosure."

"That was Mrs. Whang's big chance. 'I noticed that the shelter had an exit at the far end. When the all-clear sounded I walked the opposite way from the others and went out through the far exit. In the confusion I was not missed until I got well into the city. I was liberated a short time later by UN forces who fought their way into the city.'

Mrs. Whang said the prisoners she saw were of three types. First, were the patriots, especially the leaders of Korea's independence movement. Second, were people of moderate means who had devoted much time to cultural, scientific and other interests of their country. Third, were Christians.

Besides fear that the truce talks will not provide for returning the Carried-Off Persons to their homes the people at the dinner were concerned lest the UN forces (they always say "the American Army") should become discouraged, bored, or dismayed at the heavy casualties and decide to pull out.

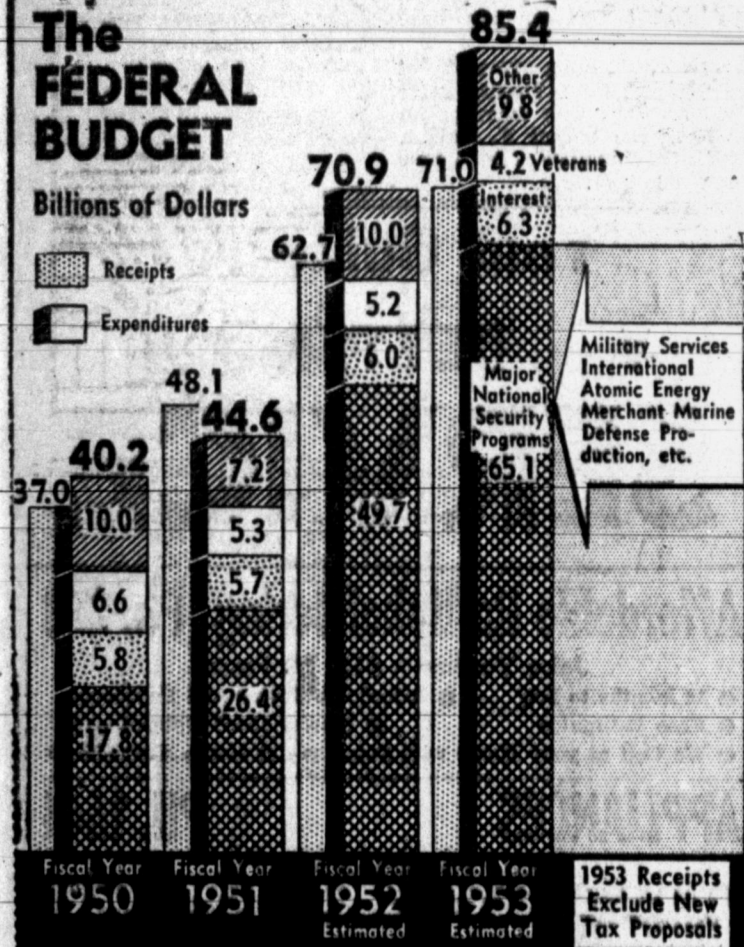
"If that should happen," said Mrs. Namdong, a woman with an exceptionally strong intelligent mind, "it would have been better if the UN had not come to rescue us."

"Now we are known to be UN sympathizers. If we are deserted, we shall all be 'Carried-Off Persons,' or we shall be driven from this peninsula into the sea. We have no other place to go."

But the women who have lost their menfolk have too much to do to spend a lot of time worrying. There's a living to be made for themselves and their families. And that can be difficult in a country where men are virtually the only breadwinners.

Some women are working in private homes, others in offices, factories, or with the armed forces. Many have organized a center where homeless widows and their children can live—while they still have a place.
