WASHINGTON - (AP) -A top CIO leader today termed Dwight D. Eisenhower, Republican presidential candidate, a "rank amateur in the field of civil government and said that on major domestic issues he would be a "prisoner of his own advisers.

Joseph A. Beirne, a CIO vice president and head of 300,000 CIO communications workers, said in an interview before leaving for Chicago and the Democratic presidential convention:

"Eisenhower has unquestionably been a great military leader but if he is elected President he will be helpless on the great domestic issues facing the country such as the Taft-Hartley Labor Law, civil rights legislation, federal aid to the states and others.

Depends On Advisors "He will have to depend completely on his advisors in making domestic policy decisions, rather than making up mind

Beirne is a member of the Platform committee at the Democratic National Convention. One of the CIO's newer and younger leaders, he is sometimes regarded as a possible successor to CIO President Phillip Murray.

Some segments of organized labor have been criticizing Eisenhower for months. The CIO, staunch supporter of Democratic national candidates ever since its formation in 1936, recently said ditorially in one of its 1 tions that Eisenhower's campaign was "out-Tafting Taft. 











