


Lubbock Feedyard Sells Borden County Graduate Co-Owner/Manager Consolidate

After winning two tournaments the Lady Coyotes continued on with nondistrict play traveling to Roosevelt on 14th, 1998 to face the Lady Eagles. The Lady Coyotes entered the game with a record of 10 and 2 and wanted to improve on that record by defeating the Lady Eagles. The games started out in the Lady Coyotes favor by winning the tip at the beginning of the game. After receiving that tip ball the Lady Coyotes scored the opening points of the game and never looked back with a great first and third quarter effort. The strong defense turned on and the great offensive performance in the game kept the Lady Eagles from having to much success.

The Lady Eagles offense scored 3 baskets in the first quarter and missed 4 free throws for a total of 6 points. The Lady Eagles struggled to get the ball down the court because the Coyotes full-court defense was giving them fits as they continued to have turnover problems. While the Lady Coyotes defense was at work the offense along with stolen passes was converting points. 
