Tax freeze discussion on July 1 agenda

Jim Brashears asked the Gray County Commission to put a property tax freeze for citizens over 65 years old on next November's ballot.

Earlier this year, the commission talked about the possibility of a tax freeze, but feared that it would shift more of the tax burden

on younger property owners and businesses.

In his request Monday morning at the commission's meeting, Brashears said that freezing the taxes on property owners 65 or older in the county would affect only 1,966 people.

While the U.S. Census Bureau shows the population of those 65 or older in the county as 17.7 percent, Brashears said that includes

those in nursing homes and apartments who are not subject to property taxes.

Gray County Appraisal District figures indicate that property owners 65 or older in the county total only 11 percent.

Brashears said the impact to county tax revenues would be only about 0.4 percent, or about \$75,000.

Brashears asked that the coun-

ty commission put the question of freezing property taxes on the ballot of the general election in November.

Under Texas Proposition 13, the Freeze Property Taxes Act, an amendment to the Texas Constitution that garnered 81 percent of the statewide vote in 2003, counties, cities and junior college

"It's a four-foot deep pit," Harvill explained. "We will measure how far they get through it. Then if the cars start making it all the way through, we'll time them." Each racer will make two runs.

The Lefors Boosters and Community Day Care will have concession booths at the event and there will be face painting and giveaways. The Cancer Society will have snow cones for sale.

Harvill said Prestige Auto Body is providing all the trophies for the bogs, and West Texas Landscape is donating the digging of the pit.

"We've got a great group of guys," Harvill said.

2 girls put on wrong Continental flights

HOUSTON (AP) — Continental Airlines said Tuesday it has taken steps to ensure that proper procedures are followed after two unaccompanied girls were placed on wrong Continental Express flights over the weekend.

An 8-year-old College Station girl erroneously ended up in Fayetteville, Ark., and a 10-year-old Massachusetts girl was mistakenly sent to Newark, N.J., after boarding planes operated by ExpressJet, which is under contract with Continental.

On Sunday, Jonathan Kamens said he put his daughter, Miriam, on a Cleveland-bound flight at

Logan Airport in Boston to visit her grandparents. Shortly after the plane landed in Ohio, his father-in-law called saying she had not arrived.

Kamens said for 45 minutes no one could tell him where his daughter was. She was finally located unharmed in Newark.

Kamens said the number of people who failed to do their jobs is "mindboggling."

Continental spokeswoman Kelly Cripe said in an e-mailed statement that in both instances flights with different destinations were being loaded at the same time from the same doorway and there was mis-

communication among staff members.

"In both circumstances the children were supervised throughout the entire process," Cripe said in the statement.

Kamens said on his blog that the airline offered him a \$75 refund.

Mega Millions jackpot grows to \$57 mil

ATLANTA (AP) — Without a big winner in the latest drawing, the Mega Millions multistate lottery game has rolled over its grand prize to \$57 million.

No player matched all the winning numbers to win the \$46 million jackpot Tuesday. The next Mega Millions drawing will be Friday night.

Although there was no grand prize winner, four tickets were worth second prizes of \$250,000. None were sold in Texas. Another 31 prizes, including one in Texas, won third prizes of \$10,000 each.

The winning numbers from Tuesday were: 9, 15, 21, 26 and 45. The Mega Ball number was 25.



Analysis: Republicans accuse Obama of socialism

WASHINGTON (AP) — Republicans are lining up behind a pointed political attack line: President Barack Obama is nationalizing American industry and socializing medicine.

Drawing on the government's ownership stakes in auto giants, insurance companies and banks — and the billions of tax dollars at risk — the Republican Party is trying to develop wedge issues in the national debate over how to repair the economy and expand health insurance.

It's a strategy they hope will pay off in campaigns for Congress next year and, in the process, help rein in the Democratic president's outsized influence.

Democrats dismiss it as conservative sloganeering.

Outnumbered, Republicans are trying to tap into negative public attitudes toward "socialism" and taxpayer bailouts.

Government meddling in the private sector is "a bridge to socialism," asserts Republican Sen. James Inhofe. "It's time to get the government out of the bailout business once and for all," says House Republican leader John Boehner.

Demonstrators outside Obama appearances are waving signs denouncing his supposed embrace of "socialism."

The Republican Party is portraying the health care effort — which Obama has made a top priority — and government bailouts as two faces of what they portray as a dangerous burst of governmental activism by Obama and a supportive Democratic Congress.

No matter that the bailouts and nationalizations were begun under the Republican administration of George W. Bush. Or that the word "socialism" may not evoke the same degree of alarm among the public it once did, especially among younger voters.

Still, Republicans point to polls that show that Obama's handling of the economy isn't his strongest card, even though his overall approval ratings remain high.

Republicans have been doubling down on the strategy — used in the 2008 national election campaigns — that Democrats in general and Obama in particular are seeking to vastly expand government control over Americans' lives.

Republican consultant Frank Luntz, who wrote a

detailed strategy plan on the language of health care, suggests that Republicans use the term "Washington takeover." While vague, it "grabs attention," he says.

"The vast majority of Americans who like the health care they have risk losing it when a government-run system takes over," says Senate Republican leader Mitch McConnell.

Although the government does provide health care coverage to the poor and elderly, most Americans have private insurance, usually provided by their employers. However, 50 million Americans don't have any health care insurance at all.

Obama ridicules the notion that he favors a step toward European-style socialism.

"When you hear people saying, 'socialized medicine,' understand I don't know anybody in Washington who is proposing that, certainly not me," he said at a town-hall meeting on health care.

"Socialized medicine would mean that the government would basically run all of health care. They would hire the doctors, they would run the hospitals. They would just run the whole thing. Great Britain

has a system of socialized medicine. Nobody is talking about doing that, all right?"

Obama is leaving it to Congress to take the lead in designing a health care plan. He has endorsed broad proposals, supported by many Democrats, to create a government-run health plan to compete with private insurers.

Republicans claim such a system would lead to government rationing and denial of care and could drive the private companies out of business.

Ross Baker, a political scientist at Rutgers University, said Republicans may be misreading how their evocations of "socialism" will resonate with the public.

"I really don't think fear of socialism is gripping Americans by the throat," Baker said. "I think there's a feeling in some ways that the government was asleep at the switch for the past eight years. I think people see steps taken by Obama as a healthy compensation for that inactivity."

Meanwhile, the administration is pushing back hard against Republican criticism over its activism in trying to combat the worst recession in decades.






Silva grabbed a high fly ball to center for Rotary's

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
