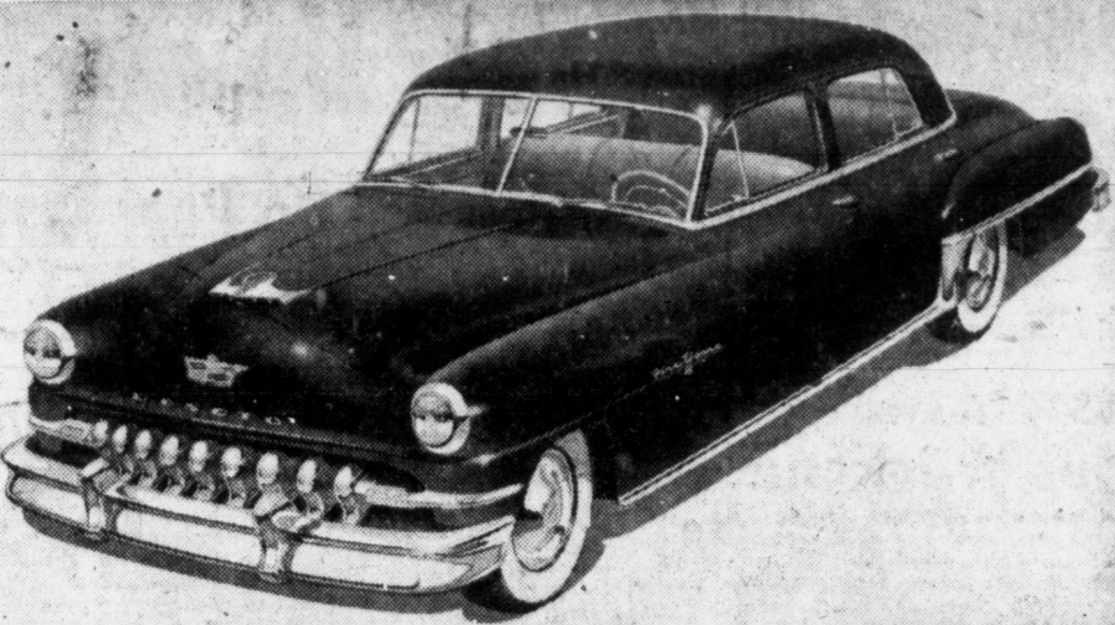

 several veterans organizations expected to support UMT.
 Most of the veterans groups content UMT will spread the requirement for military service more widely, and at the same time build up a reserve that eventually can reduce the expense and size of the regular armed forces.

Russell told a church leader yesterday that the present reserve policy is "unfair and un-American."
 He explained that relatively few of the male military population now serve as volunteers or draftees. Then they go into the reserve. As a result, he said, many World War veterans, with families and new business careers, have been called back for the Korean fighting. Other millions of men escape any service, he said.

"If World War three comes along, these veterans of two wars may be called back a third time," Russell observed.
 Spokesmen for Baptist, Methodist, Mennonite and other Protestant church groups stuck to their opposition on UMT.
 They insisted UMT would violate the American and democratic tradition, might build up a permanent military system and state, and would now bring the security through partially-trained men.

Ike's Opinions As Civilian Now Take On A New Meaning

 NEW YORK — (NEA) — Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's civilian statements on major issues — delivered from 1948 through 1950 — take on fresh meaning today because it is now clear the nation is not to have any new declarations on these topics in the months leading to the national conventions.

Since he became European defense commander in early 1951, the general has been silent on domestic matters. But in the period before, during his tenure as president of Columbia University, he touched specific issues frequently, though always rather lightly.

The views he expressed reflect his endless attention to the aim of preserving individual freedom against both internal and external foes. His overriding concern is to protect the ordinary man from the encroachments of power-hungry government.
 Here are his opinions on many specific issues:

SPENDING
 "If the times demand a sudden and tremendous increase in the budget for defense, reckless extravagance, selfish grabbing, heedless spending of dollars we do not possess will make American citizenship a mortgaged existence rather than a joyous privilege."
 "If solvency and security are not synonymous, they are so closely related that the difference, if any, is scarcely discernible." (Pittsburgh speech, Oct. 19, 1950.)

TAXES
 "How far can a government go in taxing away property rights and still not leave the government the master of the people instead of their servant?" (Fort Worth, Tex., Dec. 15, 1949.)

PROFITS
 "When shallow critics denounce the profit motive inherent in our system of private enterprise, they ignore the fact that it is an economic support of every human right we possess and that without it all rights would soon disappear." (Inaugural address, Columbia University, Oct. 12, 1948.)

WELFARE
 "As we strive to devise measures intended to lessen the shocks and privations incident to old age, to sickness, to unemployment, to natural disaster, let us choose among the several proposals that which best protects our heritage of freedom." (New York Herald Tribune Forum, New York, October, 1949.)

DUTIES OF CITIZENSHIP
 "Stop shuffling off politics as usual to the politicians; stop banking on American luck to get us good government and good policy — sometime it will run out. Stop using the alibi, 'one vote doesn't count.' It won't if not used." (Also from Forum speech, 1949.)

CIVIL RIGHTS
 "Insistently reject any doctrine that acknowledges disparity of right based on class, race or creed." (Speech to DAR, Washington, 1947.)
 "Neglect could be as damaging as attack against us. Moreover, I believe that any among us who embraces Communism or its purposes thereby becomes an enemy of America. By no juggling of words or twisting of ideas can a citizen of this country justify an alliance with the forces of dictatorship and Communist enslavement."
 "Because disloyalty is an offense of the most profound import, we must be especially careful to avoid hurling the charge of Communist against any who may merely disagree with us."
 "Respect for our own free system requires that we speak and act against others with restraint until factual evidence establishes guilt. But in fighting disloyalty we must not let restraint degenerate into indifference to the offense." (Boy Scout meeting, Valley Forge, Pa., July 4, 1950.)

UMT
 "This service will be performed as an obligation... It will demand sacrifice. But can any sacrifice be considered too great, if it can guarantee a lifetime of freedom."
 "On the other side of the coin, the least we owe to this young man in advance is a clear understanding of our problems, aims and plans, with the assurance the sacrifice will cease the instant the necessity passes." (Pittsburgh, October, 1949.)

 in prose or verse probably is explained through word derivations.
 "Valentine" is an alteration of the Old French, "galantine" — from which the English "gallant" was derived. The French word, meaning a lover of the fair sex, became associated with the saint's feast day through similarity and confusion. Literally, presuming this theory is correct, Valentine's day means "lover's day."

A second theory, one more widely accepted, is a common belief traceable to the Middle Ages and ancient times. That February 14 is the day on which all birds mate. The idea grew and, because it was the feast day of the saint, came to be regarded as specially set apart to lovers and the proper occasion for exchanging love tokens.
 The practice of exchanging cards and gifts also seems to grow out of pagan origin. During ancient times in Rome, Feb. 14 was set aside as the eve of purification festival in honor of Juno.

At this festival young Romans were paired off by lot, and the names of women placed in a receptacle to be drawn by the men.
 During the Middle Ages a similar custom existed in England whereby pairs of opposite sex exchanged presents. Later, only the men offered gifts. From this practice probably grew our present day custom.

Pirate Of Old Inspires Fun Day In Florida Town

 TAMPA, Fla. —(P)—The pirate past lives again here in one of the nation's greatest festivals. It is the Carnival of Gasparilla, a five-day holiday of fun and frolic inspired by the deeds and misdeeds of legendary old Jose Gaspar, the bloodiest buccaneer who ever set an honest sailor to the sharks.
 The fete is Florida's equivalent of the Mardi Gras. Each year it draws crowds estimated by police at 500,000 to 8,000,000. People drive up to 200 miles or more to see it, wait up all night in parked cars in order to have a good vantage point for the parade.
 To tourists the celebration is a high-point of the winter season. The festival, begun in 1904 and financed by a wealthy cigar manufacturer, is a surprise and pleased the city. It has grown each year until now civic groups chip in some \$250,000 to make it a success.
 "There is no purpose behind it except for everyone to have a little fun," said one man. That is why it is so popular.
 The mock celebration of his exploits must amaze the ghost of old Jose Gaspar, if he was half the scoundrel he is credited with being.
 He is reputed to have been a Spanish naval lieutenant who led a mutiny, formed his own pirate band and looted and sank at least 36 merchant vessels after forcing their crews to walk the plank. During a visit ashore he is said to have slit his pretty wife's throat because she objected to one of his business transactions.
 At the age of 65, the story goes, old Jose must have got nearsighted, because in 1821 he attacked a U. S. naval brig disguised as a merchant ship. Soon his own ship was fired at cannon holes. Gaspar wrapped a chain around himself, leaped overboard and drowned rather than attend the hemp necktie party he knew would be held in his honor.

Torch-Bearing Skiers Open Olympics; Snow Is Predicted

Irish Invitational Boxing Tournament Opens Thursday

SHAMROCK — (Special) — Gloves regional champ at 126, Shamrock Irish entertain the boxing of the eastern Panhandle here Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights in the annual Irish Invitational tournament. Starting time is 8 p.m. at the Irish American Legion home on South Main.

Callan is busy erecting bleachers for the affair. There will be about 600 reserve seats and the remainder will be general admission seats. Prices are \$1.25 for reserved seats, others \$1.00 and students 50 cents.

Pampa Boys club, Wellington and Lora high schools send their best into the fray. Irish fans are sorry that sensational Dick Murray, Pampa ace at 175, will not be entered, fighting instead at the Fort Worth state Gloves meet.

But the Pampanas have a host of stars, including the aggressive Bobby Wilhelm, a favorite of Irish fans for his stalking qualities and determination.

Lefors will bring Herring, Redus and a galaxy of stars, just as they provided top competition last season for all opponents. Coach Bob Callan, a younger brother of the Irish boxing mentor, is ring-wise and has imparted to his Pirates a style reminiscent of that of his more famous brother. Both were boxing mentors at Midwestern university, Wichita Falls, in college days.

But Wellington's tough stars, winners of the 1951 Irish tourney by a narrow 47-45 margin over Callan's Green-and-White, come loaded for bear.

Coach John Lee's Floyd Hood, regional winner at Amarillo at 185, is picked again to be one of the top stars of the event. Last Saturday night he took a narrow decision from Shamrock's strong boy, Bobby Campbell, who was fighting his first combat of the current season. Campbell's right wasn't working as in 1951, but should he get the lethal weapon in gear, it will be a most exciting match.

Walter Wall, KO winner at Wellington over Davis, will be back for another shot at the 122-pound crown.

IRISH CHAMPION
Kenneth Woods, only Irishman to enter the Amarillo tourney, won the 118-pound class and then proved last week that it was no fluke as he won a decision 30- minutes with his hands and from Jimmie Davis, Wellington's feet tied.

OSLO, Norway — (AP) — A gigantic relay of 100 men on skis today begin carrying the Olympic torch from the birthplace of modern skiing to the opening of the winter Olympic ceremonies in Oslo.

And it looks as if they'll have fresh snow to ski on before the end of their 170-mile journey. The Oslo weather bureau predicts snow in sizeable quantities for southern-Norway sometime tonight — the final touch necessary to get the sixth winter international games off to a perfect start tomorrow.

BOBSLEDDERS

The two-man bobsleds will get the competition underway tomorrow morning with the first of four heats to be run in two days. And after lunch the women skiers take off on the giant slalom at Norefjell, 70 miles north of here.

But the official opening of the game will not take place until Friday morning when the Olympic torch is carried into Oslo's Nislet stadium and the Olympic fire is lighted above the traditional marathon gate.

The relay starts at Moregald with a brief ceremony in the house where Sondre Norheim, Norway's first active competitive skier, lived 100 years ago.

Moregald, in the mountains of western Norway, was the first place where skiers used fastenings on their skis that make possible slalom, downhill and jumping events.

Norheim, who settled in North Dakota, was the first known skier to make his way from Moregald to Oslo on skis.

The American jumping team, which had been training at Kongsberg, broke camp today and came to Oslo to take the world famous Holmenkollen Hill will be opened this afternoon for Olympic training.

SNOW WELCOME
Snow will be mighty welcome in these parts. But the events will go on as scheduled even if the predicted storm doesn't arrive. The only change in the schedule has been the shifting of the women's downhill from Saturday to Sunday.

Soldiers have converted the barren, rocky downhill and giant slalom courses at Norefjell into usable runs against odds that foreigners thought they never could beat. Sub-freezing temperatures have provided excellent ice for speed and figure skaters.

The United States and Canadian hockey teams, highly regarded for Olympic honors, arrived here last night after touring Europe. They will meet tonight in an exhibition game.

Last night Baylor, with an uninspiring 2-5 record, staged an inspired upset of the mighty Texas Longhorns 71-59. At the same time TCU whipped Rice, another 2-5 cellar dweller, by a 83-49 score.

The results gave TCU first place by half a game, the same margin Texas had previously over the Frogs.

The leadership showdown comes Saturday night when TCU and Texas clash in Austin.

Howard Hovde, Bill Harris and Bill Fleetwood gave their best in sparking the Baylor win. Ralph Johnson roped 22 points on seven field goals and eight of the 13 free throws given him. Jim Dowies paced Texas with 13 points.

Texas grabbed a quick lead, then Baylor went wild for 19-7 first quarter margin. The Steers came back but Johnson, Harris and Hovde kept hitting the circle. Baylor led 36-27 at the half. The Longhorns cut the Baylor lead to one point by the end of the third period, but soon afterwards Dowies and the two tallest Longhorns, Don Klein and Ted Price, went out on personals.

Baylor worked the count to 64-47 with four minutes left. Texas outscored the Baylor reserves 12-7 in the last four minutes but the damage had been done.

TCU's victory was the 16th in 19 games. The Frogs hit 31 of 70 field goal attempts and 21 of 29 free throws.

Fruit Appetizers: Cut cold, crisp unpeeled delicious apples into cubes, sprinkle with lemon juice to prevent discoloration, and serve in a bowl with colored toothpicks for spears.



Filing Estimated Tax Return Discussed In Final Article

(Editor's note: this is the last of a series of stories explaining on the back of the same form, how to make out your 1951 income tax return.)

WASHINGTON — This story deals with the problem of (a) filing an estimated tax return on 1952 income, and (b) a new feature in the law called "Head of Household."

The estimated tax — Several million people, including wage earners, won't have the full tax withheld from them, or any tax withheld, in 1952. Doctors, lawyers, landlords, businessmen, for instance, won't have any tax withheld.

Still, the government wants them to be on as much of a pay-as-you-go basis as possible. So for these people March 15, 1952, is a double tax deadline. By that date they must:

1. File a return on their 1951 income tax and pay in full any tax owed.
2. And they must also file an estimate on what their 1952 income will be, and what the estimated tax on it will be. (This is called "declaration of estimated tax.") And when they file that return by March 15 they must start paying the first of four quarterly installments on what that estimated tax is. The other installments are due June 15, Sept. 15 and Jan. 15, 1953.

The wage-earners in this group will pay the difference between the tax withheld from their pay and the full tax they figure they'll owe for the year. Others, with no tax withheld, will have to estimate their income and their full tax and pay quarterly installments on it.

Remember: the income tax in 1952 is higher than the tax on 1951 income. So in figuring the 1952 tax you won't be able to use the table or the tax rates that you used in figuring your 1951 tax.

Instead you must use a special form — called 1040-ES — printed in green ink. On the back is the new tax table for people with under \$5000 income and the new tax rates for people with income of \$5000 or more. (But you can use Form 1040, which was your return for 1951, as a guide in using 1040-ES. The methods used on both are the same. It's the tax rates which are different on the two forms.)

On the back of that Form 1040-ES is a pretty detailed explanation of who must use it to file a declaration of estimated tax.

In trying to decide whether you must file this estimate, be sure to exclude from your estimated 1952 income any income which is tax-free, like social security benefits and benefits under the Railroad Retirement act.

Also, in using 1040-ES, you claim all the exemptions and deductions to which you're entitled. Previous stories in this series explained the 1951 rules on exemptions and deductions. They're unchanged in 1952.

Head of household — In previous years Congress gave married couples a break over single people by letting husbands and wives file joint returns through which they can split their income to get a lower tax.

But some people — either unmarried or legally separated — run a household, with household expenses as large as those of married couples. Until now Congress overlooked them.

Starting in 1952 they get a break. They will in most cases be taxed a little less than single persons who are not heads of a household but a little higher than married couples.

Under the new law, passed last fall, you are a "head of household" if:

1. You are unmarried or legally separated.
2. You furnish more than half the maintenance of your home which is your principal residence in 1952 and which you share with:

3. Any person for whom you are entitled to an exemption, like your mother or father or brother, or —
4. Any person who is your unmarried child, grandchild or stepchild, even though that child has income and can't be claimed as a dependent by you.

If you fit the rule for head of household and have to file an estimated tax return for 1952, you'll find your tax in the table on the back of Form 1040-ES or you can figure out your tax so

You'll notice that if you were a single person, with three exemptions and \$4950 income, your tax would be \$611. If you were a married couple with the same amount of income, claiming three exemptions, your 1952 tax would be \$594.

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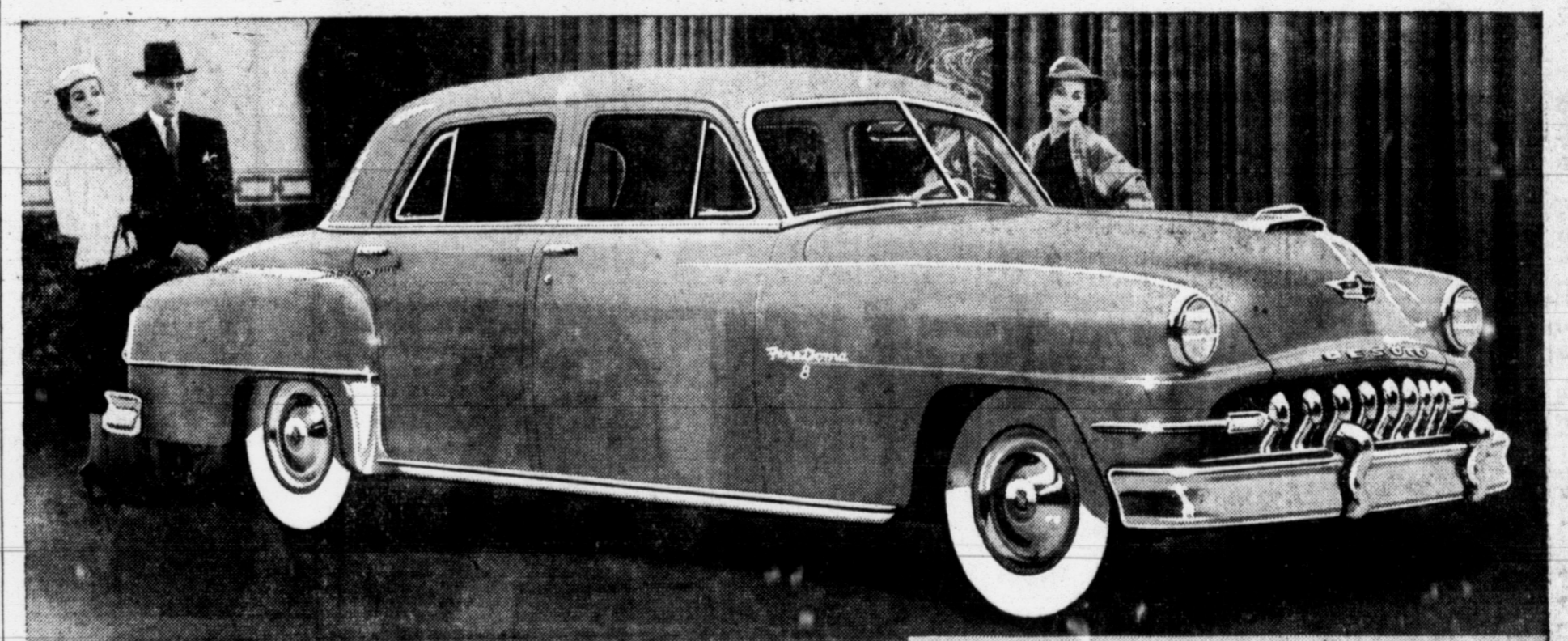
