take place right on July 15, meaning the clinic will stay open and will be seeing patients directly after Dr. Bhatia's departure.

The long-term goal, Buck added, is to expand the clinic's operations to better incorporate it under the PRMC umbrella. "Our intention," Buck said, "is to be what we call a hospital-based Medicare clinic, to expand and offer more opportunity for people to seek healthcare locally."

"It's not going to happen overnight, but we are certainly working towards that capacity. In the meantime, we want to assure the community that we're just not going to abandon them. The practice will be moving forward."

Buck added that no action will need to be made by patients with regards to the switch. Dr. Bhatia's patient files and other records are being moved to the PRMC.

He also said that if Dr. Bhatia's patients wish to seek other medical providers, they are certainly free to do so and that the PRMC would help facilitate the transfer of their records.

He did, however, encourage Dr. Bhatia's patients to see what the new PRMC-led clinic will have to offer.

"It's a difficult situation because it's not our practice," Buck said. "It was a difficult decision for him to leave, I'm sure, and I know that it leaves a lot of uncertainty with some people. We want to do everything we can to eliminate that uncertainty."

"I think that people will be very pleased with what we can bring to the table, and we're looking forward to working with Dr. Bhatia's patients and providing them with the best medical care and service that we can."

More E. coli in Texas water?

HOUSTON (AP) - Texas environmental regulators will consider lowering the standard for E. coli bacteria in recreational waters, a move that increases the risk to public health.

The governor-appointed, rule-making body of the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality will meet Wednesday. Its staff and scientists recommend the standards be loosened.

However, environmental groups warn that would put the public at risk. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency hasn't lowered its standards.

TCEQ aquatic scientist Jim Davenport says loosening the standards slightly would increase the risk of stomach illness. However, he says it's necessary to allow the state to focus more on heavily polluted bodies of water.

If approved, the rule could take effect by July 22. It also requires EPA approval.

Briscoe to be buried Thursday

UVALDE (AP) - Former Texas Gov. Dolph Briscoe will be buried in a family plot at one of his ranches in South Texas on Thursday.

Darrell Zimmerman, an office manager at Briscoe Ranch, says a public memorial service will be held in Uvalde at St. Philip's Episcopal Church at 10 a.m. A reception and private burial at the ranch in Reagan Wells will be held later in the day.

Briscoe, who died Sunday, will be buried next to his wife, Janey, who died in 2000.

The 87-year-old lifelong Texan presided over the state from 1972 to 1978, at a time when the state was enjoying an oil and gas boom. The conservative Democrat suffered a stunning loss in 1978 when he was ousted in the primary.

Alex brings the rain to Texas

BROWNSVILLE (AP) - Hurricane Alex is dumping rain in the Rio Grande Valley but easing concerns along the Texas side of the border as the Category 1 storm churns toward Mexico.

Cameron County Judge Carlos Cascos said Wednesday that Brownsville and surrounding areas had "dodged a potentially violent storm." But flooding was still a worry, with Alex expected to make landfall later Wednesday.

Mexico was expected to take the brunt of Alex, but forecasters say some parts of deep south Texas could get as much as 15 inches of rain.

At least 70 residents had already taken shelter at a Brownsville high school. State officials also said they could shut down the causeway to South Padre Island if conditions became bad enough.

BP 'didn't consider hurricanes'

WASHINGTON (AP) - Rep. Edward Markey says BP's disaster response plan for an oil spill doesn't mention hurricanes or tropical storms.

Markey says the omission is yet another example of what the oil giant was not prepared to handle.

The Massachusetts Democrat's comments came during a congressional hearing on a law to improve technology intended to prevent disasters like the Deepwater Horizon oil spill.

Officials responding to the oil spill in the Gulf Coast are scrambling to prepare for Hurricane Alex, which is expected to touch the lower half of the Rio Grande Valley tonight. The center of the storm is expected to hit 100 miles south of the U.S. border.

Slaying suspect to return

SAN MARCOS (AP) - A man charged in an April slaying in Hays County faces extradition after a nearly nine-hour motel standoff in Branson, Mo.

Extradition is pending for 51-year-old Mark David Simmons, who is charged with capital murder. Investigators say the body of Steven Wayne Woelfel of Buda (BYOO-duh) was found in his burning house in April.

Simmons surrendered Tuesday afternoon, with no shots fired, after a standoff that began when an officer spotted a vehicle matching the description of one used in the holdup of two Branson motels.

Simmons faces extradition to San Marcos, about 30 miles south of Austin.

Clemens vs. Clemens tonight

MIDLAND (AP) - Get ready for Clemens vs. Clemens. Roger Clemens is expected to pitch against his son, Koby, on tonight in the Home Run Derby prior to the Texas League All-Star game in Midland, Texas.

Because of the format, the Rocket will actually be trying to let his son take him deep as often as possible.

Koby is among eight batters. It's not clear how many others his dad will face.

Koby is a first baseman for the Houston Astros' Double-A affiliate in Corpus Christi. He is second in the league in home runs (16) and RBIs (53). Once it looked like he would be an All-Star, Roger Clemens called event organizers and offered to take part.

Lawmaker parks tainted Benz

DALLAS (AP) - A Dallas-area lawmaker on the powerful House Transportation Committee says she has stopped driving a Mercedes-Benz and a Chevy SUV owned by a company that makes millions through state transportation contracts.

The Dallas Morning News reported Thursday that Rep. Linda Harper-Brown was concerned that her constituents saw a possible conflict of interest even though she says she did nothing wrong.

The 2010 Mercedes E550 and 2004 Chevrolet Tahoe were part of a compensation package given by Durable Enterprises Equipment Ltd. to the Irving Republican's husband. The company is part of a group that does business with the state on issues Harper-Brown has worked on.

Oil regulation agency gets name makeover

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Minerals Management Service — well, the name anyway — now sits on the scrap heap of discarded monikers alongside ValuJet, Blackwater and Enron Field. Not that a new name makes it any easier for the Obama administration to convince a skeptical Congress that the agency will be any better at policing offshore drilling.

The new name, the Bureau of Ocean Energy Management, Regulation and Enforcement — or BOE for short — is designed to emphasize regulatory and enforcement responsibilities of the troubled agency, which is part of the Interior Department. The change comes in the wake of the disastrous BP oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico.

MMS had been panned for its lax oversight of offshore drilling. A recent report by the department's inspector general said that its drilling regulators have been so close to the industry that they've accepted gifts from oil and gas companies and even negotiated to go work for the companies.

Michael R. Bromwich, the new head of the MMS — er, BOE — assured Congress that the change is much more than cosmetic.

"I think it's substantive," Bromwich said. "Regulation and enforcement have been added to the title of the agency because those elements, I think, by consensus have been lacking in the approach of the agency."

One marketing expert told The Associated Press that the Obama administration has made a mistake by changing the name at a time when the agency is still the focus of negative attention. The danger, said Kelly O'Keefe, managing director of the Virginia Commonwealth University Brandcenter, is that the new name gets tarnished with the old baggage.

"If you're trying to dodge a negative situation, it is a very bad idea to do that in the middle of that negative situation," O'Keefe said.

"Because what happens is the bad news isn't over — it certainly isn't for MMS or BP."

"It's really hard to pull a fake-out, to say, 'Hey, we're something different now,'" O'Keefe added. "We tend to see through that."

Or, as "The Daily Show" host Jon Stewart deadpanned last week, "Are we really that stupid?"

"This isn't just a name change or branding exercise," said Interior spokeswoman Kendra Barkoff. The new name, she said, reflects Interior Secretary Ken Salazar's mission for the agency as it undergoes reorganization. Salazar plans to break up the agency into three separate entities to eliminate conflicts of interest.

Government agencies have been changing their names since the beginning of the republic. In 1789, just a few months into its existence, the Department of Foreign Affairs became the State Department. According to the State Department website, that switch was made because the agency took over several new domestic responsibilities, such as custody of the Great Seal of the United States.

When it comes to MMS, Stewart questioned the need for a new name.

"Why don't we just rename the water in the Gulf 'H2O Black'?" he asked.

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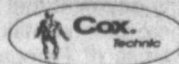

Today is Wednesday, June 30, the 181st day of 2010. There are 184 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On June 30, 1860, the famous Oxford University Museum debate on Darwin's theory of evolution took place as Anglican Bishop Samuel Wilberforce led his side in denouncing the concept, while biologist T.H. Huxley rose to defend it. (Although exact details of the debate, which was not transcribed, are in dispute, it is generally believed that Huxley's side prevailed.)

On this date:

In 1859, French acrobat Charles Blondin walked back and forth on a tightrope above the gorge of Niagara Falls as thousands of spectators watched.

In 1908, the Tunguska Event took place in Russia as an asteroid exploded above Siberia, leaving 800 square miles of scorched or blown-down trees.

In 1921, President Warren G. Harding nominated former President William Howard Taft to be chief justice of the United States, succeeding the late Edward Douglass White.

In 1934, Adolf Hitler carried out his "blood purge" of political and military rivals in Germany in what came to be known as "The Night of the Long Knives."

In 1958, the U.S. Senate passed the Alaska statehood bill by a vote of 64-20.

In 1960, Belgian Congo achieved independence.

In 1963, Pope Paul VI was installed as 262nd head of the Roman Catholic Church.

In 1971, a Soviet space mission ended in tragedy when three cosmonauts aboard Soyuz 11 were found dead inside their spacecraft after it had returned to Earth.

In 1985, 39 American hostages from a hijacked TWA jetliner were freed in Beirut after being held 17 days.

Ten years ago: Nine people died in a crush of fans during a rock festival in Roskilde (ROH'-skihl-duh), Denmark.

Five years ago: Federal Reserve policymakers boosted the federal funds rate by one-quarter percentage point to 3.25 percent, the ninth such increase since the Fed began to tighten credit in June 2004 in an effort to keep inflation under control. Spain became the third country (after the Netherlands and Belgium) to legalize gay marriage nationwide.

One year ago: Former "Saturday Night Live" comedian Al Franken was declared the winner of Minnesota's eight-month U.S. Senate vote recount, defeating Republican incumbent Norm Coleman.

Today's Birthdays: Singer Glenn Shorrock is 66. Jazz musician Stanley Clarke is 59. Actor David Garrison is 58. Rock musician Hal Lindes (Dire Straits) is 57. Actor-comedian David Alan Grier is 54. 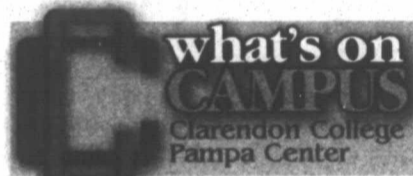

Worn-out ribbons now a different symbol

Edith Shain was 91 years old when she died peacefully last week in her home in Los Angeles. You knew her as the woman in the iconic black and white photo of a jubilant soldier kissing a nurse in Times Square on V-J Day. The snapshot tells an American tale of a war ending and an entire generation of people coupling up — creating the suburbs, a solid middle-class and a stupendous baby boom.

What strikes me about the photo is that they really knew how to end wars back then. For example: they used to end wars...back then. There was a global conflict followed by a resolution. Beginning. Middle. End. Done. Birthrate skyrocketed.

Now we have two never-ending wars and Cialis commercials on an eternal loop. How far we've come.

The U.S. decided to invade Afghanistan after September 11th in 2001. As troops were being mobilized, Americans preemptively bought yellow ribbons to show support for the mission and the troops. Yellow ribbons also appeared in 1979 during the Iran Hostage Crisis and again in 1991 for the troops in Operation Desert Storm. Then ten years later they were back, displayed for all to see: tied to trees, flagpoles, telephone poles and every pole in between. Our nation was awash in American flags and yellow ribbons. "These colors don't run!"

The other day I saw a yellow ribbon stuck in a chain link fence. The ribbon was tattered, frayed and sun-faded. The war in Afghanistan is so long it has outlasted the material of the ribbons initially supporting the effort. An original ribbon from this current war is now an antique.

support for what had become not one, but two wars. Yellow ribbons were ubiquitous. And then gradually the magnets starting disappearing until they were gone. Individually — one by one — in private, with no fanfare and no media coverage — Americans removed their patriotic yellow ribbon magnets from their vehicles. You don't see them anymore. Apparently something as temporary as a magnet shaped like a ribbon is not the proper symbol for the war we are actually waging.

With all the red-baiting and pundit-driven fear of the U.S. becoming a communist country because we no longer let health insurance companies deny coverage to sick children, we've lost sight of an important fact: the Soviet Union — communists — lost their collective red shirts in Afghanistan. The perils of fighting a determined local force whose idea of infrastructure is a bridge to the sixth century proved too enormous for the last super power that fought there.

In fact, Afghanistan is an empire graveyard. It has been for millennia. How about this for a foreign policy: don't invade a place where

the last successful incursion was led by Genghis Khan.

Last week a Rolling Stone article about the war in Afghanistan resulted in the retirement of General Stanley McChrystal, Commander of U.S. Forces Afghanistan. The media attention focused on the personnel issue in the chain of command. What was skipped over was the passage about the COIN (acronym for counter-insurgency) doctrine created by McChrystal's replacement, General David Petraeus. "The COIN doctrine, bizarrely, draws inspiration from some of the biggest Western military embarrassments in recent memory: France's nasty war in Algeria (lost in 1962) and the American misadventure in Vietnam (lost in 1975)," wrote reporter Michael Hastings.

That's right. We are looking at past mistakes and incorporating them into our current conflict — which is like gathering a bunch of defective parts, putting them into your new car and being surprised by the outcome.

So far the war in Afghanistan has cost the U.S. \$300 billion. It's already the longest war America has ever fought. The date President Obama gave for the start of withdrawal is July 2011. The war hawks argue this is too soon.

As if. You can say many things about the war in Afghanistan but "not long enough" is not one of them.

Maybe those worn-out ribbons are more of a symbol than we planned on.

you know is making money to buy something you think will make money," he said.

So he approached his friend ("He and I ride Harleys together," Milton said) T. C. Lovins about a partnership. They pooled their resources and four years ago bought Easy's Eastside Package Store at 201 East Brown Street.

"We got our feet wet and we like the business pretty well," Cook said. "Then we heard through the grapevine that Onie's was for sale."

Cook said he and Lovins met with Onie's former owner and worked out a deal to buy the business, located on Price Road.

"We kinda thought it was a done deal, but for whatever reason, it fell through and so, we thought we'd just build one from the ground up," he explained. And that they did, right next door to Onie's.

"We wanted something different, that was big and had a lot of selection," Cook said.

So he and Lovins, along with their contractor, visited 20-25 liquor stores and found the features they liked best to go into the design of their new store.

"The main idea is convenience," he noted. "There is nothing in the area with a double drive-through. We also decided to have a beer cave that we keep at 32 degrees. We have a large selection of craft beers, an Asian beer section, a Mexican beer section, a European beer section, and a Texas beer section."

"Our primary goal was to have a large selection; to give people a choice. There are literally thousands of brands. If we don't have it in the store, we can get it for them."

The store is designed to be a one-stop supply store for anyone planning a party.

"We've got paper goods, glassware, bar supplies, mixers, soft drinks, ready-to-serve cocktails, everything you need," he said. "We are also going to be distributors for kegators, refrigerated containers for kegs, and for margarita machines."

The store boasts a large wine selection, too, and will evolve as people make their favorites known. The same is true of a large selection of tequilas, bourbons and other spirits.

Cook, 41, moved to Pampa in 1991, fresh from graduation at Texas Tech. He had managed a couple of Subway stores in Lubbock and was looking for a place for his own franchise.

"I jumped in the car, came to Pampa and found a place to lease," he said. "At the time the panhandle was wide open. There was only one Subway restaurant in Amarillo."

In 1992, his future wife moved to Pampa from Cleburne (where he is from) to work for the local hospital. She would up working for the Chamber of Commerce. Milton proposed to Julie in the chamber office.

"We've always felt like Pampa was our hometown," he said. "Our first daughter was born here and we have lots of good friends here."

The daughter, Marcee, is 10, and now has two brothers, Cody, 8, and Caden, 5.

In the meantime, they also opened a Subway in Perryton.

"In 1996, I started a catering business out of my house and the Subway, just cooking for people we knew around here," Cook said. "Everyone kept encouraging me to open a steakhouse or a barbecue place. We tried really hard to get one going here, but couldn't get everything to work together. There was a local pharmacist here who moved to Canadian and bought a pharmacy there."

"One day I went to Canadian to an auction at a restaurant that was going out of business to buy some equipment for a steakhouse here than I had not quite gotten together. I ran into him and asked him, 'Where are you going to eat if this restaurant is closing down?' He said, 'We will go to Pampa or wherever.'"

He found out that the old Moody Hotel was available for rent at good price.

"I told Julie that we would go to a local bank and see what they say," he recalled. "If they say no to a loan, it wasn't meant to be."

It turned out that the bank wanted his restaurant in town enough to lower the loan's interest rate by a point.

The new business, which opened in 2000, necessitated a family move to Canadian.

"We hated to leave Pampa," Cook said, "but it is the kind of business where you have to be there all the time. The Subways and the liquor stores — we can hire managers and kind of oversee those, but with a steakhouse you have to be there all the time."

The new store on Price Road is an investment in the future of Pampa.

"Pampa has always been a town of cycles," Cook said. "I've seen it when there were 200 houses for sale in town and I've seen it when there were no houses for sale."

"Last year, business was slow — 2009 was probably one of the slowest years we've seen. 2008 was the best year we've ever had. And this year we are back on track. It comes and goes and now it seems to be coming back."

"We are glad to be here. It turned out to be a really nice looking store and we are very proud of it."

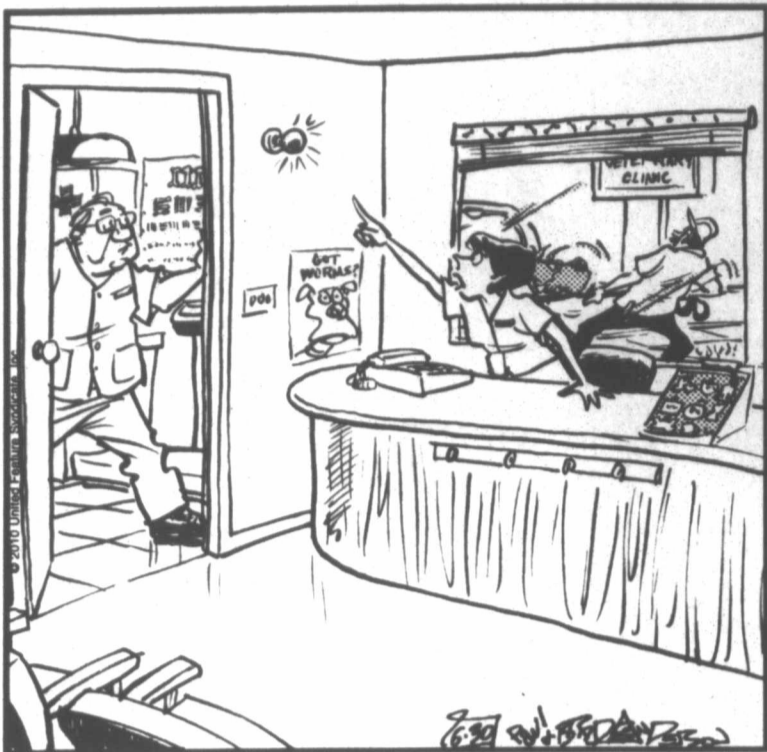
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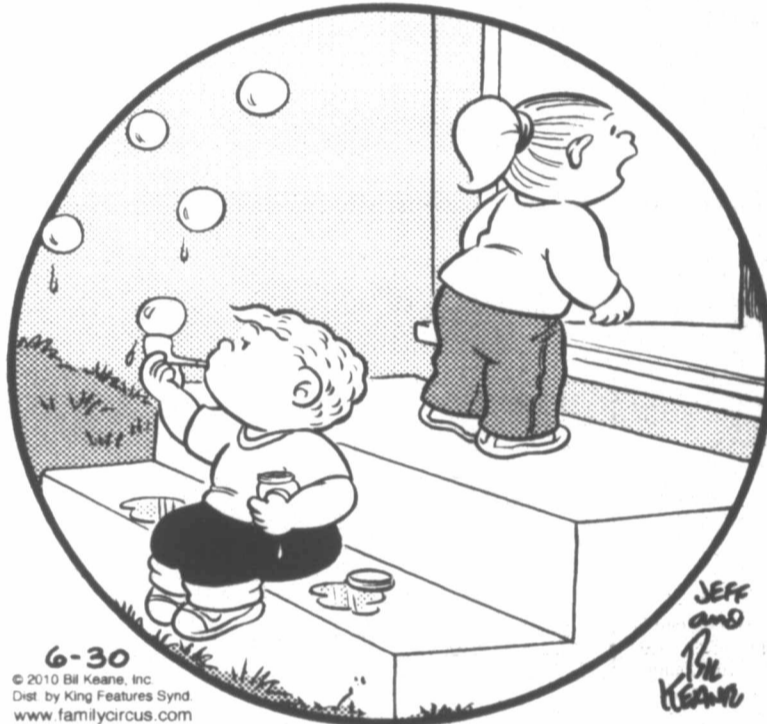

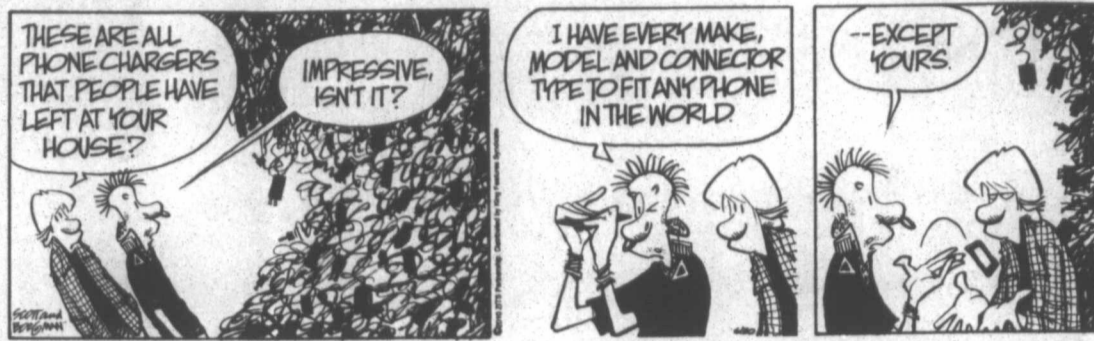

Pampa All-Stars start round robin tourney 3-1

Pampa's 11-12 round robin tournament continued Sunday with two more games. The early game featured a rematch from the Saturday evening game, but with a different result as Pampa was able to pull out a 3-2 victory over North Randall County. Adam Zuniga got the start for Pampa and out-dueled the Randall pitcher for five innings. Zuniga gave up two runs on three hits; he hit one batter and struck out five. Cade Engle came on in the sixth in a save situation and shut Randall down with a strike out and a couple of easy ground balls back at the pitcher.

The Randall pitching staff did a good job of keeping Pampa hitters off balance all day by mixing up their fastball and curveball. Engle was able to draw a walk in the first and quickly stole second to put himself in scoring position. Zuniga grounded out to short but Engle was able to score from second on the hit and run to take Pampa to an early 1-0 lead. Pampa's bats went dead for the next three innings allowing Randall to tie the score in the third at 1-1 and eventually took a 2-1 lead in the top of fifth. In the bottom of the fifth, Pampa changed game plans and began to play small ball as Kyndan Lott drew a one-out walk. Carson Eubank came on to pinch run for Lott and quickly stole second base. Braden Keown then worked a walk putting runners at first and second. A sacrifice bunt by Brandon Sieck and an error by Randall plated Eubank and put Keown at third and Sieck at first. Brendon Woelfle then squeezed in Sieck for the go ahead run

and a well deserved 3-2 victory.

Kyndan Lott got the call against Canyon and, behind outstanding run support, got a 13-1 win. Lott threw three innings striking out seven and walking no one. He gave up one hit to Canyon's lead off batter but he was immediately thrown out by the Engle to Zuniga connection trying to steal second. Julian Silva pitched the fourth in and gave up one hit and struck out one.

Brendon Woelfle led off with a single and scored on an RBI single by Engle. Zuniga reached on an error and Engle scampered home on a passed ball. A walk to Burrell and another passed ball plated Zuniga. Keown singled and scored Burrell to give Pampa an early 4-0 lead. The second inning was much of the same for Pampa as Sieck worked a walk, and then Engle singled and scored Sieck. A Zuniga ground out scored Engle. Burrell stole a couple of bases and scored on a passed ball. Pampa notched three runs in the second and owned a comfortable 7-0 lead. Pampa extended its lead in the third by executing its version of small ball. Lott was hit by a pitch to lead off the inning. A sacrifice bunt by Keown and an error by Canyon put Lott on third and Keown on first. Keown stole second then Sieck squeezed in Lott putting Keown on third and Sieck on first. Pampa went to the well one more time with Woelfle up and he squeezed in Keown. Engle hit into a fielders choice but scored Sieck. Engle quickly stole second and third then was squeezed in by Zuniga who hustled down to first, stole second and third. Bryson Burrell's sacrifice bunt

scored Zuniga. Rance Tipps added a booming double to score Burrell and bring Pampa's run total to six in the third and a 13-0 lead.

Pampa takes a 3-1 record into the State Tournament set to begin July 10.

The 11-12 Pampa All-Stars opened their season Saturday with a 1-1 record. Cade Engle got the start in the opening game Saturday morning for Pampa and delivered three strong innings to pick up the win in the 7-3 opening round victory over Canyon. Engle struck out five, walked one and did not give up a hit. Rhett Harden helped keep the no hitter alive on a diving catch in right field. Zach Hill came in the fourth in relief and was touched for three runs on three singles, walking two and striking out one. Bryson Burrell picked up the save with two strong innings giving up one hit, striking out two and did not issue any free passes.

Offensively for Pampa, Adam Zuniga singled, stole two stolen bases and scored in the bottom of the first to give Pampa a 1-0 lead.

The second inning was a big one for Pampa as Harden reached on an error, and scored on a RBI single by Braden Keown. Keown moved to second on a passed ball and stole third on a fake bunt by Brandon Sieck, who worked a walk. Brendon Woelfle singled, advanced Sieck to third and scored Keown. Engle followed with a long single off the top of the centerfield fence and scored Sieck and Woelfle. Engle was stranded at third but Pampa scored four runs on three hits to take a 5-0 lead into the third inning. Woelfle reached on an

error in the top of the fifth and scored on a single by Engle. Engle stole second and third, then scored on a Zuniga ground ball to give Pampa its 7-3 victory.

In the second game Saturday Pampa dropped a 13-12 thriller to North Randall County. Lott took the loss giving up six runs on five hits in two innings of work. Lott struck out two but didn't get much help from a defense that committed three errors in the second inning. Burrell relieved in the third and part of the fourth giving up seven runs on six hits, and hit one. Engle relieved Burrell in the fourth with one out and also pitched the fifth inning, he hit one and walked one but did not give up any runs in one and two thirds innings of work.

Offensively for Pampa, Woelfle got started with a double to left field and scored the only run of the inning for the green and gold on a single by Zuniga. In the second inning, Lott and Keown both reached on errors, to start the second inning and Sieck walked to load the bases. Woelfle plated Lott on a ground out then Engle added to his RBI total with a two-run single to right center. Engle stole second and third then scored on suicide squeeze by Zuniga. A single by Lott, a walk to Sieck and another single by Woelfle notched one more run in the third. Engle singled to lead off the fourth then stole second and third. Zuniga walked and Engle scampered home on a passed ball. Randall continued to issue free passes as Burrell, Harden and Eubanks each drew walks in the fourth

that netted Pampa four more runs. Pampa could not get anything going in the fifth but almost rallied in the sixth with Rance Tipps and Harden each drew walks and scored.

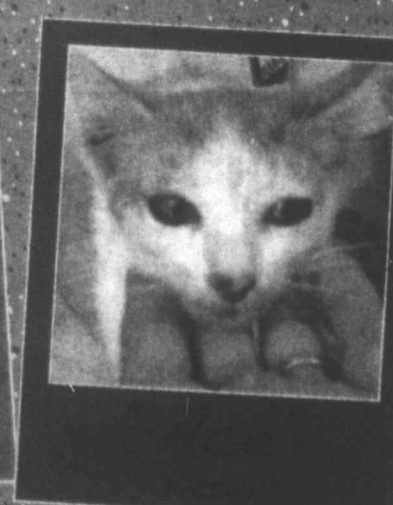
