Professor of Economics Finds GI's Shoot Craps!

KELLY WASHINGTON, Oct. 19—(P)—The size of stakes in army crap games became an economic issue today, as if it already weren't Spang in the middle of a scholarly discussion of Allied military currency used by our army in Italy, Economists Donald L. Kemmerer and T. Eugene Beattle observed that the soldiers customarily are handed their pay in the biggest bills available "and incidentally stakes

The exchange rate is 100 lire to the dollar, and sol-diers with a sense of thrift, a smart pair of dice, or both, frequently convert the lire to dollar money orlers which they dispatch home af-



AUSTIN, Oct. 19 (P)—The supreme court vesterday by granting of a writ of mandamus, ordered the Jefferson county board of county Jefferson county board of county and district road bond indebtedness to approve and recognize Dryden ferry bridge bonds previously issued by Jefferson county as eligible to participate in the county and road district highway fund.

den ferry bridge on state highway 87 across the Neches river near Port Arthur, between Jefferson and Orange counties, were involved. Issuance of \$750,000 in bonds was authorized for the bridge.

The question involved was whether the bonds in question, to the extent that the proceeds were used in con-

struction of the bridge were eligible for payment under the various road bond assumption acts, the court After reviewing the legislative readbond assumption acts under

which funds were set aside for dis-charge of subsequently maturing bond obligations, the opinion by Chief Justice James P. Alexander said: "Notwithstanding the fact the legislature had stated in the act of 1934 that the Dryden ferry bridge bonds not be eligible to participate

in county and road district highway funds, the legislature could, at a sub-sequent session, in the absence of a constitutional inhibition, alter its policy.
"The bonds in question were issued by Jefferson county x x x for the purpose of constructing a bridge on

one of the state's highways. Under the act of 1941, these bonds, to the amount of \$701,745.67 actually used in construction of the bridge, be-came eligible to participate in said fund. However, by terms of the act, only those bonds which at the time of their payment were eligible to participate in said fund, may now be taken into consideration in the apportionment of the funds in question. Consequently, only such installments of the bonds which matured and were paid subsequent to the effective date of the 1941 bond assumption act are eligible for such

Anti-Trust Law Indictments Are **All Dismissed**

SAN ANTONIO, Oct. 19 (A)-Fed eral anti-trust law indictments against 11 firms and 18 individuals, charged with agreeing on a divi-sion of territory in the making of small loans, have been dismissed, U. S. District Attorney W. R. Smith,

Several of the firms and individ-uals also were under another in-dictment which charged conspiracy to fix interest rates in 23 southern outhwestern, and western states. Both indictments were returned June 6 after an investigation which

began in Nov. 1943. Smith said that in his opinion the second indictment would be "suf-ficient to test the propriety of the conduct alleged." He gave no reason for dismissing the cases against firms and individuals not under the second indictment.

The Lesson of Warsaw

Warsaw was the first European capital to fall in World War II. now the cynical may say that was also the first capital to fall in the rising conflict of dis-sension which threatens to involve great sections of Europe in postwar vil strife. The Nazis are once again masters of the city, after a twoonths battle against a heroic underground army that fought and died for Poland while an outside tical struggle sickened and is-

olated and finally doomed it.

The Second Battle of Warsaw might well be called the Battle of Sphere of Influence. Its story has already been told in Yugoslavia and threatens to be repeated in Greece. In each case an exiled prewar government, supported by London, has been pitted against suppressed minority groups which have rallied to hitherto little-known leaders and flourished with Moscow's

Charge and counter-charge have thundered back and forth until it is impossible to know precisely what has happened. Nor can it be said who is right or wrong, for at the ment right or wrong is a matter of a person's political complexion. The only ones who can or should make the final judgment are the people of the countries involved. And that judgment should be the decision of a free election when

the war is over. In the meantime the job is to fight the Germans. Instead we that Greek has killed Greek and Serb and Croat have turned their guns on one another. No one has gained but the Nazis. It is a situation they have fostered and hoped for. And they will continue foster it as long as they can, they base their hope of escap complete defeat on dissension It is their no-longer-secret weapon

It is a tragic, disheartening thing that the men of Warsaw could not die in the knowledge that they had dealt a telling blow against the forces that tortured them and bed them of their freedom. In stead, it was in the knowledge that ey were caught between the nes of, stubborn political con-

THE THIRD FLEET (The New York Sun)

Nimitz said that 1,101 enemy planes were destroyed, probably destroyed or naged, and that between 514 and 524 ships of all types had been nk or crippled. No loss or damage was suffered by American but sixty-one planes, fortytwo pilots and twenty-three of the personnel were missing. These statistics appear to bear out the assertion that in its punishing power this operation has no equal n this war. Furthermore, the dininisning Japanese aerial opposiion—in some places only a few enemy craft ventured into the air give battle and most of those lestroyed were burned on the cround—supports Admiral Nim-tz's contention that Japanese air power in the Philippine area has been broken. 
