Says Solons Stingy With Civil Defense

WASHINGTON (AP)—Federal civil defense officials believe the records will show Congress has been stingy with funds for the national civil defense program than for any other major program. And they say they wonder why.

They point to these figures: Budget request for the year which started July 1, 600 million dollars, voted by Congress, 43 million, or little more than 7 per cent.

Requested for the year 1951-52, 525 million; voted by Congress \$74,900,000.

Budget request for 1950-51, after Congress authorized a comprehensive national civil defense program, 463 million; Congress voted 31 million.

Civil defense officials say that when the 1950-51 appropriation was being considered, the House approved \$18,24 million and the Senate 85 million but a Senate-House conference committee, without explanation, reduced the funds to 31 million.

President Truman and Civil Defense Administrator Millard Caldwell have repeatedly appealed to Congress for more money for a strong civilian defense program.

"We simply cannot afford a penny-wise-pound foolish attitude about the cost of adequate civil defense," Truman told Congress April 24.

Little Price Change For Pampa Foods Despite OPS Decontrol

Little price change in the Pampa area is contemplated for canned and frozen fruits and vegetables as a result of the recent governmental decontrol law.

A spot check of five local groceries bore out this statement and indicated that, if anything, prices might well drop on such items.

The Office of Price Stabilization was forced to take the decontrol action, Price Stabilizer Elis Arnall noted, under an amendment that Congress tacked on the economic controls law. Arnall predicted this would mean higher prices for a number of items.

Local reaction is particularly interesting—and encouraging—in light of Arnall's prediction.

Both Boston Superette Market, 210 N. Ward, and Brannon I.G.A. Market, 612 S. Cuyler, figured that prices would not change, unless the wholesaler showed up his prices. Competition was the reason given.

Lewis Andrews, manager of Furr Food Store, 125 N. Somerville, insisted that prices should remain stable because prices have been "awfully high, anyhow," and also there is supposed to be a large surplus of fruits and vegetables. If anything, Andrews predicted, there was a good chance for a price cut.

Buddy's Super Market, 318 N. Cuyler, reported that prices on such goods should remain the same, as long as wholesale prices did not increase. Prices are "high enough" was Buddy's comment.

Even if wholesale prices do go up, consumer prices on these items will probably stay where they are, according to Ideal Food Store, 220 N. Cuyler. No change is contemplated; but a few articles, Ideal reported, might increase a little in price.

Argument Ends In Death

WASHINGTON (AP)—An argument that flared up when an attractive Pentagon employe walked nude into the living room of her apartment, apparently unaware a man was painting it, is believed to have led to her strangulation—murder.

The victim was Miss Cordie A. Whitman, 39, whose fully clothed body was found in a bedroom closet of her apartment yesterday, two days after her murder. She came to Washington about six years ago from Cumberland, Md.

Police have charged Harry Clifford Porter, 24, airman 3c attached to the 1025th Air Force Squadron, with her death. He is a native of Casper, Wyo.

Police report this is the story they have pieced together: Porter, a gangling, bespectacled Korean War veteran, apparently had taken the job of painting the apartment to pick up some extra money. He was hired by the apartment manager.

He entered Miss Whitman's apartment Saturday and began painting. Apparently not knowing Porter was there, Miss Whitman walked nude from her shower into the living room. Angry words followed, and she went into her bedroom.

Porter told police she kept opening her bedroom door and he kept shutting it and later she came out and "jumped" at him. At this point, he said, he suffered a dizzy spell, and remembers nothing until he saw her lying on the floor dead.

He then picked up her body, he said, and moved it into a bedroom closet.

The body was not found until yesterday after Pentagon friends of Miss Whitman, knowing she had a heart ailment, became alarmed when she failed to report for work.

Porter was arrested when he returned to the building last night to continue painting.

Chaplain Saves Soldier's Life

INDIANTOWN GAP, Pa. (AP)—An Army chaplain climbed a 100-foot water tower on the military reservation here yesterday and talked a soldier out of a suicidal leap from the top.

While Lebanon Fire Chief John Potrok and a group of soldiers held a net at the foot of the tower, Col. J. K. Connelly mounted the structure and convinced the G. I., who had threatened to jump to climb down.

Army authorities withheld the name of the soldier. He was taken to post doctors for observation.

Former Pampa Man Dies In Raton, N. M.

MIAMI (Special)—Miami relatives were notified Monday of the death of C. B. Locke, former Pampa resident, at his home in Raton, N. M., Sunday night, from a heart attack.

Funeral service will be held, Tuesday, in Raton.

Mr. Locke was born April 12, 1883, at Mobeetie. In 1896, he came with his father, the late N. F. Locke and family, to Miami. He was a member of the original firm of Locke Bros., for a number of years before going into business for himself, in Platteville, and later, Pampa in the early 1920's. For the past ten years, until moving at Raton, two years ago, he had lived in Amarillo.

Survivors are his widow, Mary Coffee Locke, Big Spring; one son, C. B. Locke, Jr., Dallas; two daughters, Mrs. Bill Mann, Winton, Calif.; and Mrs. A. Swartz, Big Spring; three grandchildren; and three brothers, New Locke, Dallas; W. F. and C. T. Locke, Miami.

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REPUBLICAN PLATFORM

CHICAGO (AP) — Here is a comparison of the major points of the 1952 Republican platform — as proposed by the Resolutions Committee to the national convention — with the party's 1948 platform.

Foreign policy — Both set a just peace and a free world as their goal. Both endorse the United Nations and collective security arrangements with freedom-loving countries, and spurn appeasement. Both endorse "self-help" types of assistance to other peace-loving nations. The 1948 plank gave stronger endorsement to economic aid programs than this year's.

The 1952 plank is sharply more critical of President Truman's conduct of foreign affairs than was the 1948 platform.

National defense — The 1948 plank promised to maintain air, land and sea forces at levels that would insure the nation's security. The 1952 plank, calling existing military strength "disgracefully lagging," promises to develop it with utmost speed, with emphasis on air power and an abundance of atomic weapons.

Communism — The 1952 plank is much more critical of the administration's attitude toward communism, charging it has appeased the Reds both at home and abroad and allowed them to serve in many government agencies. It also claims Truman policies are responsible for Russian possession of the atomic bomb and present threats to world peace.

Small business — Both planks promise to encourage small business through anti-monopoly action, elimination of unnecessary

China Beefs Armed Forces

HONG KONG (AP) — An order from Peking says that 5 per cent of Red China's total population is going to be taken into the nation's huge armed forces — mainly in the militia.

This 5 per cent order is considered to be more a Red target for propaganda use than actual hope, because the Communists already have far more militia than they have arms and equipment for.

The order says that in the new draft, physically able men from 18 to 25 are to be added to the militia as rapidly as possible.

China's population is generally computed at 450 million. Five per cent of that would be 22 1/2 million. Add that to the 12 to 20 million already in the armed forces and you get possibly 42 million.

It seems out of the realm of possibility for the Chinese Reds to maintain forces, even half-time militia, of that size.

Peking probably will leave up to provincial and regional governments the amount of expansion their militia can stand.

The exact Chinese Communist military strength is not known. Estimates run up to 20 or 21 million.

The Red Army in the last 18 months was expanded by drafts upon the militia. It probably is between three and four million now.

Regional forces, which serve only in home areas, may run to two million.

Estimates on the militia run all the way from five to 15 million. Most observers think five or six million is correct.

Rig Activity Still Dropping

DALLAS — A total of 2800 rigs were active in oilfields of the United States and Canada for the week of July 7, 1952, according to a report to American Association of Oilwell Drilling Contractors by Hughes Tool Company. This total compares with 2850 a week ago, 2994 a month ago, and with 2702 in the comparable week of 1951.

A comparison by principal areas for the past two weeks shows:

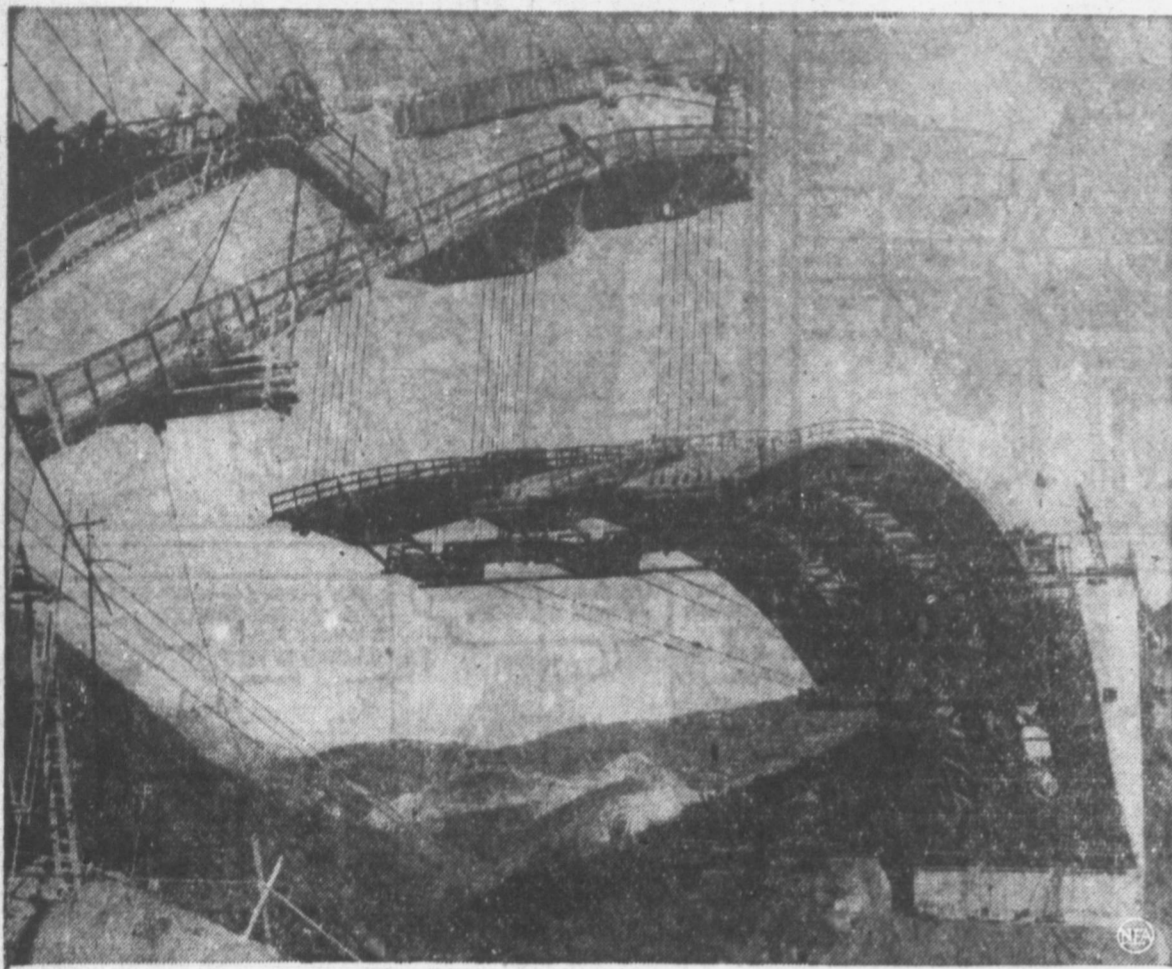

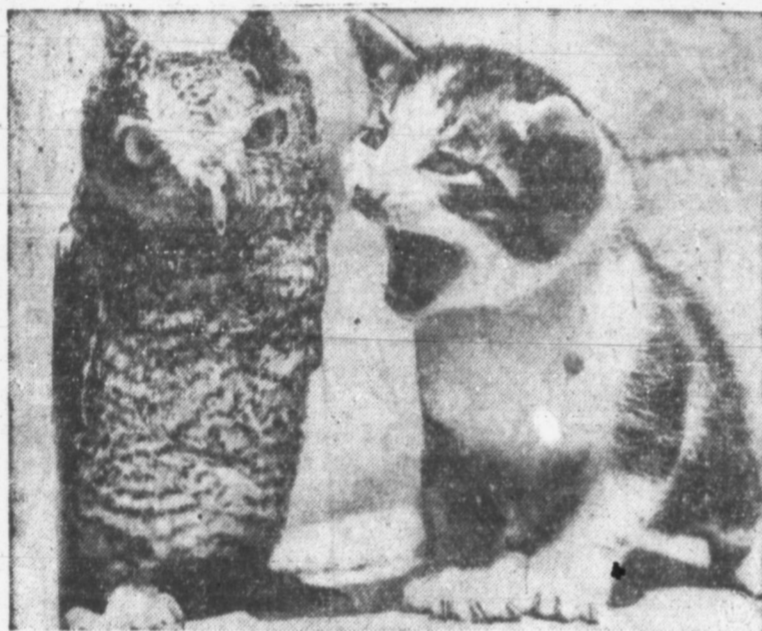

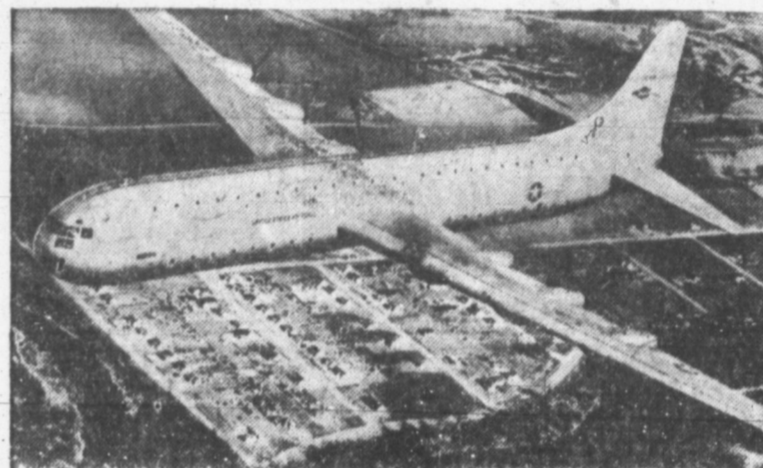

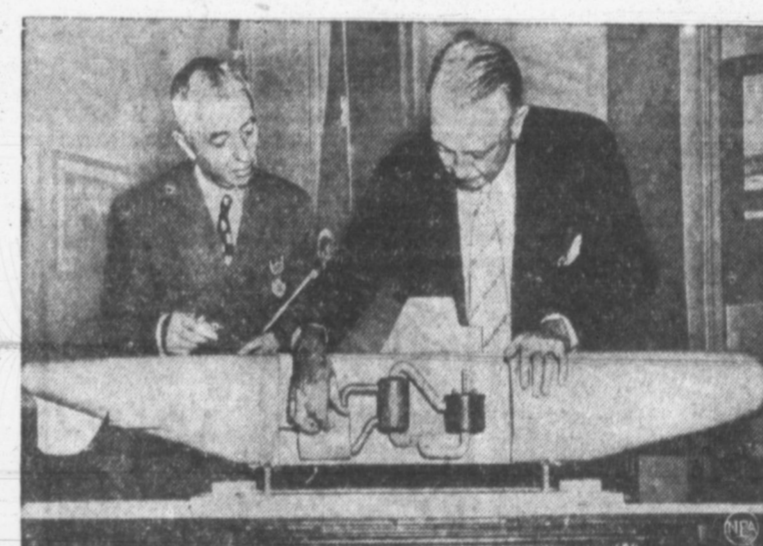

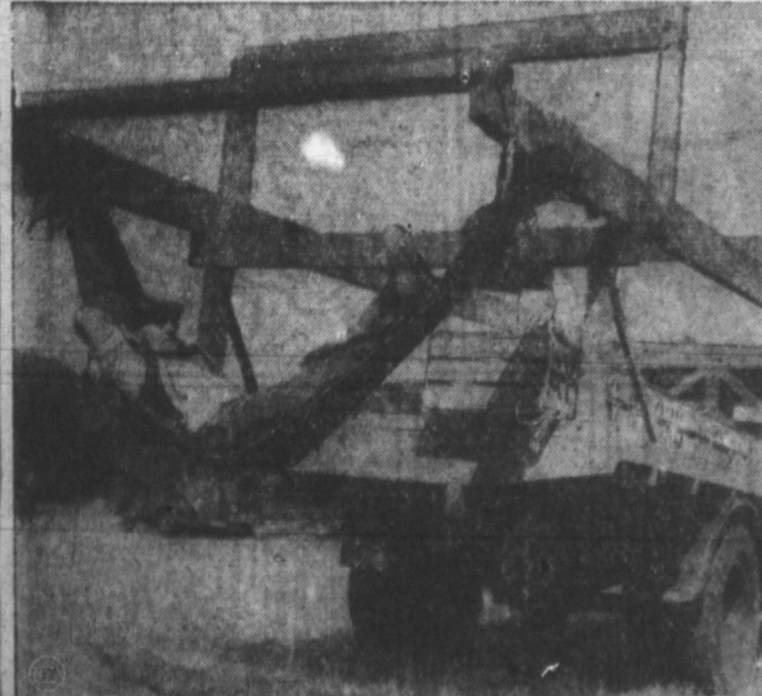

According to Rickover's model, the pug-nosed vessel carries a furnace in which uranium reacts, produces heat to make steam and revolve turbines operating two propellers. A heavy shield will protect the crew from radioactivity.

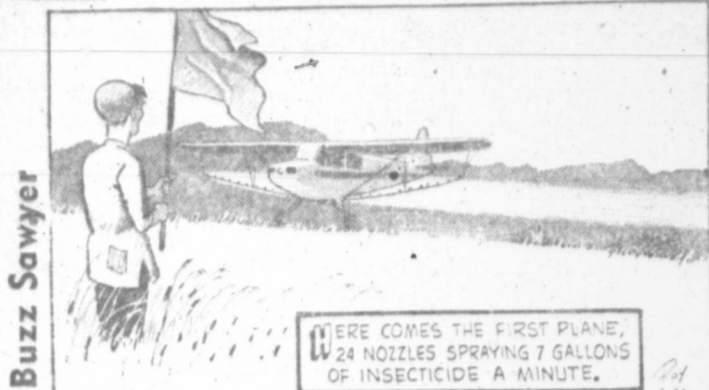

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Days Of Bossy Husband Are Numbered In Germany

 BONN, Germany (AP)—In West Germany the days of the bossy husband are numbered.

The government has just prepared a draft law to give the little woman an equal say in all family matters.

It's a revolutionary step. German men long have contended that women should have only three interests—kinder, kirche, kuche—children, church, kitchen—with the man bossing all.

Until now, German law has supported this idea. Women have few legal rights in marriage or the home in Germany.

But the constitution adopted in 1949 says there shall be no discrimination between the sexes. The new equality for women bill is intended to comply with this provision.

Under present law, the husband has full power of decision in all joint questions. If the wife receives rent from a house she owns, she must turn over the money to her husband.

The husband's approval is required before the wife can open a bank account. The husband can dispose of jointly owned property without her consent.

All these things would be eliminated under the new bill which soon will go to Parliament. Approval there is considered certain.

The bill would permit wives to control property they owned before marriage.

All property gained by husband and wife after marriage would be jointly controlled.

If a couple divorces, the new bill provides that property gained

during marriage should be divided on the basis of who earned the more—husband or wife.

Under the new bill, a woman after marrying can also retain her own name, along with her husband's, in hyphenated form if she wishes.

The new bill also clamps some new obligations on women.

Under the present-law the husband is required to make the living for the family. The new bill requires both husband and wife to earn the family living costs. If they divorce, the husband would not be required fully to support the wife if she is able to work.

The new bill restricts the right wife to earn a living for the family if the husband is unable to work. Present law requires the state to care for men physically unable to earn a living.

The new bill restricts the right of the husband to name children and select their schools. He has absolute authority now. In the future the husband and wife must make joint decisions.

One point the new bill doesn't answer is what happens if the husband and wife can't agree.

Doweries for young brides also are eliminated under the new bill. The reason: Girls now receive the same education as boys and it costs just as much. So there is no more need to compensate new husbands.

Communist Yugoslavia Looks Forward To Increased U. S. Aid

BLLED, Yugoslavia (AP)—Communist Yugoslavia is looking forward to stepped-up American military aid—including jet planes, tanks and heavy artillery.

A ranking U.S. military team found Premier Marshal Tito's fighting forces in excellent shape.

The decision to greatly strengthen the American aid program to this anti-Soviet ally was announced this week at a formal dinner given by Tito at his summer palace here for the U.S. mission headed by Frank C. Nash, special assistant to Defense Secretary Robert Lovett.

Four U.S. generals present have a highly favorable report of their first hand inspection of Yugoslav forces and their use of the limited aid already received. The American officers were Maj. Gen. Geo.

Complains Polio Funds Inadequate

AUSTIN (AP)—State Health Officer George W. Cox, greatly discouraged about the record outbreak of polio, complains his department is handicapped by totally inadequate funds.

"I go out to look at his polio situation over the state, and I come back feeling more discouraged than ever," Dr. Cox said.

A short time earlier he reported polio cases had dropped to 163 last week, but that was still the second worst polio week in Texas history. The high-tide mark came the week before with 206 cases.

"There's no question about it—I fear we're going to have more polio than we've had in any other year," he told the Associated Press.

He said he feels handicapped to help meet such situations because of the small amount of money allotted by the state for its health program.

"We are right down near the bottom of the states now, getting about 20 cents per capita in state appropriation," Dr. Cox said.

He plans to fight for more than double that amount when the legislature meets next year. He has won approval from his State Board of Health for a res-
