Thousand Years Dispute Settled

THE HAGUE—If you lived on the islands in the English Channel called Les Ecrehouse or Les Minquiers, you might now have cause for joy or sadness, depending upon your political sympathies.

The reason—The International Court of Justice has settled a 1,000-year-old dispute over the ownership of the tiny little islands which are little more than a speck on the map of the world and cover a total area of about 96 square miles. The dispute, between Britain and France, was settled in favor of the English.

Three judges of the fifteen member court were not present for the voting, but all 12 on hand voted in favor of Britain. The judges of India and Yugoslavia were absent because of illness and Russia's seat on the court is vacant.

Total population of the islands is only about 100. However, because of location, they are important to both the French and British—fishermen from both countries take lobsters and oysters off the island shores.

The Les Ecrehouse Islands are off the French coast northeast of the Island of Jersey while the Les Minquiers group are south of Jersey.

30 Million Babies Born Since War II

MINNEAPOLIS—Since the end of World War II, 30 million babies have been born in the United States. Due mainly to this postwar baby boom, the number of young people—under 20—in the U.S. is now 11 million greater than it was in 1940. This is a growth equal to the combined populations of Chicago, Philadelphia, Los Angeles, Detroit and Cleveland.

Since 1940 the number of people aged 65 and over has risen by over four million. Thus the population in the essentially dependent age groups, young and old, has gone up 15 million, against an increase of only 13 million in the number of persons aged 20-64, the age group to whom the dependent population must look for shelter and the production of goods for their living necessities and comforts.

In 1940, people in the age group from 20-64 made up nearly 59 per cent of the total population. Today they comprise 56 1/2 per cent, and by 1965, if population factors continue at about their current rates, only 52 per cent of the American people will be in the 20-64 group. This will be approximately the same ratio as prevailed back in 1900.

Helping Others

Another thing that God's new men can do, a thing which can make the world and in many respects has been re-making it—a thing that sounds simple but which calls for a great deal of thought and planning, is this: just helping other people.

The New Testament makes it quite clear that an unhelpful Christian is hardly a real Christian at all. Naturally, not all Christians have the same opportunities. A little girl just entering the first grade can help her classmates and the teacher; but the teacher if she is a good one, can help all the class even more. The principal of the school, by selecting good teachers, can by his skill in judging people help every pupil in the school. The members of the school board by picking good principals can help the whole school system.

A boy on a farm in Missouri does not have the same opportunity to be helpful that he would have if he had been appointed Secretary of State. But a Christian, whether his zone of operations is a farm or the world, can always find ways of "going about doing good" as the Master did.

Winning Others

There is one thing that most Christians do not do, which—if they only went at it with any enthusiasm—would spread their light farther than any other one thing. (We bear in mind that if a Christian has any light, it is because Christ shines through him.) If it is true that the "better world," even if only a little better, can come to pass only as personalities are changed into the likeness of Christ, then the best thing a Christian can do toward a better world is to win others to his own Saviour. Saint Paul no doubt was helpful to others by the tents he made, for we can scarcely imagine him turning out shoddy or bungled work. He was more helpful still by "growing in grace" and shining as a true Christian character. But was there any service he performed which meant as much to him, in satisfaction, or to the world, by way of improvement, as the service he rendered in winning men from the kingdom of darkness to the kingdom of light?

Opportunity Knocks Right in Home Town

LINDEN, Ala.—Teen-agers who feel like leaving their home towns to seek better fields of opportunity should consider how Buddy Perry planted a few tomato seeds and harvested opportunity in his own backyard.

The tomato seeds cost him 80 cents. The hotbed cost him nothing but a little labor—he built it of materials salvaged from dumps and heated it with manure obtained for the asking.

The tomato plants that the hotbed yielded he sold as fast as he could pick them. With the proceeds from the seeds he bought calves. From a small beginning, he has built a herd of four steers, three heifers and one cow.

That's a pretty fair realization from 80 cents, and we forgot, to mention the two pigs he recently bought.

Young Perry goes to school and is a star pupil. Besides, he builds scenery for the school shows and spends his shop periods turning out tables, screens and other furniture.

The Thought of God

Again, Jesus over and over emphasized that his teachings were not his own, but that he spoke what the Father gave him to speak. His own description of himself (John 8:50) is "a man who has told you the truth which I heard from God." "I do nothing on my own authority," he said; "but speak as the Father taught me." "I declare to the world what I have heard from him." "My teaching is not mine, but his who sent me" (7:16). Now it is not possible for any man to penetrate or understand all the thoughts of God. No human mind is capable of understanding them all. What we need, and all we need, is what God thinks about us. We want to know what he wants us to do. We want to know how he thinks we should live. (The only persons who don't want to know that are atheists; once you believe in God at all, you can understand how important it is to know what God thinks.) It is this that Jesus meant when he said his teachings were from God. But this involves a tremendously high claim on Jesus' part. He claimed that his thoughts were identical with God's thoughts, that his wisdom was God's wisdom. If he had said outright, "I am God," could he have claimed any higher authority?

With Sympathy

Jesus' tears were shed on only one recorded occasion, when Lazarus died. Could he have been weeping for Lazarus? That is hardly possible. If he believed half what we believe about immortality, he could not have wept for a man who had gone beyond these shadows to the light of God's presence. Or if he did not believe in immortality (let us suppose just for a moment that he did not), then why should he weep for a man who was within the hour to be restored to full life again? The one explanation that accounts for Jesus' tears on that day is to see them as tears of sympathy. The hearts of Mary and Martha were torn, and his own was torn in sympathy. Perhaps it was not altogether because they were for a time lonely and bereft. Jesus could see something beneath their loneliness—he could see that they did not understand death itself. To their minds Lazarus had as good as ceased to exist. He would be "raised up" at some future day; but on that day, four days after his death what had become of him? All they could see was the black shadow into which their brother had disappeared. It was for their hopelessness, their misunderstanding, as much as for their sorrow, that Jesus wept.

With Faith

People who have had little experience in such things sometimes wonder what to say when they visit a house of sorrow. If only we could bring back the dead to life, as Jesus did! If only we could break into moving poetry such as might have come from a Tennyson or a Dante! If only we could say some magic thing that would dissolve death in ashes and make life bloom again! Instead we are shy and blundering and we are afraid we say the wrong thing in spite of ourselves. Two things need to be remembered at such times. One is that what we say is far less important than our attitude. If we ourselves have an attitude of fear, of doubt, of hopelessness, anything hopeful we say is belied by our evident despair. But if in ourselves there is a strong faith, this will make the simplest words glow with hope.

The other thing to recall that Jesus reminded Martha and Mary of himself, "I am the Resurrection and the Life." When we think of Jesus we think of Life—so all his friends have felt. How can we help it? So in the presence of sorrow the best word we can say is some word that points to Jesus. But of course the better time to say that word is before sorrow comes.


Farm Pond Pay In Fun and Money

First Year Will Pay Construction Cost

Farm authorities have been preaching farm ponds to the nation's farmers for several years, pointing out that a never-ending water supply is one of the most important items in agricultural production.

Here is a case history of such a pond. Located in Wake county, North Carolina, it cost \$240 to build. It is only seven-tenths of an acre large and is dependent entirely upon surface run-off for its water.

Within a year it provided the farmer with nice bass fishing, but more important it paid for itself. It provided water for spray-

ing an orchard as well as watering 5,000 chickens during a severe drought.

Without the pond the owner would have been in severe difficulties. He could have hauled water for his chickens, no doubt, but he could never have hauled enough to spray his orchard.

In addition, the farm pond furnished a recreation spot for his family and friends with fishing and swimming.

This type of farm pond, if located near farm buildings, offers a water supply in case of fire. Add a hose and pump to the farm equipment and the farmer has a first class fire department in his back-yard.

A farm pond, agricultural experts report, is one of the best investments that can be made on a farm today.

Miracle Cure



Three-year-old Billy Lucas, of Redwood City, Calif., shown above with his mother, Mrs. Annette Lucas, until recently was paralyzed, unable to talk and all but blind. He had been in this condition since he was three days old, due to myasthenia gravis, a congenital biochemical abnormality. After more than \$30,000 had been spent in efforts to cure the boy, a University of California neurologist administered a single injection of prostigmine, a dose worth about 35c, and Billy returned to virtual normalcy within a week.

Zither Lovers Deplore Decline—In a Dither

MILWAUKEE—Lovers of zither are in a dither. Things are not bright at all. In fact, the last firm in the country to make zithers has gone out of business. This company, in Washington, Mo., had been making zithers for 85 years. But, business went from bad to worse.

The popularity caused by the zither strains of "Third Man Theme" apparently didn't help to sell zithers. Alberta Kraeder of Los Angeles, who recently played a zither concert in Milwaukee, said she is the only zither teacher left in the United States.

Authorities estimate that 11,000 zithers were made in this country and that thousands more were brought in by immigrants. Most of them are still around, they believe, scattered in attics or buried in trunks across the nation.

Milwaukee, which has one of two remaining Zither Clubs, could be the last outpost on the zither frontier.


"Yes," Barbara sighed. "It was a great idea, Don. Just wonderful."

Jeff kissed her again. "Terrific. Now scram, Don. The lady and I just got to see each other—alone."





Change Old Make-Up To Give Vitality And Sparkle to Face

HOW LONG is it since you took a good look at your make-up? A critical look, that is. Skin changes take place from time to time and it may be that the old rouge, lipstick, powder and eye shadow no longer "do" as much as they once did.

Or have you become a bit careless about applying make-up? It's easy to get into a rut about this because you do become experienced and may not be taking as much time as formerly with it.

Changes, too, are made in the art of applying make-up. Within recent years the lipstick brush has become a widely accepted aid to applying lip rouge so that the effect is much neater than formerly.

A very definite change has been made in eye make-up, too. The eyes are played up much more than previously and the "doe-eyed" look is predominant.

In addition to these, there is also the thought that it is not just accidentally that women can be beautiful. There are so few really perfect faces, yet every woman can look more attractive than nature made her by learning to play up the good features and to tone down those imperfections which all of us have.

It isn't just by chance that certain make-up does something for any woman. It's the result of careful study, some trial and error, perhaps, and a great deal of care.

Beauty is the reward that comes to the woman who cares enough about herself to make use of what's available in cosmetics as well as who is interested in learning just what she can do about her individual problems.

Don't Stretch Skin During Creaming

Before any woman can start to apply make-up of any kind, she has to start with a clean skin. This is achieved through proper elimination, for one thing, and that means there must be sufficient water as well as other liquids in the diet which must naturally be well-balanced.

Soap and water cleansings are essential, and so is cream cleansing. The type of cream preferred depends on your skin, normal, dry or oily. Age may play a part in the choice, too, for more mature women will need a cream which will furnish some oils to the skin which may be somewhat dried as the years go by.

Cream should always be applied in upward motions. Lines tend downwards naturally and so all motion should be gently upwards, thus helping to counteract this tendency.

Use a firm pressure on all your strokes as you start and lighten them as you move the hands upwards. If you're using a liquid preparation then keep the cotton well moistened.

If you're 10 years or more past voting age, then you'll probably have to concentrate some of the massage and cleansing with

creams on your neck and jawline. Use the same type of stroke as described above, for skin on the face as well as the neck and jaw is delicate and can be stretched if massage is improperly done.

Worried about lines in the forehead? Start at the tip of the nose working upwards, then finish with brisk strokes from center of forehead out, alternating.

Apply Color to Skin With Expert Touch

A foundation cream, lotion or a base of some kind will give the face smoothness which it requires for applying make-up as well blotting out small imperfections. Blend it carefully and carry it far enough in all directions so there is no demarcation line as to where it ends.

Act Promptly To Remove Those Tug Stains, Spots

IT CAN be a serious matter when your rugs spot and stain, as the investment in these home furnishings is usually a great deal. Your chances of removing a spot or stain are good, if you act promptly after the accident, so that it doesn't "set."

Another good rule to remember in removing the spots and stains on rugs is to know exactly what you're doing and why. Inexperience can do more damage with haphazard treatment than the stain itself. Call a professional cleaner, if you don't know what to do.

Sponge with Cleaner
When you're not certain as to what's caused the spot on your

rug, sponge gently with a soapsuds, synthetic, non-alkaline cleaner, or water.

You may also sponge with water if you don't know what caused the stain except on frieze carpeting use dry cleaning fluid.

Here's a tip on using water: rub the surface pile very gently. On looped pile types, the rubbing should be gentle, too.

Dry Carpet Quickly
When something has spilled on the rug, it's important to blot as much of the fluid as possible. For this use a clean, slightly damp cloth. White blotting paper might also be used, if there's not too much fluid involved.

Scrape semi-liquids with a spoon, then follow this with a cloth or blotter treatment for the liquid content.

Use the vacuum cleaner to help the soaked carpet dry more rapidly. Insert the hose under the carpet and let the airwarm and dry the soaked spot.

Hints on Specific Stains
For stains which have been caused by washable ink, blood, pet troubles or beverages, plan to use the water method. If the stain persists use a small amount of synthetic cleaner.

Stains caused by acid substances like fruit juice, vinegar or battery acids should have an ammoniac or baking soda and water solution applied to them to counteract acidity.

Orange Chiffon Pie Makes Easy Treat

Having a Halloween party this year? Here's an attractive and colorful pie that's no more difficult to make than a simple dessert.

The billowy filling for the pie is achieved with a package of orange-flavored gelatin, a tall can of evaporated milk and a little extra juice and sugar.

The crumb shell which contrasts beautifully with the filling, both flavor-wise and colorwise, is a mellow blend of melted butter a fine chocolate wafer crumbs.


Chocolate Crumb Shell
1 1/2 cups fine chocolate wafer crumbs

5 tablespoons melted butter
Mix crumbs with butter thoroughly. Press crumb mixture evenly in 9-inch pie pan to form crumb shell. Fill with orange chiffon filling.

Orange Chiffon Pie
1 package orange-flavored gelatin

1 cup boiling water
1/2 cup sugar
2 teaspoons grated orange rind
1/2 cup orange juice plus lemon juice to make 1/2 cup
1 1/2 cup evaporated milk (1 tall can) chilled icy cold

9-inch Chocolate crumb shell
Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Add sugar, rind and juice. When gelatin mixture begins to jell (about the consistency of unbeaten egg whites) whip chilled milk very stiff. Fold whipped milk into gelatin mixture quickly but thoroughly. Pour into chocolate crumb shell and chill until set, about 2 to 3 hours. Decorate top with whole chocolate wafers which have been decorated with frosting faces. For this frosting mix 1/2 cup confectioners' sugar with 1 teaspoon evaporated milk and 1/2 teaspoon orange juice.




Second Class Land Can Be Built Up Two Steps Suggested To Increase Yield

Second class land can be quickly built up through good soil management to give yields as good as first class land, according to farm management experts.

For an expenditure of \$50 to \$75 in fertilizers and other soil building measures, second class soils can be made to produce 100 bushels of corn per acre—yields equal to those grown on the best black prairie soils of the Corn Belt.

The farm management men point out that second grade farm land must have the framework of a good soil. It must have a capacity for holding plant nutrients and water, so growing crops can be properly nourished.

Dr. Frank Miller, University of Missouri agricultural economist,

reports that if yield boosting management methods were followed and low output soils were built up to high crop producing levels, 40 million more people could be fed from farm land already in cultivation.

Dr. Miller suggested these steps for getting bigger yields per acre from existing farm land: 1—Encourage farmers to use methods that increase production; give them facts and figures about costs and returns; 2—Liberalize bank lending procedures so that farmers on low producing land with a high output potential can get the financing to invest in fertilizers, drainage and other practices that build up tilth and take care of surplus water.

Magnets Are Used To Clean Crop Seed

Industrial research has developed a method of screening weed seed from crop seeds.

The first step in the process is to spray the seed—clover, for instance—with a "fog" of wet iron particles. The particles stick to the softer, rougher weed seeds, and slide off the hard clover seeds. When the seed is run over a magnet, the iron particles with weed seeds attached are dragged out and the clover seed can be bagged. Two seed companies have tested the process and find it a success.


Magnets also are being used to clear roads of nails and other metal objects which might puncture tires. That process was developed during World War II, when enemy planes began sowing Allied air strips with bits of metal shaped like children's jacks. The metal punctured airplane tires and caused accidents.

The Minnesota Highway Department has mounted bar-shaped magnets on trucks to hang about five inches above the surface of the road and grab up tacks, nails, wire, bolts, screws. A 75-mile sweep is reported to have collected 643 pounds of such junk.

Cows Like Silage

Grass silage can be fed to cows as roughage without any appreciable loss in milk production tests made at Iowa State College's dairy farm reveal. The tests were made on six Holstein cows getting only grass silage and six getting corn silage and alfalfa hay mixture. The test showed little difference in the returns.

Dabbling Pullets



According to Wyoming tests White Leghorn pullets can be dubbed when 10 or 12 weeks old. The experts say it is painless to remove the wattles and combs with ordinary shears. And they add it resulted in more egg production in a number of tests.

Almond Chicken With Rice

INGREDIENTS:

- 3 cups hot cooked rice
- 1/2 cup blanched almonds
- 1/2 tablespoons salad oil, to be used one tablespoonful at a time
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 clove garlic, cut in half
- 1 cup cooked chicken, diced
- 1 cup cubed bamboo shoots
- 1/2 cup sliced mushrooms, canned or fresh
- 2 tablespoons liquid (1 tablespoon each from bamboo shoots and water chestnut cans)
- 1/2 cup thinly sliced water chestnuts
- 1/2 cup thinly sliced celery
- 2 teaspoons cornstarch
- 1/2 teaspoon sugar
- 1/4 cup water
- 4 teaspoons soy sauce
- 1/2 cup sliced green onions

3. Leave saucepan over this low heat for 14 minutes. Turn heat off. The rice is now ready to use. However, leave the cover on the saucepan to keep the rice warm if you are not ready to use it immediately.

For extra fluffy, tender, separate grains—allow the rice to steam for an additional 10 minutes—


METHOD: Brown the almonds in 1 tablespoon of oil. Set aside. Place salt and garlic in a skillet which has a tight fitting lid. Mash the garlic into the salt. Add 1 tablespoon of oil, then the chicken. Brown lightly. Add 1 tablespoon of oil, the bamboo shoots and mushrooms. Brown lightly. Add liquid from bamboo shoots and chestnuts. Cover skillet and cook over a low heat for 5 minutes. Add water chestnuts, celery and 1/2 of the almonds. Heat through. Celery and chestnuts should stay crisp. Make gravy by shaking in a jar, the cornstarch, sugar, water and soy sauce. Stir into the hot mixture. Cook until thickened and smooth.

Serve over the hot cooked rice. Sprinkle the rest of the almonds and the green onions over the top.

This recipe makes 4 servings.

QUICK METHOD FOR COOKING FLUFFY WHITE RICE:

- To make 3 heaping cups of white, fluffy, perfectly cooked rice:
- 1. Put 1 cup uncooked rice, 2 cups cold water and 1 teaspoon salt into a 2-quart saucepan and bring to a vigorous boil.
- 2. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover the saucepan with a lid. Do not remove lid or stir rice while it is cooking.

Remove from deep fat and drain fried rice on absorbent paper.
