



eight nations taking part. The large U.S. naval force inwolved had orders to stay out of Baltic in order not to invite an incident with Russia. But the 3-day exercise includes an amphibious landing in Denmark and a counterattack against "enemy" invaders of Northern Norway. Norway's northern frontier touches Russia.

More than 85,000 men. including 40,000 U. S. sailors and Marines, are involved in the operation, along with British, Canadian, American, Belgian, Dutch, French, Norwegian and Danish warships.

The big U. S. carriers Franklin D. Roosevelt and Midway, the battleship Wisconsin, the smaller carriers Wasp and Wright, and numerous cruisers, destroyers, smaller vessels and a supply train are engaged.

# When To Zig And When To Zag

The art of national politics is knowing when to zig as well as when to zag, and this principle applies to Dwight Eisenhower's Far Western chances because:

1. He could lose out in Texas by not trying hard enough.

2. He could lose out in California by trying too hard. The Texas situation as pertains to Eisenhower can be briefly summarized as a ripe apple on the bough. If Ike comes to Texas in a series campaign, if he gives the limb a good shake, the fruit will fall into his hands. He can win the Lone Star State if he sets his mind to it: In fact, he can't miss winning Texas unless he neglects to make the strenuous efforts which are normally required for any worth-while success.

But California is different. Eisenhower can get licked there if he lets himself get over-extended. There is, for example, an attempt to present lke not only as a Republican but as a candidate who is above Republicanism. This method might work in the one-party South, but the effect in California is confusing. In beating the bushes for members to the Citizens for Eisenhower Clubs, the California Ike-backers are saying:

"You must support Eisenhower as an individual. You can do so without supporting the Republican party which is no good anyhow.

Now, this is obviously a method which can carry a disastrous backfire. It's true that Ike is a ready-made celebrity and a political newcomer with all the purity of inexperience. It's also true that the GOP minority political group with a long record of finishing second in presidential races. But there is no sense in pretending that Eisenhower is bigger or better than his party.

He and his backers put on an expensive fight to gain the GOP nomination. Moreover, Ike had two or more chances to accept the Democratic nomination at the hands of Democratic leaders. He rejected these all-but certain opportunities to run for the presidency on the majority ticket. He chose to stand for nomination and election as a Republican. It would seem that lke is the last man in the country whose affiliations should be disguised. In a two-party State, it appears completely foolish to give the impression that the GOP candidate is ashamed of his party, or vice versa.

"For contrary to academic cliches, the intellectual Left dominates American colleges today. 

The GOP effort to attract the California labor vote is another example of over-doing the job. Speakers and pamphleteers are now carrying the GOP party line which states that Federal taxes are seriously hurting the middle income group. A big point is made of some figures which show that the bulk of taxation is paid by persons earning over \$4000 and under \$12,000 a year. The figures are being hawked around the neighborhoods where rentals represent this income spread and where the inhabitants trek off each morning for an industrial plant which pays them substantial wages.

Are these people about to change their party out of self-interest? No, indeed. They may be paying three-digit income taxes but they are drawing four-digit and fivedigit wages.

The GOP is overplaying the taxation issue. There is not much chance that Eisenhower's election would lower either wages or taxes. There is no reason to think that Ike's victory would cause any lessening of the world's tensions or bring an end to the Korean conflict. Eisenhower cannot abolish inflation or war. It's doubtful if this giddy nation is really ready to vote for deflation and peace.


But what Ike can do, maybe, is to establish a government which does not rely on inflation and war. He can. perhaps, bring about a slow-down, then a halt, and finally a reversal of the destructive trend. To say this much - adding always the maybes and the perhapses is about as much as the GOP can honestly claim for lke.



In 1913, after a sufficient number of states had ratified the 16th amendment, a seeminaly innocuous law was passed by Congress permitting a levy on the income of individuals and corporations. Count von Bernstorff. then the German Ambassador to the United States, said: "You have adopted an income tax. That is the beginning. You will have more and more burdensome taxes. What amazes me is that your people seem intent upon following our example, instead of developing the system provided by your Constitution. Wait a few years and see the result!"

Von Bernstorff may have been a poor diplomat but he was a good prophet. Beginning in 1914, with a very modest share of the citizens earnings, this tax is now extracting from individuals alone more than 27 billion dollars per year or 450 dollars for every working person in the country.

Taxation in the United States has passed the point of oppression. About all that can be said is that the tax forms of our Internal Revenue Department do not yet bear the flourish of a royal decree.



the same reason that children tattle on each other. Andy's mother reports his mistakes to people whom they do not concern be-cause she needs reassurance. She is doubtful of the way she has handled his misbehavior that she wants someone to say soothingly, "He certainly is a handful. How tired you must be."



# **PARADE OF HOMES**

#### DESCRIPTION OF LOW COST HOMES

BUILT BY LYNN BOYD LUMBER YARD

Compiled by Jess Taylor for City of Pampa Tax Department

July 31, 1952

Amended --- September 12, 1952

#### TYPE OF BUILDING:

Residential - 2 and 3 bedrooms - constructed by Lynn Boyd Lumber Yard and are known as his low price housing project. At the present time he has completed one block of 11 residences, in Block 18, Wilcox Addition, and houses built for individuals at 229 Tignor Street, 2107 Coffee Street, 2106 Hamilton Street, 2122 Hamilton Street and 404 Doucette Street.

#### FOUNDATION:

Concrete slab, acting both as foundation and floor. This slab is poured over a bedding of sand, and is only on top of the ground, and no part of this goes beneath the surface of the ground. The slab is reenforced on sides with 1/2" steel bars, and throughout the level with steel wire reinforcing mesh. Around the edges, this concrete is 8" thick, and 8" wide, and the remainder of the floor is 4" thick throughout. Where there is a garage attached to the residence, that part of the floor is poured with the rest of the residence and on the same level.

#### FLOORS:

See Foundation for Base of Floors. Asphalt Tile is laid over the concrete in the residence, making the floor covering. Hardwood flooring can be used, at extra cost, and is only applied when purchaser requests this change. Several of the above mentioned homes have oak flooring instead of asphalt tile.

#### **BOTTOM PLATES:**

2x4 Redwood (which is an everlasting species of lumber) is placed over a water proof sill sealer so that no water can possibly get into the house under the bottom plates. The Redwood 2x4's - plates - are termite proof.

#### WALLS:

Interior: The interior walls are 1/2"- Sheetrock, and some are finished with Textone, Rubberized Base Paint, and others have wall paper. Decorative sheetrock has been used on some of these houses, and does not need painting or wall paper on same. The cost is practically the same. The Decorative sheetrock is used in all closets including the hot water heater closet, and does not need painting and this is done in order to save time in building these homes. Exterior: Exterior walls are of various types, either Redwood, Douglas Fir or Yellow Pine wood siding, and some are sheeted solid with wood and asbestos shingles applied. The cost of these various types of exterior walls are very nearly the same, so the choice of the buyer is taken into consideration when completing the houses.

#### HEATING:

The 2 bedroom houses are equipped with a 35,000 BTU Coleman Wall Furnace. The 3 bedroom houses are equipped with a Duplex 45,000 BTU Coleman Wall Furnace.

#### **INSULATION:**

Walls and ceilings of all of these low cost homes are fully insulated with proper insulation used for that purpose, maning a comfortable home inside in summer and winter.

#### WIRING:

These houses are well equipped for outlets, 2 in each bedroom, 3 in kitchen, 3 in living room, and one in bath. Each ceiling light and outside light is controlled by wall switch. Wiring and fixtures are suitable to type, but not elaborate.

#### **PLUMBING:**

Each house has modern plumbing with automatic hot water heater. Water lines are copper tubing. The water pipe is brought up through the floor through a tile placed in the concrete for that purpose, and the gas pipe is brought up beside the house on outside of walls, so that the only plumbing embedded in the concrete floor is the cast iron drainage system. The plumbing in kitchen and bath is back to back on the same wall, and in case of needed repairs, it is easy for the plumbers to get to the different pipes if necessary to repair same.

#### ROOF:

The roof is almost flat, having approximately 2" fall in 13 feet. It is built up of 2 layers of 55 lb. saturated felt applie with cold method cement and coated with a high grade asbestos roof coating, and is considered good for ten years or more. This roof will last many years if another treatment of roof coating is applied every 2 or 3 years.



#### LOAN VALUE:

These homes are being financed through the Security Federal Savings and Loan Association, of Pampa, and they carry a 75% loan, based on the selling price. This loan is on a 10 year pay out. They have a very unique and complicated plan for financing these homes, but a fair one, with seller and the loan company both participating in the loan until the seller receives his equity of the sale price, which takes 40 months for the seller to get his balance due him. These homes are not built under FHA or GI supervision, so FHA or GI loans are not aailable; however, they can be brought up to FHA and GI specifications by considerable extra cast and delay in constructing these homes

#### **SELLING PRICE FOR HOMES:**

The above prices are figured on 50 ft. lot, valued at \$500.00, and includes concrete sidewalks and walk to house. 3 Bedroom homes on 60 x 75 ft. lot with garage attached .... \$6500.00.

#### CONSTRUCTION:

These houses are constructed practically on an assembly lines basis. All the studs and rafters are cut to length and sizes needed, at the lumber yard, as this saves time in construction and reduces cost of carpenter labor. The floor construction has been previously explained. The walls are constructed with 2x4 studs on 24" centers when 1/2" sheetrock is used, and on 16" centers when 3-8" sheetrock is used. However, the majority of these homes have 1/2" sheetrock. The homes which have wood siding have insulation applied between the outside wall sides tacked in between the walls. The homes having asbestos shingles applied, have insulation between the storm sheathing and the asbestos shingles. The ceiling rafter and joist is a combination ceiling joist and rafter, and is tapered to make the drop in the roof and give the necessary pitch for drainage. The rafters are on 24" centers and have proper insulation between the roof and ceiling. On the 2 bedrooms with garage, it takes the carpenter crew an average of 7 to 8 days to complete the carpenter work, which includes the running of the concrete slab and the laying of asphalt tile floor. The job is then turned over to the painters who complete this home in about 3 days. The plumber has already finished his work. Then the electrician sets the fixtures. So, you might say within 10 days after a job is started, the home is ready for occupancy. All carpenters and painters and other workmen are first class workmen and draw top wages. Where the big saving comes in, is in the floor and the roof and the coordination of all workmen on the job.

#### PERSONAL SYNOPSIS OF WRITER:

The above facts have been gathered by the writer from the very beginning of construction of these residences, and are presented with my best efforts with all fairness and consideration, and as nearly correct as possible. Any error or misrepresentation has not been intentional. In general, these residences are very liveable, make a very nice little home, and are economical, but are not built to all the detailed specifications of FHA or GI homes, and only time will tell whether they have the durability of the supervised FHA and GI homes. If they do have the durability, they wil lhave been a great boost to the low cost housing project of private enterprise. I am told, the principal reason for the building of these houses is to combat public housing, which is sponsored by the government with our tax money. The last statement is the spark behind the efforts of the builders and business men to start on these new projects, with the interest of our own particular locality in mind.


The original idea of these homes originated in San Angelo, Texas, by the Armstrong Brothers Lumber Company. They were built with concrete blocks. However, I believe the original plan has been improved on considerably, as these Pampa homes have a better roof, all windows and doors fully weatherstripped, and insulation in all walls and ceilings. 




Interior Scene at 1009 E. Murphy on Display


