But the women who have lost their menfolk have too much to do to spend a lot of time worrying. There's a living to be made for themselves and their families. And that can be difficult in a country where men are virtually the only breadwinners.

Some women are working in private homes, others in offices actories, or with the armed orces. They have even organized a center where homeless widows and their children can live while they still have a place.
