TOKYO (P) — The Japanese er mission to The Philippines to urge three imperial Japanese Army holdouts to call off the war on Lubang Island.

For seven years, the trio have resisted all inducements to surrender. Kyodo News Service said the new attempt will be a major peace offensive.

The surrender mission will distribute leaflets, newspapers, letters and photographs from families of the three. They also will play tape recordings from the families telling the holdouts the war is over-come home.

If an accident should occur and the driver has not been alert-has failed to keep a proper look-outhe may be charged with "improper look-out" as a traffic violation and also held liable in damages to the oher driver. The courts call a "proper look-out" such a lookout as a reasonably prudent driver would have kept under the same circumstances.

Of equal importance is the rule of "proper control." This rule means pretty much what those words imply - that the driver degree of control as to be ready arise. It may be breached even Sheriff R. H. (Rufe) Jordan though no violation of ordinary

Copy Book Maxims Are Passe These Days

The old copy book maxims about prudence and thrift are largely passe in today's business world. The smart businessman today is one who borrows to the hilt, spends the firm's money lavishly and keeps a shrewd look out for a good bankrupt business to buy.

In their personal financial affairs, many individuals, too, are turning old-fashioned values upside down, and making plans and decisions they wouldn't have dreamed of making a few years ago.

The reason for this strange fiscal behavior isn't hard to find. It's a somewhat alarming by-product of today's jumble of tax laws. Progressive individual income tax rates that have become confiscatory, the "loophole" of lower rates on profits from the sale of property, high inheritance taxes, and the astronomically high corporate "excess profits" tax are changing the business habits of thousands of firms and the personal habits of many.

Examples: A homeowner, moving to another town sells his house and makes a profit. Ordinarily he would have rented for a year or two in his new location before deciding on the purchase of a new home; now he buys immediately in order to take advantage of a regulation that exempts him from taxes on the profit on the old house if he uses the profit in the purchase of a new one.

A business executive, offered a better job with another firm at a better salary, weighs the offer in terms of take-home pay, decides the net increase doesn't warrant making the change.

A professional man, when his income reaches a certain point, figures that getting into a higher tax bracket isn't worth the effort, closes up shop and takes a long vacation trip.

Some corporations can reduce their excess profits taxes by borrowing money to increase their capital. The tax savings are greater than the interest payments on the

Some high tax bracket individuals, too, find it pays to stay heavily in debt, using the borrowings to speculate in stocks or real estate. Interest is tax-deductible, and if the speculations are successful, the gains are subject to relatively low tax rates.

Corporations subject to excess profit taxes get to keep a mere 18 cents out of each profit dollar. Thus, temptation is strong to spend money wastefully on so-called good-will activities, such as lavish business entertainment, or on unneeded equipment or for questionable ex-

Perhaps the oddest of all the financial changes the tax laws have brought about is the new value of a failing business. A business that operates at a loss instead of a profit is often considered a desirable investment today by larger, successful concerns, which can use the other firm's losses as an offset against their own profits, and thus reduce their tax liabilities.

Treaty Government

Pending decision by the United States Senate is a detailed proposal submitted by the International Labor Organization, which recently met in Switzerland, for a complete system of government-subsidized medical care for the American people. Senate approval of this compact (requiring two-thirds of the Senators present and voting, not two-thirds of the entire Senate!) would automatically, under our Constitution, make it a law of the

The same State medicine "convention," as it is legally termed, has also been submitted for ratification to 64 other countries. Once ratified, it would have the binding force of a treaty on all of them, superceding any domestic statutes in conflict with it.

How other nations may dispose of this convention or dispose of any of the growing list of proposed compacts emanating from the UN or other international organizations - is no affair of the American people. But what we do with it is of signal importance to us.

Our own Congress, as everyone knows, has definitely declared against socialization of medicine for the American people. But the specific content of this proposal is not the moot point at issue. The point is that any such proposal, of whatever nature, that would by-pass our Constitutional safeguards against outside interference, and nullify the lawmaking powers of our Congress, is a menace to our national sovereignty in complete self-rule.

This Nation has taken the lead in creating strong international organizations in the interest of mutual security and progress. But those aims are at the opposite pole from the concept of government of the American people by foreign treaty.

A Constitutional amendment has been proposed which would make it unalterably clear that U. S. domestic law cannot be altered by treaties or executive agreements with other nations. Unless we are to withdraw completely from the field of international cooperation and participation in worldwide organizations, such basic protection seems urgently needed.

Profit In Waste?

A lady who wrote a letter to her government asking for some simple information received six pounds of government material. She weighed it on her kitchen scales. At the time she wrote to the government, she asked the same question of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States and received the answer in a one-page

In addition to the mass of material the government sent the inquirer, she received an offer from one bureau to put her on a list to receive a monthly publication on population growth, a monthly retail trade report and a monthly wholesale trade report.

Now the lady suggests slyly that she might make a hear sum by obtaining all the government printed materral available and in turn selling it to the paper dealer in her town who picks up her old newspapers and maga-

Believe Will Promote

Since this column has had so nuch to say about the education in public schools and the kind of textbooks used, the following letter pretty well expresses my ideas on the kind of civics textbooks I belive would do the least possible harm in public schools. The letter

form the kind of civics textbooks would recommend to be used in the Santa Ana High School.

I believe that every educational institution, private or public, should use civics textbooks that are based on a single principle to determine right from wrong and to deter-mine human relations that will tend to develop character and to comote good will, friendship, prosperity and peace among men. The single principle that I believe summarizes all moral principles and hould be the basis from which to reason to determine the proper course of human action is the Golden Rule. I believe it is pretty well expressed in the Declaration of Independence, which is the spirit of the Constitution of the United States.

I think the textbooks should explain that the American form of government is a definitely limited government and not an unlimited government, as are all democracies. hey should explain that the United States Government is a republic. And as Isabel Paterson says; "A Republic signifies an organization dealing with affairs which concern the public, thus implying that there are also private affairs, a sphere of social personnal life with which government s not and should not be concerned; t sets limits to political power. The facts in each case correspond to the meaning of the words.'

The textbooks should teach that the general welfare clause in the Constitution does not give the government authority to take from one to give to another, as that is specific or personal welfare and not general welfare.

I think the books should set forth that there is only one standard of right and wrong for both the individual and for the agent of the state. In other words, there is only one god and no person can serve two masters or two contradictory beliefs. Principles are eternal and are always in agreement with every other principle and do not change with time or place or with the number of people believing in them. What any person or group believes has nothing to do with whether it is right or wrong. think the books should advocate government of principles, or, as only expressed, law, rather

than a government of changeable, whimsical men. The study of history of ments, other than that set forth in the principles of the Declaration of Independence, is little else than a history of legalized crime and Frankfurter soon after F. D. The books should definitely define liberty and freedom as meaning the right to be let alone, the right to self-control, that each and every individual must respect the human initiative of every other human being, that where the spirit of the Lord is there is liberty and that liberty can only be brought about by practicing the Golden Rule which represents the spirit of

The above are the positive things that I think the school textbooks

should advocate. Since nine of the Ten Commandments are negative, they are a good guide to use as a test to eliminate certain textbooks, Never use a textbook that would embarrass the author or teacher or superintendent by causing him to refuse to answer questions concerning what it advocates or causing him to contradict himself in trying to defend it. A textbook that no man holding a position of trust will attempt to defend must be a harmful, danger-

out and vicious book. The books used in any public school in America should never advocate initiating force to satisfy a human want, either individually collectively. The textbooks should never advocate individuals getting things on an involuntary lectively. To do so is to deny the principle of a single standard-it is to attempt to serve two gods

or multiple gods.

Any textbook that advocates any form, of coveting, whether it coveting as an individual or coveting as a group representing the state, should never be used. The civics books should not teach that the state is the master over the individual, but is the servant or an agent of the citizen. They should teach that if the state tries to do something that no individual has a moral right to do it is attempting to be master and trying to serve contradictory ideas. They should teach that the state cannot be an agent for an individual and do something that the individual has no moral right to do. They should teach that multiplying an act that is a violation of the Golden Rule for an individual to do is still a violation o fthe Golden Rule whether it is done by the majority or 99 per cent of the people. They should not teach that might makes right and that the end justifies the

If there is no book that can be had that complies with these principles, then it seems that those responsible for selecting textbooks n public schools should select the textbook that violates these principles the least and does the least

As an example of books that I think pretty well set forth what should be taught in American high schools, I would mention "The Constitution of the United States, its Sources and its Application" Thomas James Norton and "Main-
