



# Few Steady Jobs In Cabinet

Looking for a steady job? Then do not apply for a cobinet post in President Truman's administration. That sort of thing has proved to be just about the most insecure employment you could hold.

There was a time, not too long ago, when a fellow picked by a President for the capinet had reasonable assurance of sticking in there throughout the President's term of office, whether it be four years or eight. It was, in fact, the rule rather than the exception.

Today all that is changed. Maybe it's the stress and strain of the times. Whatever it is, short-term service is standard. Cabinet members come and go like offensive and defensive football platoons

Some get fired, some get worn out by it all, some deliberately restrict their tenure to two years or three. In many quarters this kind of duty is looked upon as the most hazardous front-line combat. It's something you. don't take too much of if you want to preserve life and

The recent "resignation" of Attorney General Mc-Grath puts the matter in fresh focus. James McGranery, McGrath's successor, will be the fourth attorney general under Mr. Truman - if he should manage to win confirmation from the Senate.

Remember Francis Biddle, President Roosevelt's last appointee to that job? Then there was Tom Clark, who served just long enough to be regarded as socially ac-. ceptable in the rarer atmosphere of the Supreme Court. McGrath was next in line.

Mr. Truman has had four secretaries of State-Stettinius, Byrnes, Marshall and Acheson. He's had the same number of defense secretaries - Forrestal, Johnson, Marshall and Lovett.

The turnover pace isn't quite so swift in some of the quieter cabinet backwaters. There have been but three secretaries of agriculture, three secretaries of commerce, three secretaries of the interior, three of labor.

Of course, the President acted in accord with tradition when he ousted most of the Roosevelt cabinet he inherited. A chief executive is expected to surround himself with men of his own choosing.

Yet, no one quite imagined when he did this that he was opening the gates to a flood. He's fixed it so that setting down the names of his full cabinet is about the toughest parlor game you can play.

When the Internal Revenue scandals were at their peak last year, there were a lote of demands for the resignation of Secretary of the Treasury John Snyder. But he wouldn't quit. If he had, he would have had to yield up his bonors. For though he shares with Postmaster General Donaldson the rare distinction of having been the sole Truman appointee to his job, Snyder has more oak leaf. clusters on his chest. He's manned his post almost from

In later years, not only the historians but the psychologists may be keenly interested to learn what peculiar qualities Snyder possessed that enabled him to stay in there fighting while his colleagues were dropping like

# Hoover And The Scandal Inquiry

ground the Capital City is of the opinion J. Edgar Hoover, top man of the FBI, will take on the job of investigating corruption in government.

It's not in the cards for him to tackle the chore. In the first place, Hoover is a servant of the president in office and he would be inviting the axe to fall on his head by uncovering misdeeds concerning men surrounding the chief executive.

The plain fact is that Hoover must be influenced by partisan and political considerations except when he is in pursuit of criminals falling within his jurisdicton. Hoover was suggested for the clean-up job by Fed-

eral Judge James P. McGranery who has been named to succeed J. Howard McGrath as attorney general.

Of course, McGranery's nomination has to be confirmed first and that will take two weeks, assuming that the Senate will give him a clean bill of health and approve his selection.

\*Under the plan proposed by McGranery, Hoover would be obligated to report any evidence of wrongdoing to the attorney general. The next step would be to lay the facts before the President. And past performances of Mr. Truman don't indicate that any one of his cronies will be

Hoover has repeatedly ducked proposals that he enter into non-criminal fields which might involve him or his department in political entanglements, a policy Washington correspondents have considered wise.

If the FBI director should accept the assignment there is little doubt that he would get smeared on one side or the other. And that's about the last thing he would want to happen since he has spent a lifetime building up the reputation of the FBI and himself.

Hoover also has powerful friends in Congress who reportedly have already started a movement intended to keep the FBI director out of the job.





Read The Civic Textbooks To Know What Will Happen In The Future

There is nothing more important that department of political science and duties of citizens. A new edition of this textbook is issued every year. Years ago when our government was not so socialistic this look did not advocate as many collectivistic ideas as it does oday. Now that the adults have been mostly trained in public schools and have come to believe that the state has a mora, right to do things that are immoral for an individual to do. the book advocates more and more encroachment on individual liberty

I have been comparing the 1952 edition of "American Covernment" with the 1951 edition. There were some statemen's in the 1951 edition that were so shocking and met with so much resistance that the publishers were obliged to take them out of the 1952 book. The 1951 edition even contended that it was more just to place the burden of supporting even shiftless people everybody instead of onome dutiful son or daughter. The 52 book didn't have nerve enough to leave that statement in.

The 1951 edition admitted frankly, and so advocated, that in a democratic society it, was morally right for the government to do things that were immoral for an individual to do. In other words, were very frank in their statement. They were basing tax supported schools on the belief hat might or the majority makes ight and that the end justifies the neans. In other words, they were ontending that there were no moral laws governing human reations when it came to majorities. This was so obnoxious to people the believe in the principles on which this government was formed, that the new 1952 edition was oliged to omit his statement. No Real Definition Of Freedom

After reading the page that had this former statement on, I came to the conclusion that civics textbooks used in tax supported schools cannot define liberty or freedom justice, or inalienable rights. If they defined any of these, they would be embarrassed because their collective action would be

denying any rational definition of these terms The 1952 edition of "American Government" makes this state-

"Drawing the line between what an individual may or may not do is an extremely difficult task. Yet, the problem lies at the very core of the meaning of liberty in a de-mocracy." What does liberty in a democracy mean? No one knows, unless it means that might makes right or the majority determines what liberty is.

It is certainly not very difficult to draw the line between what an individual may or may not do if he uses as a guide the Commandments or the Golden Rule to determine what is right and what is wrong. They dare not use the Golden Rule as a guide because they continually violate it when they force a man to pay for something that he does not want and thinks will enslave his children. So they have to make the difference between right and wrong difficult to understand. They have to use words that have many different meanings that can be twisted around to give them. power over the lives of helpless citizens.

They dare not use such definitions of freedom as the one set forth by Rose Wilder Lane-"Freedom is self-control, no more, no less." They dare not use this because they want to control somebody else than themselves. Nor do they dare use the defini-

tion of Immanuel Kant that "Freedom is the faculty which enlarges the usefulness of all other facul-

Nor do they dare use the definition of Herbert Spencer-"Every man has freedom to do all that he wills, provided he infringes not on the equal freedom of any other They want to infringe on man." the freedom of the man who wants to educate his own children. They want to have the finai say as to what education is. And they want to force everyone to pay for the kind of education the bureaucrats and the majority claim is educa-

Nor can they obey the rule set forth by Abraham Lincoln when he said: "Those who deny freedom to others deserve it not for themselves, and, under a just God, cannot long retain it." And God is just. We are rapidly losing our freedom because we are teaching our children by example that might makes right and that the state is not limited to doing what is in harmony with the Golden Rule and the Commandments. Nor dare they use the definition

of John Stuart Mill-"The only freedom which deserves the name is that of pursuing our own good in our own way, so long as we do not attempt to deprive others of theirs, or impede their efforts to obtain

Every rational definition of freedom they disobey. A training that does not impress upon the pupil what freedom is and the blessings of freedom is worse than no training at all. It only makes the pupit who does not understand the blessings of freedom more dangerous and more harmful. (to be continued)

# **Roof Leaks**

Simple leaks in an asphalt roof can be fixed in just a few minutes with asphalt roofing cement. If the hole is a small one, all you have to do is lift the edge of the shingle, apply the asphalt over the hole with a trowel and press the shingle down again.

If the shingle is torn, coat the underside along the tear and press it down. Drive roofing nails through on each side of the tear and paint them as well as the with more asphalt. If the shingle is loose and flapping, paste it down in the same man-If a shingle is worn beyong

repair from tree limbs or any other objects rubbing against it, you should replace the shingle. Lift the shingle, remove any nails possible and very carefully cut the worn shingle out. Put a new one in its place, nail it down if possible, paint the nail heads with asphalt and otherwise secure it with cement. If you find it necessary to re-

place the entire roof, check carefully for warped boards and nail them down. Remove and replace or hammer down loose nails, then sweep the roof clean.

You may have had the same unfortunate experience last winter that Mr. Fix had with water backing pu from clogged and frozen gutters. The water ran down inside the window frames and stained the wallpaper. To stop this condition, lay a strip of roll roofing under the shingles along the lower edge of the roof for the length of the gutter. Place it under the shingles at least a foot above the point where the inside of the wall bisects the roof, let a quarter-inch of roofing protrude from under the roof's edge.

In covering an old asphaltshingled roof with a new material you can be guided by the old shingle line, but if you have removed an old roof preparatory to installing asphalt shingles, you should snap chalk lines at intervals as an aid to uniformity.




