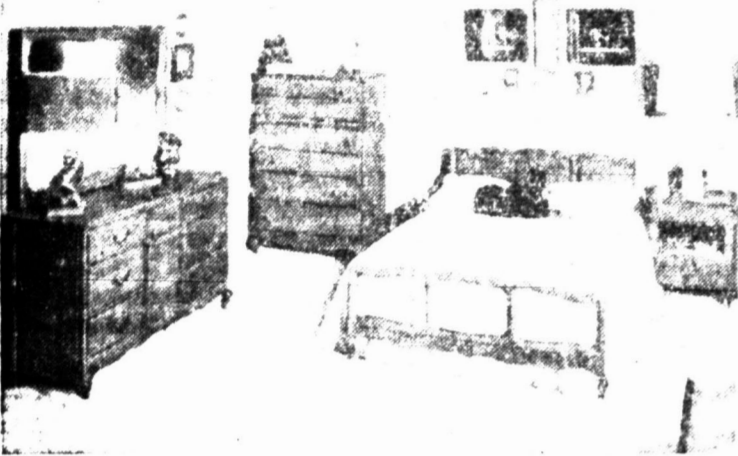

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Remove Paint From Concrete To Install Resilient Tile

More American home-owners are laying their own resilient tile floors to save costs. The reason is that the floor is actually bonded to the concrete, and instead of to the concrete, it will become loose when the paint film is destroyed. The easiest way to remove paint from concrete is with a sanding machine, using No. 4 or No. 5 opencoat sandpaper. After the paint has been removed, the floor should be rinsed with clear water, then washed with one part of muriatic acid in 9 parts of clean water. After another rinse, the floor should be allowed to dry for several days. When the floor is dry, test it by the following simple method: Place a teaspoonful of water on various areas of the floor, and with an eye-dropper drop into each water puddle a few drops of a 2 percent solution of phenolphthalein dissolved in alcohol — a mixture available at any drug store. If the spots turn pink, red or purple, it indicates the alkali has not been neutralized and another bath in the muriatic solution is called for.

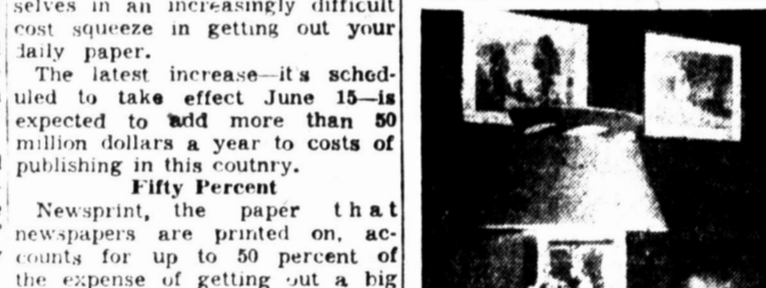
Floor Plans Of The Ashland House Can Be Modified

The Ashland is a basementless house consisting of living room, kitchen, utility room, bath and three bedrooms. A door from the front entrance hall into the utility room makes it available for other uses such as workroom, dining, office, or the door can be omitted if preferred. An insulated floor slab is laid over a cinder or gravel fill and may be covered with hulem, asphalt tile or carpeting. The utility room houses the heating and laundry equipment and also has a closet and storage cabinet. Wardrobe closets, with double doors and overhead storage are provided for the bedrooms, and linen and coat closets in the hall. Exterior finish includes asphalt shingles, plywood gable ends, face brick chimney and wide siding. Overall area is 44 feet by 28 feet. Area is 1224 square feet, while the cubage totals 13,290 cubic feet.

Prepare Brush For Painting Use

Don't put a new brush directly into paint or enamel. If you do, the paint pigment adheres to the bristles and is difficult to remove. Treat it with oil first — it's much easier to clean. Before putting the brush into oil, however, remove any loose bristles by rolling the handle of the brush between the palms of your hands. Then beat the bristles lightly across your fingers. For at least twelve hours before it is to be used, suspend the brush in linseed oil. Be sure that the ends of the bristles do not rest on the bottom of the container. When you're ready to use it, remove the surplus oil by laying the brush on a House Planning Bureau, St. Cloud, Minn. 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FLOOR OF OAK ADDS TO CHARM Dining Room Stages a Comeback

Techniques Of Toy Painting

Many types of toys are painted in halves, with the aid of specially devised conforming masks. From time to time during the operation, the masks must be withdrawn and cleaned of excess paint that collects on the spraying side. Just who tied the first fly that fooled the first herring no one will ever know. But the first actor in this little drama is the May fly. The thousands of miles of shallow shore lines of the Great Lakes have always been the greatest May fly breeding ground in the continent. In the spring and early summer untold billions of them pop up. The herring, normally a deep water fish, swarm shoreward to gorge themselves on the flies. The movement has nothing to do with spawning, since they spawn in the early fall, chiefly in November.

One day in the last ten years or so, somebody decided to offer the herring an artificial May fly. Dalrymple describes the strike this way: A streak of streamlined silver burst out of the water, leaped with tarpon spirit. It flashed in dazzling airborne acrobatics. It tail-walked the water like a small-mouth bass, raced with trout speed, dived and cavorted and in general fought stubborn, ganey rings around anything its own size wearing fins.

It's a sweet new sport from many angles. The rankest dub with the most elemental tackle gets strikes simply because there are so many fish. There's no wading necessary. Since the peak of the inshore herring migration usually occurs in

Old Out-Of-Bounds Rule Is Mental Hazard For Player

(Twelfth of a series as told to Harry Grayson, NEA Sports Editor)

A mental hazard is fear, nothing more or less.

Anything a golfer believes is a mental hazard is one.

A player is conscious of a mental hazard before he makes the shot. This causes him to think of the hazard instead of the target, and thoughts have wings.

The out-of-bounds rule restored this year constitutes a mental hazard to many average players. The new rule penalizes the player stroke and distance, making it three off the tee instead of two.

Even though many duffers disregard the rule, they know the regulation is there, and it causes them to worry.

Many club players are complaining about the restoration of this rule.

They should be asked this question, "Would you let me drop out of an unplayable lie or water hazard for nothing?"

The answer would be "No."

Then they no doubt would agree that a player should be penalized for making what in theory is the worst error possible on a golf course — driving out of bounds.

A water hazard in front of the tee can constitute a mental hazard to a duffer. He will concentrate on the lake and hit the ball into it. The accomplished shotmaker will never be in the water. He knows he can reach the fairway, so completely eliminates the lake from his thoughts.

Players erect mental hazards around certain holes and clubs.

How many times have you heard a golfer say, "I hate that No. 4 hole. I just can't get to the green," or something to that effect? That player is building a first-class mental hazard for himself.

Say a player has taken an eight on a certain hole. That is likely to leave a bit of apprehensiveness, and he's liable not to play the hole well in the future.

The golfer who says, "I'm not playing my No. 5 iron well," is feeding a Grade A mental hazard.

Even the greats suffer from mental hazards, but they do

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Joe Routt Named To Texas Hall Of Fame

DALLAS (AP) — Joe Routt, who won all-American fame at Texas, and glory for his country in the Battle of the Bulge of World War II, today was named to the Texas Sports Hall of Fame.

Routt was an all-America guard at Texas A&M in 1936 and 1937. He died in the Battle of the Bulge. A company captain of the 102nd Infantry division, he first was listed as missing, then was reported killed Dec. 10, 1944. He was awarded a Bronze Star medal posthumously.

Routt's memory will be honored at a Hall of Fame dinner to be given in Dallas early in June by the Texas Sports Writers Association, which sponsors the hall.

Those eligible for the election to the Texas Sports Hall of Fame are the athletes, male and female, living or dead, whose achievements "have brought lasting fame and honor to Texas."

Routt's name will be the third inscribed in the Hall of Fame. The first nominee was Tris Speaker, former major league baseball player, and the second was Ben Hogan, three-time National Open golf champion.

In other words, the works: A man with a fluttering putter and anaemic long irons would be gone over by specialists in each complaint. Instead of trusting himself, as he has in the past, to a general practitioner, he would have so much more instruction, practice and play based upon the length of time he was going to be there and the type and degree of training he needed.

"After an initial examination, during which a student would be classified as beginner, intermediate or advanced, he would be assigned to one or more pros for intensive individual coaching during his stay."

It would not even be necessary to staff the various branches of the Dunedin spa. The place is crawling with professionals from all over the country, especially during the winter when scores of teachers from snowed-in northern clubs go there to hibernate. As matters stand now, they can keep their touch only by dissecting each other's games, and that could easily breed a feeling of futility.

"Complete records would be kept on every student," the Digest stipulates, "and each would be given a progress report to take home with him, analyzing faults, outlining remedies and suggesting further training and practice. A copy of this report would also be sent to whatever home town the student had designated."

Makes Him Stand Out
"It is entirely possible that

home town pros would receive "referral fees" for members they sent to the clinic. They certainly would benefit from follow-up and check-up lessons after the student returned home. Eventually sub-clinics, staffed by local pros trained at Dunedin, could be held in other parts of the country at other times of the year.

We do not feel personally that the business about "referral fees" should have been brought into the open. It smacks too much of fee-splitting, a practice which is frowned upon in better professional circles. Otherwise, the entire plan strikes one as

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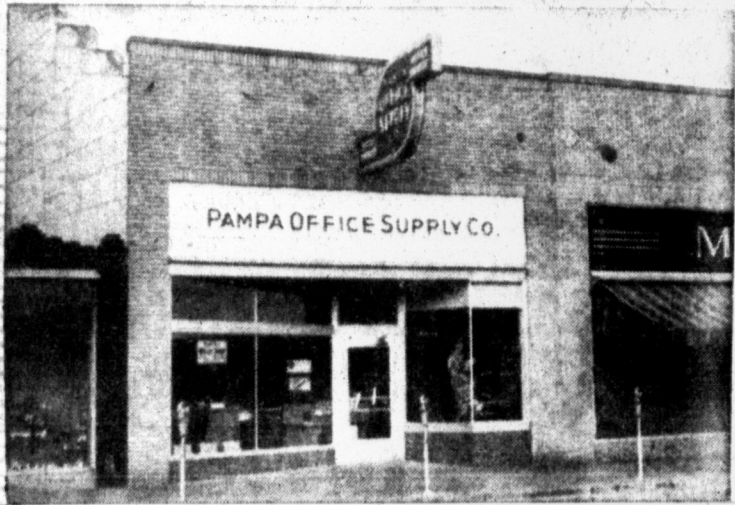
