

Parental Duties

A group of San Francisco ministers started a mighty ruckus by enlisting the aid of a committee of teen-agers to test the degree of enforcement of state statutes prohibiting the sale of liquor to minors. They found that in San Francisco, at least, it's remarkably easy for a minor to buy whisky, wine or beer, particularly in the self-service stores.

The ministers' survey made quite a splash in the S. F. papers and caused a curious chain reaction. Some people bitterly assailed the ministers for making "stool pigeons" of children. Police complained the problem is difficult because some unscrupulous printers sell teen-agers faked identification cards listing their age as 21. Some youth leaders contended there is no teenage drinking problem

Board of Equalization member George R. Reilly issued an order prohibiting self-service merchandising of liquor, but revoked the ban after being inundated by proprietors of liquor and grocery stores who pointed out that the expense of setting up separate departments to handle liquor sales quite likely would put them out of busi-

One of the most sensible arguments in the whole controversy was made by Mr. Reilly, who pointed out that parents can't expect a government agency to raise their children for them. Laxness in law enforcement, where it exists, can be corrected; but the chief responsibility for prevention of juvenile delinquency will remain a parental responsibility.

Then you're doubled up in the aisle, especially when you see that only generals and commissors are riding at all. Even Groucho isn't so funny, after all.

"Or Karl's line about the miserable hovels in which workers must live stiff with cold as they huddle about the charcoal brazier. You don't get that until Saturday night when you hear the furnace click on and you notice that the only thing huddled around the charcoal brazier are the hamburgers. That stretches you out holding your

"Funny thing is, that only under capitalism is there ever enough money for comedians. So when it comes to comics, we've made our choice. Groucho can stick to romantic roles, where both he and his countless admirers will have more fun. We'll stick to Karl. He's the biggest. laugh of all times."



They Preached Liberty"

I am indebted to Rev. Raymond A. Waser, minister of the First Congregational Church of Pasadena for calling my attention to the book "They Preached Liberty" and for loaning it to me since, it is out of print.

"They Preached Liberty" refers to the ministers of New England prior and during the Revolutionary Period.

The book is edited by Franklin P. Cole. He quotes from 49 different ministers from 1750 to 1784. Many of these quotations were before the Battle of Lexington, the start of the Revolution, on Armit 19 1775.

The author quotes Rev. Moses . Parsons as stating his conception of the duty of ministers to be:

"Watchmen upon the walls must not hold their peace-they must cry and not spare, must reprove for what is amiss, and warn when danger is approaching." It is hard to conceive how minis-

ters could be of a greater service to their fellowman than to do exactly what Rev. Parsons said, and what these 49 ministers did during the Revolutionary period. They certainly did much to create public opinion for liberty and freedom.

The author describes these socalled "Election Sermons" of Massachusetts, Connecticut, New Hampshire, and Vermont, In these sermons the ministers expressed themselves most fluently on the subject of civil government. According to the Rev. William Gordon or Roxbury, an historian of the Revolution:

"Two sermons have been preached annually for a length of time, the one on general election day, the last Wednesday in May, when the new general court has been used to meet, according to charter, and elect counsellors, for the ensuing years; the other, some little while after, on the artillery election day, when the offi-cers are re-elected, or new officers




