## **Tax Evasion `Shocking**'

WASHINGTON - (AP) House investigators came out today with what they called a "shocking example" of poor administrative work within the Justice Department. They suggested more "vigorous top direction" to prevent recurrences.

But for a change, the Justice Department was not held wholly to blame.

In the sixth of a continuing series of reports, a House judiciary subcommittee detailed the case of Norman E. Miller, Detroit industrial engineer, as an example of the delays and frustrations sometimes besetting officials.

Taxpayer Blamed The subcommittee, headed by Rep. Chelf (D-Ky), has been sharply critical of the Justice Department and its officials in past reports.

Pampans were digging out today from under a sheet of ice-and-snow which blocked traffic, closed schools and interrupted communications.

Hard-crusted snow, shimmering in the morning sun, greeted area residents following a freezing norther which has brought seven inches of snow to the Top o' Texas since late Sunday evening.

Pampa's mercury dropped to a season's low of 8 degrees early today from a Tuesday high of 25.

Most of the major roads servicing Pampa were open at noon today, but officials were warning motorists to use caution — and chains. Snow removal crews worked late and early to get the remaining roads in operation.

A Sign Of Hope

One of the false premises on which the Democratic administration that is retiring from federal control in January has rested is that government is an inexhaustible financial horn of plenty. Not even a torrent of votes can change this fundamental belief of Harry Truman & Co.

Reports from Washington disclose that the administration will submit to Congress when it convenes in January an \$80 billion budget. Fortunately for the taxpaying populace the Democratic financial proposals are no more than a sardonic gesture from a disavowed regime.

The fiscal advisors of Dwight D. Eisenhower report they are aiming at a \$70 billion top for the 1953 budget and they'll start soon on ways and means to prune back federal costs although their plans may not be unveiled until the White House gets its new occupant.

If the GOP fulfills its promises their first budget in 20 years will be approximately \$9 billion less than the last effective Democratic budget, the current one for 1952-53. That will be a move down a long, long road to national solvency.

It is an illusion that government can spend and spend with impunity. The truth is that government creates no wealth and derives all its revenue from taxing its citizens or from borrowing. By the first method it imposes a burden that automatically lowers the standard of living that the citizens would be entitled to by the results of their labor, and by the second it reaches into the future to seize the fruits of production which haven't yet been created. When a man dies his sons can liquidate his assets and forget their father's debt after paying whatever share the assets will provide. They can assume the remainder as a moral obligation if they will. But a government debt offers no such alternative. It is not only a moral but a legal obligation on the present generation and its sons and their sons after them. The only escape is to sacrifice the government and their own economy with it. Otherwise, the debt will ride them --- like the old Man of the Sea on the back of Sinbad

Forty years ago, the citizens of this country were lured into freeing their purse strings to government by passage of the income tax amendment to the Constitution. In four decades we have created a financial monster that would cause Frankenstein to gape with horrendous envy - a monster that no longer exists on the coins we suffer it but rather claims as its due a vested right in our earnings and through some of its high priests, asserts an authority to tell us how much of our production we may keep

There's no hope the next Republican administration or its immediate successors if any will be the St. George to kill this governmental dragon but they may possibly curtail its appetite. And if the citizens are smart enough and stern enough, they may in the next four decades get the master-slave status with their government in proper alignment.

## PatternChanges

Despite reports that the American family is tunctioning in an atmosphere charged with deep concern and cynicism, there is no real evidence that it is disappearing. But the family pattern is changing and the family unit is growing smaller due probably to the influence of urban living.

According to a study made by Dr. Charles B. Spaulding, associate professor of sociology at Santa Barbara college, Americans are among the most married of the people of technically advanced civilizations of these times.

Americans marry younger than formerly and a larger percentage of the widowed and the divorced remarry more frequently than they used to.

Dr. Spaulding maintains in his study that the classic picture of a large patriarchal, economic partnership type of family cannot exist easily in modern city life.

There is now less living under the control of the family. The smaller number of children and the changed economic roles of women and children have increased. "freedom" and the influence of these members of the family group. The loss of intimate neighborhood contacts leaves the pattern of family living more completely in the hands of the small family group itself. These are canditions, of course, which primarily prevail in metropolitan communities and are not so evident in towns like Pampa,

Easier divorce and greater tolerance of the divorced in social activities doesn't strengthen the family role, and the loosening of family ties is surely further encouraged by the great growth of governmental agencies to care for those who are "victims of life's crises."

The problem of the older widow, according to Dr. Spaulding, is one of growing importance. "The average wife," he explained "can expect to be a widow for about eight years under present circumstances."

Increasing numbers of families must adjust to what Dr. Spaulding described as the "empty nest," because of the increasing age of the population, coupled with the decrease of the birth rate.

The Spaulding study indicates that the trend toward suburban living probably means some increase in family life and it also seems, he says, to mean a slight trend toward matriarchy in family affairs.

We think the doctor is somewhat conservative about the matriarchal trend. We think the female of the species has had a firm grip on more than family affairs for a long time and a lot stronger influence than the sociologists suspect.





The involved Elizabethan sentences employed by Gov. Bradford don't make easy reading today but they get over the point that the "dream" communal scheme was a howling flop. It is further evident in the history that the communistic system which was supposed to be the perfect way of life actually operated to kill individual initiative and self-respect. The governor also noted that there was no hope for "godly and sober men" in the false belief that "the taking away of property . . . would make them happy and flourishing; as if they were wiser than God '

The original plan of the Pilgrims, according to Gov. Bradford "was found to breed much confusion and discontent, and retard much employment that would have been to their benefit and comfort." He concluded: "God in His wisdom saw another course fifter for them."

Not long after the communistic scheme was abandoned, the history continues, there were plenty of workers in the fields and food enough for everyone. In sincere gratitude after their success, the Pilgrims set aside a "Solemn Day" for proclaiming "glory, honor and praise with all thankfulness to our good God." The motivating spirit of the custom inspired Abraham Lincoln to issue the first Thanksgiving Day Proclamatian in 1863.

B. H. K. writes "I am suffering from bronchiectasis, but I am told that it is not serious enough for surgery. It is sometimes difficult to breathe. Will you discuss this

condition?' Bronchiectasis is a condition of the lungs in which the small pockets in these organs, which are usually filled with air when a person breathes, are broken down into larger pockets which are partly filled with mucous fluid or other semi-solid material. When large areas of the lungs

are involved and are examined by X-ray by a method which shows up these pockets, they will look much like a bunch of grapes.

Bronchiectasis interferes with 45 Lie health and ability to work, and it can produce dangerous complications and even death. It is better 149 Win to prevent than to treat.

Since it can come from so many different causes, a person who has a long-continued cough, regardless of what he or she thinks is producing it, ought to try to get at the bottom of the trouble early and stop the difficuly before bronchiectasis can have a chance to develop.

The medical treatment of fully developed bronchiectasis has not been highly successful, at least until recently. Now, however, there have been some reports on the use of penicillin — usually given by the inhaling method — which seem promising.


