



Report: Capitol gunfire suspect tried reloading

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) A man who fired several shots outside the Texas Capitol was trying to reload his weapon when police confronted him and tackled him to the ground, according to court records.

Fausto Cardenas remains in Travis County's jail Friday on a felony charge of deadly conduct. Bond is set at \$250,000.

affidavit An arrest filed Friday describes Thursday's shooting incident on the south steps of the Capitol.

Roussel says he spotted Cardenas outside the Capitol after hearing shots ring out. He says he saw Cardenas "reloading a magazine" and noticed a pistol in his waistband and empty shell casings where Cardenas was standing.

State Trooper Husain

State troopers tackled the 24-year-old suspect and arrested him. No one was injured in the shooting, which briefly shut down the Capitol.

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Gov. Rick Perry says he's not for increased security at the Texas Capitol after a shooting incident on its south steps this week.

Perry said Friday that "the last thing I want is the Texas Capitol to turn into DFW airport," referring to security checkpoints that have become familiar features of airport terminals.



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Holt was selected from 500 eligible students meeting the academic requirements. Finalists were chosen from essays they wrote saying why they wanted to participate in the project. This was the third Emerald Eagle Study Abroad Program, which is cooperative effort between the Emerald Eagle Scholars, the University of Texas and the Center for Global Learning and Experience, that covered the full cost of the trip and provides students with three hours of course credit in humanities.

The travelers tasked with leadership questions, that determined part of their grade, and they were required to bring digital cameras to document their experiences and to learn about ethical cultural storytelling and archiving.

"Getting to see her artwork was a great honor, and hearing her views on issues such as global warming was very eye-opening. One of the largest holes in the ozone layer is over Punta Arenas, and so it is a big issue in Chile."

Then it was on to Torres del Paine, Chile and the national park."In Torres del Paine, we took a 10 1/2 hour hike up a mountain in the Alps to see a lagoon and the Three Peaks, Holt explained. "The scenery was almost as breathtaking as the actual hike."

Stop six on the tour was Tierra del Fuego National Park. "The plant life there was incredible," Holt said. "The guide pointed out several types of edible fungus and even some carniverous flowers.

Then it was back to Buenos Aires. "One of my favorite parts of Buenos Aires was definitely the markets, "Holt said. "Tons of people had set up stands all along the streets, and everything they sold

was handmade. We were amazed to have jewelry made right in front of our eves!

Still the Pampa teen said she tired to stick to familiar food, such as burgers and fires, as much as possible, but found some new cuisine along the way. "We had some really good pizza, but the pizza there has no sauce," she explained. " It does have tomatoes on it instead. Once we got a pizza with ham on it. It was literally one big slice of ham underneath the cheese. There was a lot of bread and cheese," she said.

"In Chile, they cook meat in what we thought was dessert- it was good but it had pork in it, that was different."

"The trip was a very good experience, "Holt said. "It opens your eyes and opens you up. It helps you look at your own culture differently. "People complain here when people speak Spanish, now I know what it's like not have the language you speak be understood.

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

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
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

Americans deliver a message: No more big government

In November 2008, the American people gave President Barack Obama not only the White House but overwhelming majorities in both the House and Senate. Now one year after the President's inauguration, the American people are evaluating the past year and assessing where our nation stands.

On the economic front, our national unemployment rate is currently at 10 percent, and our national debt has surpassed \$12 trillion (with a pending Democratic bill to push that to \$14 trillion). On the domestic front, a partisan health care bill that will raise the cost of health care for the insured while cutting Medicare for our seniors is awaiting final action that the American people are hoping will never come. In our security efforts, the country was spared a terrorist-led disaster when the detonator to an explosive device aboard a Detroit bound flight failed in what will be remembered as a great Christmas miracle.

Last week, the people of Massachusetts cast "vote heard 'round the world" when they elected Scott Brown, a Republican, to fill the term of the late Senator Ted Kennedy, a seat held by the Democratic Senator for 47 years. Many pundits are interpreting this surprising vote in a Democrat stronghold state as an objection to the many policies proposed and pursued in Washington over the last year. As many have reported, Senatorelect Brown campaigned against the Democratic health care legislation, and his election will now break the Democrats' filibuster-proof majority in the Senate. He also campaigned against bringing terrorists from Guantanamo Bay to the United States for trial, a position on which a majority of Americans

Over the past year, we have seen unprecedented federal actions, not the least of which has been unrestrained spending and federal encroachment in private markets. In 2009, government spending grew \$705 billion, or 24 percent, in just one year. The Democrats proposed taking over the entire healthcare sector, a full 1/6th of our economy. I believe these actions are contrary to the values a bipartisan majority of Americans support, a point illustrated in the election returns from the State of Massachusetts. Most American fami-


a doggie bag because her cooking is so delicious.



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The Pampa Harvesters allowed an 18-0 run in the second quarter and lost their fifth consecutive game 75-53 to the Palo Duro Dons Friday in Palo Duro.

The win extended Palo Duro's district win streak to 84. Head Coach Dustin Miller said you never want to lose but felt his team accomplished their goals for the game.

"We had goals coming into that game," Miller

said. "I think we are better than we were before tonight.

"We couldn't break their press and they forced a lot of turnovers," Embry said. "We were down 15-4 after one. Down 20 at the half."

"We just have to play four quarters and not two or three," Miller said.




