The party will start before noon Saturday in front of Dolly's Bar and Grill on Cuyler.

The proceeds will go to beautify downtown Pampa. "We'll have entertainment starting at 11 a.m.," said David Howard of Dolly's, "and we'll serve food."

At 1 p.m., he said there would be a live auction. "We've got various items like earrings from Rheams Jewelry," Howard said.

There will also be a guitar auctioned off that's been

signed by Matt Martindale, Kevin White and Michael Van, all of whom will perform during the day.

Kevin White will be playing from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m., and Rip Medlinger will be playing inside Dolly's from 4 p.m. to 5 p.m.

There will be other music starting from 6 p.m. to 8:30 p.m.

"Michael Van will play from 9 p.m. to midnight," Howard said.

Howard said the guitar in the auction was donated by Hastings.

He said a silent auction will run from 11 a.m. to 5 p.m. "It has various items,"

Howard said. He said door prizes will be given away at 5 p.m. Saturday.

Disc golf tourney to christen course

Event serves as 'thank you' to new course's sponsors

Players will tee off Saturday morning for Pampa's premier Disc Golf Tournament.

"We'll have a regular tournament that will consist of a full 18 holes," said Kelley Dewey, tournament director and the moving force behind the new disc golf course. "We'll have an 18-hole round in the morning. We're going to have a lunch, and then have another round in the afternoon."

He said there would be prizes for the winners as well as for such things as

the longest drive and closest to the pin.

"We're going to have a 50-foot putt at a basket," Dewey said, "and we'll give that basket away."

He said they're also planning a raffle.

"We'll have a whole bunch of stuff," Dewey said, "and just a lot of fun."

Registration for the tournament will start about 8:45 a.m. Saturday at the Disc Golf Course in Highland Park, just north of the Super Playground.

"We'll have a shotgun start around 9 a.m. to 9:15 a.m.," he said. "The Number One tee box is near the small

playground just north of the Super Playground."

Dewey said he expects about 50 entries for the tournament.

"Right now, we've got about 20, and we're expecting at least another 20 or 25 people," he said. "You just never know."

Dewey, who designed the course and approached the City Commission with the idea earlier this year, explained that the game is playing in a manner similar to regular golf, but with flat disks being sailed through the air rather than with clubs and golf balls. Players

Reminder: Jr. Rodeo deadline is Wednesday

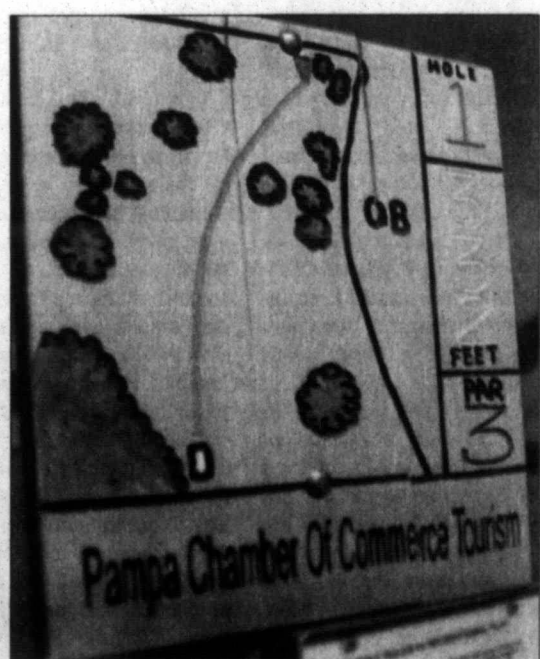

Dear Abby...

DEAR ABBY, I'm a gay 44-year-old man with self-esteem problems. I have never seen myself as worthy of affection, and I don't consider myself attractive. I have never been in a relationship, and no one outside of my family has ever said "I love you" to me.

I have recently tried to come out of my shell. As a result, the network of people I associate with has tripled — and I think that has compounded my problem. Aside from parties where everyone is invited, I never hear from any of these people. I have only a couple of good friends, people I can talk to.

I have leaned on my friends to try to help me with my problem. But I'm afraid if I keep unloading on them it'll wear them down, and I don't want to burden them.

I wish I didn't feel so worthless. I know part of my problem is the fact that I am unemployed and worried about money. But this is who I have been my whole life. How do I break the cycle and start feeling good about myself? I'm tired of being lonely all the time. — LONELY IN CHICAGO

DEAR LONELY, One way to stop feeling lonely is to give yourself less time to feel that way. Because you are unemployed and have the time, volunteer some of it. Find a nonprofit that helps homeless gay youth or senior citizens — or, because the political scene is heating up, the party of your choice.

And while you're at it, contact a gay and lesbian center and ask what kind of counseling services it offers, because your problems predate your

unemployment. There is help available in your city. Once you understand why you feel "unworthy of affection" you'll be able to improve your self-esteem. There are better days ahead.

DEAR ABBY, My office was relocated recently, a bit farther away from home than the old one. My new commute involves riding public transportation and then a shared shuttle van.

One of my co-workers, "Phil," rides the same shuttle. He always waits for me to get off the shuttle so he can walk with me to the office. He seems nice enough and well-meaning, but my mornings are my time to prepare myself for the day. He also occasionally touches my arm, which makes me uncomfortable. He also talks about personal things I would rather not hear about.

I would prefer to walk without him, but there is no other way to get to the office. I have debated being 10 minutes late to work each day, but then I would need to stay 10 minutes later and it would be much harder for me to catch the later shuttle.

What do I do? Tell Phil I don't want to walk with him? Walk faster? Go in later? — UNCOMFORTABLE IN SOUTH SAN FRANCISCO
DEAR UNCOMFORTABLE, Tell Phil that as you walk to the office you meditate — that it helps "center" you in preparing for the workday. Explain that when he talks to you or touches you it's distracting, so you would prefer that he go on ahead. It's the truth, and he should accommodate you.

Danny Bryant Hathcoat, 47

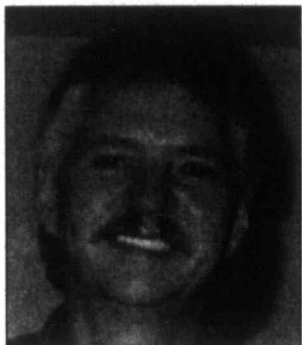
Danny Bryant Hathcoat, 47, died July 26, 2010 in Pampa.

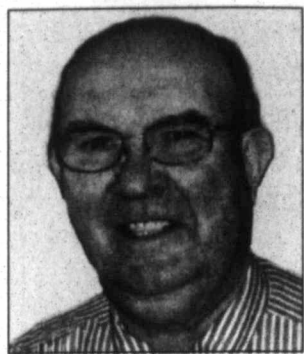

Recovery lost speed in spring

WASHINGTON (AP) — The recovery lost momentum in the spring as growth slowed to a 2.4 percent pace, its most sluggish showing in nearly a year and too weak to drive down unemployment.

Consumers spent less, companies slowed their restocking of shelves and the nation's trade deficit dragged more on the economy in the April-to-June quarter.

The report raises doubts about whether employers will hire enough and consumers will spend enough to invigorate the economy. As unemployment remains near double digits, Congress could feel pressure to pass more stimulus measures to speed the recovery. So far, Republicans and some Democrats have blocked additional spending because of their concerns about the size of the deficit.

Man exonerated after 27 years

HOUSTON (AP) — A judge has ordered that a Houston man who's spent the last 27 years imprisoned for a rape he didn't commit be freed on bond.

During a court hearing Friday, Michael Anthony Green was granted a \$500 bond that will let him walk out of jail. Green was expected to be released later Friday after his paperwork had been processed.

His pending release was made possible after the Harris County District Attorney's Office reopened his case. New DNA tests it commissioned showed he did not commit a 1983 rape of a woman who had been abducted.

Green's release had been set for Thursday, but was delayed a day after he became too emotional and angry while waiting in a holding cell for his court hearing.

Candidate's ticket led to warrant

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Republican candidate for a West Texas congressional seat had an arrest warrant issued for him in 2004 after he failed to pay a speeding ticket.

Francisco Canseco is running against incumbent Rep. Ciro Rodriguez, D-Texas, in the 23 district which includes San Antonio and parts of West Texas.

According to documents obtained by The Associated Press, Canseco was pulled over in April 2004. An arrest warrant was issued after he failed to pay the ticket, though it was eventually paid in full — plus an additional \$50 fine — about 10 months later in January 2005.

Scott Yeldell, Canseco's campaign manager, said Canseco lost track of the ticket after he was pulled over, because it occurred while he was running in a primary. Yeldell said that as soon as Canseco became aware of the ticket and the warrant he paid up.

Deadly July in Afghanistan

KABUL, Afghanistan (AP) — NATO announced Friday that six more U.S. troops have died in Afghanistan, bringing the death toll for July to at least 66 and surpassing the previous month's record as the deadliest for American forces in the nearly 9-year-old war.

In Kabul, police fired weapons into the air to disperse a crowd of angry Afghans who shouted "death to America," hurled stones and set fire to two vehicles after an SUV, driven by U.S. contract employees, was involved in an accident that killed four Afghans.

The contractor, DynCorp International, confirmed that its employees, working on a program sponsored by the U.S. Department of State, were involved in an accident on the airport road. DynCorp said that when its employees got out of their vehicle, they and other DynCorp employees, who arrived at the scene to help, were attacked by the crowd, which burned their vehicles.

Woman recovering after dog attack

TYLER (AP) — An 83-year-old east Texas woman is recovering after being attacked by a pit bull mix authorities say may have been used in illegal dog fighting.

Glynda Hulsey was attacked as she walked to her mailbox in Smith County last week. She made it back to her house, with the dog following, and her husband shot the dog.

She told the *Tyler Morning Telegraph* on Thursday that she had more than 50 stitches and is still using a wheelchair. Smith County Sheriff's Lt. Gary Middleton says they're investigating. He says dog fighting occurs in the county, but the locations move around.

"We have to find the location while the fights are going on to catch them," he said.

Driver obeys law while fleeing cops

CINCINNATI — Cincinnati police say a speeding driver tried to flee arrest while obeying red lights.

Police say a 26-year-old woman was going 78 mph in a 55 mph zone early Friday on Interstate 75 when an officer tried to pull her over. Police say she exited the highway to drive home.

Police say that when the woman reached local streets, she drove the speed limit and stopped at red lights. They used sticks that punctured her tires, just yards from her home.

She told police she feared having her car impounded, which they did.

Police say she resisted, and they used a stun gun before charging her with resisting arrest, failing to comply with police, speeding and driving under suspension.

Today is Friday, July 30, the 211th day of 2010. There are 154 days left in the year.

Today's Highlight in History:

On July 30, 1945, during World War II, the Portland class heavy cruiser USS Indianapolis, which had just delivered components for the atomic bomb that would be dropped on Hiroshima, was torpedoed by a Japanese submarine; only 316 out of some 1,200 men survived.

On this date:

In 1792, the French national anthem "La Marseillaise," by Claude Joseph Rouget de Lisle, was first sung in Paris by troops arriving from Marseille.

In 1932, the Summer Olympic Games opened in Los Angeles.

In 1960, the recently founded American Football League saw its first pre-season game, in which the Boston Patriots defeated the host Buffalo Bills 28-7.

In 1965, President Lyndon B. Johnson signed into law the Medicare bill, which went into effect the following year.

In 1975, former Teamsters union president Jimmy Hoffa disappeared in suburban Detroit.

In 1980, Israel's Knesset passed a law reaffirming all of Jerusalem as the capital of the Jewish state.

Ten years ago: President Hugo Chavez of Venezuela won a fresh six-year term in a landslide re-election.

Five years ago: President George W. Bush was pronounced "fit for duty" after a checkup that showed that the 59-year-old commander-in-chief, an avid mountain bike rider, had lost eight pounds since his last physical exam in December 2004.

One year ago: Harvard scholar Henry Louis Gates Jr. and the Cambridge, Mass. officer who arrested him for disorderly conduct at his home, Sgt. James Crowley, had beers with President Barack Obama and Vice President Joe Biden at White House to discuss the dispute that unleashed a furor over racial profiling in America.

Today's Birthdays: Actor Richard Johnson is 83. Major League Baseball Commissioner Bud Selig is 76. Blues musician Buddy Guy is 74. Movie director Peter Bogdanovich is 71. Former U.S. Rep. He says "Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. And the peace of God, which transcends all understanding, will guard your hearts and your minds in Christ Jesus."

the good word

The first principle Paul teaches us is to not worry or be anxious. We all spend too much time worrying about problems that 90 percent of the time never comes to pass.

The second principle Paul teaches us is that the alternative to worry is prayer. If it is big enough to worry about then it is big enough to pray about. God will take care of the problem if we are willing to give it to Him instead of worrying about it.

The third principle Paul teaches us is to give up our requests to God with a thankful heart. This reminds us how God has answered prayer before and that He will do it again.

The fourth principle that Paul teaches us is that when we pray in this manner then God will give us the peace that transcends all understanding. This peace only comes from God. It is a peace that God gives to comfort us, strengthen us, and to help us deal with worry and troubles.

When God gives us peace, then He guards our hearts and minds so that worry and anxiety don't enter back in. Real inner joy and peace come when the worry and anxiety of life are given to God to take care of and we let Him handle it.

Cornerstone outreach continues

"We have gotten quite a few resumes," Taylor said. "We have an ad in the Southern Baptist Magazine that people can look at. A lot of the Southern Baptist Texas Convention pastors get this."

Taylor said the church has several outreaches they are participating in.

"We're doing Chautauqua again and handing out water to people," Taylor said. "I'm involved in the planning for the Pampa Youth Alliance See You at the Pole."

On August 6 through 11, the church is sending a group to Sturgis, S.D., for evangelism.

"We are going to be giving away a Harley," Taylor said. "People will receive a ticket and will listen to a

three-minute testimony and can enter their ticket into the drawing."

The youth ministry did a mission trip to Las Vegas, N.M., over Spring Break and will be going back August 20 through 22. Taylor said they helped a Baptist Student Ministry at Highlands University.

"We put on a service and concert for them," Taylor said. "We had 35 students show up. We are going back in August with Calvary Baptist and go back to the colleges and help people move in."

Later this month, the church will be kicking off its children and youth ministries. Taylor said they are starting a children's ministry called Cornerstone Kids and will have a rotating schedule of games, choir, Bible stories and crafts. The youth ministry will kick things off with a block party August 18.

"We will have inflatables," Taylor said. "We want the neighborhoods to come and join us. There will be an evangelistic rally where someone will share the message of Christ and there will be chance for people to respond."

Taylor said Cornerstone is a service-oriented church.

"We want to meet the needs of the community," Taylor said. "We want to get out and serve people with no strings attached."

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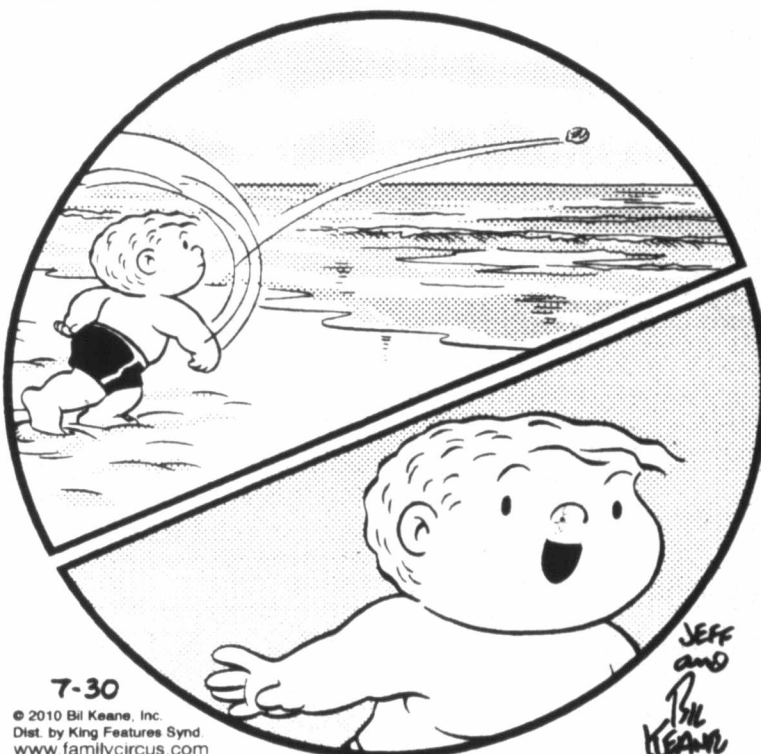

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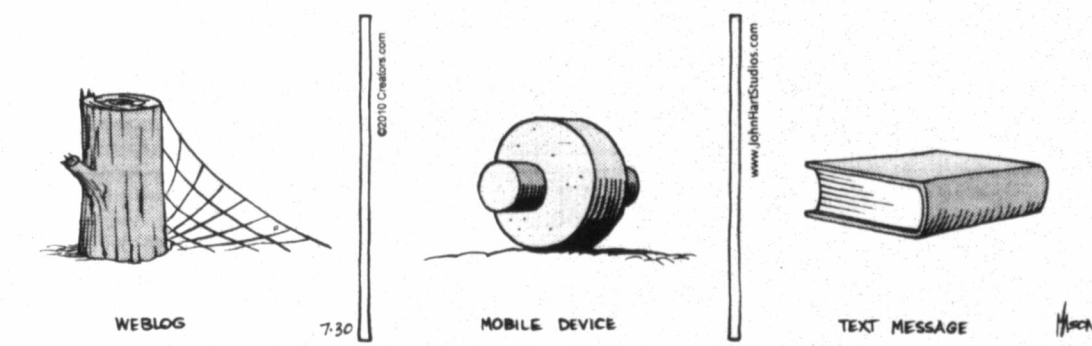

fall short in a 9-3 loss.

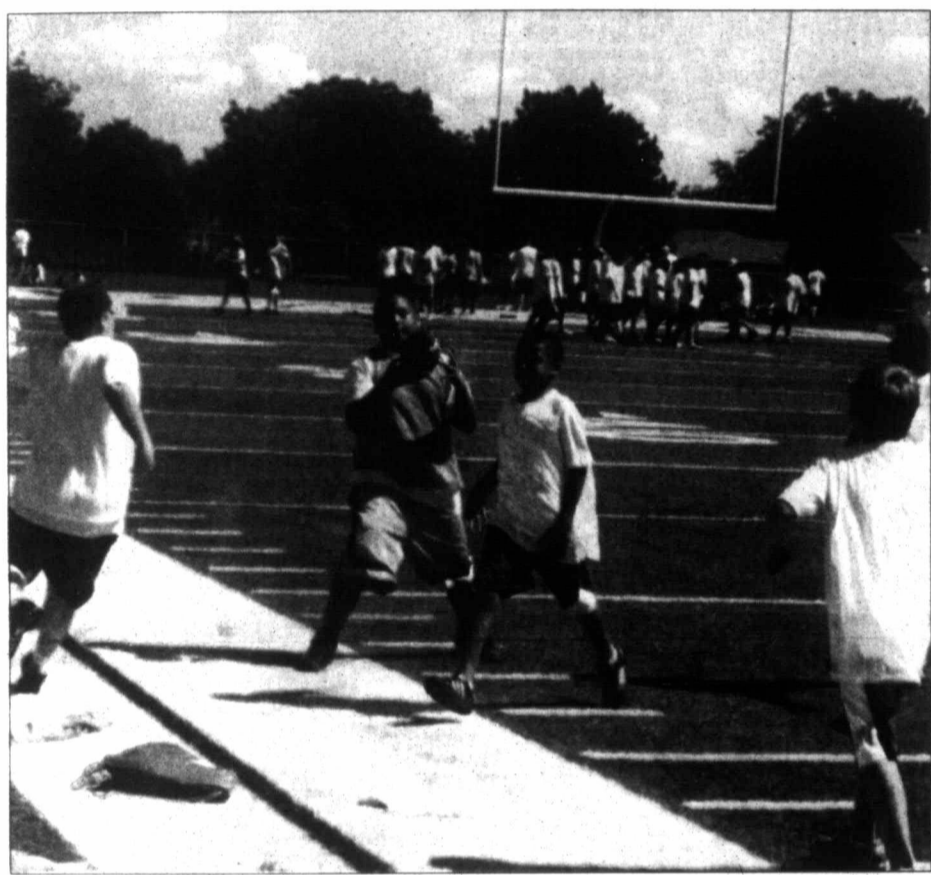

Solid execution by young athletes at Ripken Tourney

For six days, the Cal Ripken 10-year-old Southwest Regional Tournament was in Pampa. During those six days, we witnessed some amazing baseball and skill from nine- to ten-year-olds from defensive gems to unbelievable offensive performances.

To begin, the fundamentals these teams were showing are ones that are going to be of greater importance as they play at older levels. Little Rock was carrying out infield and outfield shifts depending on the batter. The East Central Miss. coach was very vocal about where the ball was going depending on how many outs they had. Texas Tri-County was very skilled on the base paths and did a good job of executing small ball. North Randall County pitcher Trevor Andrus looked a runner back to third to prevent him from scoring on a ground-out.

To be able to win in baseball, you need to keep the other team off the scoreboard. Several teams did this well.

North Randall County only allowed eight runs in five games and four of those runs were scored in their final game. Isaac Maes and Trevor Andrus pitched no-hitters in North Randall County's first two wins. Tri-County only gave up

an average of 2.5 runs per game in eight games played. Plaquemine, La., and East Central Mississippi were the only teams that scored more than three runs against Tri-County.

Benton outfielders assisted on several putouts. Mountain Home's Dawson Brown threw out Benton's Conner Kordsmeier out at second to keep the game going in the bottom of the ninth Saturday. Colson Geisler threw Andrus out at home for the final out of the first inning Wednesday.

Double plays were also key. Benton turned two in their opening game against Pampa. Tri-County turned two in the first game of the championship to help them win 1-0. Tri-County's Weston Aymond went airborne like the Astros' Craig Biggio frequently did in turning one of those. Double plays put an end to offensive momentum and can help get the necessary outs.

Additionally, you can't win games if you don't score runs.

Texas Tri-County did this the best in the tournament and it was one of the reasons they won it. The team average nine runs per game in eight games played. In Four of Tri-County's seven wins they scored in double digits. Kaleb Rael batted .650 which helped him win tournament MVP. Hudson Oliver batted .520 with three home runs. Mason Mays and Isaac Maes were the leading hitters for North Randall. Mays hit two home runs in the final game for three runs batted in. Jacob Wagner was a key contributor to Little Rock's tournament victories.

One of the major things is in five to six years these children will be playing for high school programs. The great high school programs have players that developed their skills at a young age. Randall is one of the top high school programs in the state, and this past week the North Randall County team threw two no hitters against top teams of Mississippi and Arkansas.

Overall, the Cal Ripken 10-year-old Southwest Regional showed an awesome display of baseball skill by 10-year-olds.
