Four state conventions in the next 10 days - in Maine, Tennessee, Iowa and Michigan — will test the effect of Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's popular vote appeal on the 'pros" of the Republican par-

In all four states, supporters of Sen. Pobert A. Taft of Ohio have been counting on doing well in their campaign for presiden tial nominating delegates.

Prior to the New Hampshire primary and the large write-in vote for Eisenhower nesota, Taft forces had been confident of getting the bulk of the total of the 108 delegates in-

The people don't vote directly on the choice of delegates in the four states and for that reason the selections are regarded as being largely of the active poli-

dentiai contest. If Taft collects a majority of the delegates, observers will be inclined to discount to some ex tent the lasting effect of primary results such as Eisenhower's victory in New Hampshire and *strong showing in Minnesota.



doesn't apply only to salesmen.

weight merely because he eats more. People with ulcers are advised not to smoke. Smoking increases the acid secretions of the stomach and tends to slow healing of an ulcer, according to some authorities.

Excessive smoking interferes with athletic performance Shortness of breath on exertion after smoking is usual. Athletes in training are not supposed to smoke during the period of their competi-

Many smokers complain of cold hands and feet. This is because the nicotine absorbed causes some of the small lood vessels to contract and, therefore, to carry less varming blood to these regions. BLOOD PRESSURE MAY RISE In some people the tightening of the blood vessels is so great

TAFT FAVORS STATES ON TIDELANDS ISSUE (The Dallas Morning News)

Sen. Robert Taft of Ohio has come out squarely in favor of state ownership of the tidelands. This stand may mean much to Texas. since Taft is one of the leading contenders for the Republican nomination for President. It seems likely that, whoever is the nomi-

nee, the GOP platform will support the states on this issue. The Democratic platform, if Truman forces write it, is expected to come out for federal ownership as it did four years ago. Unless, of course, the Eighty-second Congress shall have returned title to the states. The tidelands may well become the main issue in the Texas vote for President next November. If Taft and Truman should be the contenders. Texas voters would have to choose between retaining

the brass collar or protecting the interests of this state and its school funds. If, in such a contest, the Texas vote should go to Truman, the tidelands likely will be lost permanently to federal control. In that event, Texans will have no excuse to wail. They will have vot-

ed this calamity on themselves. The issue may be almost as plain as that, even if Truman and Taft ald not be the candidates. This likely will be a year in which it will pay Texas voters to look behind party labels and do what they can to avoid loss of this state's


