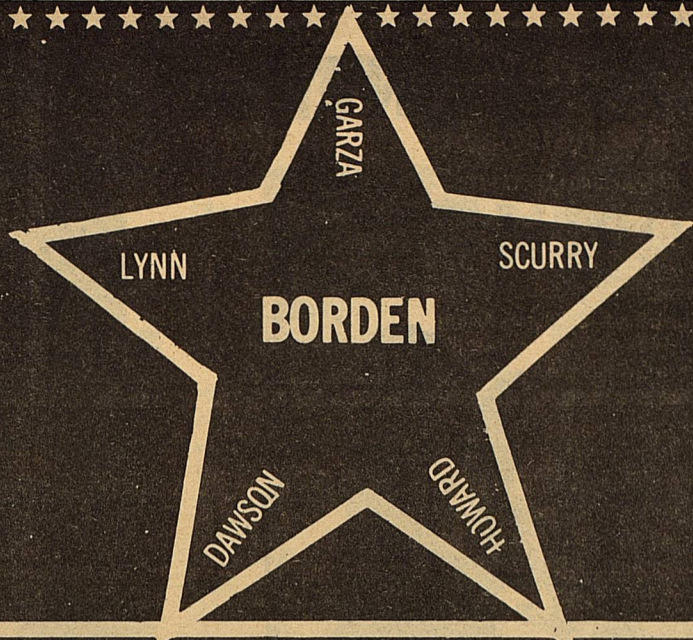

Record crowd at barn dance

The annual Borden County Cancer Crusade Barn Dance held Friday April 9 at the County Barn drew a record crowd as Hoyle Nix and his Western Boys tuned up for the 1982 Cancer drive.

1982 marks the eleventh year for this event and the success of this year also assures Borden County of passing the 1000 percentile in per capita giving for the eleventh time. There is also a very strong chance the Borden County will again be number one in the state of Texas.

According to Chairman E. L. Farmer unofficial results of monies earned Friday totaled \$5426.00. The "gate" brought in \$2270.00 and the calf raffle, according to Chairman Sue Smith, earned \$3156.00. Secretary of the Society and Concession Chairman Dorothy Browne reported \$435. in the 1981-82 Memorial Fund to date and \$173.00 earned at the Concession stand. Mrs. Banny Hancock is Co-chairman of the concession booth. This brings the grand total for 1982 to \$5861.00.

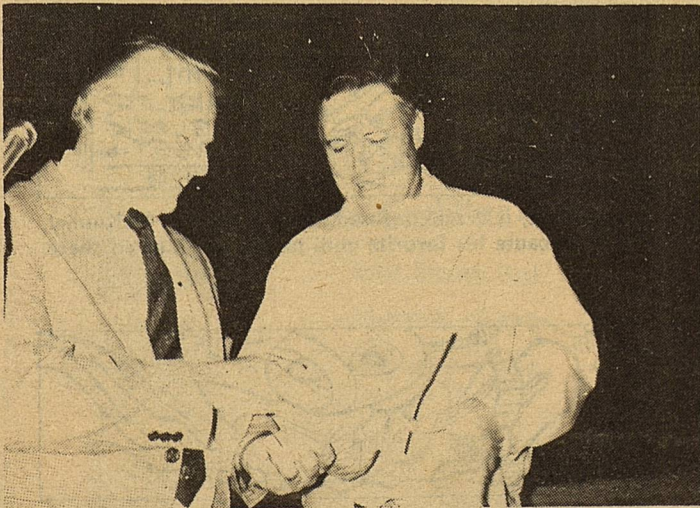
Lillie Belle was the eldest daughter of Billy and Birdie Clerk Moore. Billie Moore was the first County Clerk and second Sheriff of Borden County.

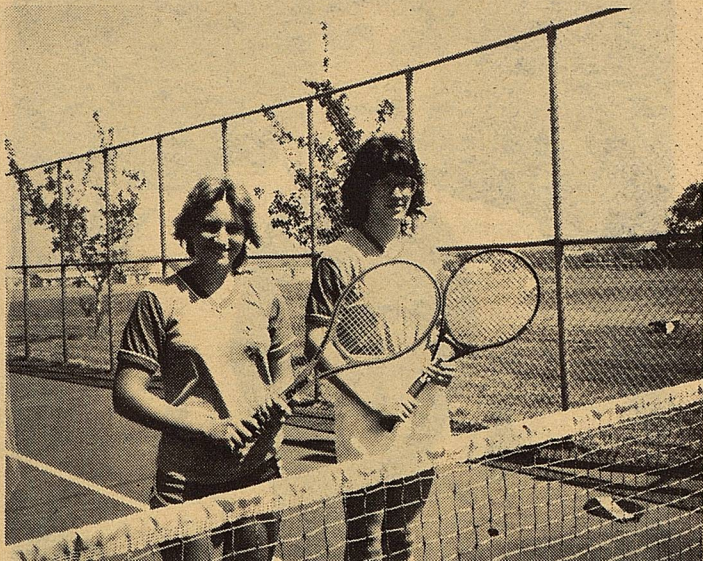

Tammy Miller and Kelli McPhaul Qualified for Regional in Tennis.

Miller & McPhaul Qualify For Regional

Tammy Miller and Kelli McPhaul defeated Klondike, Dawson, and Wellman before falling to Sands in the finals of District 5-A tennis. They defeated Klondike 6-1, 6-3; Dawson 6-2, 6-0; Wellman 6-3, 3-6, 6-4; and lost to Sands 7-6, 6-4, 6-3. Sands was avenging an earlier loss to Borden County when Tammy and Kelli had defeated them 6-3, 7-5 earlier in the week. They will now compete in Regional play at South Plains College in Levelland April 22 and 23.

They will be one of 16 teams with the top two advancing to the state tournament at Austin.

In other play in district, Shana Bradshaw was defeated by Dina Todd of Klondike 6-4, 6-4 and Kim Wills was defeated by Staci Mitchell, also of Klondike, 6-2, 6-0. Both girls from Klondike went on to capture 1st and 2nd in singles play, playing each other for the district championship. 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The British are coming! The British are coming! And I'm on my way to Washington to recall the victory of the Colonials which made US a nation of self determination. But the difference is, this time I'm glad that the British are on their way.

Boy am I glad to see a nation stand up for its' possessions, citizens and dominion. It has been a long time since any of us have witnessed a call to arms--a sailing of an armada and a vow to go to war in order to avert a takeover. Margaret Thatcher as spokesman for the British government is exactly right to have sent the British fleet to the Falkland Islands. And she is more than right to place an embargo against any goods shipped out of Argentina to Britain and blockade any help or goods going into Argentina.

Just think how different things might have been had the United States under the direction of Jimmy Carter sent the fleet to Iran--had placed an embargo on Iranian oil--had refused to do business with any nation who supported Iran. Taking of hostages in Iran

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is no different from Argentina taking over a British protectorate. The difference is that Britain is not standing for it--we let it run its course and lost face around the world.

This incident is also just another example of the United Nations' impotence. Maybe I've missed it, but I don't believe there has been a peep from the "peace keeping force" on Staten Island. And there again Margaret Thatcher is right. She knows that Britain would be forced to give up the Falklands if left to the U.N., therefore she moved decisively with only Britain's interest at stake.

By the time you read this there will have been a settlement. But there is one thing for sure. Britain has once again established a long forgotten principal of strength and determination. Long rule Brittania

Why High Interest Rates?

Interest rates are made up of two different components, an inflation premium and real return to capital, says a Texas A&M University agricultural economist. The inflation premium is the amount of interest it takes to compensate savers for the expected decrease in purchasing power of their savings over the loan period and is based on inflationary expectations. Real return to capital is the amount of interest savers require for deferring current compensation until later when the loan is paid off. With current restrictive monetary policies and huge projected budget deficits, the calculated real return (cost) to capital has increased substantially. And the growing government is crowding out private demands for debt capital by paying a higher price than potential private borrowers can afford. As inflation falls or remains low, the inflation premium in interest rates also falls. But increases in real return to capital may be more than offsetting so that overall market interest rates may be unchanged to higher.

The Sul Ross women's team is currently leading the region. The team from ENMU is in second place, hoping to repeat last year's


championship.



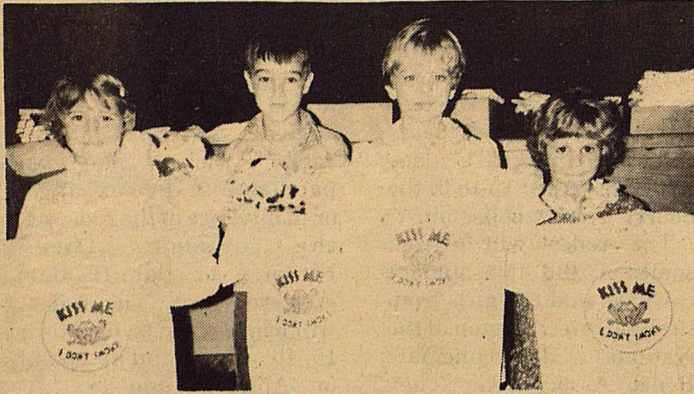

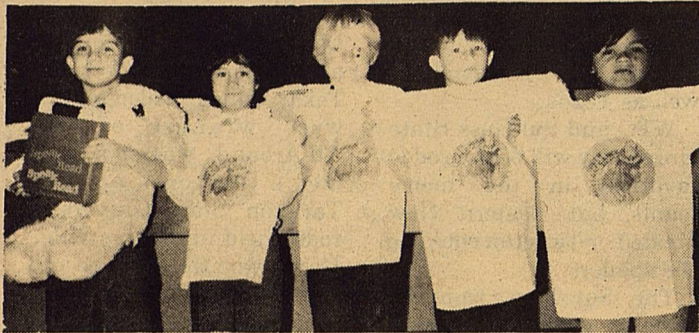

HIGH RATE OF SKIN CANCER AVOIDABLE

Whether you work outdoors for a living or simply enjoy weekends in the sun, by taking simple precautions and using good judgement you can often prevent needless occurrences of skin cancer.

Presently, superficial skin cancer, the type attributed to overexposure to the sun, is the most common form of cancer in the United States. Between 3,000,000 and 6,000,000 cases occur annually, according

to American Cancer Society estimates. Studies also show that the incidence of skin cancer is significantly higher in the South where exposure to the sun is greatest.

Although skin cancer may be the most common form of cancer, it is also the most effectively treated with a cure rate of about 95 percent. Most experts agree that those figures could approach almost 100 percent if patients would seek proper medical attention earlier.

It is known that people with fair complexions are more susceptible to skin cancer because their skin lacks sufficient quantities of melanin, the pigment substances which filter out the sun's harmful rays.

When skin is exposed to the sun, ultraviolet rays stimulate these pigment cells to increase their production of melanin creating the darkening known as "tan". Thus, a fair complexioned farmer who has little protective melanin and prolonged sunlight exposure would be at a particularly high risk.

What can you do to protect yourself?

While most of the patients we see cannot really alter their lifestyles, they can be aware of the high risk light complexioned persons have. If they have

previously had skin cancer, they should periodically have a physician or skin specialist check for changes in the skin's condition.

Also, everyone can cover the skin when outdoors by wearing wide brimmed hats, long sleeve shirts and using a good sunscreen agent, which a pharmacist can recommend.

If an abnormal skin condition appears, such as a scaly skin thickening in a small area (usually on the face, neck, or hands) see your doctor. In many cases this scalliness may be a noncancerous condition known as actinic keratosis which, while easily treated, can become cancerous if ignored.

Other characteristic signs of skin cancer include pale, waxy, pearly nodules which may eventually ulcerate and crust, or red, scaly, sharply outlined patches.

Ignoring skin cancer symptoms can be dangerous. Left untreated, it may become aggressive, penetrating below the skin to bone and eventually other parts of the body where treatment becomes more difficult and the outlook for cure decreases.

PECAN MANAGEMENT SHORTCOURSE

Borden County will host a five county Pecan Management Shortcourse April 29 in the Plains Community. The Shortcourse will begin at 9:00 a.m. and conclude at 1:00 p.m.

Dr. George McEachern, pecan specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will be on hand as the main speaker. He was here last year and talked primarily about orchard management. Dr. McEachern will talk about managing insect and disease problems and budding and grafting of trees. He will also touch on drip irrigation systems. This will be a follow up to last years program but in more detail.

The afternoon will be spent going to individual

MESQUITE CONTROL

The time for controlling mesquites is approaching quickly. Most of the trees have budded and are greening up.

This year is likely to be different than last year concerning spray conditions. Poor subsoil moisture will slow down growth of the tree somewhat.

There are a couple of things to remember when

controlling mesquite trees.

(1) Spray when the leaves are fully extended and have turned from the light to dark green color.

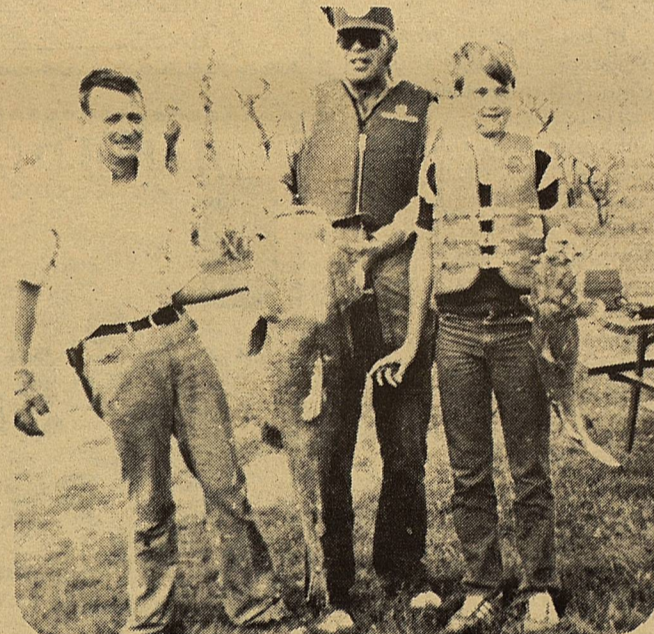
(2) Spray before the wax buildup gets set in. Less effective control will result if waxy leaves are prevalent. Dry conditions will cause wax buildup to be much earlier than if wet spring conditions exist.

There are 3 spray treatments for mesquites that are cleared for rangeland use. These are: (1) 2,4,5-T low volume, low pressure (2) 2,4,5-T and Picloran (Tordon 225E) Tankmixed (3) 2,4,5-T and Dicamba (Vanvel) Tankmixed.

year in and year out, 2,4,5-T and Picloran will give the best control of mesquite. If you have any questions concerning mesquite control, give me a call.

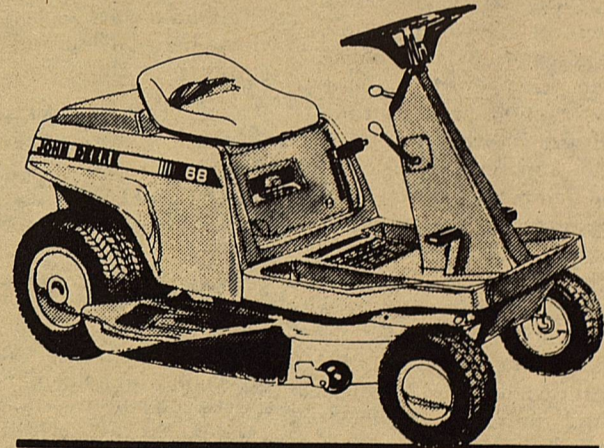

NOTICE OF BASES

Operators should be receiving notice of crop bases for each farm. It is very important for you to review these figures. Any appeals for reconsideration of bases listed in column 4 must be made by April 16, 1982. Your appeal must be in writing and show why the acreage base is not representative of your normal operations of the farm or cop. Review will be made of planted and considered planted for 1978, 1979, 1980 and 1981. If the appeal is approved, the base will be the average of 1978, 1979, and 1980 xbr the crop appealed. IF there are other reasons why this base isn't normal, you might also wish to appeal by April 16.

CONSERVATION USE ACRES

To control erosion, insects, weeds, and rodents on cropland taken out of production as a result of 1982 farm program provisions, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service requires program participants to devote this land to certain conservation uses.

The conservation use acreage must be eligible land which meets certain size and width measurements. The land designated as conservation use acreage must be devoted to an approved conservation practice that will protect the land from wind and water erosion. The acreage must be cropland that was planted to small grain or row crops within one of the last two years. Conservation use acres may not be harvested. Grazing, however, will be permitted between October 1 and March 31. Farmers who comply with the acreage reduction programs will be eligible for price support loans, target prices and the reserve program.



ATTENTION!

SIGN-UP DEADLINE NEARS

Only a few days remain in which to file an intention to participate in the 1982 Reduced Acreage Progra. Please give this important announcement your serious consideration. The program is voluntary; however, you must participate to be eligible for program benefits. Filing the intention by April 16 places you under no obligation, but it will allow you until the time you certify your crops to make a final decision on participation.

If you have filed an intention on one crop, you may want to revise your intention to include other crops for which you have bases.

Remember - Final date is April 16.

ALL RISK CROP INSURANCE

Farmers who have not make application for thier All-Risk Crop Insurance policy are reminded April 15 is the last day cotton or grain sorghum applications can be accepted for the 1982 crop year.

SMALL GRAIN CERTIFICATION

Teh final date to certify wheat, oats, barley, and rye is May 3.

CCC INTEREST RATE

Commodity Credit Corporation loans disbursed in April will ahve a 13.875 percent interest rate.

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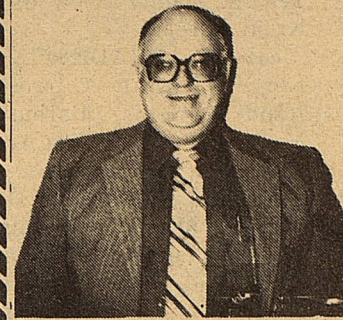
