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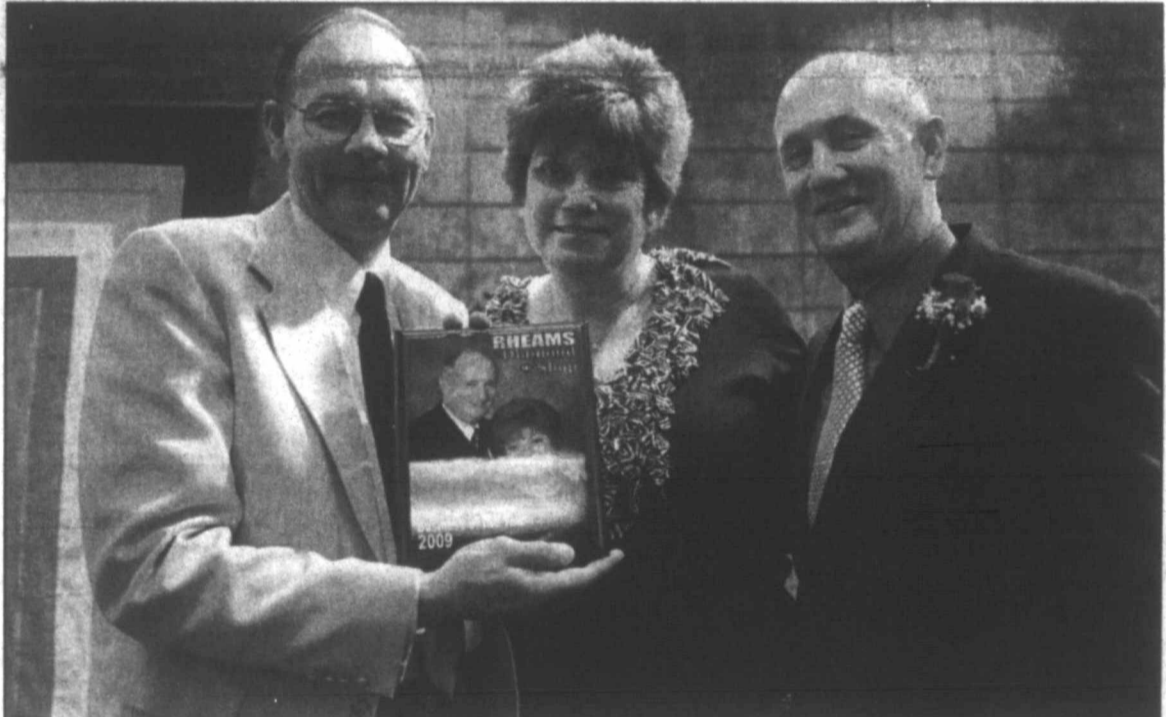

US closes consulate after border gunfights

CIUDAD JUAREZ, Mexico (AP) — The United States has temporarily closed its consular office in the Mexican border city of Reynosa, across from McAllen, Texas, after gunbattles with drug gangs rocked the area this week.

Four suspected cartel gunmen were killed Thursday outside the nearby city of Matamoros after they attacked an army patrol on a highway, Mexico's Defense Department reported.

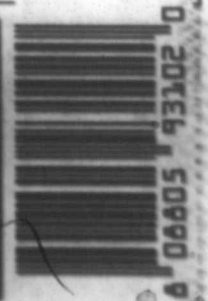


Fire damages laundromat



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Oil flirts with \$80 a barrel

NEW YORK (AP) — Oil prices jumped Friday to near \$80 a barrel after the government reported that the economy surged at a 5.9 percent pace in the final three months of 2009.

The GDP reading was the strongest in six years, though the economy isn't expected to maintain that level of growth this year.

Benchmark crude for April delivery added \$1.63 at \$79.80 a barrel on the New York Mercantile Exchange. In London, Brent crude rose \$1.59 to \$77.88 on the ICE futures exchange.

Oil prices have bobbed between \$70 and \$80 for most of the last six months as investors balance weak energy consumption in the U.S. with expectations that the world will use more crude later this year.

Crude prices also got a boost Friday from a weaker U.S. dollar. Dollar-based commodities like oil become cheaper for international investors when the dollar falls.

Meanwhile, pump prices increased for the ninth day. The average price for retail gasoline added less than a penny overnight to \$2.701 a gallon, according to AAA, Wright Express and Oil Price Information Service.

A gallon of regular unleaded is 0.6 cent more expensive than it was last month and 81.9 cents more expensive than a year ago.

In other Nymex trading in March contracts, heating oil added 4.53 cents at \$2.0315 a gallon, while gasoli

Same plane turned around 2 days in a row

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — The same American Airlines flight was forced to return to Kansas City International Airport two days in a row because of concerns about smoke and fumes.

American Airlines spokesman Tim Wagner confirmed that Flight 1592 to Dallas was returned to the airport Wednesday and Thursday.

He says the MD-80 plane returned Wednesday after a compressor stall. Mechanics lubricated the blades inside the engine. He says that on Thursday, the extra lubrication burned off, causing a smoke and odor in the aircraft.

Robyn Dickinson, a passenger on the Thursday flight, told The Kansas City Star that the pilot apologized to passengers and told them to brace for a hard impact.

The plane landed safely both times and no one was injured.

Former Enron CEO could see new trial

HOUSTON (AP) — It's a 28-word word law that's been used for more than two decades by federal prosecutors to send high-profile public officials and corporate executives, including former Enron Corp. CEO Jeff Skilling, to prison.

But the law's future could be in doubt as Skilling's appeal of his criminal convictions — in which he challenges the statute's constitutional validity — is set to be heard by the U.S. Supreme Court on Monday.

Skilling's challenge of the law is one of three the high court is hearing in its current term and legal experts say it has the best chance of convincing the justices to strike down the statute. Unclear, though, is whether a successful challenge would overturn some of Skilling's convictions or all of them, possibly resulting in a new trial. A successful challenge by Skilling could also affect convictions in other cases involving prominent defendants.

Skilling was convicted in 2006 on 19 counts of conspiracy, securities fraud, insider trading and lying to auditors for his role in the once mighty Houston-based energy giant's downfall. The company collapsed into bankruptcy in 2001 under the weight of years of illicit business deals and accounting tricks. He is serving a sentence of more than 24 years at a minimum security prison outside of Denver.

The law at issue is a 28-word addendum to the federal mail and wire fraud statute that makes it illegal for officials, executives and others to scheme to deprive those they serve and possibly others of "the intangible right to honest services."

Skilling's attorneys say the law is unconstitutionally vague. Daniel Petrocelli, Skilling's main attorney, said in his Supreme Court brief that

prosecutors have given it "whatever meaning is necessary to prosecute whatever defendant happens to be in the government's sights" and that the law "facilitates opportunistic and arbitrary prosecutions."

But federal prosecutors argued that the law is appropriate for cases involving bribes, kickbacks or conflicts of interest. They argued that Skilling feigned loyalty to Enron and its shareholders and intended to deceive them, hiding the sale of large chunks of company stock.

By participating in a scheme to disguise the company's true financial condition, he "deprived shareholders of the information they needed to make informed decisions and thereby defrauded them of his honest services," prosecutors wrote.

Skilling, 56, was the highest ranking executive to be punished for Enron's downfall. Company founder Kenneth Lay's similar convictions were vacated after he died of heart disease less than two months after trial.

The company's collapse put more than 5,000 people out of work, wiped out more than \$2 billion in employee pensions and rendered worthless \$60 billion in Enron stock. Its aftershocks were felt across the city and the energy industry.

In December, the court heard arguments in the two other cases challenging the honest services law: former newspaper mogul Conrad Black, convicted of depriving the Hollinger International media empire of his faithful services as a corporate officer, and former Alaska legislator Bruce Weyhrauch, indicted for allegedly soliciting future work from an oilfield operations company in exchange for taking steps on legislation that would benefit the firm.

Skilling's case is more of a "frontal

attack" on the law and would provide the high court with an avenue to void the statute, said Ellen Podgor, a law professor at Stetson University College of Law in Gulfport, Fla.

In the December hearing, several justices seemed to agree the law is vague and has been used to make a crime out of mistakes and minor transgressions.

"I hope for the sake of my students the court invalidates the statute," said Kelly Strader, a law professor at Southwestern Law School in Los Angeles. "My students always end up tearing their hair out because they don't know what it means."

Jack Sylvia, a Boston-based attorney and expert on securities and financial fraud litigation, said the skepticism expressed by justices in December suggests prosecutors are in trouble.

"Those in criminal defense believe it's time the Supreme Court takes a look at it," he said.

While honest services is only mentioned in the conspiracy count, Petrocelli argues all of Skilling's convictions have been tainted by the argument and thus should be overturned.

Prosecutors contend the jurors would have found Skilling guilty on the conspiracy count even without the honest services argument because they convicted him on the securities fraud counts based on many of the same claims.

Tom Curran, a New York-based defense attorney and former state prosecutor who dealt with securities fraud cases, said he believes the justices might strike down the honest services statute but leave some of Skilling's convictions intact. Sylvia and Podgor hesitate to predict what the high court will do.

Storm rakes East, more than one million in the dark

HAMPTON, N.H. (AP) — A strong-willed winter storm that began with a whimper parked itself Friday over the Northeast, bringing hurricane-force winds, flooding and more than 2 feet of snow as it cut power to more than a million homes and businesses.

Schools were canceled as far west as Cleveland and roads closed as far south as West Virginia as the slow-moving storm spent a second day parked over the region.

The storm brought a wide array of calamity over a broad area after getting a slow start Thursday, when snow began falling in the Philadelphia region around dawn but didn't start sticking to the ground until dusk.

It turned out that snow — 31 inches in Monroe, N.Y. — was only part of the story. In the parts of coastal New England where winds caused havoc, the precipitation mostly came as rain.

Power failures were so severe and widespread in New Hampshire — 330,000 customers in the dark in a state of 1.3 million people — that even the state Emergency Operations Center was operating on a generator.

In Kennebunkport, Maine, a loud boom from a transformer early Friday awoke Michael Wiewel and cut power to his home. A short time later, a 50-foot poplar crashed on his roof above the bed where he and his wife slept.

"It sounded like a bomb going off," he said.

Throughout the area, crews were cutting fallen trees that littered yards and pounded roofs. Power lines dangled free.

The highest wind reported was 91 mph in Portsmouth, N.H. — well above hurricane force of 74 mph. Gusts hit 60 mph or more from the mountains of West Virginia to New York's Long Island and Massachusetts.

In the coastal town of Hampton, the unoccupied Surf Hotel caught fire, and the howling winds quickly spread the blaze to the rest of the block. To the north in Maine, waves crashing ashore at high tide Friday morning turned beachfront streets into rivers in Saco, where storms have claimed several homes over the years.

"Felt like the walls were coming in on the house, and the windows were rattling, and the trees were cracking. It was pretty impressive," said Mark Breton, who rode out the storm in his house a few blocks from the beach.

Utility officials said in New Hampshire said it would take days before everyone's lights flickered back on.

At the peak of the outages early Friday, there were 260,000 customers without power in Connecticut, and 220,000 customers in New York, mostly in the Hudson Valley north of New York City. There were 140,000 in Maine, 100,000 in Massachusetts, 25,000 in Vermont, and 11,000 in New Jersey. Those numbers began falling Friday as crews got to work, in some places contending with toppled trees and deep snow that made it difficult to move around.

The weather also snarled traffic. A tractor-trailer jackknifed and as many as 20 trucks piled up on a mile of the Pennsylvania Turnpike, forcing closure of a 60-mile stretch in the hills of central Pennsylvania. Two injuries were reported.

1939 comic sells for more than \$1M

DALLAS (AP) — A 1939 comic book in which Batman makes his debut sold at auction Thursday for more than \$1 million, breaking a record set just three days earlier by a Superman comic, Heritage Auction Galleries said.

The Dallas-based auction house said the rare copy of Detective Comics No. 27 sold for a total of \$1,075,500, which includes the buyer's premium, to a buyer who wished to remain anonymous. The consigner wanted to

remain anonymous as well. "It pretty much blew away all of our expectations and now it's the highest price ever raised for a comic book," said Barry Sandoval, director of operations of Heritage's comics division.

A copy of the first comic book featuring Superman, a 1938 edition of Action Comics No. 1, sold Monday for \$1 million in a sale between a private seller and a private buyer, with the transaction conducted by the New York City auc-

tion site ComicConnect.com.

"We can really say that Batman has nosed out Superman, at least for now," Sandoval said.

He said the consigner had bought the Batman comic in the late 1960s for \$100. With a bright yellow background, the comic features Batman swinging on a rope above city rooftops.

"That cover is just one of the most famous of all comic book covers," Sandoval said.

J.C. Vaughn, associate publisher of The Overstreet Comic Book Price Guide, said most people had predicted it would be the comics with the first appearance of Superman and Batman that broke the \$1 million barrier. Both comics that sold this week were in great condition — scoring an 8.0 on a scale that goes up to 10, he said.

"I think that you can greenly ascribe this to a real comfort with the liquidity of rare, high grade vintage collectibles," Vaughn said.

George Pantela, owner of Melbourne, Australia-based GP Analysis, which tracks sales of certified comics from more than 20 auction houses and dealers, said the previous record was about \$317,000 paid a year ago for a lesser grade Action Comics No. 1 than the one sold this week.

Vincent Zurzolo, chief operating officer of Comicconnect.com, took the breaking of their record in stride.

"It's an exciting week in comic books when you have two comics selling for \$1 million," he said.

Stroke study finds neck stents safe, effective

SAN ANTONIO (AP) — A big study finds that people with narrowed neck arteries that could lead to a stroke can be safely treated with a less drastic option than the surgery done now.

Doctors say that hundreds of thousands of Americans a year might be able to have an artery-opening procedure and a stent instead of surgery to remove built-up plaque. A stent is a mesh tube that props the blood vessel open.

Stents have long been used to fix heart arteries but are approved for use in the neck only for people too sick for surgery. The new study, in people with less severe disease, suggests stents will find much wider use.

"The sea of people is gigantic" who could benefit, said Dr. Walter Koroshetz, deputy director of the National Institute of Neurological Disorders and Stroke, the study's main sponsor.

"We now have two safe and effective methods" to treat neck vessels, said Dr. Thomas Brott of the Mayo Clinic in Jacksonville, Fla. He led the study

and gave results Friday at an American Stroke Association conference.

The treatments have different complications, though. Strokes were more of a problem after stents, while heart attacks were more common in people given surgery. Which risks a patient chooses to take may depend on their general health, and how badly they want to avoid undergoing surgery, doctors say. A big factor will be whether Medicare decides to cover stents for this purpose.

The study enrolled 2,502 patients in the United States and Canada. Half had recent symptoms such as a mini stroke. The rest had no symptoms but significantly narrowed neck arteries. They were given either surgery or a stent.

A month later, about 4 percent of the stent group had suffered strokes versus 2 percent of those who had surgery. About 2 percent of the surgery group had heart attacks compared to 1 percent of those given stents. The overall rate of major complications did not differ between the groups.

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Duncan to lose 150 Halliburton jobs to transfer

DUNCAN, Okla. (AP) — Halliburton Co. plans to transfer about 150 employees in Duncan to a research and development facility being built in Houston.

The company began telling employees of its plans last week. Among the employees to be relocated from the company's former hometown are chemists and engineers. About 400 employees work at Halliburton's technology center in Duncan.

Halliburton spokeswoman Diana Gabriel says the transfers are planned for 2012. She says Halliburton's new research and development facility in Houston will support about 2,200 employees.

Halliburton was founded in 1919 and based in Duncan until 1961.

Duncan Chamber of Commerce President Debra Burch says she's confident Halliburton will maintain a presence in the Stephens County town.

that a series of clashes on Tuesday farther west along the border killed six gunmen and one soldier. Ten soldiers and a police officer were wounded.

"The U.S. Consulate General in Matamoros has restricted the travel of American officials to Reynosa until further notice," read the statement, dated Wednesday. "The Consulate General also has temporarily closed the Reynosa Consular Agency until further notice."

Harvesters open Snelgrooes era with two wins

The Pampa Harvesters won their first two games in the Snelgrooes era 14-3 over Dalhart and 5-2 over Borger Thursday at Harvester Field in the Cavalier Classic.

Head Coach Kaleb Snelgrooes said the only moment bigger for him was the birth of his son.

"It feels exactly like I wanted it to," Snelgrooes said. "To be raised in this town, raised in this program and come back and start 2-0, besides the birth of my son it doesn't get better than this."

The Harvesters opened the Cavalier Classic with the Dalhart Golden Wolves. It didn't take long for Pampa to take the lead. After ending the Golden Wolves first on a double play, Pampa's first three batters reached base in their half of the first. Braden Hunt drove in the first run of the season when he walked with the bases loaded scoring Doug Smith. Anthony Allen expanded Pampa's lead to two when he scored on a passed ball. The Harvesters ended the inning stranding runners on second and third.

Dalhart went three up and three down in the top of the second. The Harvesters broke the game open in their half of the second. Pampa sent 10 batters to the plate, got four hits and scored six runs. Brent Green drove in two with a double and Tyler Malone also batted in two runs with a double. Cole Engle scored on an error and Mitch Simon scored on a wild pitch. The Harvesters led 8-0 after two.

In the third the Golden Wolves got on the scoreboard. Dalhart led off with a single and got another base hit after a strike out. After a walk that loaded the bases, the Golden Wolves got a single and scored their first run. The Harvesters made a key defensive play as they threw one of the Golden Wolves out at home. Dalhart scored two more on an error on the second baseman but Pampa ended the inning throwing

someone out at home.

That would be the only runs, the Harvesters would allow. Smith reached base after he was hit by a pitch and stole second after getting on base. After Allen popped out to third, Mitchell Killgo reached on an error by Dalhart's third baseman that scored Smith to make it 9-3. Killgo stole second and third. Hunt, Collin Killgo and Green reached with walks and Mitchell Killgo scored on Green's walk. Tyler Malone drove in the last two runs of the inning with a single. Pampa led 12-3 after four.

Pampa scored two more runs in the fourth. Mitchell Killgo brought home Allen on a double and advanced to third on a wild pitch. Collin Killgo brought home his older brother on a suicide squeeze. The younger Killgo (Collin) was the starting pitcher, and pitched three innings, allowed three runs on four hits, walked one and struck out three to pick up his first win of the season. Green pitched the last two innings and gave up no runs on two hits and struck out five.

Malone went two for three, with a double and batted in three runs. Mitchell Killgo was two for three, scored three runs, drove in one and stole two bases. Allen went two for three and scored three runs. Hunt walked in all four plate appearances, scored two runs, stole one base, and drove one in. Smith stole two bases and got one base hit.

About 30 minutes later the Harvesters played their second game this one against the Borger Bulldogs. At the beginning of the game both teams pitchers were in control as they pitched two scoreless innings. Braden Hunt was Pampa's starting pitcher and only allowed two walks and one hit. Hunt escaped the second by throwing two of the Bulldogs out at third. Pampa was only able to reach base on a walk in the first two innings. That runner was erased in the first on a double play.

Borger broke the scoreless tie in the third. The

Bulldogs first two batters grounded out and struck out. The next batter reached on a walk and stole second. Borger scored their first run on an error. The Bulldogs made it 2-0 as they scored on a single. After allowing another base hit, Snelgrooes pulled Hunt for Malone. The new pitcher took care of business as he struck out the last batter.

The Harvesters answered back in the third, Malone led off with a single, and advanced to second on a groundout. Zach Murray reached as he was hit by a pitch. Smith grounded into a fielders choice which advanced Malone to third and Murray was out at second. Malone scored on a hit by Allen to cut Borger's lead to one after three.

In the fourth, Malone only gave up a walk, and kept that runner at third base as the Harvesters trailed by one going into the bottom of the inning. Collin Killgo reached with a walk and Brent Green singled. Malone sacrificed bunted to move Killgo and Green to second and third. After Cole Engle struck out, Murray drove in Killgo and Green to give the Harvesters a 3-2 lead. Allen drove in two more with a single, scoring Murray and Smith. Malone only gave up a walk in the fifth and after that the game was called due to the decreasing daylight. Snelgrooes said Malone, Murray and Allen came up big in the second game.

"Tyler Malone the kid that hasn't played baseball since he was 12, grew up right in front of our eyes tonight," Snelgrooes said. "Comes out and gets the win, pitched his heart out for us and gets us our second win...Murray comes up clutches up and gets two runs. Couldn't ask more from him, didn't play the first game but played the second game and does that. Allen the same thing gets two RBIs late."

Malone pitched two innings and a third, only gave up one walk, and hit one batter, and struck five to pick up the win. Hunt pitched the first two

TPWD to wrap up Dove study

AUSTIN — A bird in the hand is worth two in the bush and Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials are content with the 1,360 birds collected during two years of field research comparing lead and non-lead ammunition effectiveness for doves.

Public concern about the incidence of lead in the environment is growing. This issue has been discussed by the Central Flyway for the past five years. It is conceivable that non-lead shot requirements could be proposed for the hunting of all migratory game birds, including doves at some future date. This could have considerable impact in Texas,

which boasts the nation's largest dove population at an estimated 20-25 million breeding birds and a rich hunting tradition that sees from 300,000 to 350,000 hunters take to the field each fall. Texas hunters harvest about 6.4 million doves annually or roughly 30 percent of all doves taken nationally.

There is also an economic consideration. Based on a 2005 survey conducted for the U. S. Census Bureau and the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service by Southwick and Associates, Texas dove hunting has an economic impact of \$316 million annually. Texas dove hunting produces 3,145 jobs in the private

sector and \$21 million in sales tax revenue.

Given the popularity of dove hunting in Texas, TPWD is conducting a study to determine the effectiveness of lead versus non-lead shot on dove under real Texas hunting conditions. This study was designed by an internationally recognized shotgun ballistics expert, who has designed over a dozen similar studies involving waterfowl and upland game birds. This research is supported by many organizations, including the Central Flyway Council, the Association of Fish and Wildlife Agencies and the Wildlife Management Institute.

The goal of the dove lethality study was to collect between 1,050 and 1,500 one-shot-kill doves under real hunting conditions. Wildlife officials need fewer than 200 samples to reach the 1,500 benchmark, but say they will forego a third collection effort this year after preliminary statistical evaluations and discussions with ballistic and university consultants.

"Statistical analysis of the existing data indicates that one more year of dove collection will not significantly enhance our understanding derived from the data collected thus far.

If you haven't already done so, "Speak!" to your wife about it and tell her you need some of those demonstrations of affection aimed in your direction -- or someone's going to wind up in the doghouse, and it won't be Barkley.

DEAR ABBY: My husband, "Brian," has a terminal illness and only a few months more to live. We have been married four years. I fell out of love with him shortly after our wedding, and now he's sick. I'm his only caregiver.

for our child, but it's difficult when you're being put down or ordered around all the time. What can I do? Just hang in there until it's over? I'm confused, lost, depressed, and I cry all the time. Please help. -- WANTS OUT IN SOUTH CAROLINA

DEAR WANTS OUT: Please accept my sympathy. What you're experiencing is the most difficult of life's transitions -- painful, exhausting, sometimes thankless. But for your sake, please don't give up now. Once this is over you will emerge stronger, more confident -- and knowing you did your best and fulfilled your wedding vows to the very end.

Although you feel alone right now, you are experiencing what many other caregivers do when dealing with a loved one who is dying. Because you feel

isolated, you might benefit from contacting the Family Caregiver Alliance. Its toll-free telephone number is 800-445-8106; the Web site is www.caregiver.org.

DEAR ABBY: When I started dating this guy, "Mitch," everything was great. We were happy and made each other laugh. After three months, he left me a message saying he had to go out of state for work and would call when he got to where he was going. All I got was silence. 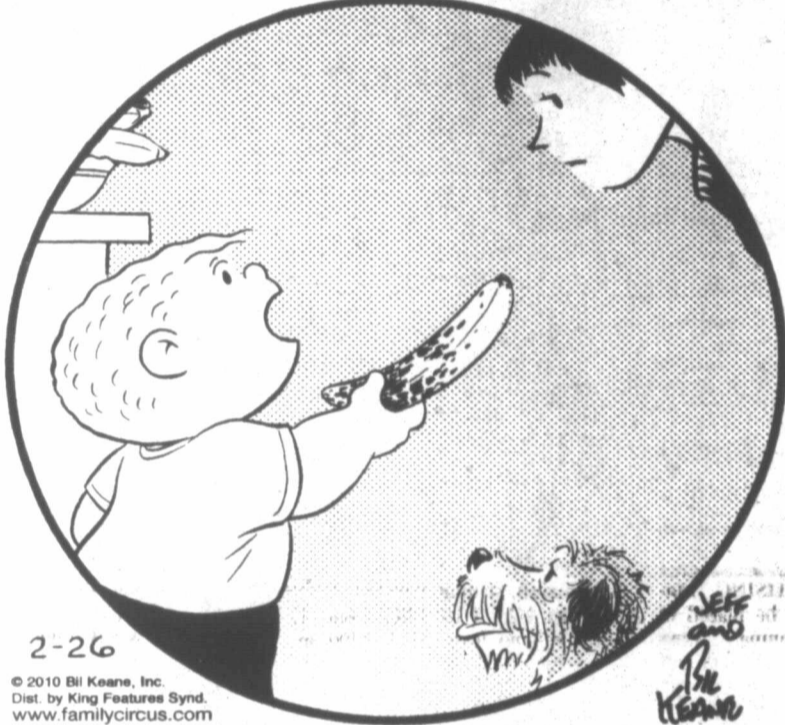

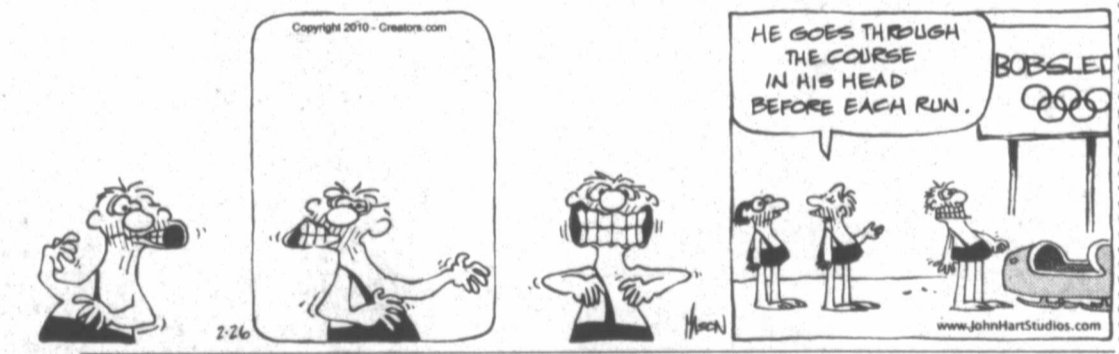

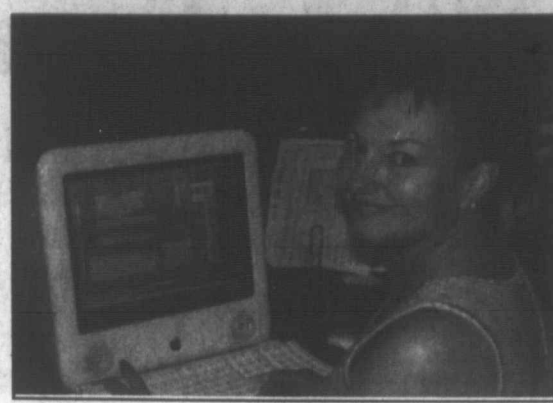
